



Most Earthlike Planet Yet

It was announced on Friday that the Kepler Mission has discovered the most Earthlike planet found to date. Kepler 186f is one of five planets orbiting the M-type dwarf star Kepler 186 about 500 light years from Earth. It is about 10% larger than Earth, is thought to be a rocky world and is within its star's habitable zone.

The chances for life on this planet are uncertain. This means that the habitable zone of the system, defined as the region within which liquid water, thought to be essential for life, can exist on

the surface of a planet, is inside the tidal locking radius of the star. One side of the planet will thus always point towards the star, which may make it difficult for it to retain an atmosphere. Also M stars are more active than our own Sun, so the planet will be bombarded by hard radiation and cosmic rays.



Most Earthlike Planet Yet

It was announced on Friday that the Kepler Mission has discovered the most Earthlike planet found to date. Kepler 186f is one of five planets orbiting the M-type dwarf star Kepler 186 about 500 light years from Earth. It is about 10% larger than Earth, is thought to be a rocky world and is within its star's habitable zone.

The chances for life on this planet are uncertain. This means that the habitable zone of the system, defined as the region within which liquid water, thought to be essential for life, can exist on

the surface of a planet, is inside the tidal locking radius of the star. One side of the planet will thus always point towards the star, which may make it difficult for it to retain an atmosphere. Also M stars are more active than our own Sun, so the planet will be bombarded by hard radiation and cosmic rays.
