CHAIRMAN'S BIT

Well, this is it, the last P.R. before the convention.

There's a LOT of information in this one, so READ IT

In fact, there is so much information that this completes the Chairman's Bit, the rest of the P.R. is more interesting, and more useful, than anything I might have said!!

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FOOD AND DRINK

Food will be available from 5.00 p.m. on the Friday evening until midnight, and on Saturday and Sunday from 11.00 a.m. until Midnight Saturday and 9.00 p.m. Sunday.

There will be fresh hot meals at specific times, and both hot and cold snacks and sandwiches all the time the food area is open.

Prices will start at 50p for sandwiches and £2.50 for meals.

We will be having a menu from the hotel, and your programme leaflet will contain full details of exactly what will be available at which times.

Breakfast tickets can be exchanged for a meal and a sweet, or for sandwiches, (the meals will obviously give you better value), on the day of issue only, in the servery only, NOT THE RESTAURANT. Those of you who have booked a hotel room but don't eat breakfast will find this facility useful.

The Restaurant will be open for those who can afford to eat there. I have been for meals here on special occasions, and can vouch for the quality and choice. The carvery is the best value in the restaurant, and if you can afford it their A la Carte meals are superb.

Should you want to eat outside the hotel Birmingham has a wide selection of restaurants and fast-food places, far too numerous to mention here. We hope to be able to put together a mini-guide for you by the time you arrive.

There will be three bars providing an almost continuous service during the convention. The main hotel bar, Wimsey's, will be open from 3.00 p.m. on Friday, 10.00 a.m. Saturday and 10.30 a.m. Sunday, and will close when we stop buying.

The Wroxton bar, being in the main programme hall, will only be open for the Disco on Saturday night.

The Ariel bar, which will be a portable bar provided specially for us, will be open the same times as the Wimsey, but ACCORDING TO DEMAND. If we don't use it they'll close it. As the Ariel is also the fan room I don't expect there will be a problem of underuse, but the hotel do have to provide extra staff to man these bars, and we cannot expect them to do that if we don't use them.

Bar prices will start at £1.10 for a pint of bitter, with lager and shorts correspondingly higher. I have made strenuous efforts to get these prices reduced, but the brewery which owns the hotel will not budge. I am really sorry about this, as I know its been cheaper at other conventions, I even wrote to the brewery myself, to no avail. Please don't blame the bar staff, or even the hotel management, they really are brewery tied, and the brewery seems to have a blind-spot where prices are concerned.

GETTING THERE

BY CAR If driving on the M6, take Junction 6 (Spaghetti Junction), labelled "Birmingham Central". This takes you onto the A38(M) Aston Expressway. After the "End of Motorway" sign move into the right hand lane, which will take you over the Lancaster Circus flyover. At the end of the flyover move to the left hand lane and the Royal Angus is about 100 yards ahead on the left after the end of the flyover. If you find you didn't move over fast enough and have gone past the hotel while still on the ring-road go round and try again.

If you are coming on the M5 you can either stay on the motorway to Junction 6 as above, or leave at Junction 3, which is about 5 miles out of the city centre. Follow the signs to the city centre, arriving along Broad Street, which leads onto Paradise Circus Roundabout. Take the second major exit from this, roughly straight on, onto St Charles Queensway. Don't take the underpass, stay in the left hand lane leading to St Chads Circus roundabout. Turn right, 4th exit, up Snow Hill Queensway to Colmore Circus roundabout. Take the first exit left off Colmore Circus, a short road called Weaman Street. This leads to a back entrance to the Royal Angus car park.

From the A34, A41, A45, you will pass Digbeth and the Bull Ring. Turn right at the St Martins Circus roundabout onto Moor Street Queensway. Go under the first underpass, but keep left at the second, onto Lancaster Circus roundabout. Keep left here onto St Chads Queensway, and you will find the flyover from the A38(M) joining you from the right, see first para. The Royal Angus is 100 yards ahead on the left.

BY TRAIN You will probably arrive at Birmingham New Street station. If you arrive at Moor Street you must be local, and should know the way. If you arrive at Birmingham International you're in the wrong place! Stay there until another train to Birmingham arrives, and get that to New Street station!!

As you come through the ticket barriers at New Street go up the escalators which you will see straight ahead of you, turn left at the top and leave the shopping area via the ramp, (which will be almost directly ahead of you as you turn left getting off the escalator, but can't be seen properly until you get to it). Turn right at the bottom of the ramp, and the first bus stop you see is the 101 Centrebus. This runs every few minutes and will take you to the Angus, but stops running early evening. If you arrive after 6.00 p.m., when you reach the bottom of the ramp walk up Corporation Street, which is straight ahead of you across the traffic lights. Turn left at Old Square into Colmore Circus, down Snow Hill Queensway, and the Royal Angus is round the corner on the right.

BY COACH You will arrive at Digbeth Coach Station. Walk towards the city centre, crossing the road as you go, and turn right to Moor Street Station to catch a 101 Centrebus as above. If you arrive after 6.00 p.m. you go the same way, ignoring the station, under St Martins Circus, up High Street, bear slightly left up Bull Street, which brings you to Colmore Circus. You then proceed down Snow Hill Queensway, and the Royal Angus is round the corner to the right.

The pedestrian routes described above can be very confusing, as the Birmingham City Fathers decided to put traffic on the streets and people in underpasses and subways. They can also be a little unsavoury especially after dark.

A taxi from from either Digbeth Coach Station or New Street station would cost about £1 to £1.50, less if two or more are sharing, and is probably the best way to get to the hotel, especially if this is your first visit to Birmingham.

CHEAP RAIL TRAVEL

We have again arranged cheap train tickets for you, but I'm afraid the deal isn't as good as it used to be.

The Theatre & Concert Rail Club no longer do this except for card carrying members, but the new set-up, That's Entertrainment, have carried on the good work, but to a lesser degree. The main differences are:

1. No flat-rate for children, they pay half adult rate.
2. No Special Railcard prices.
3. Conditions in respect of accommodation on certain days, see the booking form for full details.

In addition to these, you may be asked by British Rail staff to prove you actually have accommodation booked.

"That's Entertrainment" do NOT require such proof, they don't even want you to specify on the form when you order tickets, but B.R. may ask, so if you haven't got a room in the hotel it's entirely up to you if you want to take a chance on not being asked.

Speaking purely personally, I would check B.R.'s own prices, especially if holding a student card or similar, then use the form if it really is a good saving. THAT IS NOT OFFICIAL ADVICE, it is a strictly personal opinion.

THE NOVA AWARDS

The NOVAS are awards for fanzines produced by *Science Fiction Fans* in the British Isles, created in 1973 by the late Gillon Field, and presented annually at the Birmingham Science Fiction Group's Novacon. The NOVA was, until 1981, awarded to the editor of the fanzine voted 'Best of the Year'. Since then there have been two additional NOVAS awarded each year, to the fanwriter and fanartist voted 'Best of the Year'.

For a fanzine to qualify *one* or more issues must have appeared between 1/10/1986 and 30/9/1987. For fanwriters and fanartists to qualify a piece of writing or artwork by the person concerned must have been published in a fanzine between 1/10/86 and 30/9/87.

For the purposes of this award a 'fanzine' shall be defined as an amateur publication which is concerned with science fiction, fantasy, science fiction and fantasy fans, and/or related subjects, and copies of which may be generally obtained in exchange for other amateur publications or in response to letters of comment.

The fundamental idea of the NOVA Awards as they have been run since 1981 is that they should be awarded by informed vote. Informed votes come from informed voters, who for the purposes of the NOVA awards are defined as any full or supporting members (of the Novacon at which the award is to be made), provided he or she has been active in fanzines during the year terminating on the 30th September of the current year. 'Active in Fanzines' is a bit harder to define.

For the purposes of these awards the NOVA committee have decided that 'to be active in fanzines' means to have recieved six or more fanzines during the course of the relevant year. *Fanzines* in this instance means *different publications* and *not* different issues of the same fanzine. The various official organs of a group or society shall not be treated as different fanzines for the purposes of this rule.

At Novacon 17 there will be a display of all the fanzines that I know to be eligible for the NOVA this year. If you have published a fanzine during the period 1/10/86 and 31/9/87 and you don't believe I have access to a copy, either send a copy to me at the address below, or bring it along to the convention-I'll be in the bar.

You should find a copy of the NOVA award ballott with this progress report. When completed it should either be returned to me at the address below, at least 1 week before Novacon 17, or deposited in the ballott box provided at the convention before Saturday midnight.

Many many thanks to all who have contributed material to the book and memorabilia auction. We now have all we are able to handle, thanks to the magnificent response.

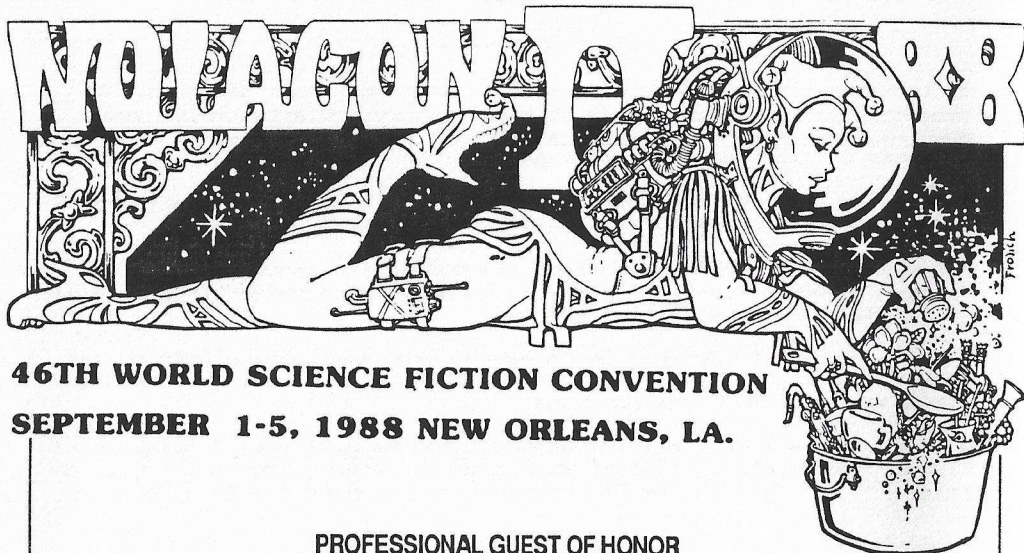
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OVERFLOW HOTEL

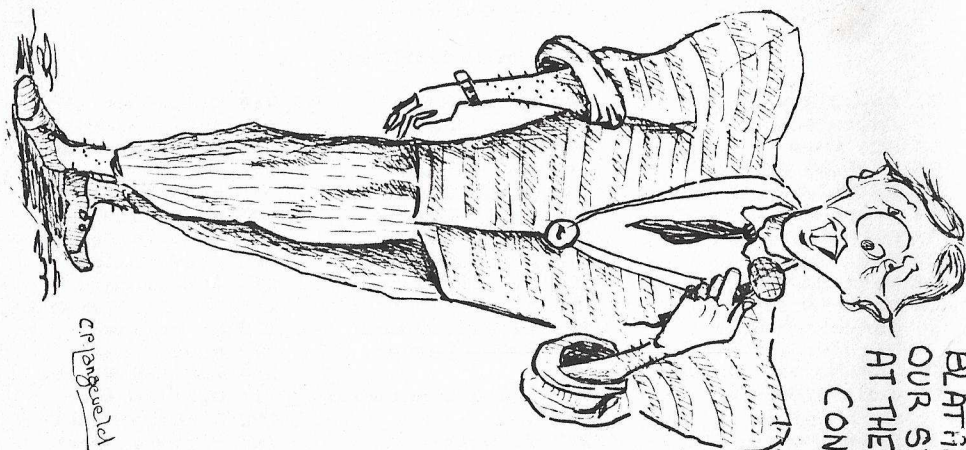
