On all days films scheduled after Midnight will start 1 hour earlier than shown.

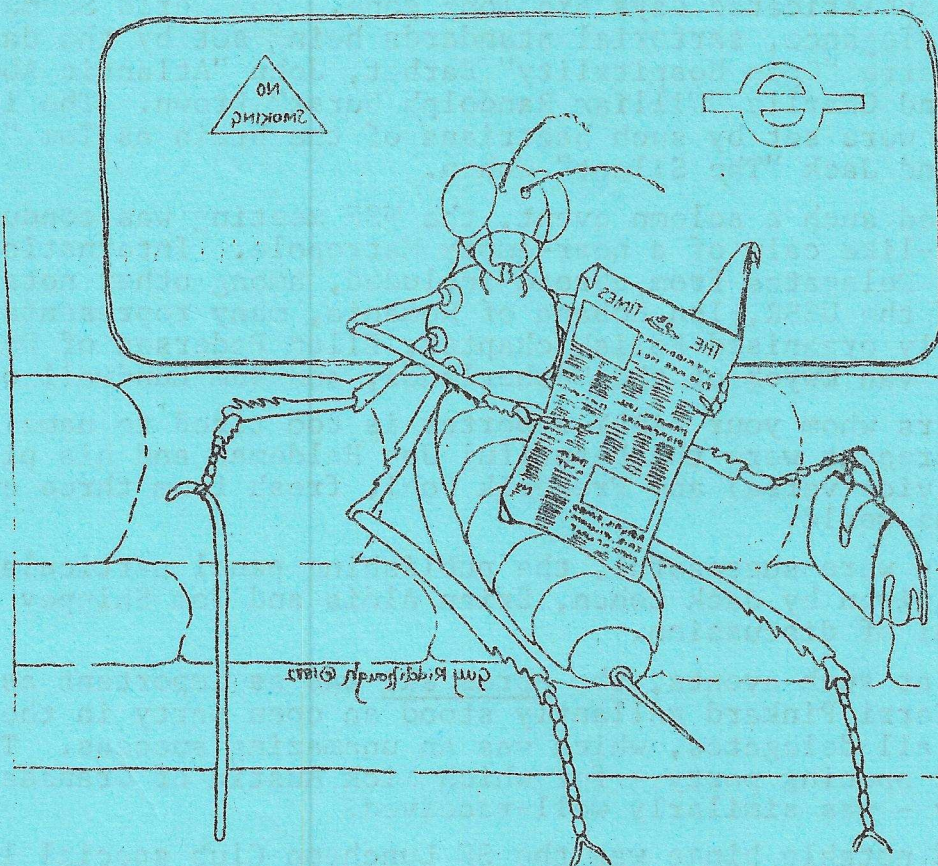
Friday - film programme starts at 15.00 not 13.00 hours.

Scientific advice for this project was provided by Bob Shaw who will be giving another of his serious scientific talks at 3.00 pm today.

The Committee apologises for the disorientation this may have caused but you should now be returning (temporarily) to normality. Anything you still can't handle is your own problem.

The World SF meeting was a model of elegance, sartorial standards being set by the dandies of the field, Pierre "Open Hospitality" Barbet, John "Atlantic Abomination" Brunner and Charlie "William Randolph Hurst" Brown. The panels were successful, the publishing panel particularly so. Lectures given by Jack Cohen, Brian Aldis and Tom Shippey roused a great deal of discussion.

As usual at such events, the apres ski was as important as the programme. Tom and Terri Pinkard gallantly stood an open party in the Ambassador room for all delegates, which was an unamazing success. The Granada-sponsored opening party - for which Nick Austin of Granada drove down specially - was similarly well-received.

The third notable binge was the SF Luncheon Club special luncheon, chaired by chubby Gerald "Ten Per Cent" Pollinger, was graced by such legendary luminaries as Forrest and Wendayne Ackermann, David "Have Another" Hartwell, John "learning to Walk" Clute and Roz "Sign Now" Kaveney. Malcolm Edwards was also present and Gerry Webb spoke.

At the luncheon, the WSF Awards and Karels were distributed by President Brian "Thirsty" Aldis, soon to become ex-President when deposed by Sam "Anglophile" Lundwall, who now takes up the burdens of office.

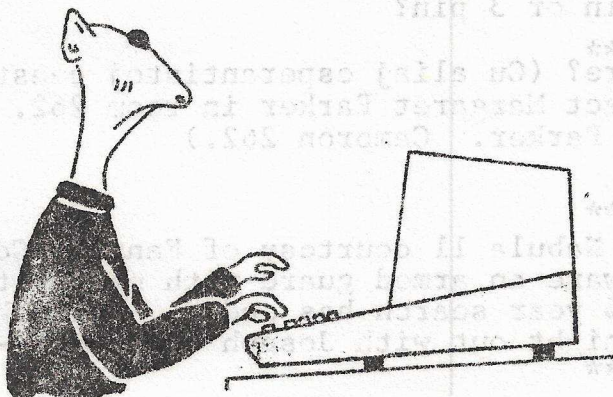
RESTAURANT REVIEW - Simon Peresford

The Nan was fluffy and light. Unfortunately all the rice dishes appeared to have been reheated and in consequence were hard and indigestible. Your correspondent, however, visited early in the evening; maybe later on the rice would have improved but the Nan could have ended up less tasty. In short, good for Tandoori dishes but avoid it if you like Biriani.

PLACE TO CRASH OUT NEEDED

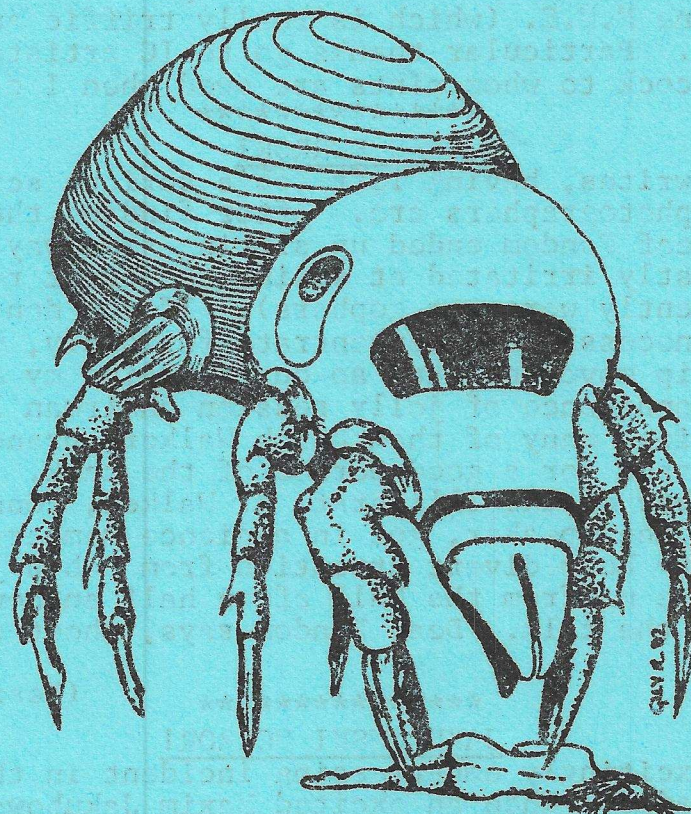

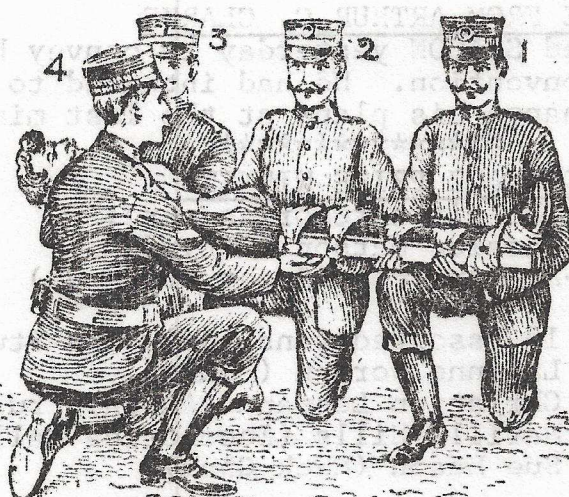
Our foreign visitors may wish to know how to dress for the beach.

For the Scalp (Fig. 62). 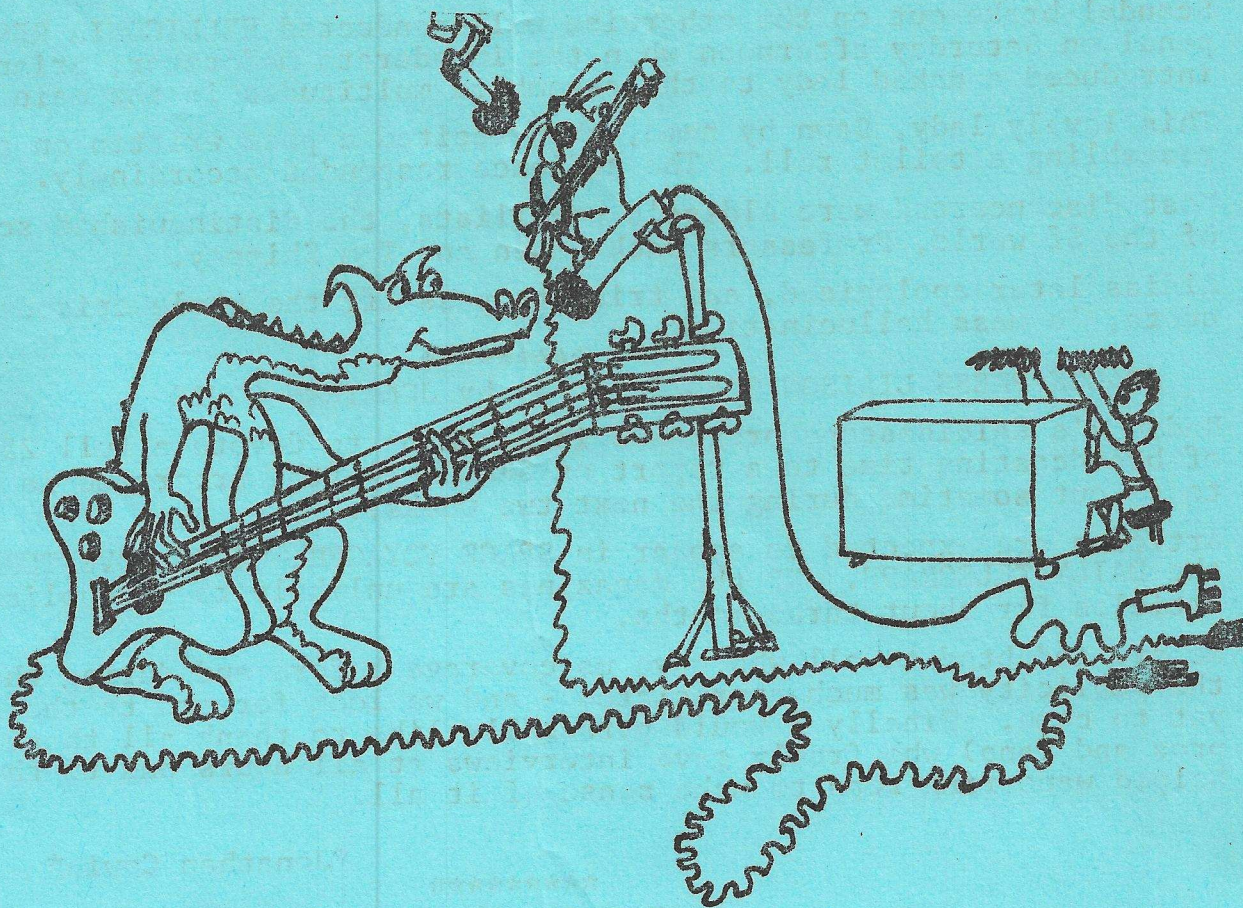
