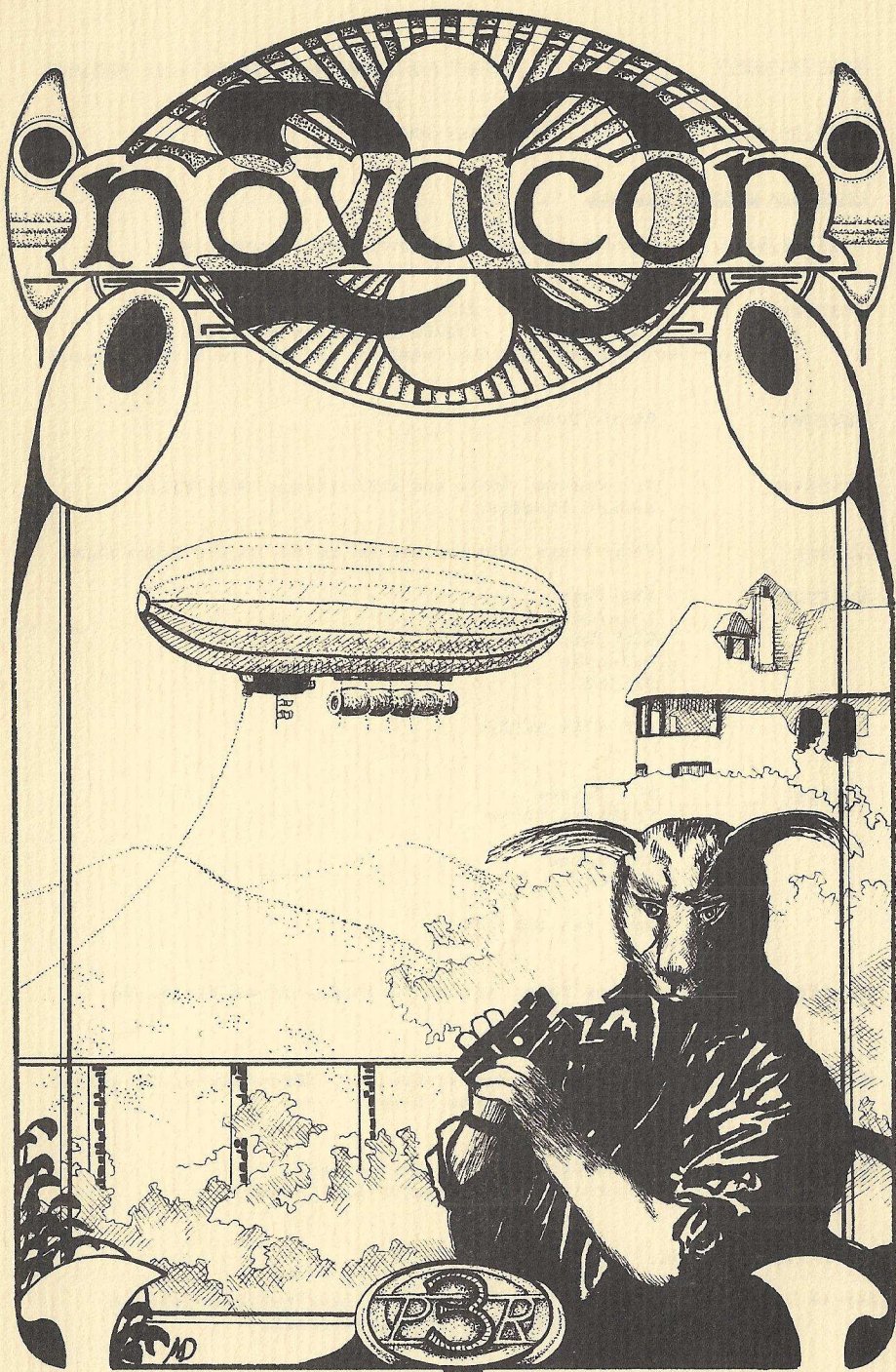

IN THE BEGINING.

It was October 1930, the month when the R101 crashed in flames taking the airship industry with it, and the month after Adolf Hitler's Nazis increased their representation in the German Reichstag from 12 to 107 to become that body's second largest party. These were distant concerns for most people, however.

In Ilford, on the eastern edge of London, the 18 year-old Walter Gillings was more concerned with trying to make contact with others who shared his obsession with a strange new form of literature known as scientification. Gillings had already made contact with Len Kippin, a resident of nearby Leyton, after Kippin had a letter printed in the June issue of WONDER STORIES magazine but now the two wanted to contact other enthusiasts.

In 1930, Gillings was in the throes of his first year's training as a reporter on a local newspaper, The Ilford Recorder, and in the 3rd October issue, with the sanction of an indulgent chief, he inserted a 'Letter to the Editor' he had written himself announcing the formation of the Ilford Science Literary Circle. It began:

"We are writing to you in an attempt to bring together in Ilford all who are in sympathy with the furtherance of scientific knowledge and who themselves take a keen interest in the progress and, particularly, the possibilities of scientific achievement."

After giving examples of things predicted by SF writers, and paying homage to Jules Verne and H.G Wells, it continued:

"The writers of this letter...being anxious to popularise this type of literature (which, we would emphasise, is an admixture of imagination and scientific FACT), propose to form a club and enable others with similar literary tastes to avail themselves of the opportunity of becoming familiar with more recent examples of scientification."

Pompous the letter may have been, but it produced results. On Monday 27th October 1930, at 32 Thorold Road, Ilford, the inaugural meeting of the Ilford Science Literary Circle was held. Besides Kippin, his wife and Gillings, the other five who turned up included one J.W Beck (later described by Gillings as "...a valuable member of the Circle...can always be relied upon to propound a sound argument..."), and George and Mary Dew. This latter pair were, according to Gillings "...a middle aged-aged couple who without quite realising what it was all about were willing to lend their front parlour so long as the group enlivened their Monday evenings".

The readings from contemporary works of SF given at the meetings prompted discussion and argument that in turn provided Gillings with 'copy' for the Recorder. In all a full eight of the paper's columns were filled with accounts of the Circle during the nine months and thirty-seven meetings of its existence, and some of these Recorder pieces were reprinted in the March 1931 issue of WONDER STORIES.

This got Gillings noticed by other British readers and even acted as the catalyst for the formation of another group, the Universal Science Circle in Liverpool, but it couldn't save the Ilford Circle. The Circle went into recess for the summer of 1931 and failed to reassemble again, partly because the members could think of no other way of discouraging an elderly lady who had mistaken them for a Spiritualist circle.

Gillings himself went on to greater things as editor first of TALES OF WONDER, Britain's first true SF magazine, and later of SCIENCE FANTASY. But some of us remember him most fondly for forming this country's first ever fan group, whose inaugural meeting on 27th October 1930 marked the birth of British fandom.

It's that birth that we will be celebrating at NOVACON 20, British fandom's sixtieth birthday. Enjoy the party.

HOW TO FIND US

The Excelsior Hotel is situated at the entrance to the OLD passenger airport, now the cargo airport, and is known locally as the Airport Hotel, please bear this in mind if you get a blank stare when asking directions.

Last year, I'm told, Tony's excellent directions were marred by a missing junction on the map. This year I've (more or less) copied them, BUT there's a new map provided by the hotel itself, and the route was checked by one of our car-driving committee members. Happy Travelling..... (Bernie)

By Rail

Get off at Birmingham International Station (not New Street). Get a taxi to the hotel, (about a five minute ride), OR catch the 900 bus TO Birmingham from outside the station and ask for the Excelsior Hotel, OR if you're a lot fitter than me, turn left out of the station, walk up to the A45 island, turn right and keep going for about a mile.

By Car

From the M6, leave at Junction 4 or 4A, depending on your direction of travel, and head south on the M42. Leave at Junction 3 and take the A45 towards the NEC and the station, carry on a short distance, (be prepared to turn RIGHT) until you get to a set of traffic lights. You will see the hotel on your right, the turning is signposted Freeport & Hotel.

Parking

The hotel has free parking space for about 200 cars, or there is a large NCP car park nearby, on the way to the Freeport.

By Bus from Birmingham

Catch the 900 bus from Stephenson Street, which lies behind the Midland Hotel. The bus stops outside the Excelsior, just past the entrance, and runs every 20 minutes during the day, every 30 minutes evenings & Sundays.

By Coach

National coaches will go to Digbeth Coach Station. The 900 bus stops roughly opposite the coach station, travelling towards Coventry, see previous paragraph for details.

By Air

Get off the plane at Birmingham Airport, if you're in Birmingham Alabama send us a postcard, if you've done it right and you're in Birmingham England, get a taxi to the hotel.

Getting to the Wheatsheaf

This is the overflow hotel, and is on the A45, about a mile nearer to Birmingham than the Excelsior. The 900 bus stops outside in both directions. By car, watch out for a crossroads with lots of traffic lights on an overhead gantry. The hotel is on the corner of Coventry Road and Hobs Moat Road, on the right travelling away from Birmingham, on the left if you're travelling towards Birmingham.
