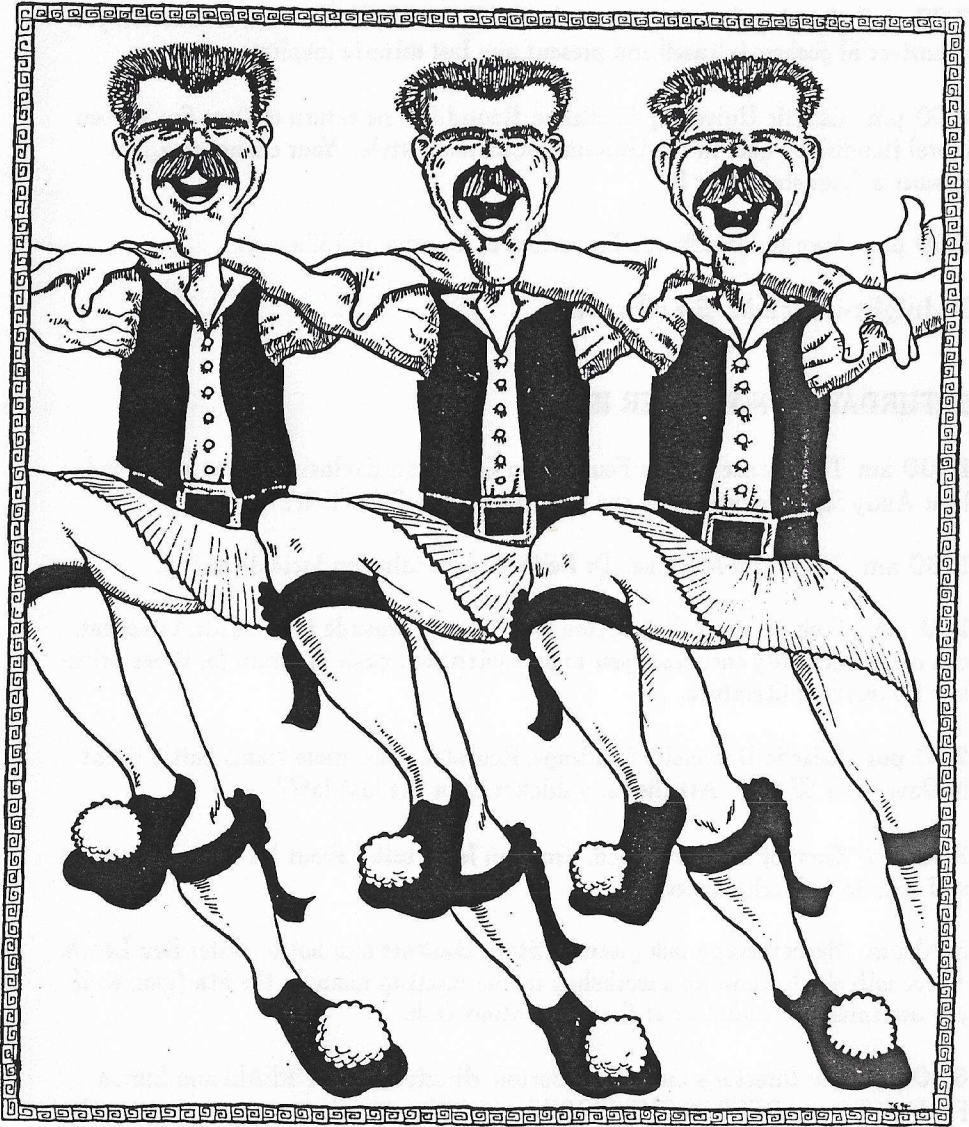

WHAT DREAMS MAY COME: *The Novacon 24 Film Programme* Steve Green

Friday, 12 Midnight:

NIGHT OF THE EAGLE

(Independent Artists; UK, 1961, 87 minutes: dir. Sidney Hayers)

Psychology professor Norman Taylor (Peter Wyngarde) becomes gradually convinced his wife Tansy (Janet Blair) is misguidedly using witchcraft to aid his academic career. Only when he intervenes - and places them in lethal danger - does Taylor realise she is far from the only practitioner on campus.

Also known as BURN, WITCH, BURN, this second screen adaptation of Fritz Leiber's CONJURE WIFE (the first being 1944's WEIRD WOMAN, second in a series of six "Inner Sanctum" thrillers moulded from Simon & Schuster novels as vehicles for Lon Chaney) avoids the jokey approach of I MARRIED A WITCH (1942) and BELL, BOOK AND CANDLE (1958) and instead opts to underline the novel's more sinister elements. The steady accumulation of evidence allows Hayers to build up the atmosphere and reinforce the credibility of the scenario (supplied by TWILIGHT ZONE regulars Charles Beaumont, Richard Matheson and George Baxt).

Saturday, 6.30 pm:

DEEP IN THE WOODS

(Broadsword Films; UK, 1989, 10 minutes; dir. Simon Frith)

In an Arthurian dreamverse, a gallant knight attempts to rescue a young maiden assaulted by deformed dwarves, but soon realises discretion might have been far wiser than chivalric honour.

Worthy winner of this year's Delta Award at the Fifth Festival of Fantastic Films, Frith's short fantasy was rightly praised by director Norman J Warren for its photography and editing; the final "twist" might be familiar, but it's handled well enough for that slight flaw to be overlooked.

GET REAL!

(Gusto Pictures; UK, 1994, 20 minutes; dir. Nigel Barton)

For company executive Dave Bartlett (Jonathan Coote), the Personal Reality Simulator is more than a Virtual Reality spin on the Walkman - it's literally a way of life, more attractive in every respect than the drab existence beyond his visor.

Produced for a mere £5000, Nigel Barton's addition to the "Just Say No" campaign would make Roger Corman beam - every penny is shown on screen, plus a fair amount he's saved by enlisting the aid of enthusiastic volunteers. Applauded at the Fifth Festival of Fantastic Films, this is one of the most assured directorial debuts in years.

Saturday, 12 Midnight(ish)

THE HAUNTING

(Argyle Enterprises; UK, 1963, 112 minutes; dir. Robert Wise)

Dr Markway (Richard Johnson) gathers together two psychics (Julie Harris, Claire Bloom) and to the skeptical heir to an allegedly haunted house (Russ Tamblyn) in a bid to form an anthropological rationale for paranormal phenomena.

Notable for Wise's restraint (reminiscent of both **THE ANDROMEDA STAIN** and **THE DAY THE EARTH STOOD STILL**, but which slid into catatonia on the original release cut of **STAR TREK, THE MOTION PICTURE**), this remains arguably the scariest ghost movie ever, not least thanks to David Boulton's superb photography, the deliberate downplaying of special effects (other than lens magic, the only gimmick is a rubber door) and the faithfulness of Nelson Gidding's screenplay to Shirley Jackson's **THE HAUNTING OF HILL HOUSE**.

Sunday: rescreening by democratic decision (vote soon, vote often!)

TEA AND COFFEE Will be available at all times until 1.00 am either from the lounge or the bar.

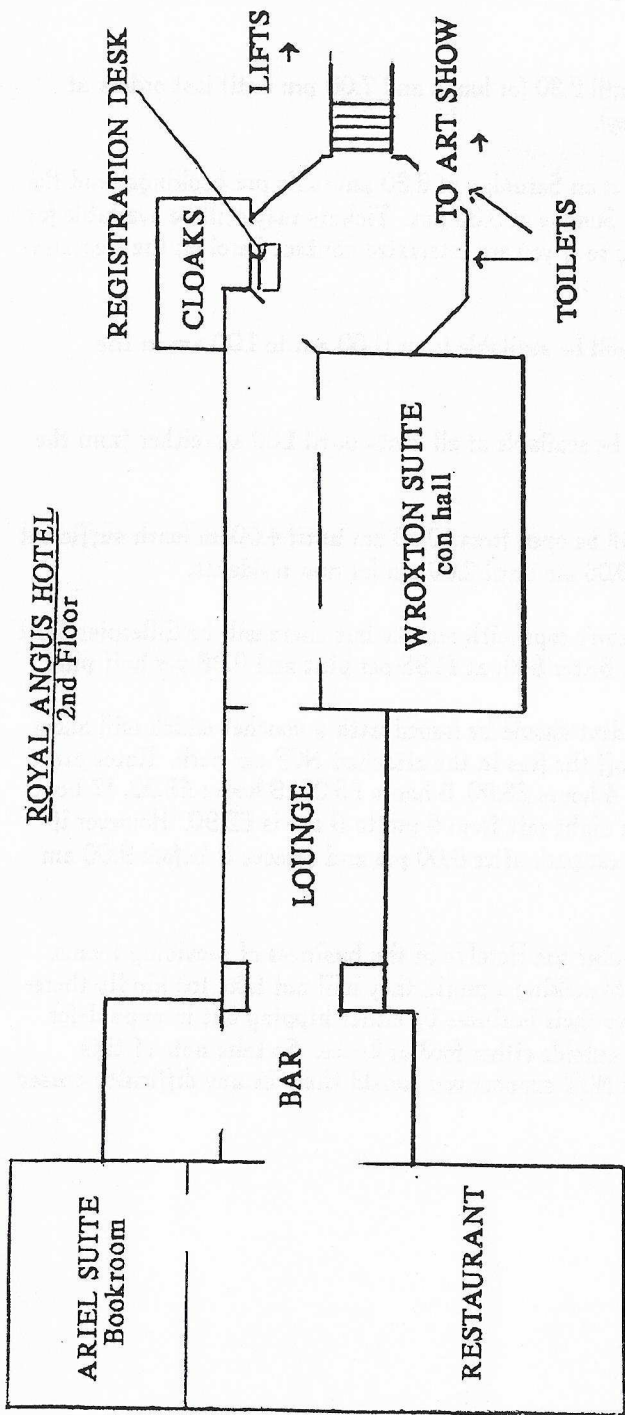
BAR Whimseys Bar will be open from 10.00 am until 4.00am (with sufficient demand) for residents and 10.00 am until 2.00 am for non residents.

BOOZE Again the Hotel can't cope with real ale but there will be Gillespies Malt Stout and Theakstones Best Bitter both at £1.95 per pint and 0.98 per half pint.

CAR PARKING Each resident should be issued with a voucher which will allow a discount of £1.90 per day off the fees in the attached NCP car park. Rates are: 2 hours £2.00, 3 hours £3.00, 4 hours £3.90, 6 hours £5.00, 9 hours £6.00, 12 hours £6.80, 24 hours £7.50. The night rate from 6 pm to 9 am is £2.90. However if you park your vehicle in the car park after 6.00 pm and remove it before 9.00 am then the car parking is free.
