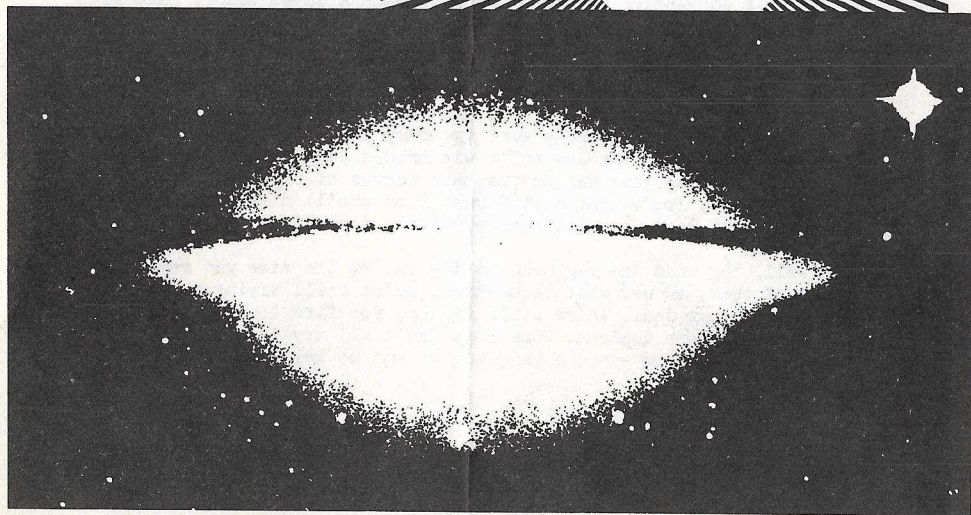
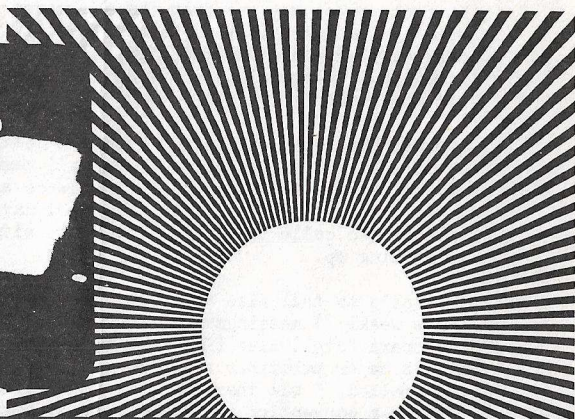

"Oh no," I think, "that's someone else pulling out of Dave's panel on post-Freudian SF!" It's funny - the excuses. People, well authors, say they are saving themselves for Worldcon as if it means something; as if suddenly bills will go up:

In fact as you may see from the Programme (organised in co-operation with the Science Fiction Foundation) it is only an irritation. One can readily understand young and relatively poor writers finding it a strain and, after all, nobody has to come (or didn't you realise), but those excuses....!?:

Instead the phone call comes from the Seattle in '81 Committee asking us to hold up the Programme Book until March 16th for an airmailed advertisement. For a moment I experience a "Stop the Presses!" thrill until I realise that this is the final date anyway. Nevertheless I get another two calls that night concerned with the convention; the pace is hotting up.

I am able to tell Alan about the cable next day as we have one of our (now weekly) meetings with John Hepworth, the sales manager of the Dragonara Hotel. Also I deliver more advertising copy, including one from a major publisher with the name of one of its leading authors mis-spelled. I sit there drinking bitter and atmosphere, trying to imagine a convention in the Dragonara. Such a quiet place, that'll change, but comfortable, homely - the sort of place that makes you want to sit on the carpets. Any remaining butterflies are dispelled by listening to John enthuse about how much he's looking forward to the Con, not an attitude easily discernible in other managers we've come across. He also seems to understand more about what it involves; at one time he thought fans were grown-up Trekkies. But then anyone who's accommodated The Jam and a victorious Australian Rugby League Team at the same time has got to have nerves of steel.

"What's that; You've got a different firm who'll hire us a projector at less than half-price? Thanks John."

Ah well, the ends are begining to tie up. By the time you read this most of them, or us, will be knotted. We're still trying to get a draught bitter deal. We're still waiting for firm bookings, with money, from some dealers. Hope they don't all try to leave it until the last minute or someone is going to end up selling books in a toilet.

Just come along and enjoy yourselves, unless that's against your nature. You've paid your money and with six weeks (three or four when you read this) to go, I think you'll get a bargain.

PROGRAMME

Plans for the convention have firmed up considerably since the brief report given in Progress Report 2. There will be a number of interesting talks and panel discussions, as well as a Call My Bluff quiz, a disco and fancu dress parade. There will also be a full programme of films featuring among others 2001: A Space Odyssey, Demon Seed, Alain Resnais's brilliant Providence and Tod Browning's delightful horror classic Devil Doll.

The major programme event will be the Guest of Honour speech by RICHARD COWPER, which will take place on the Saturday afternoon. Other talks will include Mick Farren (SF writer-cum-rock artiste) giving his views on why he finds science fiction an exciting medium; Dave Langford (SF writer, physicist and fanzine publisher) giving a witty exposition on future weaponry; and Peter Garratt (clinical psychologist, conversationalist and dry wit) on the subject of cetacean intelligence and the way whales have been treated in SF.

The two major panel discussions of the convention will be on "SF in the 1970's", chaired by Peter Nicholls and featuring Brian Stableford and other writers; and "Humour in SF", chaired by Mike Dickinson and featuring Bob Shaw and others. There will also be a "Brain's Trust" chaired by Alan Dorey, the "Call My Bluff" quiz, chaired by Simone Walsh and a Writers' Panel (aimed especially at aspiring authors). Writers and other experts who have promised to participate in these events include, in addition to those named above, John Brunner, Chris Priest, Geoff Ryman, Robert Holdstock and Philip Strick.

In addition to all this there will of course be the banquet (Sunday evening, April 15th) and various book and art auctions. With two months to go before the convention as this is written, there is every possibility that there will be last minute improvements to the programme -- which we intend to make as full and interesting as possible. Full details will be contained in the Programme Book and a day-to-day board at the convention will keep you completely up to date with the events.

Several candidates are nominated for each trip and a winner is selected by the votes of interested fans in Europe and America. This year's American winner will attend the 1979 Worldcon in Brighton.

TAFF is entirely supported by sf fandom and relies for much of its income on auctions held at conventions over here and in America. Needless to say, we'd appreciate material for the auction at YORCON. Just about anything can be sold - books, fanzines, manuscripts, magazines, fannish oddments and ephemera, propellor beanies, bottles of booze, posters, stuffed anteaters - anything you can think of that can help TAFF. Donations would be welcome, though we're also prepared to accept a percentage of the price on certain items.

Remember to vote in this year's TAFF race. Ballots will be available at YORCON, or now from the address above.

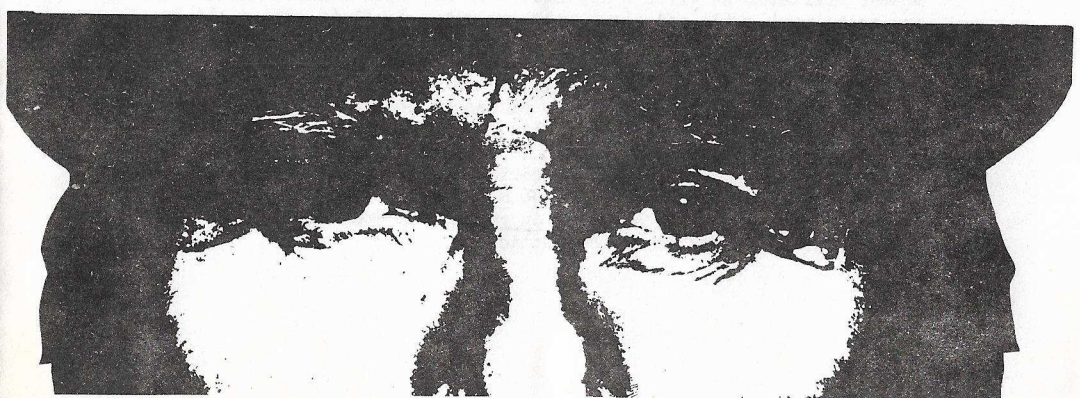

HOTEL AND TRAVEL INFORMATION

Hotel confirmation forms are being sent out with this mailing and it is essential that any outstanding bookings reach us by March 31st at the very latest if you intend staying in the Dragonara Hotel. Also enclosed with this mailing are the details regarding cheap rail fares for convention members. These forms should be filled in and returned to the address indicated as soon as possible.

Leeds is a very convenient centre to which to travel. Details of rail services are listed below, and most major towns and cities have National Express coach links with Leeds, Wellington Street Coach Station.

By Road:

From the South via M1 or A1
From North Wales/Lancashire/Cheshire and Manchester via M62
From the North/Scotland via M6/M62 (West Coast), A1 (East Coast).
Lincolnshire/Humberside via M62

By Rail: (Please enquire at your local station for times)

A map of Leeds city centre will be found on page 9 with the Dragonara Hotel clearly indicated. Those travelling by car would do well to remember that Leeds (like most large cities) is the owner of a large and bewildering One-way traffic scheme. When leaving the M1 from the south, simply follow signs for Leeds City Centre and the route will take you past the hotel which will be on your left-hand side just before the Railway Station. The Hotel car-park is free to patrons provided on leaving you remember to collect a token from reception to operate the barrier. Should the car-park be full, there is a National Car Park almost directly opposite the entrance.

On arriving at the hotel, proceed via the lifts in the entrance foyer adjacent to the Casino to floor PL (Reception) where you will register with the hotel and then see the Convention Registration desk to which all members must go to collect their literature. Each member will also be given a detailed town map with tourist information and restaurant guide and there are also other leaflets that might be of interest.

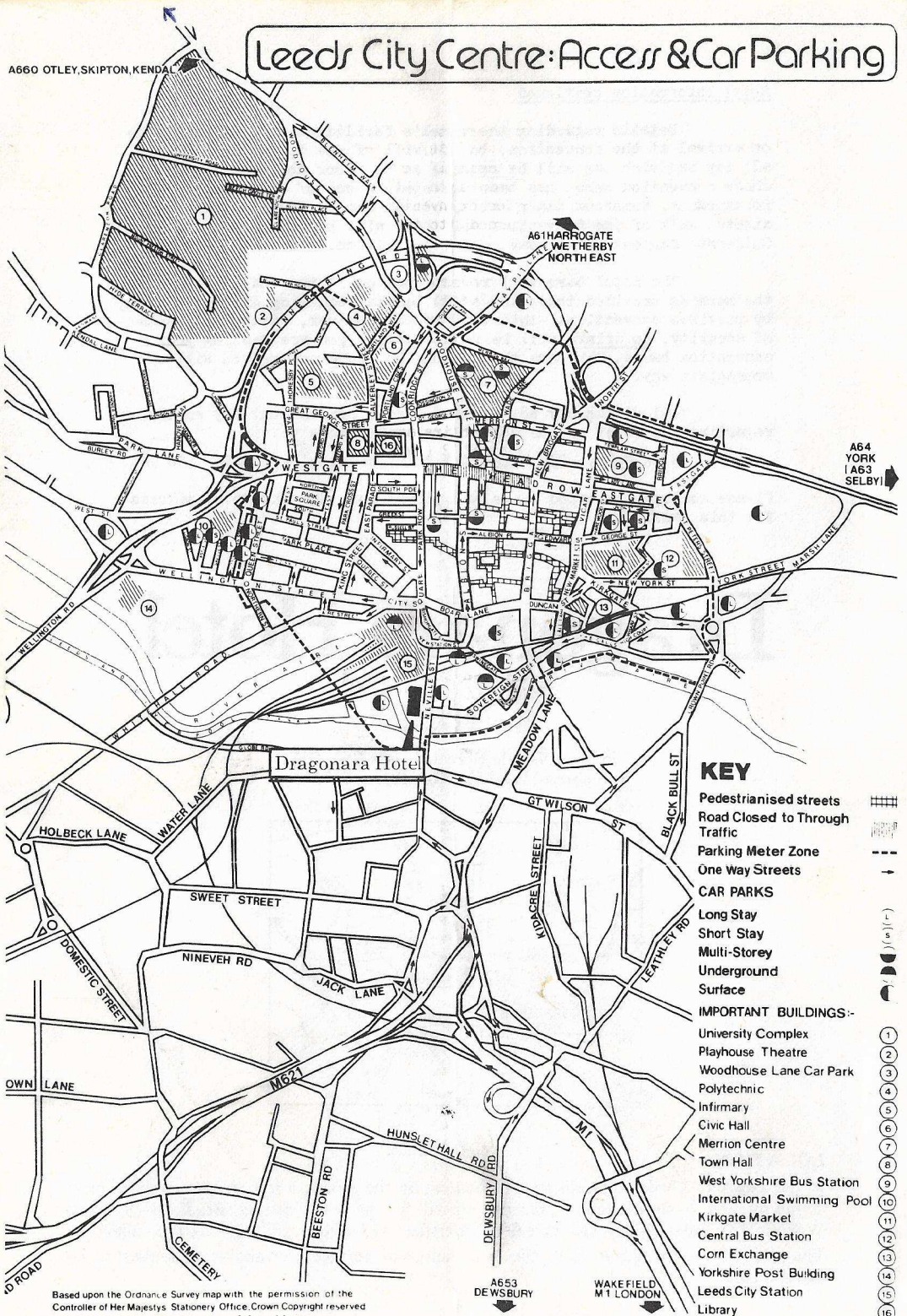
It is the responsibility of each convention member staying at the hotel to pay his/her own bill. Please do so promptly; this will not only help us and the hotel staff, but future conventions. The hotel has a casino next door and although it is part of the Ladbrokes chain, it is not part of the hotel. Should you decide to make use of its facilities you must become a member at least 48 hours before you wish to game and this can only be done by applying in person, so don't be disappointed if they refuse admission at the convention.

All we can say now is have a good convention! Any enquiries regarding the hotel or the convention can be made to:

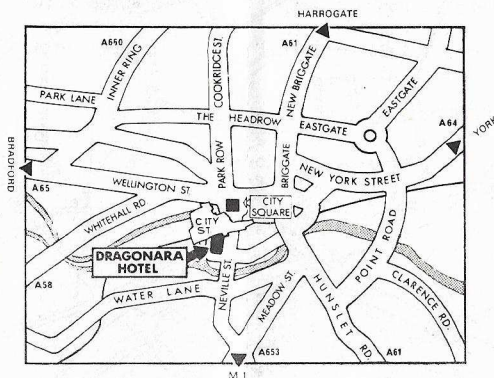

LOCATION

SO YOU WANT TO BE A CONVENTION SECRETARY?

- MONDAY: The postman arrives early today with a mixed bag of mail, some of it held over from the weekend. There are three new memberships, seven returned hotel booking forms (of which six are filled in correctly; the seventh has a cheque made out to YORCON, which involves paying into our own account and then writing a cheque from the a/c for the hotel), two letters from advertisers asking about copy dates and a catalogue of Thermal Underwear from The Damart Factory in Bingley. D.West has been giving them my name again.
- TUESDAY: Go down to our printers and ask for badges to be printed, and get a quote for printing the convention book. This is cheaper than I had thought, but the press date is earlier, so I have to go back and write lots of letters asking contributors to let us have their copy as soon as possible. Receive a letter from Newcastle Polytechnic asking if I'm interested in attending a conference on "Psychology and Science Fiction" in June. Write back giving them D.West's name to get my own back.
- WEDNESDAY: After dealing with the usual convention mail, I phone Mike Dickinson to ask him about advertising copy. Informs me that a couple of people have come through that morning, so the number of reminders I have to write that morning is reduced by two. Write letters to the 1981 Worldcon bidding committees to see if they are interested in advertising with us. Collect Writing competition artwork from the printers and buy 500 envelopes for next mailing. Phone Simone Walsh enquiring after SEAMONSTERS, which has been coming out 'Real Soon Now' for six weeks.
- THURSDAY: Nine letters of enquiry this morning; spend ages replying; decide to hold over the rest of the mail until I return from the One Tun SF meeting in London. Meet a guy on the train who is convinced that he is an alien from outer space studying the human race before he has to report back to his superiors. I tell him I'm from the Intergalactic Police and this quietens him down.
- FRIDAY: Recover from the One Tun meeting and return to Leeds just in time to answer a whole pile of mail and send on some more cheques to the Dragonara Hotel. In the evening is our regular committee meeting, and we fix a copy date for our contributions to this PR. As usual, Paul Matthews and I end up producing the PR. Not that we mind. D.West challenges me to a game of dominoes, and as usual I win.
- SATURDAY: After the soccer match Mike and I always go and see, I travel over to Bingley to put together the Press Release with D.West. After a bottle or two of ale, he challenges me to dominoes. I lose. We are now quits, especially as he sent me out to get the drink.
- SUNDAY: No mail today and I stay in bed until 11a.m, until I realise that I've got to get a train to Harrogate at 11.30 so that I can pick up some convention artwork from Robin Hughes. Persuaded to stay for a few drinks and I quite enjoy myself.

CREATIVE WRITING COMPETITION

£25 IN PRIZES

With this Progress Report you should receive a set of eight illustrations. If these seem rather familiar -- if, in fact, they look like a representative collection of all the SF cliches you've ever seen -- it's because they're intended to. The question is: What can you make of them?

The rules of the competition are simple: any convention member can enter, and all he or she has to do is write a story (any length up to 6000 words) using any three or more of the illustrations. The £25 prize money will be split according to the nature and number of the entries, but you can expect at least three categories: Best Serious, Best Humourous and Best Parody.

Entries should preferably be typed, but hand-written mss will be considered provided they are legible. Copies of the illustrations need not be included, but those you have used should be marked in the text at the appropriate places by a figure in double brackets -- eg ((1)). The illustrations are numbered as follows:

1. Interior with view of City.
2. Two aliens with body of man.
3. Spaceship in orbit.
4. Tracked exploring vehicle.
5. Throne
6. Laboratory interior.
7. Swamp Monster.
8. Dome with Flash.

Entries can be submitted (at the registrations desk) as late as Saturday night of the convention itself, but authors of longer and more serious stories are advised to send them in as soon as possible. The late deadline is chiefly to allow time for the kind of instant Multiple Author Fiction sometimes produced by members of the Leeds Group -- good entertainment if not always good literature.

Form and subject are left wide open -- "Creative Writing" in this context simply means something imaginative and non-factual. Those with serious ambitions in the field of SF may like to attempt an orthodox short story, but there's no bar on anything at all, from a blank verse drama to a book review of the kind of novel Vargo Statten might have written round all eight illustrations.

Some of you, of course, may find that too much SF has rotted the brain completely. So, if you creative energies don't run to more than a dozen words, try the Captions Competition. Having cobbled together some tremendous witticism simply write it on the bottom of the appropriate illustration together with your name and convention number. Or, if you want to take a little more time and trouble, speech balloons can easily be cut out of sticky labels.

desk. Results will be announced on Sunday night, after which Mss can be collected. If you want your postal work back, please enclose a Stamped s.a.e..

There will also be one or more informal discussions groups (details at the convention) at which those interested can talk about the practical problems of writing SF.

The chief problem, of course, is getting started. Hopefully, this set of illustrations will provide a stimulus and a starting point.

So -- Do it NOW!

Samples of the writings of YORCON's Fan Guests of Honour, the inimicable Pat and Graham Charnock. Also on show will be a wide variety of fanzines, some for sale, some for free and some for just looking at. How many there are will depend upon attending fanzine editors bringing them (Broad hint!). I'm also very keen to display as much information about local groups and national organisations and other conventions (Another plea).

There's going to be a small but varied fan programme. It's small because it usually tends to overrun. It will involve a wide variety of panels, some serious, some just for fun. One of them is called "Getting Into Fandom", a panel of anecdote and information about a subject that recently seems to have become somewhat controversial. Conventions can be a somewhat bewildering experience for newcomers, so one of the aims of the Fan Hospitality Room is to try and overcome that. I'm attempting to make it a real hospitality room. If you want information have a problem, or just want somebody to talk to, try the Fan Room and ask me or, if I'm not there, someone who's looking after the place for me and we'll do our best to help. Fans are generally friendly, sociable people, but it can be difficult if you aren't sure who to approach. So please make use of us.

Lastly, I'm still in desperate need of photographs, so if anybody has any they think useful for display, please bring them along.

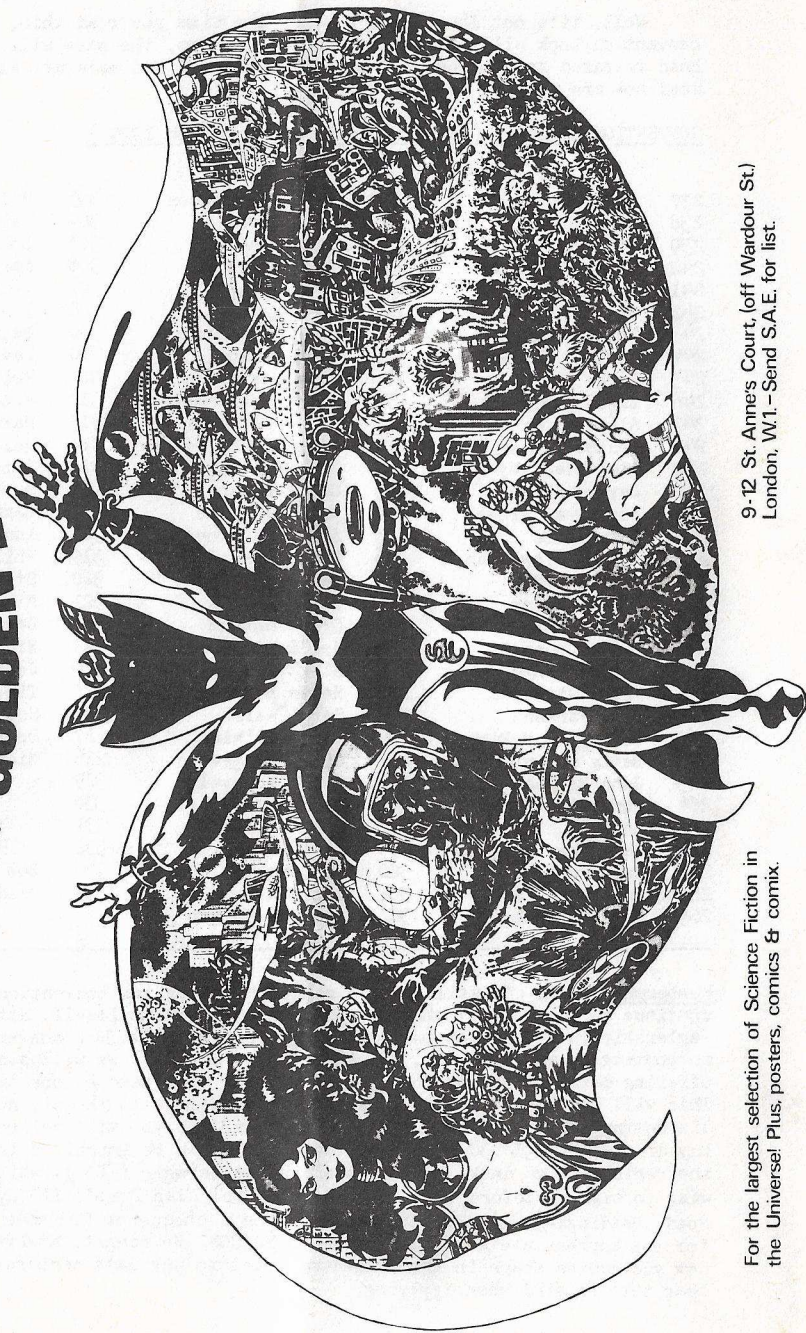
