We invited artists to write briefly about the work they have supplied on CD ROM:

Claire Smith:

C-THIS SPACE And Encounter Dimensions Beyond The Universe...

My space art site at (<http://www.cthisspace.com>) was generated and inspired by a recent interest in space scenery, astronomy and related subjects about over a year or two ago. My interest in science and art, especially space art, coincided with my inspiration, and enabled me to produce some of the visions I had in store, that I was later able to express with the use of computer technology. Although I was only using a simple computer art format initially for my website, the medium was another adventure from the beginning, and the creating of my site right to this day has left me with more than a fare share of new ideas! The method I use is simple as I tend to stick to using only a few computer tools because I prefer a personal touch to the pictures, also the pictures were more or less to do with my experimenting with the techno tools of the computer that I do use, so they vary in theme, and as a result they have evolved over time. Some are my idea of what the outer regions of space is like in an imaginary sense. e.g. Globular Storm, while some are my view of space from what we see now. e.g. Jupiter with Io. I am always hoping to create new pictures that will eventually make more people imagine, not just by looking at what's there, but by also seeing what might be.

Colin P. Langeveld:

My conversion to computer generated graphics has re-opened my eyes to the rules of art, i.e. the misty obscurity of objects as they recede with distance; the colour, weight and sharpness of shadow when applied and the general 'balance' of a picture. The initial difference now is that I can change my designated world by the touch of a mouse. These days, my figures, mountains, oceans, space vehicles and planets are fully three dimensional, I can rotate, move or resize or vary transparency as the mood takes me. I am now no longer inhibited by the

limitations of the airbrush. I can create a starscape at the drop of the proverbial space helmet. The rings of my Saturn are at last, geometrically correct.

Although most of my object are of my own creation, some are downloaded from various websites which are then converted to my specifications.

The endless possibilities of rendering has proved to be the most fascinating of this fascinating business. The enchantment with the planet Mars has been with me since I first laid grubby fingers on THE WARLORD OF MARS at the age of 14. I've produced textures of the planet's surface by downloading images of the Martian landscape and with the blessed assistance of PHOTOSHOP 6, come as close as possible to recreating images of the Barsoomian vista.

My figures come from POSER, a splendid 3D programme specialising in the production of characters. You can clothe them, deform them or morph them as you deem fit. My only complaint is the lack of a spacesuit. This I put together from various bits and pieces.

The final rendering comes via the innovation of BRYCE 4. Here skies, mists, fog and oceans are mine to control. Following the image print-out, I return to basics and add the final touches with good old acrylics, water and brush. Hope you like the results.

David A. Hardy:

This year I have tried to include images which were not on last year's CD-ROM (though there are a couple). I tried to include a good mixture: there are paintings and illustrations from years ago, like 'Proxima's Planet v.1' from *Challenge of the Stars* (with Patrick Moore, 1972). I have Stephen Baxter to thank for digging that one out, because in *Light of Other Days*, his book with Arthur C. Clarke, he describes a scene which seemed oh, so familiar. A huge red sun in a dark red sky, reflected in a lake or sea fringed by ice-crystals, eroded volcanic hills, the 'W' of Cassiopeia in the sky with an extra star at its left – our Sun. So I e-mailed Steve, who replied thus:

>Actually I thought I was inventing that scene, especially the detail about Cassiopeia, a factoid that has always stuck in my mind, but then I remembered CHALLENGE, and looked at it again, and there it was – I'd reconstructed the scene unconsciously – so in the later drafts we made it more explicit. . . yes it was that painting!<

Then there are recent paintings (ie. brushes, canvas and stuff), like 'Eruption on Io' and the three circular Earth/Moon/Mars paintings which form the jacket and endpapers of my new Paper Tiger book, *Hardyware* – and (shameless plug) I have included that jacket illo too. Several of the images on this CD are also in the book, but a lot are not, because they are too new or whatever. And there are several digital pieces, too. The most recent is the discovery of another new Jupiter-like planet of another star, which was announced to the media on 15 October. It is digital – but the landscape may seem familiar to Tony Berry (ask him and see). There are SF covers for *Analog* and books, space art, movie production art, diagrams, private commissions. . . a bit of everything, and hopefully something for everyone, I hope. And you may find some of them in the 'real' (as opposed to

virtual) Art Show too!

Meraylah Allwood:

I have spent most of my life living in the countryside, or seeking the wild places where the veil between the worlds of spirit, or faery, is thinner. I have always painted using nature as my inspiration. I try to combine the dynamic worlds of folklore and mythology with the ecology and natural history of the subjects I illustrate. I love the connection between past mythologies and folklore and the present, the way those old stories have an uncanny way of weaving themselves into daily life, until they are somehow transformed once more and reborn as new tales each generation.

We can surely only marvel at the complexity and intricacies of the natural world, the web of life to which we ourselves owe our very existence. I feel that we have all lost so much with our modern mechanistic materialistic focus, so many of us living with our backs to nature, away from the knowledge of the Earth who bore us, and away from the magic that can inspire our imaginations to grow and seek out changes. I hope that in however small a way my paintings can be part of those inspirations.

Josh Kirby (1929 - 2001)

As this Read Me! was readied for press, we sadly learned of the death of the artist Josh Kirby, aged 72.

Although he will certainly be best known for his cover illustrations for the novels of Terry Pratchett, Josh's first cover appeared three decades earlier, on the Panther edition of Dan Morgan's Cee-Tee Man (1954). The following year, he produced the cover for Ian Fleming's latest James Bond adventure, Moonraker.

A graduate of the famous Liverpool School of Artists, his first published portfolio was a selection of Discworld posters in 1983; sadly, its appalling production standards failed to match expectations. Fortunately, this was rectified by The Garden of Unearthly Delights (1991) and Cosmic Cornucopia (1999).

Perhaps the next Discworld novel will feature a skeletal figure with a scythe in one hand, an easel in the other and a mad gleam in its over-active gaze: Death of Artists. Meanwhile, his covers for the Discworld series ensure Josh Kirby's fevered - and glorious - imagination endures.

2001: A Taste Odyssey

What could be a more science fictional and appropriate way of celebrating 2001 than a mashed potato tasting session? "*They peel them with their shiny knives, and mash them ...*". So, on Sunday night (from 7pm) we will be combining the traditional beer tasting with a Sausage and Mash tasting! (Food will be served from 8pm.) This will feature a selection of sausages and a choice of plain, Black Pudding or Cheddar mashed potato. Tickets for your Sausage and Mash Tasting (£5 per head) must be purchased in advance, either from Tony Berry at the address below or from the Novacon table before 5pm on Sunday of the con. (In addition, from 11pm-12am the hotel will be selling a late night snack of bacon/sausage rolls

at £1 each to help soak up the beer!)

This latest in a long series of Novacon Beer Tastings will be using the ever-popular BYOB (bring your own beer) format. To get the ball rolling the convention will supply a firkin of Sarah Hughes Dark Ruby Mild (6% abv) on draught as well as a few interesting bottles - the rest is up to you!

To partake of the BEER, all you need to do is bring at least THREE bottles of your favourite British or foreign beer to the convention and check them in at the Novacon Registration desk when you arrive. In return you will receive a Technicolor "BEER BADGE" which will entitle you to drink the beer at the Tasting on Sunday. Alternatively, you can also take part in the Tasting by buying a BEER BADGE for £4.50 from Novacon Registration.

All Novacon members are welcome to attend the Tasting. The convention is supplying an assortment of exotic and/or unusual non-alcoholic drinks at the Tasting, which will be free to everyone, but only those with BEER BADGES will be entitled to drink the beer and only those with SAUSAGE & MASH TICKETS will be able to partake of that culinary delight.

In a change from established tradition, prizes will *not* be given out as the draw is made at the Award Ceremony. Instead prizes will be available for collection from a table set up in the Oliver Cromwell suite *after* the ceremony.

We have a wide variety of prizes which will be displayed near the Novacon registration table from Saturday onwards. These include a limited edition proof of THE CONFEDERATION HANDBOOK signed by Peter F. Hamilton and copies of Ann Halam's latest book, DR FRANKLIN'S ISLAND (many thanks Orion and MacMillan for the prizes they have donated).

Operations

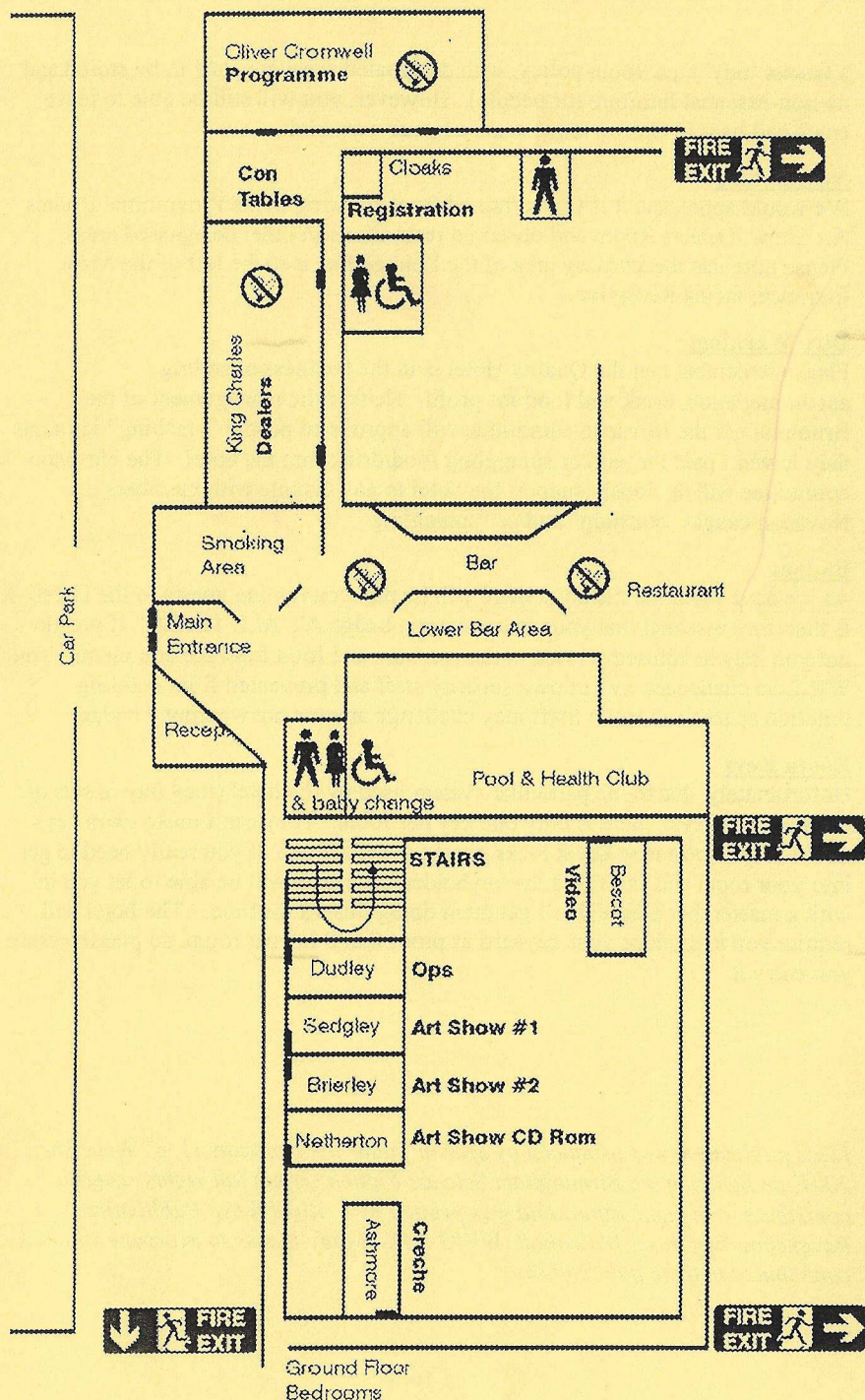
Badges

As we have not filled the hotel there will be non-convention guests in the Hotel. It is therefore essential that you wear your con badge AT ALL TIMES!
