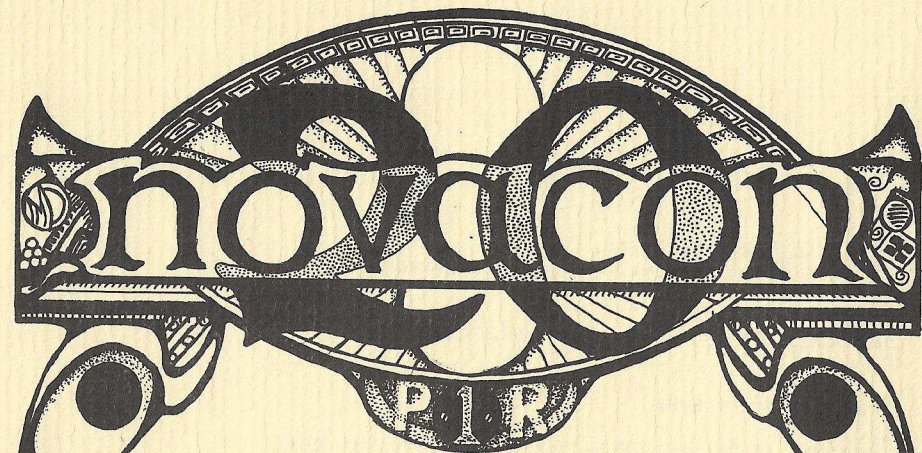
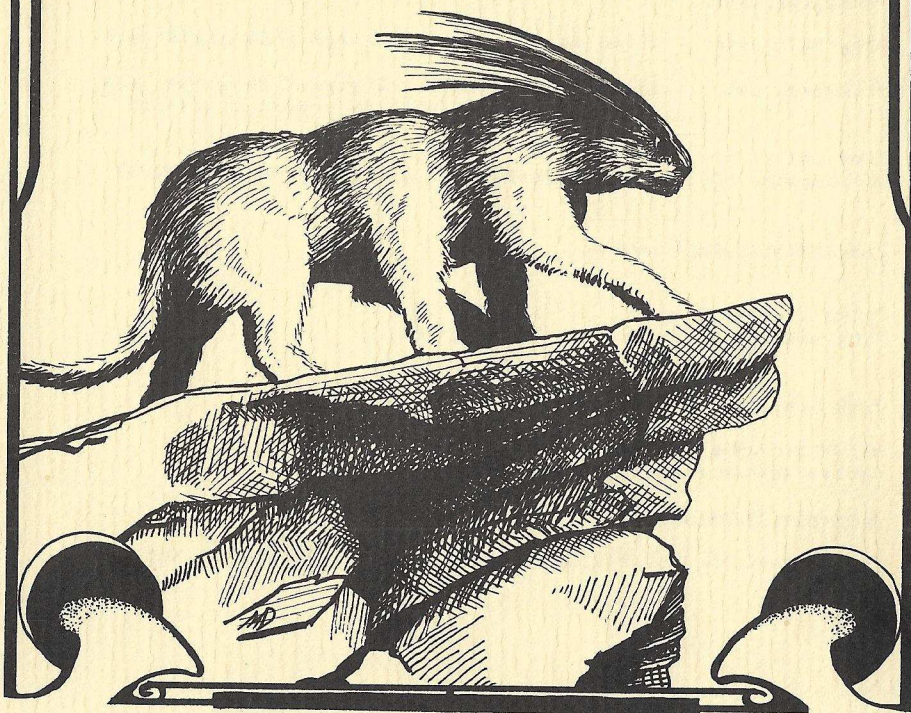

CHAIRMAN'S BIT

Well, here it is at long last, your very first PR for NOVACON 20. I start with an apology, for the more than extreme lateness of this PR. It is entirely my fault, I'm afraid I fouled up completely when I moved house, (well, SINCE I moved house, to be strictly correct). I'm sure you don't all want to read house-moving horror stories, so I won't go into boring detail, and for those who DO want to read house-moving horror stories, TOUGH!. Anyway, to further delay matters, this page was so far out of date I recalled it from the printers to do it again, which added to the overall lateness of things. OK, explanation over with, apologies proffered, me being who (and what) I am, I ain't gonna grovel, that's your lot along those lines!

So, what about the Convention? Things are progressing as they usually do, in that a couple of foul-ups have already happened and been sorted. Talk about the best laid plans..... Nice though it was at the Excelsior last year, we were mindful of the overflow hotel problem, and tried real hard to go back to the city centre, but it seems the city centre don't want us, in fact the city centre don't need us. This new Convention Centre's playing havoc with hotel accommodation in Birmingham. The only deals I could get were at full commercial rates with no concessions. An important aspect of our programme this year will be the celebration of British Fandom's 60th birthday, (what's 2 weeks after 60 years?), since the first known meeting of SF fans in Britain took place in Ilford on October 27th 1930. Fan historian ROB HANSEN will be helping us to plan that aspect of the programme.

JACK COHEN - FRIEND AND PRO

With his white hair forming a wild halo around his head, his wonderful lecture-room filling voice, and his expansive gestures, Jack Cohen would make a good Emmett Brown (Back to the Future). With his enthusiasm for life, his thirst for knowledge and his overwhelming ability to impart his knowledge and ideas to others in an interesting and exciting way, he must have been a great teacher. I wish I'd been a student of his. Yes, you've guessed, I'm a fan of his!!

My first visit to the Brumgroup was for a Jack Cohen talk, which was described in the following month's newsletter thus:- "Dr Jack Cohen showed us slides of a variety of copulating animals, and explained some of the weird and wonderful ways in which aliens might reproduce." This exemplifies Jack's approach, whether he's talking to a bunch of students or a meeting of SF fans, his talks are lively, visually and mentally stimulating, informative, and FUN.

But, there's more to Jack than that. If you've ever read an SF novel or story in which the aliens are believable, there's a very good chance Jack's influence and knowledge is in there somewhere.

The illustration opposite is singularly appropriate, since Jack Cohen has had a hand in shaping more worlds than you or I could ever dream of. To be more accurate, Jack's hand was shaping the aliens who inhabit those worlds. Worlds written of by the Brumgroups own honorary presidents, Brian Aldiss and Harry Harrison, and by many others too numerous to mention.

Harry Harrison, quoted from *WEST OF EDEN*:-

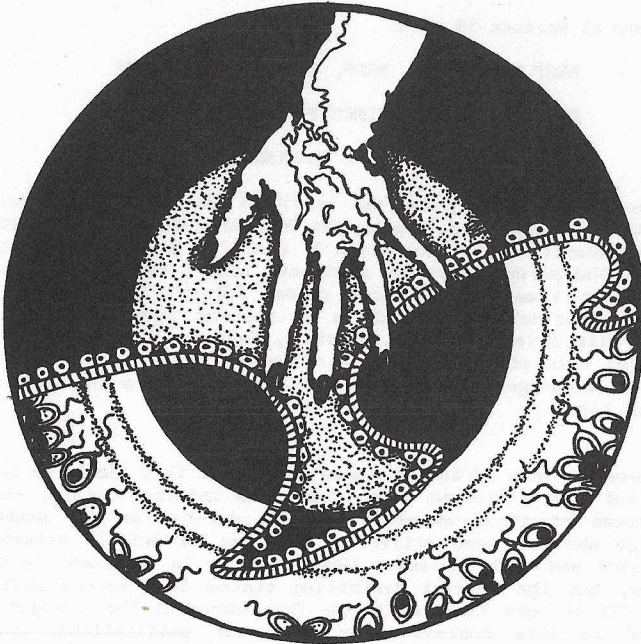
"for.....and Jack Cohen, without whose aid this book would never have been written"

The biographical notes from the dust-wrapper of his book *THE PRIVILEGED APE* tell us that "for 25 years he was a reproductive biologist at Birmingham University, and he has made professional contributions within many differing branches of Biology, including:- origins of the major phyla of animals, feather development, maternal effects in development and biology of spermatozoa." (now take a closer look at the illustration!). The notes also tell us he has written important books on embryology, reproduction and human fertility.

Sometimes his work was controversial, but always he has striven to improve the quality of life, to lessen the sadnesses that many couples have. Jack once spoke to me of *LIKING* his children. He was the first person I ever spoke to who understood the difference between loving your children because they ARE your children, and liking them as people. But of course he understood me, Jack has a depth of understanding which many of us would do well to try to emulate. It is this which has shone through whenever he has discussed this area of his professional life.

Perhaps I should have left this article to the professionals, but I wanted desperately to write it myself. Until I met Jack I'd never met a academic who was so full of life, so bubbly, so enthusiastic. This I wanted to communicate to the rest of you, the professional tributes will come later.

So, WHAT IS Jack Cohen, fan, perfectionist, researcher, writer, lecturer, entertainer. He is all these and more. Others will be writing about him in future PRs, this little offering is my own tribute to a warm caring man who has contributed much to SF, and even more to the world at large. It is also my reason for inviting Jack to be our Guest-of-Honour. My life has been made richer by being able to call him my friend, so will yours.



Excerpt from a letter from John Brunner to another Jack fan

"Once at a convention I was trying to mediate between Jack and a would-be author who wanted intelligent cats with an upright stance in her story. Jack didn't. (He wouldn't, would he?) So I improvised a treetop-dwelling predator which pounced by using internal pressure for its spring. All she needed was to bring the reflex under conscious control and she'd have a predator walking upright. She still wanted intelligent cats..... After she'd gone, Jack turned to me and asked "Do you know how a chameleon's tongue works?" I said no, and he said "Exactly as you've described!" That made my invention too good to waste. Now you know where the aliens came from in *THE CRUCIBLE OF TIME*. Thank you, Jack!"

THE NOVA AWARDS

In 1973 the late Gillon Field created the *NOVA AWARD* for fanzines produced by Science Fiction Fandom, and until 1981 this was presented annually at Novacon to the editor of the fanzine voted 'best of the year'. From 1982 onwards, additional Nova Awards were presented to the Fanwriter and Fanartist voted 'best of the year'. These three awards have been presented annually at Novacons ever since.

The winners at Novacon 19 were:

BEST FANZINE. VSOP, edited by JAN ORYS
BEST FANWRITER. SIMON POLLEY
BEST FANARTIST. DAVE MOORING

For a fanzine to qualify for the award at Novacon 20, one or more issues must have appeared between 1st October 1989 and 30th September 1990. For fanwriters and fanartists to qualify, a piece of writing or artwork by the person concerned must have been published in a fanzine for the first time between those dates. For the purposes of these awards, a 'fanzine' is defined as an amateur publication which is concerned with Science Fiction, Fantasy, Science Fiction and Fantasy Fans and/or related subjects, and copies of which may be generally obtained in exchange for other amateur publications or in response to letters of comment.

The fundamental idea of the Nova Awards is that they should be awarded by informed vote. Informed votes come from informed voters, and for the purposes of these awards these are defined as any member of Novacon 20 who has been active in fanzines in Britain between 1st October 1989 and 30th September 1990. 'Active in fanzines' is harder to define, but the current definition states that voters must have received SIX or more fanzines during the course of the relevant year. 'Fanzines' in this context means different publications, and not different issues of the same fanzine. The various official organs of a group or society will not be treated as different fanzines for the purpose of this rule.

Nova Award ballot forms will be enclosed with the third Novacon 20 progress report, and a supply will also be available at the convention itself. I hope that all of you who enjoy fanzines between now and then will bear the Nova's in mind and consider how to cast your votes.
