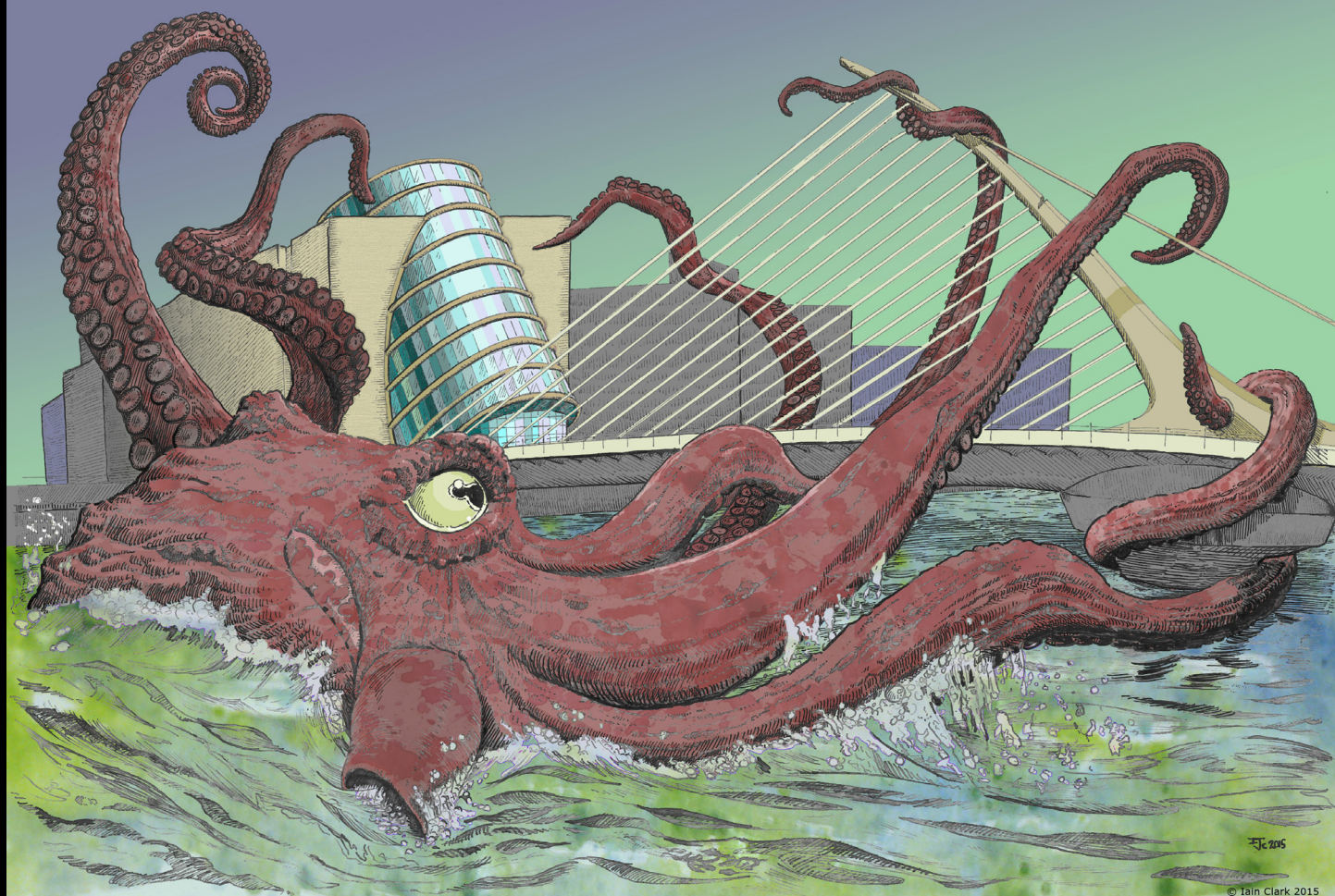

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CHAIR'S INTRODUCTION

Good afternoon and welcome to Mancunicon's Souvenir Book.

I hope you had a good time and look back with fond memories. I think Manchester treated us very well, I don't think I drank the same beer twice all weekend, and there were hardly any complaints. Though please let's not talk about the too small programme rooms any more, please!

So, Democracy. Democracy and the Future of Eastercons.

I think Eastercons are deeply democratic – we have a system for choosing our leaders in free and fair elections; we encourage active participation by all our members; we protect the rights of all our members; and we have a rule of law, in which rules apply equally to all our members. (*Everyone* must wear their badge!)

I know there's no written constitution and the whole process can be anarchic and rough around the edges sometimes, but an Eastercon is a great example of a functioning democracy.

This democratic spirit affects our behaviour in lots of ways, some obvious, some less so. The Art Show for example, doesn't pick and choose from prospective exhibitors, it's more or less first come, first served. The same goes for the dealers' room. Moderators in Programme items are encouraged to let conversation go where it will and encourage audience participation. Almost all events held in convention space are open to all members. All volunteers are members, who have bought their membership and paid for their hotel. The Committee is made up of people who are interested in putting on an Eastercon, and they're all paying their own way as well. Your level of involvement in Eastercon programme depends on your level of interest and the contribution you can make, not on how important or professional you are.

So, at the moment the only people who get to decide anything about an individual Eastercon are the membership, acting through the Business Session; and the Committee elected

by that membership. There's really strong precedent for this. Can an Eastercon be held in Jersey? Do we need a written constitution? Can a Chair be replaced by the Committee? What happens if a Committee resigns early enough for a Business Session to replace them? What happens if a Committee resigns too late for a Business Session to replace them?

On and off over the 20 or so years I've been coming to Eastercons, there's been discussions about what changes we need to make and how we need to make them. Currently we're dealing with a cluster of very practical problems about continuity and links between individual Eastercons – copyrights and trade marks, bank accounts, data protection, artshow boards, security and safety reports, historical hotel information, DBS Checking and child protection, the Eastercon wiki – that could use practical solutions. We have actually found solutions to some of these – in the usual disorganised and slightly anarchic way – but some of these continue to be headaches for each individual Eastercon.

What makes this current set of problems different is that we, the membership acting through the Business Session, have appointed a group to look for answers and try and find long-term solutions. They've done a lot of detailed work and they're getting close to solutions. While the Future of Eastercons group had no official role at Mancunicon, the Mancunicon Committee did attempt to get them involved and to try out some of their ideas at a real event. We also had some ideas of our own we tried out.

Based on that experience, I have some comments for you, the membership to consider.

First, if we do create some sort of permanent *Eastercon, Inc* board we'll have to be very, very careful how much control we give them over individual Eastercons. Giving them even quite trivial controls over **requiring** all Eastercons to use particular bank accounts or websites or companies could quite distort the existing



balance of power. I trust I don't need to explain why giving some unelected group broad powers over Eastercons would be a really bad idea – would you want this group to preapprove bids, for example?

One issue is that it's already very difficult to find a suitable hotel. So if the group placed a requirement on hotels for future bids that could make finding a hotel impossible. Even something very reasonable sounding like *all the program rooms and bedrooms must be in the same hotel*, or something minor like *the hotel must have enough chairs in the bar for a standard Eastercon*.

Second, we need to look closely at who gets to be on this board. The most recent proposal I've seen is to use recent Eastercon Chairs and give them permission to co-opt others. Trust me, a sitting Eastercon Chair already has too much power in our anarchic democracy! And Eastercon Chairs are typically people who like to *do* things, just the sort of people who will try and place requirements on future bids.

There are better choices – we could elect people from the Business Session for fixed terms; we could decide that anyone who'd ever been elected by the Business Session to a Committee could be involved if they wanted; we could allow *anyone* who's a member of an Eastercon to join this *Eastercon, Inc*; we could decide every Eastercon Chair ever; we could decide every decision has to be agreed by the Business Session. The larger versions of these groups would be anarchic, unwieldy and slow to make changes or decisions, but I think *slow-to-make-decisions* is a necessary feature not a bug. We don't need to do anything in a hurry,

we need to do stuff properly.

Thirdly, a lot of innovation comes from the Eastercon Committees and we want to make sure those Committees remain empowered. For an example of something we did, remember my comment above that I feel the role of Chair is over-powered? To a large extent a Chair can do what they want. If a Chair does something unreasonable or harasses somebody, there is no-one the Membership could complain to. The Chair is supposed to be subject to the same rules as everyone else and the membership's only option is bloody revolution.



I realised I wasn't comfortable with this, it went against my democratic principles; so Mancunicon appointed an Ombudsman, someone for the members to complain to if they felt the Chair or Committee behaved unreasonably. There were some complaints, but with the Ombudsman's help they were resolved to the membership's satisfaction.

Every Eastercon should have an Ombudsman. And

every Eastercon should have the freedom to innovate and experiment.

Thank you

Finally, thank you for letting me use my position as Mancunicon's Chair to share these thoughts with you. Being elected to be the Chair of an Eastercon by you guys was one of the highlights of my life, and I've tried all the way through to be worthy of that trust. Thank you to everybody for everything!

ALIETTE DE BODARD, GUEST OF HONOUR

I've been going to Eastercon since 2008: the only one I missed was the 2014 in Glasgow (I had a nursing baby, and we were headed to the Worldcon in London a bit later in the year!). It's always a fun time for discovering new books, meeting friends old and new, and hanging out in the bar for far longer than reasonable!

When Dave Lally asked me if I wanted to be Guest of Honour at Mancunicon, I was there-fore over the moon, and much looking forward to the con. In conversation with Emma England, I hit upon the idea of offering a cooking demo as a change from the usual panels, feeling (at the time) only mildly stressed that in spite of my passion for cooking, I had no experience in public demos, and not much either in the way of holding people's attention in a solo item.

Fast forward a couple of months, and things are looking very different. I managed to drag the fabulous Zen Cho to Manchester as my guest. I'm also seven months pregnant, and under strict doctor's orders to not over-strain myself if I don't want to give birth prematurely. As a result of which, the cooking demo has suddenly been upgraded to a double act, with Zen filling in for the stuff I won't be able to do (like standing up for most of the demo, a prospect that was emphatically shot down by my doctor), and I try not to angst.

It does not start auspiciously: the kitchens of the Hilton are confusing, the crate of supplies is intimidatingly big for something that was supposed to be a simple dish, and when we walk into the room it's full of people (a positive sign but not one that helps with my levels of angst).

Fortunately, it's cooking. Along with talking

SFF, it's one of the things I could do in my sleep. There are a few technical issues: it's really hard to do a cooking demo when the closest source of running water is outside the room, and even a simple thing like washing knives turn into an adventure. And cooking demos, it turns out, are a bit like cooking in the kitchen of a rental place: you never quite know what you're going to get. In particular, getting used to the knife took more time than I'd planned: it turned out that talking and chopping a shallot at the same time can be a very risky activity (I didn't cut myself, but I did have to markedly slow down on the talking). Fortu-

nately with two cooks there's always some-one talking.

And then there's the infamous "bowls with holes" incident, aka the one thing we'll remember about this cooking demo for *years*. The demo involved pouring boiling water into a bowl to cook some rice noodles. Everything went well up to the "pouring water" part, when we suddenly discovered that the bowl only looked waterproof: it had a hole in it (don't ask me why. This isn't my dream bowl design).



Of course, we only found that out after the entire tablecloth turned into a swamp. A cursory examination of all the bowls confirmed that yes, all of them had holes, and that, no, none of them were going to be useful to hold any sort of liquids. We make do, but it's a really awkward moment.

But overall it's all gone swimmingly well: Zen and I bounce off each other in awesome ways (apparently we have a future as a comedy cooking duo, if writing and engineering/lawyering fail us), the food is coming together, looking and smelling good, and the audience is



engaged, watching us chop shallots and beefs and asking lots of questions. And, at the end, people queue up to eat the dish, a sure sign of success.

Would we do it again? Heck, yes. We're planning to submit a cooking demo to programming for the Worldcon in Helsinki in 2017, and hope for another chance to wrangle knives and chopping boards!

They might not understand why we ask for bowls with no holes, though.

Bò Bún (beef on rice vermicelli)

Ingredients

220g beef
160g bun noodles
2 shallots, chopped
1 tablespoon nước mắm
2 big garlic cloves, chopped
1 stalk lemongrass
1 tablespoon sugar
4 sprigs mint leaves, or to taste
4 sprigs coriander, or to taste
80g soy beans, washed
A handful roasted unsalted peanuts
4 big salad leaves
Nước chấm dipping sauce, to taste

Instructions

1. Make the beef marinade: mix together the nuoc mam, garlic, lemongrass and sugar. Cut the beef in thin slices, mix with the marinade, and leave for half an hour (longer if you can).
2. On a medium stove, cook the beef until it's done. Cover, and take away from the stove.
3. Pour boiling water on the bun noodles, and mix them with chopsticks until they turn opaque white and are no longer brittle. Drain the noodles and leave them to cool.
4. Pound the peanuts into small pieces with a mortar and pestle.
5. Put the bowls together: put half the noodles in them, followed by the beef, followed by the salad torn into small bits, followed by the soy beans, mint, coriander, and crushed peanuts.
6. Add about 3 tablespoons of nước chấm, or to taste. Mix well, and eat.

Nước chấm (basic dipping sauce)

Ingredients

Basic measuring unit: juice of one lime

2 units of nước mắm
2 units of sugar
4-6 units of water
1 garlic clove, chopped into small pieces
1 teaspoon of chilli garlic sauce (I use Lee Kum Kee, which is medium hot, since the point isn't to take out your taste buds)

Instructions

1. Mix everything, and leave to settle in the fridge for a while (ideally, overnight, but it still works if you leave it around ten minutes. It needs to settle, though, don't skip that part).

Note

If you're NOT using 35° fish sauce (and if your bottle of nước mắm carried no inscriptions, chances are you're using the US standard of 20°), adjust by 20/35.

Bò cuốn (wrapped beef rolls)

Ingredients

220g beef
160g bun noodles
2 shallots, chopped
1 tablespoon nước mắm
2 big garlic cloves, chopped
1 stalk lemongrass
1 tablespoon sugar
4 sprigs mint leaves, or to taste
4 sprigs coriander, or to taste
One big salad (iceberg, for instance)
1 carrot, julienned into matchsticks
1 cucumber, julienned into matchsticks
Rice papers
Nước chấm dipping sauce, to taste

Instructions

1. Make the beef marinade: mix together the nước mắm, garlic, lemongrass and sugar. Cut the beef in thin slices, mix with the marinade, and leave for half an hour (longer if you can).
2. On a medium stove, cook the beef until it's done. Cover, and take away from the stove.
3. Pour boiling water on the bun noodles, and mix them with chopsticks until they turn opaque white and are no longer brittle. Drain the noodles and leave them to cool.
4. Assemble the rolls as you eat them: one roll is a bit of beef, a bit of noodles (*not* too many!), 3-4 soy beans, 1-2 carrot bits, 1-2 cucumber bits, a few salad leaves, and a sprinkling of coriander and mint.



DAVID L. CLEMENTS, GUEST OF HONOUR



When I was growing up someone who worked on space missions, studied the origins of the Universe, the evolution of galaxies, and who was starting to search for signs of life in our own Solar System would have sounded like a character in science fiction. Add to that a dabbling in writing both fiction (science fiction of course!) and non-fiction, as well as teaching at a world ranking university and this person begins to sound rather far-fetched.

And yet that is now my daily life. I type this sitting on a 777 airliner about to take off for Hawaii where I'm meant to be using one of the large telescopes on Mauna Kea to look for dust in galaxies inside distant galaxy clusters only a couple of billion years after the Big Bang. The encroaching tropical storm Derby must only be there to add dramatic tension.

How did I get here?

The glib answer is that I walked down the jet way to the plane, but the real answer involves science fiction and the fannish community of which Eastercons in general, and Mancunicon in particular, are great examples. My initial interest in science was sparked in equal measure by Apollo and related NASA projects, and by the SF of the late 60s/early 70s – *Dr Who*, *Thunderbirds* and the rest of Gerry

Anderson, *Star Trek* and the like. Even shows that might be taken as ostensibly anti-science, like *Doomwatch*, still used science to identify and deal with whatever was the menace of the week. From all this I learnt that science was an effective way to learn the world, to make it better, and that it was not only the wave of the future but the only way we were going to get there.

Fandom arrived for me when I got to university, in the form of the Imperial College Science Fiction Society, ICSF. They had a library – at that time this meant a couple of cupboards full of books in an obscure part of the Students Union building – and their own convention, Picocon. The second of its name was the first con ever I went to (what happened at Picocon 1 is still lost in the mists of history) and gave a glimpse of a broader community of SF fans who were not only interested in SF but many broader issues related to science, space, the future and much more. I liked Picocon so much that the next year I agitated for the society to run another.

The result of that was my first smoffing, not that I knew it at the time, and I became chair for Picocon Pi and then the society as a whole. Promoting Picocon Pi and later instances



brought me to the Tun and London fandom in general, making friendships that have lasted the subsequent 30 years. I liked running Picocons so much that I got involved with an Eastercon bid that culminated in the 1992 Eastercon, Illumination.

Throughout all of this I was talking formally and informally at conventions and fan meetings about the science I was doing. Making sure that there was a significant science element in the programme at the cons I was involved with was also becoming something I did. When you work every day in a field like astrophysics being surrounded by people pushing back the frontiers of knowledge seems ordinary, but the true extraordinariness of it was brought home to me by my fannish friends who helped me not only keep my head a little outside the clouds, but also fed me their excitement and enthusiasm for what I was doing.

In 1995, Simon Bradshaw, John Bray, Amanda Baker and I ran the science programme at the Glasgow Worldcon, Intersection. I realised I had found my fannish calling, and have been running science programming at a wide range of conventions ever since, mixing real science guests with writers and expert fans in ways I hope are interesting, approachable and informative.

Fandom also brought me to Manchester for the first time, when I was part of the senior staff for the 1998 Eastercon, Intuition.

Unlike Mancunicon, with its futuristic arcology

of a hotel, Intuition used two different hotels, split across a busy road, that were more historical in architecture. They're both still there. The long winding staircases of the Victorian-styled Britannia and the oddly shaped concrete brutalism of what is now the Mercure seem largely unchanged.

Despite the science-fictionality of my day job, the most unlikely thing that has happened to me is being an Eastercon Guest of Honour, GoHs were distant figures of mythical proportions when I started going to Eastercons. The idea that I might one day join such a hallowed company didn't even occur to me until Dave Lally and Pat McMurray approached me one evening to ask if I was interested. Appropriately enough this happened at The One Tun, the pub where I first started going to fannish gatherings, and to which the London Fannish Circle had returned for Christmas.

Being a GoH is hard work, but it's the kind of work that doesn't seem like work at all since you're doing it for people who are so amazingly enthusiastic and engaged. It's only when you get home and realise you (or at least your liver) need a holiday that you realise you've hardly stopped moving or talking to people for 5 whole days.

It's an experience I'd recommend to anyone and the Mancunicon committee did us proud. And, in the inevitable way of fandom, I'll now turn to our con chair, Pat, and say those words that strike fear into the heart of conrunners – "So – when are you planning to do Mancunicon 2?"





SARAH PINBOROUGH, GUEST OF HONOUR

Sarah Pinborough is the number one *Sunday Times* bestselling and *New York Times* best-selling author of the psychological thriller *Behind Her Eyes* (Jan, 2017). During her career she has published more than 20 novels and several novellas, and has written for the BBC. Her recent novels include the dystopian love story, *The Death House*, and a teenage thriller, *13 Minutes* which has been bought by Netflix with Josh Schwartz adapting.

Not really enough sitting around space. Like having a fan lounge.

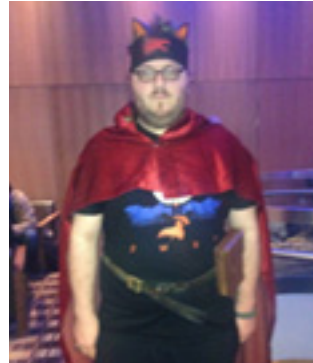

REAL ALE AROUND BEETHAM TOWER



1 THE APE AND APPLE 30 John Dalton Street, M2 6HQ. A Joseph Holt's bar and Holt's is one of the cheapest quality ales you can buy anywhere. There is a rooftop beer-garden smoking area too.

2 THE BRITON'S PROTECTION 50 Great Bridgewater Street, M1 5LE. A beautifully designed pub chopped into smaller snug rooms surrounding the central bar which serves from the front and through side hatches. The beer selections are great and the Briton's also offers an extensive menu of hundreds of whiskies & bourbons, many of them quite rare.

3 CASK BAR 29 Liverpool Road, M3 4NQ. A small blue looking building you'll see on route to the science & Transport Museum. As well as its four real ale pumps Cask offer a great selection of internationally imported ales.

4 THE DEANSGATE 321 Deansgate Manchester, M3 4LQ. Seven real ales to choose from, while surrounded by photos of Manchester from yesteryear. Even the pub sign is unusually a photograph rather than a painting.

5 GASLAMP 50a Bridge Street Manchester. M3 3BW. Very easy to miss, this basement bar used to be a Victorian refuge centre for children from Manchester and Salford. The rooms are

divided by partitions and much of the original tiling survives. There are many fine wines offered here as well as modern craft beers.

6 KNOTT BAR 374 Deansgate Manchester, M3 4LY. Located very close to the con hotel, Knott Bar is spacious, offers up to eight guest ales, plus real ciders, and has a superb pub-grub range. There is a very good open air balcony to sit on upstairs too.

7 THE MOON UNDER WATER 74 Deansgate Manchester, M3 2FN. One of the biggest bars in the city, this Wetherspoons inn is a former cinema, with lots of upstairs rooms and the full range of ales and food you would expect at a Wetherspoons.

8 PEVERIL OF THE PEAK 127 Great Bridgewater Street Manchester, M1 5JQ. The name comes from a famous stagecoach which broke all records for the fastest journey times between Manchester and London. The pub was its starting point for the journeys. The stagecoach itself took the title from an obscure novel by Sir Walter Scott. The unusual wedge shaped bar and yellow-green tiling create a unique building. The beer selection is ever changing and excellent. It's also one of the few bars at which you can also still play table football.

DOC WEIR AWARD

The Doc Weir Ballot form has this to say about the award:

The Doc Weir Award was set up in 1963 in memory of fan Arthur Rose (Doc) Weir, who had died two years previously. Weir was a relative newcomer to fandom, he discovered it late in life – but in the short time of his involvement he was active in a number of fannish areas. In recognition of this, the award is sometimes seen as the “Good Guy” Award; something for “The Unsung Heroes”.

Fandom needs volunteers. Conventions, clubs, fanzines – they all require an extensive workforce, people who do “stuff” for no financial reward. Some people have a high-profile role but there are many who don’t, whose involvement goes almost unnoticed and may even be taken for granted. In some respects, the ideal Doc Weir Award candidate is the sort of person who doesn’t immediately spring to mind but makes perfect sense if somebody else suggests them.

The Hitchhiker’s Guide To The Galaxy says:

It’s a lovely little cup for putting things in.

Peter Mabey, who was the very first recipient of the award way back in 1963, says:

When the BSFA agreed to apply the money collected as a memorial to Doc Weir to buying a cup to be awarded (the original plan was to buy his SF collection fell through as it turned out he wasn’t a collector) the Cheltenham SF Circle was asked to decide on the category.

As we did not want to duplicate any existing awards (and rejected the idea of leaving it to the BSFA, as we were closer to him than any other fans), we decided that it should be an open award. I remember suggesting that the nomination should take the form “I would like [Fan] to receive the award for [fanac]”, but we eventually agreed that if fans didn’t know why someone had been nominated, they probably hadn’t done enough to deserve the award.

Consequently, as I did not attend Bullcon a.k.a. Petercon 1 (my father had died that year, so I

wanted to visit my mother at Easter) and so was rather embarrassed when the CSFC fans came back with the award for me. The award did not come as a total surprise, as at that time the BSFA Library was operating as a postal lending library. so that much of my spare time was taken up with dealing with requests (with the help of John Humphries, another member). However, if I had been asked at the time who I thought the first recipient, I would probably have suggested Archie Mercer (the next one) or one of the other fans who were honoured later. I am very happy that the Award has developed into what it is now, as if it had remained as recognition of any specific activity I think it would have eventually died for lack of suitable nominees, as fandom is so broad that no person is likely to be universally recognised.

Kathy Westhead, who won the award at Mancunicon, says:

People outside SF fandom often react with surprise to the idea that our conventions are organised by a bunch of us working together voluntarily to make it all happen. The Doc Weir Award is a way of recognising one of those volunteers each year, by the presentation of a silver cup, engraved on the base and box with the names of the previous winners.



It’s voted on by members of the Eastercon, with a simple ballot that says, basically, write in the name of the person you think should get the award this year. It was a complete shock when Martin Hoare, the 2015 winner, gave my name at the closing ceremony of Mancunicon, and I was basically speechless when I went up onto the stage. So I’d now like to thank everybody who voted – it really is lovely to feel so appreciated. And a particular delight was that the first person to congratulate me was Peter Mabey, the first winner of the award, in 1963 (which is about the time I started reading SF, though I didn’t start going to cons until the late 1970s).

Now, who are you going to vote for at this year’s Eastercon?

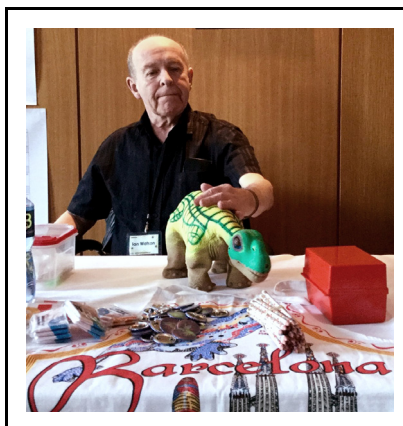
this Roar-aima. So I roared. And I panted.
