A (challenging) fifteen minute walk away is a Toby Carvery. If you drive you need to head up the Ring Road and turn back on yourself at the Asda roundabout. The food at the carvery is cheap, quick and filling. If you are seated before 7pm it is just a fiver and meals are £7.50 after that.

Starters and puddings are available, but we didn't see the need for a starter, or have room for a pudding. Beef, Gammon and Turkey are always available along with eight types of vegetables, plus Yorkshire Puddings that appeared to be deep fried.

Saturday's special is lamb, with a couple of extra dishes available. Fish and Vegetarian options are mentioned on the menu. Restaurant recommended by David Haddock.

This new endeavour from the BSFA, intended as an arts and humanities counterpart to the SF Foundation's popular George Hay memorial scientific lecture, has got off to a strong start with 'Visualising Time in the Middle Ages' by Dr Shana Worthen.

Her fascinating talk on the measurement and visualisation of time during the (somewhat nebulously defined) medieval period.

Shana began by explaining some of the different calendars in use throughout Europe (in 12th-16th Century France, for example, the year started on Easter Sunday) and then moved on to an exploration of how individual days were divided into hours. She then discussed the various mechanisms that were developed for measuring time: sundials, water-clocks, marked candles, astrolabes, mechanical clocks and sand hourglasses. We also learned about allegorical depictions of time, and the "New Iconography of the Virtues" (or "The Virtues Went Shopping") in which several allegorical figures acquired about as many additional items and attributes as they could carry. I look forward to learning more about the Hedgehog of Nineveh at a later date.

All in all, an excellent start to what I hope will be a long tradition of BSFA lectures at Eastercon – Nicholas Jackson.

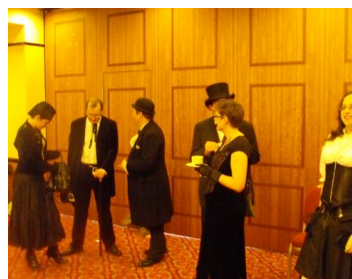
