

#### Moorcock Finks Out --- Committee Aghast!

No convention is complete without... Would you believe, a Guest of Honour? It is with red faces and abject apologies to the hundreds of disappointed that we have to announce that Michael Moorcock will not be able to fulfil his commitment as our Guest of Honour this year. Mike has an incredibly heavy work schedule for 1975 and is suffering at the moment from exhaustion, which he fully expects by the time the convention comes up to have turned into major nervous collapse. After giving the matter prolonged thought, he has finally decided, regretfully, to withdraw as Guest of Honour. Our apologies go, on his behalf, to those of you who were looking forward, as we were, to enjoying his company at the convention.

And now, the good news:

#### A Transatlantic Guest of Honour, Hurrah!

The trouble with writing an introduction to someone who needs no introduction is that you inevitably end up with some cliched opening sentence about "a man who needs no introduction". Luckily the Seacon committee is clever and imaginative enough to be able to clear that pitfall...

Harry Harrison, science fiction writer, is a man of many faces: there is the serious novelist, author of books like Make Room! Make Room! and In Our Hands, The Stars; there is the man who has written some of the most exciting, adventurous sf of recent years - books like the Deathworld series; there is the slapstick creator of The Stainless Steel Rat and its offspring; there is the satirist who pricked some of the over-inflated balloons of sf in books like Bill, The Galactic Hero and Star Smashers of the Galaxy Rangers; and there are various other Harrisons, all of them sickeningly successful.

Equally important in the field is Harry Harrison, editor - a career which predates his writing by some years. One of his biggest mistakes came in the early Fifties when, out of misplaced kindness and little suspecting what he was about to unleash, he commissioned an article from an unknown teenage fan from New York, a certain Rob Silverberg. Over the years he has been editor of several sf magazines and numerous anthologies; at present these include his Best of the Year series and also the *Nova* series of original anthologies. This year Eyre Methuen will be publishing the first volumes in their *Sf Masters* collection, a library of classic sf titles edited by Harry Harrison and Brian Aldiss.

Born in America, Harry is a notoriously peripatetic character. Last summer he and his wife Joan sold their house in California, bought a trailer, and drove over to England (with the help of the OFII). Since then they have spent periods in Oxfordshire and London, not to mention France and the odd trip back to the USA. However, they'll be intersecting with this country long enough to spend Easter in Coventry, where we know those of you who haven't previously met them are going to enjoy making their acquaintance.

But watch out for meat pies.

#### Hotel Booking

Hotel rooms continue to fill steadily; by the time you receive this, the De Vere should be more than three-quarters full. We have received bookings for over 200 people. Double rooms were all filled some time ago (as reported last time). At present there are no more single rooms available in the De Vere itself, and we are making overflow arrangements, for those who want them, in a couple of nearby hotels. We are also hoping to persuade the De Vere to make a few more rooms available to us as singles, but it will only be a handful.

If you send in your booking form now, therefore, it is important that you make clear your exact priority of alternatives. If you want a single room in the De Vere, but there is none available, would you prefer a share in a twin room at the con hotel, or a single room in an overflow? We naturally recommend that you opt to stay in the convention hotel: it's far more comfortable and convenient (even if you live in the vicinity) and you'll see more of the convention. You won't spend much time in your room, of course; but when you do need to go there, the rooms in the De Vere have every modern convenience: private bathroom with shower, television, and so on.

For the wealthier fan, or the group wanting to throw a big room party, or even the book dealer wanting to keep his own hours, there are still a few suites left. The main suites have separate bedroom and sitting-room; the executive suites are extra-large rooms. All have three-piece suite and colour television. The executive suites also include refrigerators.

If you are bringing children, you may be interested in one of the special family rooms available in the hotel. These have a main bedroom and a smaller, second room which can take two beds for children. No need to wake them up when you come to bed late! (Hurry, though - there are only three such rooms left.)

Confirmations of booking have been sent out and you should have received yours, unless you only sent it within the last fortnight or so. If you think you've booked, but haven't had one of these yellow slips, write to us immediately. Check your name on the membership list in this booklet: there will be an asterisk against it if we have a booking recorded for you.

One final point: please do *not* include payment for your hotel room with your booking. You pay the hotel when you check out. Details of acceptable forms of payment will be included in the next Progress Report.

#### Money

It has come to our Treasurer's gimlet-eyed attention that of the first 150 or so people on the membership list, only about a quarter have paid for full membership. Naturally, you don't have to pay until you arrive at the convention; but if it's possible, we'd rather you didn't wait until then. The point is that virtually all our bills will have to be paid before the con; if we have the membership money beforehand it should make things easier for us and also allow us to invest it in some aspect of the convention in order to make it still better. To convert supporting membership to attending, you simply pay £1.50.

#### Mail

We've had quite a number of instances of post going astray. If there's anything you think you should have received from us, but haven't, please write - don't get too angry with us, though: it may not be our fault. In particular, if everyone who doesn't receive this Progress Report could write and tell us, we'll get an accurate idea of how much is going missing. If your initial letter and all subsequent communications have failed to reach us, and you have received no information whatsoever concerning Seacon, we'll write to you - or see a committee member about it at the convention itself. Ok?

#### Programme

It's a well-known piece of convention lore that as soon as a cop committee announces a programme item, all the participants fall ill, emigrate, or simply vanish, while the subject itself becomes sub judice. However, taking our courage in all mineteen hands, we are prepared to commit ourselves to the following:

Harry Harrison's Guest of Honour speech: "Soylent Green, or, How a Book is Turned into a Film".

Philip Strick on "Comedy in Sf".

Bob Shaw speaking on a subject which we'll announce when he decides what it is.

A major item on "Research Problems in Sf", to consist of a talk by James Blish, followed by a panel discussion moderated by John Brunner.

A discussion panel on sf in 1974, chaired by Chris Priest, with Peter Nicholls and others. So you have a chance to prepare yourselves, the books under discussion will be drawn from the following: The Disposessed (Le Guin), Flow My Tears, The Policeman Said (Dick), Beyond Apollo (Malzberg), The Continuous Katherine Mortenhoe (Compton), Frankenstein Unbound (Aldiss), Concrete Island (Ballard), and Orbitsville (Shaw). Whether all these books are actually discussed will depend on the panel as finally constituted; but if you've read most of them, you'll be well prepared.

There will also be a quiz - by now an annual fixture at British conventions. As always, ours has to be different from last year's. This time, anyone will have an opportunity to enter, and it will be a contest between individuals. This will mean everyone has a chance; previously entry has been confined to members of readily-defined local fan groups. When you register at the con, you will receive (amongst other things) a set of preliminary questions, which can be handed to a committee member during the first two days. The fans providing the first four sets of correct answers will take a place in the final on Sunday afternoon.

Other startling and dynamic items are still being arranged for the main programme. There will also be a variety of fringe items, some of them extremely silly, which we hope will add to the entertainment. To find out what they are, you'll just have to come to Coventry.

#### Heavy

After the banquet on Sunday night, we intend to hold a dance in the main convention hall. Music will be provided by that well-known band, *The Burlingtons*, featuring our very own Graham Charnock on guitar and 'vocals'. With any luck this will be a loud, mindless noise, with relatively unintelligent music played relatively deafeningly (Oops - sorry Rob Jackson). The convention bar will be transferred to the main hall for the occasion, so there's going to be no escape...

#### Fancy Dress

Only a couple of months to go, so we hope you're busy welding the finishing touches to your costumes. Prizes will be given in various categories (many more were suggested at the last committee meeting, but sadly most proved unfeasible, even in these enlightened days). Special categories will include: Silliest Costume (which will receive the silliest prize); Least Costume (male, female, and special award to Brian Burgess for not entering); and Best Imitation of an Sf Writer (your choice - but careful, some of them are hig).

#### The Banquet

After much salivating, the committee has decided on the banquet menu for Seacon. We agonized more than a little over the price people would be prepared to pay, but eventually agreed that even the struggling, impoverished, and unemployed committee members (ie, 90% of them) would rather pay a little more and (hopefully) get a much better meal for it. Obviously there's no way we can guarantee the quality, except to say that the De Vere has a high reputation for catering, and we have confidence in their ability to serve an edible banquet. The menu is as follows:

The price, inclusive of service and VAT, is £3.45. If you require wine with your meal, you will be able to order at the banquet and pay cash to the waiter. An application form for banquet tickets accompanies this Progress Report. Since there are not nearly enough places to go around, we recommend you book early. Payment must accompany the form, otherwise the application cannot be considered valid.

And who can blame them ? Unfortunately, everyone else is doing it as well, including those of you out there with valuable material that could be coming under the hammer at Seacon. Auction material is, in a word, sparse. We'll have a van travelling up from London to Coventry before the convention, so we will be able to transport stuff from people living in the London area. All donations welcome, but we can also sell your material on a private commission basis by arrangement.

There will be two special auctions at Seacon. First of all, there will be an art auction, featuring work by several of our leading sf artists - Chris Foss, David Hardy, Eddie Jones, and others. If you want an original sf painting to hang on your wall, don't forget to bring your cheque book.

Secondly, we are intending to hold a special charity auction, with all proceeds going to Oxfam. We would particularly welcome donations of manuscripts and books in support of this worthy cause.

#### Art Show

Plans are taking shape for what we hope will be an unusually varied and interesting Art Show. Among the professional artists whose work will be on show will be Christopher Foss, David Hardy, Bruce Pennington, and Eddie Jones. There will also be a special exhibit of the best entries from the Science Fiction Monthly art competition.

But the Art Show is by no means limited to professional artists. Anyone interested in exhibiting work in the show is invited to contact Malcolm Edwards at the committee address. If possible, enclose photos of your work; space is at a premium and we can't simply allot space to anyone who asks, without some guarantee of reasonable quality. We are very keen, however, to include work by newer artists, so don't hesitate to get in touch if you're interested in sf-oriented art.

#### TAFF - Nominations

What is TAFF? The Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund was created in 1953 for the purpose of providing funds to bring well-known and popular fans across the Atlantic. Since that time, TAFF has regularly brought overseas fans to the USA and sent American fans to European conventions. TAFF exists solely through the support of fandom. The candidates are nominated and voted on by interested fans all over the world. Each vote is accompanied by a donation of no less than one dollar (40p). These votes, and the continued interest of fans are what makes TAFF possible.

Nominations for American candidates will open December 1st, 1974 and will close April 1st, 1975. The campaign - to elect one of the nominees to go to the 1976 Eastercon in Great Britain (and perhaps visit the Continent) will run until the end of 1975, at which time the votes will be counted and the winner announced.

Nominating Rules: Each nominee must have five nominators - three from the fan's own country (in this case, countries in North or South America) and two from overseas.

Fach nominee must provide a platform of 100 words or less (which will appear on the TAFF ballot) and five dollars as a bond of good faith and a donation to the fund.

Each nominee must sign a statement to the effect that he or she is ready, willing, and able to make the trip, barring acts of god, &c.

Nominations should be sent to either the American or European TAFF Administrators between the dates mentioned above (Dec 1st, 1974 - April 1st, 1975).

After April 1st, 1975, ballots will be printed and distributed to all who wish to participate in the election.

Who May Participate as Nominators, Nominees, and Voters? Anyone active in fandom prior to September, 1973.

*Ponations:* TAFF needs continuous donations of money and material (to be auctioned) in order to exist. If you are not eligible to vote, or do not feel qualified to vote, why not donate anyway ? It's a good cause.


