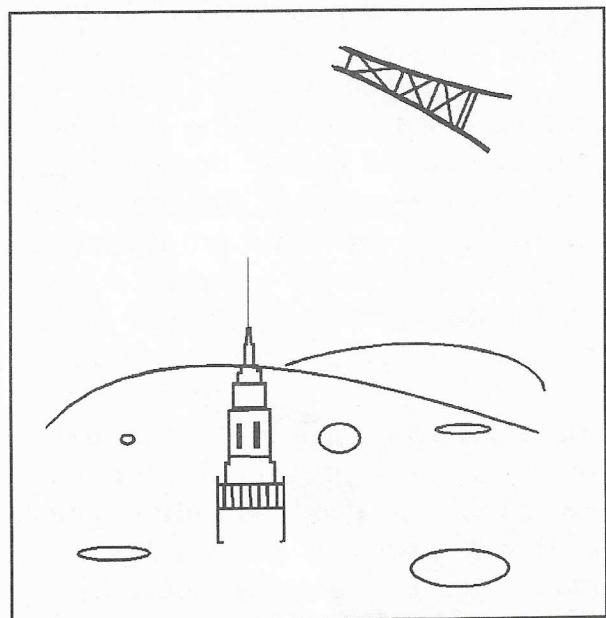
stripper. Oh no. It's a men only sport. Women don't have a choice".

In doing so we wish to reprise two aspects of Illumination: its strength in smaller scale programme items and, above all, its sense of fun. In short, expect all the usual stuff and we hope a few surprises.

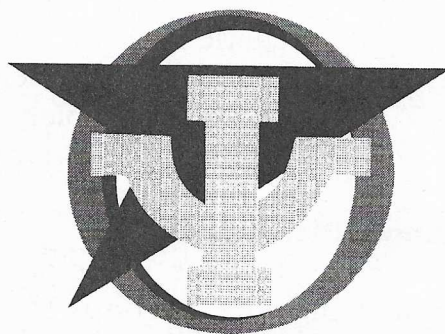
Ops

Blackpool – What else is there?

David Cooper has compiled this sampler of Blackpool's attractions.

Besides the magnificent Norbreck Castle Hotel, what else is there in Blackpool to entertain the jaded convention member or the bored kids who have had enough of hanging about with all these strange people? Well, Blackpool describes itself as Britain's undisputed capital of entertainment. The biggest and most popular seaside resort in Europe, Blackpool offers just about everything a visitor can wish for. Everyone has heard of the Tower and the Golden Mile, but there's so much more on offer.

You could start with the Pleasure Beach, the single biggest tourist attraction in Britain with six and a half million visitors a year. Try the fabulous Sandcastle and the Big Wheel. Go on to the Sea Life Centre, Louis Tussaud's, the three piers ... and there's still so much more.

Blackpool Pleasure Beach

The Pleasure Beach is home of the Pepsi Max Big One, perhaps the tallest, fastest rollercoaster in the world. There also over 150 other rides and attractions on site. There is the Beaver Creek Theme Park for younger children. For all the family there are the Spectacular Ice Show, the Illusion Show, the International Circus, and top cabaret in the new Paradise Room. Other attractions include discos and ice-skating. For food and drink, there are restaurants, cafes and bars on site. There is a large car park and the tram stops outside. It is free to enter. You pay for each attraction or buy discount sheets of ride tickets.

Blackpool Tower

Blackpool's famous landmark, the Tower, celebrated its centenary in 1994. After a £13 million transformation, the Tower provides seven levels of fun for all the family including the Dawn of Time, a stunning animatronic ride that takes you through the entire history of the Earth, from dinosaurs to astronauts. There are new express Tower Top lifts, a new food court and 'Jungle Jims', an adventure playground for younger children. The Tower Circus too has a new face, with novel high tech performances in a traditional setting. The Tower Ballroom remains untouched by the massive face-lift - but then its fans will say you can't improve on perfection! Standing 519 feet tall, the Tower is a proud symbol of Blackpool's past and future greatness.

Golden Mile

This is where seaside fun overflows. The brash and bustling Golden Mile offers seaside favourites like hamburgers, chips, ice cream and candyfloss. A place where silly hats and saucy T-shirts are the order of the day. The Golden Mile is also the slot machine capital of Britain where giant leisure centres are interspersed with the latest video technology. Discos, cabaret spots and exhibitions are all to be found on Blackpool's famous Golden Mile. Among the latest additions to the Mile is the six million pound Sea Life Centre with its thrilling 'shark tunnel'. Do the Golden Mile on foot to savour all the sights, sounds and smells. Then see it again from a tram or one of the fleet of horse-drawn landaus!

Blackpool Trams

Officially opened on September 29 1885, Blackpool's world famous trams have come a long way since those early days. Stretching for 12 miles along the Promenade, the Blackpool electric trams range from finely restored cars from ages past to customised feature trams during the Illuminations. There is a tram stop just outside the hotel.

Blackpool Zoo

Your visit would not be complete without a trip to Blackpool Zoo Park. You don't have to travel miles to get there - it's only two miles from the Promenade - and the clever landscaping makes it easy on the feet. The Zoo Park is one of the most modern in Europe, with a carefully planned environment of spacious moated pens, lakes and islands. Don't forget to take the camera for some terrific pictures of the big zoo favourites, like lions, tigers, giraffes, apes and a fine collection of marsupials. A family favourite is feeding time for the sea lions in their modern pool. Opening times from 10:00am to dusk.

Louis Tussaud's Waxworks

Situated on Central Promenade, the world famous Waxworks exhibition is open daily during Easter. The famous - the infamous - personalities of royalty, film stars, pop idols, television personalities, politicians, world leaders are all portrayed here in wax. A visit to the Chamber of Horrors is a must with its many blood-curdling exhibits - but definitely not for the fainthearted! New and exciting tableaux and figures are introduced every season and there is an optional Anatomy Exhibition for adults. Opening times every day from 10:00am.

Piers

In England, the seaside resort is nothing without a pier. Blackpool has three magnificent piers which are amongst the resort's finest attractions. North Pier is famous for its theatre and top-class seasonal shows, its amusements, shops, restaurants and bars and is the resort's favourite sunbathing spot. The facade of the North Pier has been restored to its Victorian splendour. The newly refurbished Central Pier boasts a showbar and a superb new Big Wheel. All the other attributes of a pier are there; amusement arcades, shops and kiddies' amusements. South Pier with its famous circus marquee style frontage also has its own theatre that is a popular attraction for the whole family.

Sea Life Centre

Wonders of the deep come into sharp focus at the Sea Life Centre where visitors come eye-to-eye with the largest sharks on display in Europe. Forget old-style aquaria - this is pioneering, state-of-the-art approach that helps us understand and respect the world's marine life. Opening times daily from 10:00am to 9:00pm (6pm out of season).

Sandcastle

Leading the way with a new concept for all weather and all round family fun is the Sandcastle - Blackpool's tropical indoor seaside. This giant watery playground complete with palm trees and exotic plants has something to suit all ages.

Experience the thrills and spills of water chutes, wave and fun pools, a safe kiddies harbour and the exhilarating white knuckle water slides. Captain Sandcastle's Adventure Playground with giant

inflatables, ball ponds and serpent slides is a child's paradise and with bars, cafes, sunbeds, amusements and live shows throughout the whole summer season, the whole family can enjoy an entire day out under one roof. The latest attraction is a fully computerised adventure game show - The Crystal Maze. Opening times from 10:00am to 6:00pm.

Stanley Park

With so many exciting attractions in Blackpool, some people like to slip away to tranquillity. Once you have visited the beautiful Stanley Park you will return again and again. Situated less than two miles from the seafront, the 256-acre park is the place for those more leisurely pursuits. The 26-acre lake, partly enclosed by woodland is the perfect setting for a quiet cruise by motorboat, rowing or pedal boat. There are six superb bowling greens and two 18-hole putting greens and numerous tennis courts as well as a Model Village within the park.

Winter Gardens

Marvel at the gilded exuberance of Blackpool's Winter Gardens, newly restored to pristine glory. This is quite simply one of the most amazing buildings in the world. As if renowned Empress Ballroom and Opera House - Britain's biggest theatre - weren't enough, the architects crammed the sprawling 4 and a half acre site with bits and pieces from dream palaces of a dozen ages and cultures. Vast, yet full of intimate corners, the Wintergardens is partly Tudor England, partly Strauss's Vienna, partly Seville in its golden age, partly ancient Rome - in fact, wholly fantastic and wholly Blackpool.

Bowling

Bowling's back in a big way in Britain, and whether your choice runs to the sedate click of flat green woods or the musical rumble and clatter of ten pin, Blackpool can offer the very best. The eight rink Blackpool Indoor Bowls Centre at Lark Hill Street and the Superbowl, a 30-lane computerised ten pin centre on the Promenade, figure amongst the biggest and most up-to-date of their kind anywhere in Britain.

Shopping

The town centre has been carefully designed to offer an excellent selection of shops and multi-storey car parking. The development of the magnificent Hounds Hill Shopping Centre has added another dimension to shopping with a pedestrian precinct, undercover arcades and entertainment provided to make your shopping trip a pleasure.

The Beach

Back in the 18th Century Blackpool began as a small village with a great beach - no less than seven magnificent miles of sand. The resort grew fast in Victorian times with all its major attractions within a stone's throw of the sands. Nowadays entertainment in all forms is Blackpool's greatest attraction, but the beach is still a magnet for many. The sands stretch from the bustling Central Beach with its donkeys, ice cream and seafood stalls to the tranquil, wide open spaces of Bispham to the North and Squires Gate to the South.

The Norbreck Castle Hotel

Steve Lawson provides information on the hotel. (Actually Alice wrote much of this as Steve says "I think Alice writes it better than what I do".)

Starting life as a Manor house in 1896 the Norbreck Castle is now a hotel with 361 bedrooms. It is not only Blackpool's but also the UK's largest combined Hotel, Conference and Exhibition Centre. It also has car parking for 600 cars and a dedicated tram stop. Situated on Blackpool's North Shore the hotel faces the sea and sandy beaches. The hotel has two bars one of which is public and called Copperfaced Jacks. This is a 200-seater pub named after a famous Irish judge. It sells real ale and draught cider as well as a range of Irish whiskeys. Although it is open to the public it will be easy to ensure they do not venture through to the hotel side. The other bar is the main hotel bar. Those of you that were at Illumination will remember the long sun lounge with a little serving hatch, which was the hotel's idea of a bar. This is still a lovely sun lounge but now they have added on a big conservatory and full bar. I think that it is a great focal point for meeting and relaxing. We are in discussion with them about the possibility of real ale being served here or possibly setting up a separate bar for this purpose. The prices are already good. In a recent survey of pub prices in Blackpool the Norbreck Hotel was one of the best in the area, we will, of course, still be trying to do better. At the side of the bar is a food court that sells sandwiches, baked potatoes and such like, with a decent vegetarian selection. The prices when we visited seemed reasonable. For those of you who do not like to wander too far there is another restaurant in the hotel called the Boston Stake Out. This has a range of food such as ribs, burger, steaks and much more. Starters start at £1.95 with main meals starting at £5.25. Again there is a decent veggie range. There is also the main hotel restaurant.

There is a lot of conference space. The Norcalympia Hall is a fully integrated exhibition area within the Norbreck Castle Hotel. It has almost 2,500 square feet of

exhibition floorspace and is particularly suitable for wheelchair users. All aisles are sufficiently wide and there are no steps, pillars or other obstacles to concern visitors. At the moment this is being earmarked for dealers room and art show. The dealers should be able to drive into the hall to set up; again any dealer who was at Illumination will remember this. There are another six main rooms and 10-syndicate room. This will be more than enough for our purposes. All but one of the rooms has full disabled access. The hotel is looking to see what they can do about this.

The leisure facilities include a swimming pool, spa pool, sauna, steam room and a gym. There is also an aerobics studio and a beauty centre where you can get a facial or a massage. For children there is plenty to do. There is a crèche for little ones. There is also a play area to the side of the pub. You may place your children in there and keep an eye on them via monitors inside the pub; hotel staff is also on duty there. In the Boston Stake out there is a 60-foot play ship for kids. Some committee members are keen to have a go, but only our chairman meets the height requirement.

We think that the hotel has a lot to offer. Plenty of space to lounge in. Plenty of choice for food and drink. Above all the hotel seems friendly and eager to have us there.

We are due to go on a hotel visit to stay overnight and check out the facilities. We will check the disabled bedrooms and access and the family rooms as well as anything else we can think of. We will also force ourselves to try the bars and report back.

All of the above will give you some idea of why we think the hotel is a good venue for us. But most of all we wanted to go back to the Norbreck Hotel because we had a good time there in 1992. I hope those of you that were there then also have fond memories of Illumination.

We will try to make 2001 just as good and hopefully better.

Memories of Blackpool

David Kirby gives us one of his few memories of Blackpool. Yet again strippers feature. I wonder why David Cooper did not mention this in his review of the delights of the town...

Sisters had caught cold - probably through walking around in the niff in draughty pubs - so it was Razzle Sister. She wasn't on for some time so we continued our libations.

After several pints, John went to the toilet.

"There was this drunk Irish bloke in the toilet and he kept nudging me and saying 'It's the way I tell 'em' then he'd nudge me and wink as if I knew what he was on about."

"Er...he's got some big mates."

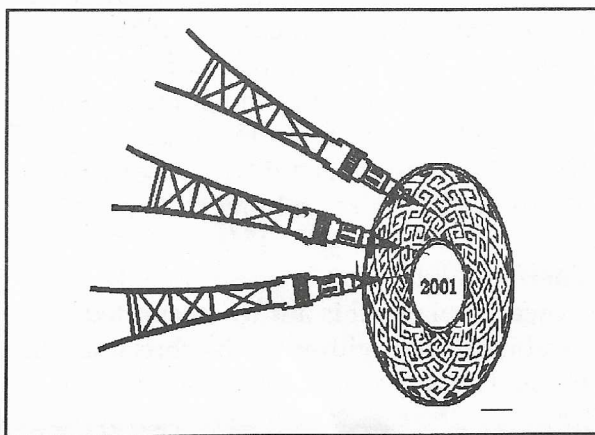
