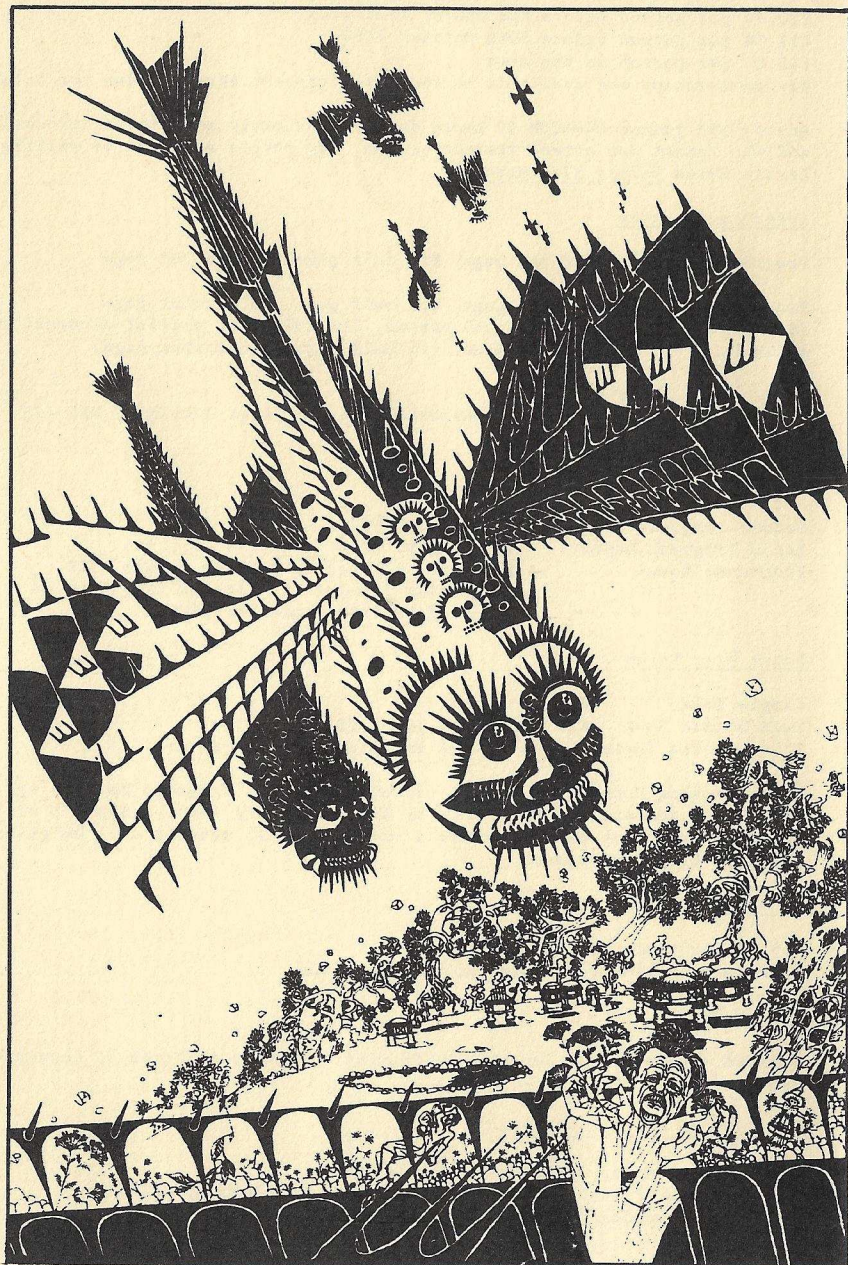

NOVACON 19 - Chairman's Introduction

Welcome to the first Progress Report on NOVACON 19! A little later than we would have liked, but better late than never, eh? I'm afraid that the delayed appearance of this PR was due to the fact that NOVACON has been forced to move again.

When we returned to the Royal Angus for NOVACON 17 we had hoped to remain there, especially as both NOVACONS 17 and 18 were so successful. Unfortunately it was not to be. Despite the fact that I started making approaches to the Royal Angus long before the last NOVACON, it wasn't until two weeks after the convention that the General Manager finally gave me his answer - it was "No!" He phrased it very pleasantly, of course, but it boiled down to the fact that, although he realised and appreciated the vast amount of business NOVACON brought to the hotel, they'd had to work too hard for their money! Mr Thirwell didn't believe his hotel could cope with the level of business a NOVACON entailed. Bernie Evans had a shot at dissuading him, but he would only consider hosting a NOVACON if the membership was limited to between 200 and 250 people. We considered this out of the question.

Luckily, because of the initial difficulty of getting a reply from the Royal Angus, I had already begun to make overtures to alternative hotels. However, I swiftly discovered that, due in no small part to the amount of business the NEC is now attracting (10,000 people one weekend, 30,000 the next, and so on), very few hotels were in a position to help us. Finally, having struck out at twelve other hotels, we discovered the Excelsior.

Fortunately the Excelsior is not only available but perfect for a NOVACON. All of the ample function space is on the ground floor (the Book Room, Art Show and Main Programme just a few feet away from each other), along with the comfortable Lounge Reception, a large Bar and a spacious Snooker Room with two full size tables. So far the hotel have been very helpful, and I have no doubt they will continue to be so.

But that is more than enough information on the venue; there will be plenty of time later to tell you more about the hotel, its facilities and the surrounding area. Now it's time to talk about the convention itself!

Firstly, a few words about the committee. Tony Berry, the NOVACON 19 Treasurer, you know already as he has chaired two previous NOVACONS. Helena Bowles, who is in charge of our Programme, will be a new name to many of you; she has the main advantage of being young and enthusiastic (and the disadvantage of being our 'token 19 year old'), as well as the backing of an experienced committee. Bernie Evans is dealing with our Registrations, a job she knows inside out, having occupied the same position on NOVACONS 17 and 18 and FIFTEENCON (two of which she also chaired). Nick Mills, who worked on NOVACON 16 and the CONSPIRACY Fan Programme will be dealing with our Operations on the day. Finally, Pam Wells, a name new to NOVACONS but not to convention running, will be doing our Publications.

Our theme is 'The Music, the Science and the Fiction of the Sixties,' which is admittedly a fairly tall order to cram into one convention, but we will be doing our best. The idea of the theme first came up during a pre-committee drink when several people tried to define when 'the Sixties' began and ended. One year mentioned as being the year in which they ended was 1971, thus 'proving' that the birth of NOVACON marked the death of the Sixties... The

more we talked about the idea, the more enthusiastic we became. So much happened during 'the Sixties' in so many fields - New Wave SF, genetics, space travel, psychadelia, synthesizers...the list is almost endless, but we will be covering as much as is possible in our (hopefully) innovative programme.

Last but by no means least is our Guest of Honour, Geoff Ryman. In fandom Geoff is probably better known for his superb stage presentations, such as THE TRANSMIGRATION OF TIMOTHY ARCHER at the first MEXICON. But as Geoff is also an equally superb published writer, I hope you will all take this opportunity to familiarise yourselves with some of the excellent work he has had published, such as his two novels THE UNCONQUERED COUNTRY and THE WARRIOR WHO CARRIED LIFE. In my opinion, Geoff is a perfect GoH for a NOVACON, both as professional writer and fan; I'm sure you will agree.

We will again be providing limited creche facilities this year.

3. It would be helpful if you could bring along a few favourite toys, clearly labelled with your child's name - partly because your child will settle better with a familiar toy, and partly because we are a little limited in what we can provide ourselves!
4. If your child is in nappies PLEASE ensure that you bring spares, preferably disposable ones (including the one that the child is wearing when you leave him or her in the creche!).

Vicky tells me that she has enjoyed providing the creche: "I wouldn't be doing it again if I didn't!". So please help us to help you have a good con by remembering these few simple points.

By the way, the hotel will be providing us with a bed and a cot in the creche.

Guest of Honour GEOFF RYMAN



Our Guest of Honour - Geoff Ryman:
An Introduction by Kate Jeary

In the year 1979, I and other members of the erstwhile Leeds Group entered the dodgy business of conrunning, on the grounds that we couldn't possibly be worse than all the preceding people who had attempted the same; and that, even if we were, we could at least try and enjoy ourselves. During the ensuing committee and group meetings, I heard a lot about a place called Lumb Bank, where it seemed aspiring writers were wont to foregather; and even more about a very tall Canadian writer encountered there, who had this strange predilection for cooking. (You have to understand that the Leeds group, at this time mostly male, was more noted for its eating than its cooking propensities. Things changed later.) There is nothing more exasperating than constantly hearing about someone you haven't met, and so I was very glad when he actually turned up to YORCON 1. Great, I thought, and then as I neared him in the flesh I began to have second thoughts - was it my imagination, or did he seem to be getting taller and taller? When I finally stood next to him I realised that, no, this was no optical illusion, he was actually giving me a crick in the neck. It is not what a self-respecting female of 5'8" is used to, but I have had to become accustomed to it over the years, since Geoff hasn't got any shorter, and the only way I expand these days is sideways.

In the year 1989 I now find myself, somewhat to my surprise, in the position of having to write about Geoff and, as with anyone that you have known for a long time, it's actually difficult to think what to write. Should I mention Geoff's rise to critical fame and his growing list of SF awards? No, that's more the type of thing for FOUNDATION or INTERZONE, not a NOVACON report. I could say that one of the few occasions in my life when I was nearly rendered speechless was when I got my hands on THE WARRIOR WHO CARRIED LIFE and realised that this was what Geoff had been talking about when he spoke of his attempts to write a downmarket sword and sorcery novel. If this classic was downmarket, what on earth was Geoff going to write when he went upmarket?

I could mention the play he put on for YORCON 3, or the Philip K Dick dramatisation he did for Worldcon - which was for me, and I think many others, one of the best parts of the convention. I could mention his well-remembered appearance in SPOCK IN MANACLES, a piece of fannish legend which will surely be retold to the as yet unborn. I could mention his firm commitment to the YORCON 2 film programme, when everyone else (particularly me) seemed to be running around in circles. I will mention his friendliness and very real concern for others, especially his lack of arrogance. Being a rising author can sometimes, very clearly, be no fun at all at conventions. I could mention his touching faith in me when driving around Oxford. Geoff had this funny idea that, since I had a licence, I could tell him what he was doing wrong when he made a mistake. I spent most of that weekend being ferried around with my eyes closed. I could mention dragging him to a number of terrible films (yes, CONAN THE BARBARIAN included) and the fine critical mind he brought to bear on what could have been done to redeem the unredeemable. Oh, have I mentioned it? Well, I won't again.

Suffice it to say, firstly, that I am extremely glad that the present NOVACON committee has invited him, since he will be an impeccable Guest of Honour; and secondly, that he has accepted the invitation. A NOVACON is one of those occasions during which someone who is as much celebrated for his contributions to fannish life as for being an author can comfortably relax and enjoy himself. About time! 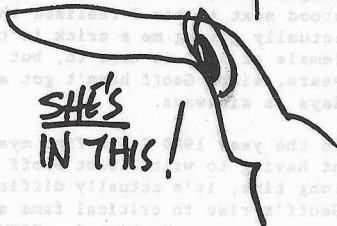
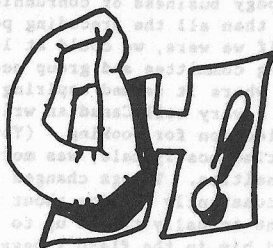

The Nova Awards

In 1973, the late Gillon Field created the Nova Award for fanzines produced by Science Fiction Fandom. Until 1981, it was presented annually at NOVACON to the editor of the fanzine voted 'best of the year'. After that date, two additional Nova Awards were awarded - to the Fanwriter and Fanartist voted 'best of the year' - and this trio of awards has been presented annually at NOVACONS ever since.

The Nova Award winners at NOVACON 18 were:

Best Fanzine	LIP, edited by HAZEL ASHWORTH
Best Fanwriter	MICHAEL ASHLEY
Best Fanartist	D WEST

For a fanzine to qualify at NOVACON 19, one or more issues must have appeared between 1st October 1988 and 30th September 1989. For fanwriters and fanartists to qualify, a piece of writing or artwork by the person concerned must have been published in a fanzine for the first time between 1st October 1988 and 30th September 1989. For the purposes of this award, a 'fanzine' is defined as an amateur publication which is concerned with Science Fiction, Fantasy, Science Fiction and Fantasy Fans and/or related subjects, and copies of which may be generally obtained in exchange for other amateur publications or in response to letters of comment.

The fundamental idea of the Nova Awards is that they should be awarded by informed vote. Informed votes come from informed voters, and for the purposes of the awards these are defined as any member of NOVACON 19, provided he or she has been active in fanzines in the British Isles during the year 1st October 1988 to 30th September 1989. The term 'active in fanzines' is a bit harder to define, but the current definition states that voters must have received SIX or more fanzines during the course of the relevant year. Fanzines in this context means different publications, and NOT different issues of the same fanzine. The various official organs of a group or society will not be treated as different fanzines for the purpose of this rule.

NOVACON 18 saw a record-equalling number of ballots cast by the members, with 55 eligible voting forms being received and counted by the Nova Committee.

This is a positive indication that the Nova Awards are in good health, and I hope that we can collect even more ballots at NOVACON 19. I'd like to thank everyone who voted, for your participation and interest in these awards.

The awards themselves are made annually by Ray Bradbury of the BSFG, and we would like to thank him for all his time and effort in creating such beautiful awards for the winners to keep each year.

Future Progress Reports will feature work by the NOVACON 18 award winners. I also plan to include a brief discussion of some of the fanzines, writers and artists who will be eligible for the NOVACON 19 awards.
