Mutterings from the Chair

First of all, I'd like to thank you, on behalf of the Committee, for giving us the opportunity to run this Eastercon for you. It's going to be a big job, but I'm fortunate to have a great Committee behind me who are working hard at sorting out all of the myriad tasks that go into making a convention happen.

I know that some people have concerns about the programme for *Illustrious*. We take these issues very seriously, and are doing our best to ensure that the convention programme we produce will be a balanced one, taking into account the many different facets of not only our military SF theme but also of our historical theme and our general programme. This is not going to be a gung-ho programme glorifying the use of force, but rather a reflective investigation of the genre and its influence.

As part of our general programme we're also delighted to announce that, for the first time, Eastercon will have its own Poet Laureate, Roz Kaveney. SF poetry is a field that has lurked in the shadows for too long, and we are delighted to give it a chance to take centre stage. We hope to have a poetry link-up with conventions in the US and Australia amongst our programme items, and will have several other items including our poetry, film and creative writing competitions.

Something else that we're doing a little bit differently is that we're going to hold an Admiralty Ball rather than a masquerade. The reasoning for this is that for a while there has been a lot of discussion about the fact that most of the entries to the masquerade nowadays are from chaos costuming rather than pre-planned entries. While these are often inspired and sometimes brilliant, it was decided that perhaps it was time to take a year off in the hope that it might encourage people to plan ahead for future masquerades. We will be holding costuming competitions at the Admiralty Ball and, of course, will be encouraging people to wear hall costumes in the hotel on the Saturday.

Many of you will have heard of the issues we've had with the hotel. Our new hotel liaison, Richard Crawshaw, is working tirelessly to deal with these. He is in regular contact with the hotel to make sure that things go as smoothly as possible from now on. For anyone who prefers not to stay in the con hotel, we will shortly publish information on cheaper local alternatives.

The only thing left for me to do right now is to encourage you to volunteer to take part in the programme, to start planning your hall or ball costumes and, if you haven't done so before, to give some military SF or SF poetry a try.

As Nik has said in her mutterings from the chair we have many ideas in progress. Some of them you need to know about in advance. The next few pages will cover these things.

First Dave Mansfield, our programme supremo shares some thoughts about the programme.

The Programme : an overview

With our guests, we have a superb opportunity to excite your mind and look at a variety of areas in SF, where they already have visualised, speculated and created the fantastic, in words, art, actions and activities.

One of our themes lends itself to proper exploration and discussion. Is military SF a dirty phrase? While political wings may praise or vilify various ideas, we want to objectively take time to look at this whole theme within SF. Heinlein or Haldeman, Scalzi or Bujold - all have written of war. In David Weber and Peter F Hamilton we have two authors with distinct takes on space war, but what's behind their use of this? Should we believe it's a lust for war, or is it a reflection on broader issues, or a way to tell a thrilling tale?

Britain has been at war now for a number of years. During the Second World War there were conscientious objectors from within the SF community. There was accusation from professionals against fans, who lacked nationalism, and there have been anti-war works. Has the genre and the fans reflected the ongoing situation, or is the blog now the panacea or solution?

Our other major theme, SF through the decades will allow us to uncover and take a fresh look both at classic works and works which have been lost to us now, whether it be cover artwork or writing. We want to reflect and recognise what is good and great.

As we look back at this first decade of the 21st century is it time to consider if we, as readers, have had the quality and variety of SF that we had hoped for? Are we finding the genre a beacon of equality and egalitarianism, liberty and freedom or is it being more and more driven by revenue and sales?

Socialising is an important part of the weekend, and there will be plenty of evening entertainment, with:

- a ceilidh band, leading us in series of dances on Friday
- a "Golden Age" themed disco on the Saturday. Be this the golden age of SF, of comics, of fandom, or even of mythology - your attire decides.
- culminating with a Grand Admiralty Ball on Sunday, a chance to show off your regal finest.

A convention is also a chance to let your hair down. We'll be having lots of the less serious stuff too. From panel games, to construction completions, to energetic silliness. And a programme stream for the kids too.

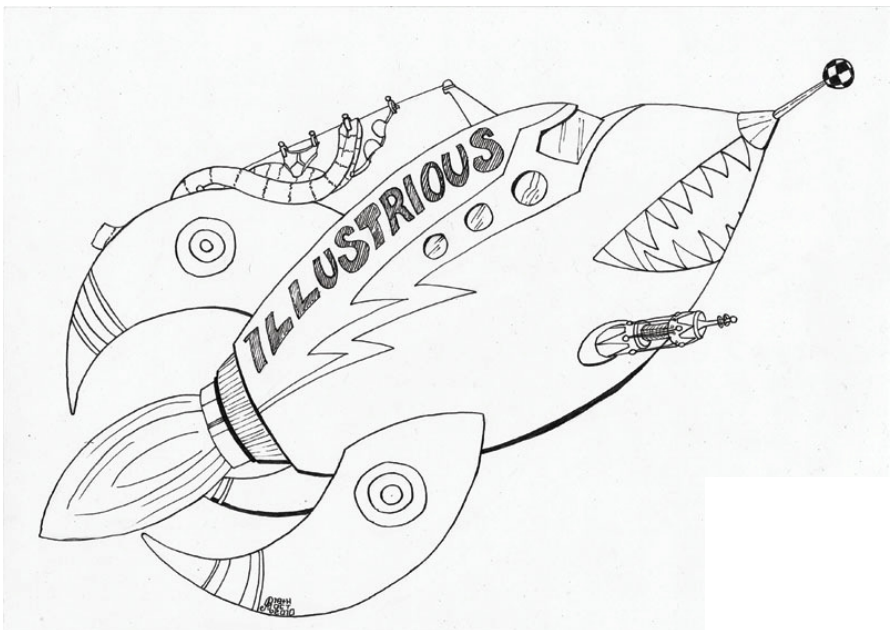

If you'd like to get involved, then drop us a line. We'd love to hear from you. Whether there's just something you want to see or you have something to tell the rest of fandom about please get in touch.

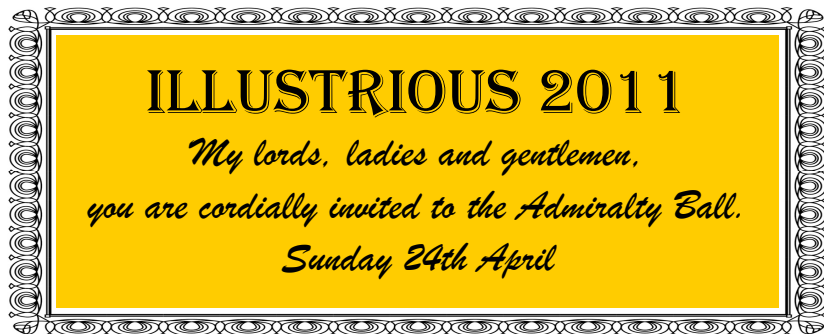

The Admiralty Ball



Illustrious will be offering something a little different on the Sunday night. Instead of the usual masquerade we will be hosting the Admiralty Ball. This is a chance for everyone to dress in their finery (of any world and any time, of course) and dance the evening away. There will still be a costuming competition, and entrants to this will be formally announced upon their arrival by the Master of Ceremonies (with the opportunity for a little theatre), but the intention is to encourage more people to get involved in costuming without the stagefright factor of the masquerade catwalk. It also means that people can get closer to the contestants, that they might better appreciate the amount of time and work that goes into creating some masquerade costumes.

Can't think of a costume? As this won't be a normal masquerade we won't be holding a chaos costuming workshop but will instead hold workshops where you can make badges and other insignia. Come along, create something, pin it onto one of your fan-regulation black t-shirts and you have a costume. If you're dressing for the celidh on Friday night then add a few medals to your highland dress and you're ready to go.

Can't dance? Don't worry - in the days leading up to the ball we'll have a couple of dance workshops where you can learn some of the more formal dances (at least a couple of which will be wheelchair-friendly). As the evening draws on we'll switch from the formal dancing to something a bit more relaxed.

Uniforms are, of course, welcome, but you needn't limit yourself to a uniform. After all, such an event would be attended by the great and the good of many worlds. Fancy yourself as a diplomat? Or maybe a visiting head of state? All of these (and more) are welcome at the Illustrious Admiralty Ball.

The Con Charities

As usual, Eastercon will be supporting several charities with various fund-raising events throughout the convention. As one of our themes is military SF we have decided to support a military charity, a charity that supports civilian naval personnel, and a humanitarian charity which supports the victims of war and other disasters. These are Help For Heroes, Seafarers UK, and Medecins Sans Frontiers. The money we raise over the weekend will be split equally between the three charities.

Help For Heroes is an umbrella charity supporting those from all three services who have been wounded in the service of the UK in current and recent conflicts. They support infrastructure projects such as rehabilitation centres and



also provide grants to specialist organisations working directly with the wounded.

Seafarers UK - www.seafarers-uk.org

Seafarers UK (formerly King George's Fund for Sailors) is an umbrella organisation that has been providing support to seafarers and their families since 1917. They provide grants to charities supporting not only the Royal Navy and Royal Marines, but also the Merchant Navy, lifeboat and fishing fleets and their equivalents throughout the Commonwealth.



Medecins Sans Frontiers - www.msf.org

Medecins Sans Frontiers is an independent, apolitical organisation that provides medical help to populations worldwide who have fallen victim to natural or man-made disasters. Their stated aim is to alleviate human suffering, to protect life and health and to restore and ensure respect for human beings and their fundamental human rights.



Competitions

Feeling inspired?



That's a pretty impressive picture, isn't it? The colour version, available on the Illustrious website, is even more so. David Hardy our artist Guest of Honour painted it as a commission and suggested that we might like to use it as the inspiration for a competition. So here it is: the Illustrious Creative Writing competition.

There are four categories, two prose and two poetry:

- * A short story of EXACTLY 2011 words (you didn't think we were going to make it easy for you, did you?)
- * A drabble (100 words)
- * A sonnet (any sonnet form described in Wikipedia) or sestina
- * A haiku

But that's not all...

Illustrious is also holding a short film competition. Entries should be no more than 10 minutes in length and should take as their subject something related to one or more of our main themes - military SF, SF through the ages, or poetry in SF. These should be submitted in either .avi or DVD format.

The competitions will be judged by a panel including our GoHs and prizes will be

presented at the closing ceremony. The winning literary works will be published in the convention souvenir book after the con and the winning film will be shown at the end of the closing ceremony.

Literary entries should be emailed to competitions@illustrious2011.org.uk or sent to the convention postal address. Film entries should be sent on disc to the convention address. The closing date for all competitions is noon on April 1st 2011, although we would ask anyone planning to enter the film competition to let us know by February 15th 2011 so that we know how much time we'll need to give the judging within the programme schedule.

ILLUSTRIOUS ART SHOW

We are delighted that Robbie Bourget will command our art show. She writes:

I will be limiting panels to 12 - 4'x2' (HxW) per artist plus one half table as a maximum. If your work is primarily 3-D, I can offer you up to 4 half table (2.5 feet) spaces as a maximum. If you want to have some of both, discuss your needs with me and we will work something out. I will, again, be allowing 'prints', which can be exactly that or cards or t-shirts. However, I will be requiring that all of these be displayed on a table next to the control table, so that I can keep a closer eye on things more easily. If you have a display stand for your items, please feel free to bring it. A reminder that the longest stretch for panels [usuall]y is 6 foot wide and you are more likely to be working with 4 foot or 2 foot wide sections. If you have large items – tell me! I will try to allocate space to account for such requests if possible.

Once you have sent me a request for space, I will send you:

Artist Control Sheet to list all your pieces individually;

Bid Sheet x 4 so that one bid sheet goes with each piece displayed;

Artist Control – Prints for any items for direct sale only to be listed on.

Please make a bid sheet for each type of item as well, so that that can be with the display. Please feel free to make copies as needed of any of these documents.

To request space, send me an e-mail request at robbiebourget@aol.com and I will send these documents to you or you can download them from the website.

I am going to provide a table with some paper, coloured pencils, odds and ends like white tack, and such for the younger set to attempt some artwork of their own on site and I would like to ask if any of the artists would be willing to take a few minutes to act as a judging panel. I am also going to see if I can persuade the youngsters to do a judging of their favourite pieces in the Show, just to be fair. Hope to hear from all of you ;>

Hotel Stuff

The hotel is the Birmingham Metropole which is adjacent to Birmingham International railway station and airport. It is also easily accessed from junction 6 of the M42.

Room Rates

As some of you are aware there has been an issue with VAT on the room rates. Currently these are £50 + VAT per person per night for a double occupancy room and £60 + VAT per person per night for a single occupancy room; which works out at the 2011 VAT rates as £60 and £72 pppn, respectively. However, I am currently attempting to resolve this. I have a meeting scheduled with the hotel in early November, unfortunately too late to meet the copy date for this PR. Parking

We do have a reduced price for parking at the hotel. The standard rate is £12 per 24 hours; our rate is £3 including VAT per 24 hours.

Food and Drink

We also have reduced rates for food and bar. Attendees will probably need to use the bar(s) set up for the convention to get these rates; again this is not yet fully arranged. Further details will be in later publications and on the website when more is known.

The plan for food is to have an extended breakfast, with lunch and dinner also available over a longer time frame, and the traditional late night nosh. We are currently sorting out food options with the hotel; we want to have a range of fixed menu options for each meal that vary by meal and by day, to give as wide a selection as possible. The intention is to have menus that are flexible and can accommodate as wide a range of dietary requirements as possible, though we can't guarantee that we will be able to accommodate *all* dietary requirements. To help the hotel catering please let me know if you have any particular dietary requirement. This information will be held in strict confidence and personally identifiable details will not be passed on. It will be used to define the range of dietary requirements and the number of people who fall into each.

Internet

We are currently working out the options on Internet connectivity. The bedrooms have wired Internet and there is BT Openzone in the public areas. Again we will announce further details later.

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Guests of Honour

We are very pleased with our Guests. We want to introduce them to you if you are perhaps not yet acquainted with their work or contributions to the SF and Fantasy. We have five guests. In this PR we do not have space for a piece on each of them. David Hardy our Artist Guest and Roz Kaveney our Poet Laureate will be the subjects of articles in the next PR. Here however you will find articles on David Weber, Peter Hamilton and Vince Docherty.

And A Star To Sail By: David Weber

One of the themes of *Illustrious* is military SF and the works of David Weber fall clearly into this sub-genre of SF. However series such as the Honor Harrington books (the Honorverse) and the *Safehold* series (mankind's last low tech refuge against a far more powerful alien foe) are as equally at home in the sub-genre of the historical novel dedicated to the nautical tradition as they are to military SF.

The progenitor of this sub-genre was C.S. Forester, creator of the not quite inimitable Captain Horatio Hornblower, the 'not quite' as this character appears to have inspired Patrick O'Brian's Captain Jack Aubrey, amongst others in the contemporary nautical tradition.

In SF Hornblower has inspired Gene Roddenberry's Captain James Tiberius Kirk, Poul Anderson's Ensign Flandrey and David Feintuch's Nicholas Seafort amongst other notable Captains.

The pedigree of David Weber's (and Honor Harrington's) literary antecedents is therefore quite clear. The first of the Honor Harrington Books (*On Basilisk Station*, 1992) is dedicated to Forester and the series parallels its progenitor as a homage, with history repeating itself with the Star Kingdom of Manticore standing in for Great Britain and the Peoples Republic of Haven for Revolutionary France.

There is therefore considerable fun to be had in spotting the historical and Hornblower references over and above the joy of the story. At one point David Weber has Honor Harrington read Hornblower, and remarking that Forester seemed to know what he was talking about, in a 'knowing wink' to the fans of Hornblower.

The Honorverse now stands at 13 novels (including the forthcoming *A Rising Thunder* in 2012, five anthologies with work by other writers, the Saganami sub-series (2 novels) and the Wages of Sin subseries with Eric Flint (also 2 novels).

The latter led to an inadvertent reprieve for Honor Harrington, scheduled to die to accommodate the original Honorverse Chronology and be replaced by her children as principle protagonists. However as is often the case this plan did not survive contact with the enemy, and a new war started in the Honorverse when the children were still toddlers, throwing out the original chronology.

In its new chronology the series now appears to be evolving beyond its progenitor and moving into previously uncharted territory in *Mission of Honour*, 2010, with Manticore and Haven finding a common foe, and starting an entirely new sequence in this established universe taking on the rich, corrupt, powerful Earth based Solarian League and its proxies. Fans await developments with eager anticipation.

The Safehold Series (running currently to four books) on the other hand whilst largely as concerned with the projection of Naval Power as the Honorverse, is set within a low-tech sailpower world rather than a starfaring milieu. It features a nascent sea trading power adopting forbidden technical innovation (through outside hi-tech help) to survive a repressive Luddite religious edict (shades of Edmund Cooper's *The Cloud Walker*) to destroy them and the change they represent to create a unified world capable of taking back the stars for humanity.

Unlike the Honorverse, the Safehold Series is mid sequence with *Off Armageddon Reef* published in 2007 and the most recent, *A Mighty Fortress* published this year (2010). A fifth so far unnamed volume is due to be published in Spring/Summer 2011, we can only hope in time for *Illustrious*.

Both series represent the output of a prolific author, and yet these are not David Weber's only work. There are other military SF series and novels, contributions to other shared worlds and an entire fantasy series yet to be explored and which make him probably the hardest working author in SF (Harry Turtledove is his only real challenger to this title). Despite this there has been no diminution in quality, so for his fans he is the ideal author, he regularly turns out more of the same high quality Honorverse, whilst at the same time producing exciting unrelated major new work. The only problem is the size of the back catalogue, which may be a little daunting to the new reader, but even then it is pretty much all e-accessible making it an opportunity rather than a drawback.

A Mindstar Risen: Peter F. Hamilton

Writing about Peter Hamilton puts me in a quandary. He is a Big Name Author certainly, but one of whom comparatively little is known, outside of his on-line biographies.

This may be because he never went to University and is instead a graduate of the University of Life (with a First). It was University where so many of us entered SF Fandom for the first time, joined societies and attempted to write. He just started to write one day and didn't stop, thankfully.

It may be because he doesn't live in London or one of the big conurbations, but instead based in lovely rural Rutland, the setting for *Mindstar Rising* and the other Greg Mandel books.

It may be that he isn't a compulsive/obsessive blogger like so many of his contemporaries, and has a comparatively small on-line profile as a consequence. This means he spends almost all of his time as a writer just writing fiction. That, as a reader of his fiction suits me to the ground.

And yet despite this, he is an SF author who has escaped from the traditional SF Convention Circuit to become a big name draw at events such as the SFX Weekender and the recent MCM Expo in the ExCel Centre in London. I was at the Expo myself as an Exhibitor with the Victorian Steampunk Society with my remote controlled steampunk dalek. Peter Hamilton was the bigger draw.

As a consequence I do hope someone on the Committee has told him Illustrious is at the Hilton Hotel at the NEC and not the NEC itself, otherwise he may be sitting at a table in the NEC wondering where everybody else is. For Peter Hamilton this would not be an unreasonable mistake to make.

I myself started reading Peter Hamilton with *Mindstar Rising*, 1993, intrigued by the East Midlands setting (my family live in Loughborough, and I read the Adrian Mole books for exactly the same reason) and the near future it portrayed. Definitely military SF (or in this case ex-military SF), featuring The Mindstar Brigade comprising artificially induced psychics drawn from every branch of military service. The sequels *A Quantum Murder*, 1994 and *The Nano Flower*, 1995 were also gratefully received.

It was somewhat perturbing then to find out that Greg Mandel and the Mindstar Brigade were to be set aside for a huge new Space Opera Trilogy, *Night's Dawn*, 1996-1999. I had enjoyed E.E Doc Smith when I was 11 (the perfect age to do so in my opinion) re-reading them in my adult life left me slightly embarrassed of my earlier appreciation of his work. I had matured in my tastes and Doc Smith had stayed the same.

It was therefore a terrific surprise when reading *The Reality Dysfunction*, 1996, it had all those parts I had really enjoyed of Space Opera when 11, but had themes and complexities which satisfied the adult me. Kimball Kinnison is the ultimate self-sacrificing clean cut hero, too good to be true. The prat. Joshua Calvert on the other hand is in fact a bit of a shit, but in saving the universe at least comes to terms with the fact that he is a bit of a shit. He is far more believable as a character. Space Opera for adults.

For me the next significant book was the short novella *Watching Trees Grow*, which I bought in Waterstones Manchester as part of a limited signed and numbered special edition from PS Publishing. An excellent pithy read, which reminded me of a favourite novel, *Methuselah's Children* by Robert Heinlein. I was distraught therefore when *Watching Trees Grow* was completely ruined by a flood to my cellar. It was the worst individual loss of the 200 or so affected books.

However, a couple of years later I was at a Con (probably Orbital) where there

was a Peter Hamilton signing. I rushed to the dealers' room where there was a surfeit of appropriate titles I already owned. To my surprise however there was a second hand mass market edition of *Watching Trees Grow*. I bought this and rushed to the signing session, presenting to Peter the thinnest and cheapest of all his books to sign. Everyone else had the very large and very expensive new books sold for this purpose. He must have thought me to be a terrible cheapskate and opportunist, although I did try to explain to him it was to replace a much loved expensive special edition. I don't think he believed me. I wouldn't have.

I hope therefore at Illustrious I can really put the record straight, and speak to him on the Commonwealth Universe books, *Misspent Youth*, 2002, *Pandora's Star*, 2004, *Judas Unchained*, 2005 and the *Void Trilogy*, 2007- 2010. In fact I have held off buying the *Evolutionary Void* the third and final volume of the Void series so I can get a brand spanking new copy for signing at Illustrious and erase the awkwardness of my previous meeting with Peter Hamilton. Here's hoping at least.

Vincent Docherty Fan Guest of Honour.

No one would have believed in July 1978 at Faircon in Glasgow, that the sixteen year old, just dropped off by his parents, who felt simultaneously very awkward among strangers and also immediately sensed that there were a lot of people like him there, and who had a great time would later bstride two Glasgow Worldcons, like a Colossus, where we petty fen would walk under his huge legs and peep about, to find ourselves dishonourable pastimes.

Vince Docherty is many things to many people, but his ability to organise, talk common sense, understand, communicate and excite has meant that some people call him a 'Great Leader' when it comes to his con running skills. He is a gentle and kind man, thoughtful, intelligent and warm.

Vince began reading early (both his parents being teachers probably helped) starting with the children's magazines of the day such as Look and Learn/Tell Me Why. He was reading children's books early and then quickly started devouring the SF section of the local library.

He proudly recalls *'buying my first books when I was about 12 - they were the Foundation Trilogy and Dragonflight. After that I spent most of my spare time reading. I recall that Olaf Stapeldcon's Starmaker made a big impression as did many Clarke books. I also started reading Tolkien mid-teens and read some fantasy books for a while but that tailed-off. My favourite reading remains towards Hard-SF/Space Opera/Literary/Political SF, although I will try out new things.'*

A fan of SF and Fantasy TV shows and movies, he enjoyed Batman, Doctor Who, the classic cartoons, the Gerry Anderson series and Trek when it came along. The 1960's Space race was also a major event in shaping the young Vince's tastes, and he vividly remembers watching the moon landing.

Like many a conrunner, he started humbly, although he is unsure whether he started his fanac by gophering at either the 1980 Eastercon 'Albacon' or 'Hitchercon' later that year. 1980 saw him attending the local fan group FOKT and the Strathclyde University SF Group, S4 - which he would later run. By 1983 with some University buddies he ran the small September con 'Invention' with Chris Boyce as GoH, in the Central Hotel. From this many other fans have come and it would be Glasgow where he would be proudest, bringing the 1995 Worldcon there.

He is honoured here without doubt for his fan activities, but this is not a place just to list his successes. Knowing the Science Fiction fan is as much about knowing their tastes as their achievements. His favoured, he hates having favourites, as he can never decide, but amongst his favoured classic SF titles are, The Dispossessed (Le Guin), Lord of Light (Zelazny), Star Maker (Stapledon), Childhood's End (Clarke), Dying Inside (Silverberg). Looking at the works that have excited him in this brave new century, he of course cheats, and includes, Blindsight (Peter Watts), Revelation Space (Reynolds), Air (Geoff Ryman), Laundry stories (Stross), Culture novels (Banks) and the Harry Potter series (Rowling). An interesting selection there by any account.

Not someone to sit on laurels, he hopes to take an active part in helping Illustrious to create programme. In the real world, he is 'Senior Organisation Effectiveness Consultant' but this just trains his strategic and innovative mind, for more fun things, such as bringing live orchestras to cons. His suggestions for Illustrious, remain a scary secret.
