The Shining Girls, by Lauren Beukes

The Shining Girls was my first Lauren Beukes book. I love genre-crossing books, and the mix of serial killer, crime and time-travel really appealed — I'm a sucker for time travel. I found myself hooked, very quickly, not

just as a reader, but also as a writer. To maintain a tight and complex time line over so many years, without leaving plot holes in awkward places, takes a degree of skill. To develop a likeable main character from what could have been so easily a victim-vibe, and turn their challenges into

strengths takes a deft hand. And to make a truly creepy antagonist, who can jump through time in search of the 'Shining Girls' — his victims — and appears seemingly invulnerable through his use of the cloak of time.

Combined with the feel of classic noir, the book worked for me on several levels and when the climax arrives, it does so with a bang. It's a book I've remembered,



***Skulduggery Pleasant*, by Derek Landy**

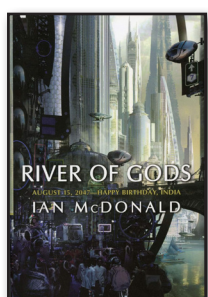

Skulduggery Pleasant sets the bar for witty humour, fleshed out characters and interesting magic. This dark fantasy series takes place in beautiful Ireland and follows the story of Skulduggery Pleasant, the wise cracking, sarcastic and semi-un-dead private detective. He is joined by Stephanie, a normal 12-year-old girl who gets in the middle of a massive magical conspiracy after the death of her uncle. Together they start an investigation to see if everything is as it seems or if murder is afoot. It's not long before Stephanie is learning the ropes of this unseen world, from choosing a name to figuring out her own latent magical power. They are aided by plenty

whose feeling and vibes come back at odd moments, and the TV adaptation of it picked up on that feel so well — it's really worth a watch. In short, something different for the genre, but which picks up on the classic time-travel elements of subterfuge and the isolation of being out of our own time and place, and chimes it perfectly with the feel of noir crime.

of colourful characters, all part of Skulduggery's network of confidants, from a strait-laced tailor wielding the power of the elements to a loose cannon peacekeeper able to enhance her body and turn the walls and ceiling into her arena. It all starts as a personal grudge between our sarcastic investigator and the man who made him who he is today, but the bigger picture always raises its ugly faceless head to loom over us.

Overall, this series has you spoiled for choice. Hilarious banter, magic, suspense, action and even horror. With two full bodied arcs with neatly tied up bows for endings you cannot do much better than reading the beautifully written ***Skulduggery Pleasant***.



***River of Gods*, by Ian McDonald**

River of Gods is a true epic of the cyberpunk genre, its interweaving stories stretching from the deeply personal, to the political, to the wonderfully weird transcendental. Published in 2004 and winner of the BSFA award, the book depicts a near-future India during the run up to the centenary of its independence from the British Raj. AIs, known as *aeais*, are a regular part of everyday life. Some are celebrities, the mega-star actors of popular TV shows. Others, those which grow too independent, too intelligent,

often appear as entities from Hindu mythology and are hunted down by the Krishna corps. It is almost impossible for me to sum up everything happening in this book. It provides a vibrant, well-realised look at a future in which ancient traditions mix and mingle with the steady march of technology, one which leads the characters into places filled with exciting, terrifying, and hopeful possibilities. It's a book which almost feels more timely now, with the rise of AI generated content, than when it was published. It really is one to experience for yourself.

What's an Eastercon?

Eastercon is the annual British National Science Fiction Convention. It has been held over the Easter weekend every year since 1955, and is the original gathering of the clans of the UK science fiction field. Eastercon attracts 800–1,200 fans of Science Fiction, Fantasy and similar genres.

Programme events usually include panels, workshops, talks, quizzes, competitions, an Art Show, a Dealers' Room selling books and other items, and gaming and crafting rooms. Events range from hard science through writing workshops to the fun and silly. People are encouraged to take part. Authors, artists, dealers and other professionals in the field attend to meet both fans and colleagues as well as appear on the programme or exhibits.

As SF has broadened its scope to encompass comics, film, TV, games, cosplay, filk and other media as well as books and magazines, Eastercon has encompassed all these new forms of artistic endeavour.

Because it is considered to be a place for fans to meet and take part, rather than sit and listen to presentations, it's a convention and not a conference. Similarly when you pay your money to take part, you buy a membership in Eastercon and not a ticket. Each year the convention is run by a different committee, made up of volunteers from the community.

Under the Pendulum Sun is perhaps the most interesting and disturbing take

on the fair folk since **Jonathan Strange and Mr Norrell**. Jeanette Ng leans on the folklore studies of the Victorian era to create a world and characters as rich, atmospheric, and full of shadows as an

old oil painting. The book is a brilliant piece of gothic literature, one which interrogates the oppressive social and cultural beliefs of the time, digging deep into its characters and drawing their darkest secrets out into the light one by one. It's a brilliant, fever dream book whose world I want to explore further.



A Murder at the End of the World, by Rebecca Roanhorse

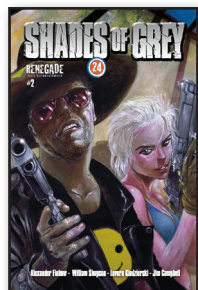
Rebecca Roanhorse's works have been on my TBR list for longer than

I care to admit. **Black Sun** had all the components of my favourite reads — rich mythology, political intrigue, powerful women, and a world I could sink my teeth into. Unfortunately, with mental health being what it is, picking up new books can be a challenge, even when you know you'll love the work.

That's why, when I discovered Rebecca Roanhorse had a hand in the writing and development of **A Murder at the End of the World**, I knew I had to take a chance. It was a limited run TV show, low investment, completely encapsulated. One episode a day and I'm done in a week. Little did I know it would be three AM

and I would be reduced to a puddle of tears. Now I have **Black Sun** prepped as an audio book and I'll be diving into it later today.

If you're looking for a gateway into the world of speculative fiction, **A Murder at the End of the World** is a fantastic place to start. This show does what all great Science Fiction does, it looks at our society and the state of the world, draws conclusions, and shows the audience a possible scenario if we do not course correct. A powerful statement on the evolution of technology and what it means for one man to hold so much power he seems untouchable. Our phones can do amazing things. But they can also allow us to do terrible, unspeakable things if we are not careful.



Shades of Grey, by Alexander Finbow & William Simpson

Shades of Grey is adapted from the film **24 Hours in London**, also written and

directed by Alexander Finbow. It follows a pair of assassins hired to kill a gang in a park, but miss a key civilian witness. Their boss, Christian, orders them to the police precinct to finish the job. This standalone introduction to **Shades of Grey** showcases a London full of ruthless criminals,

cops playing hero, and those who walk a morally grey line.

Will Simpson's artwork is clever, engaging, and violent, bringing this story to life frame by frame. Having previously been familiar with Will's work as the lead Story-board Artist for **Game of Thrones**, it was fascinating to see him creating in a different genre. There were multiple frames that caused me to gasp — fantastic!

Accessibility Policy

Our accessibility policy describes what we aim to do to help people with access needs, and the full access audit — looking at how we use the site for you — is under-way now. The detailed audit report will be uploaded to our website soon, and printed in PR3. For info, email access@easterconbelfast.org.

Programme rooms and items:

- ♦ The programme items will be 60 minutes long in 90 minute slots to allow movement and breaks.
- ♦ We will have at least one wheel-chair/scooter space marked in each programme room with space for a mobility scooter to manoeuvre.
- ♦ We will reserve seats for those with access needs in all programme rooms and have seating in any area where there is likely to be queueing. There will be step free access to any staged areas, and microphones.

Scooters:

- ♦ We aim to have mobility scooters available. These will need to be pre-booked by emailing the accessibility team.
- ♦ Hotels:
- ♦ Our access audit (to be published in PR3) will include specific information about the venue so you have advance knowledge of the venue and nearby facilities.
- ♦ The Hilton Hotel bedrooms will be prioritised for those with specific access needs. Those who need it will be allowed to book earlier than general release.
- ♦ We will provide a clearly legible map and signage at the venue to aid navigation, and aim to keep the route between the Hilton and the ICC clear.

Publications Format:

- ♦ We aim to have a large print paper programme available on request. If you require this, please email the access team.

Quiet Room:

- ♦ We will have a quiet room space and aim for one in each venue.

Scent:

- ♦ Please don't apply scents while in the convention spaces, including in the toilets. We aim to ensure that cleaning products and hand sanitisers are unscented, and hypoallergenic.

Gender Neutral Toilets:

- ♦ We aim to have these in both venues, in addition to accessible toilets.

Invisible Conditions:

- ♦ We recognise that not all conditions are visible and where an attendee chooses to make their needs known will not require any disclosure of medical information or proof.

Allergies and Food:

- ♦ Information should be available; if you have an allergy (food or otherwise) or dietary requirement and would like this information passed on to party hosts, launch organisers or to the Hilton Hotel, we are happy to do this.

Communication and Social:

- ♦ See the website for details about communication preferences, pronoun preferences, sign language in Northern Ireland, and specific support and a meet-up for those New to Eastercon.

Alcohol:

- ♦ We will ask that any time alcohol or food is available there should be a soft drink option as well. This will apply to parties and launches.

Covid:

- ♦ We will put together a policy regarding Covid, if it is appropriate, closer to the time. Our aim is to do this in early 2025. The convention centre has a CO2 monitoring system linked to their air conditioning and where CO2 levels are found to be raised, the AC will mitigate this.

Online Access

We will plan to stream live and record our main programme (resources and costs allowing) where appropriate. This is from Hall 1A in the ICC.

We will look at the options of captions/subtitles on this live and recorded online content. Please contact us if you would benefit from this.

We intend to record Hall 1A, where appropriate, to allow this to be viewed later. Attendees should know the items are being recorded and will be informed of this.

We hope to have a Discord channel if we can find the volunteers.

Our Code of Conduct will apply to online spaces and direct messaging as well as in physical places.

Stipend

- ♦ We will have a stipend to assist those who would benefit from some financial assistance. This is as well as a low-income membership rate. Our hardship rate is not judged, and we trust those who apply for it, and also can assist further. Please contact the Accessibility team if such assistance is helpful.



Accommodations

Our main hotel is the Hilton Lanyon Place; this is also one of our two main sites for the convention and is joined to the International Convention Centre by an indoor walkway, as well as being conveniently adjacent via the front entrances of both venues. We will be announcing the discounted room rate in a separate email to all members in September, along with details about booking rooms via the accommodation agency linked to the city's VisitBelfast tourism information

bureau. There will then be a page on our website with details for booking accommodation.

Rooms in the Hilton will be prioritised for those with accessibility requirements, who will be allowed to make bookings specially early. There are many other hotels, AirBnBs, hostels and guest houses within convenient walking distance. Please start looking at city maps to work out what and where might suit you in terms of cost and location.

Transport News

Though we will have more details about arriving in Belfast in Progress Report 3, you may well find that some air, ferry or train fares are cheaper if booked very early. It is worth checking with the airline, train or ferry company for your route.

Belfast's Great Victoria Street station is

being updated to a new transport hub, Belfast Grand Central Station, but this will not be open till sometime in 2025. This is affecting some transport options through the city. However, the convention station, Lanyon Place remains fully operational throughout.
