Learning the Guest of Honour... By Dave Hicks

On his weblog *The Early Days of a Better Nation* (http://kenmacleod.blogspot.com/) Ken MacLeod recounts a panel at last year's Novacon where he was moved to cry from the audience: "I would be very worried if my kids read SF." He explained that he feared an adolescent fascination with SF went hand in hand with alienation and insecurity.

"Yes, Ken," said Peter Weston, "but you've improved."

Personally, as someone who's read SF for thirty years, I feel no more alienated and insecure than the next degenerate freak. In fact I'd go along with the balance of Weston's thesis that SF does you good.

I'd add that Ken MacLeod's writing certainly does you good. His latest work, Learning the World (pub. By Orbit in the UK and Tor in the US) is shortlisted for both the Arthur C. Clarke and BSFA awards, a decade on from the appearance of Ken's first novel, The Star Fraction, which introduced the Christian fundamentalist state of ... Islington. It began a sequence of novels which serve as a demonstration of how to get it right if you're going to use your personal history and places you've lived in a work of fiction. All writers do this, of course, but it can jar horribly in inept hands, instead of adding to the romance and involvement. Ken also pulled off the demanding accomplishment of producing a sequence of books that each stands alone, set in different places, different times, that nonetheless lock together to form an entertaining future history of mankind and gave us the term fast folk.

I suspect the reason Ken's work is successful may be because, as above, he's suspicious of science fiction. He doesn't take it for granted and feels the need to ask "what is this for?" even though it's how he earns his living.

Meanwhile, Learning the World reprises the first contact theme, although the futuristic aliens are us, and the planet-bound twentieth century style civilisation is the aliens. There's a comment on Amazon:

"The aliens are about as alien as your next door neighbour, but the future humans seem pretty strange."

That summarises a lot of Ken's best work as a leading exponent of one of SF's most compelling themes that, pace Haldane, not only are we stranger than we imagine, we're going to become stranger than we can imagine.

What's more, Ken is as articulate and forthright (while remaining eminently approachable) in person as he is in print. A regular on the UK convention scene and at many Novacons, we're delighted to have him as our Guest of Honour.

Hotel Information...

The venue is the Quality Hotel, Bentley, Walsall, which is situated next to junction 10 of the M6. The nearest railway station is Walsall, and the nearest intercity station is Wolverhampton. Full travel details will appear in PR3.

The Quality has 150 twin/double rooms and no singles. However a number of the rooms will be released to us as singles, but these are limited and so if you particularly want a single please book early as they will be allocated on a first come first served basis.

ROOM RATES:

Twin/doubles: £36 per person per night.

Singles: £48 per person per night.

Both include full English breakfast

There are also a number of suites that are suitable as family rooms. Children aged 5-12 years will be charged at £10 per night inc. breakfast, while children under 5 years will be accommodated free of charge.

BREAKFAST:

We have arranged with the hotel that breakfast vouchers will be issued this year. If you miss breakfast the voucher will entitle you to a baguette from the bar.

LEISURE FACILITIES:

All residents will be entitled to full use of the hotel's Leisure Club facilities including swimming pool, spa-bath, sauna, gymnasium and solarium (hopefully, all will be fully functional this year!).

DUPLICATE ROOM KEYS:

For those of you sharing a room the hotel can provide each person with a room key, but please let us know in advance. This does not apply to suites, which have a different type of lock to the rest of the rooms and don't allow the hotel to make copies. If you each want a key let the hotel know on arrival as they will be programming a number of rooms to take duplicate keys in advance of the convention and buying in key sets especially for us. Once you have a key each don't lose it! If you do then a new set of keys will have to be issued, and your sharer's key won't work anymore as soon as you use your new one. Of course if you do not have a key each and you can't find your sharer, you can still get into the room by asking hotel reception to let you in with a Master key, but please don't get them doing this all the time. The hotel will need to see your key card as proof of identity, so carry it at all times. You may also need it to charge drinks to your room, and at breakfast.

OVERFLOW HOTELS:

For those of you who want a single, but don't book in time, or those of you who are strapped for cash, there is an overflow hotel nearby. This is the Travel Inn, 10 minutes' walk away from the Quality. Rooms are currently £48.95 Mon-Thurs and £45.95 Fri-Sun, excluding breakfast. Bear in mind that this rate is for the room, regardless of how many people are in it! Many of their rooms will accommodate 2 adults and 2 children. It's up to you to book here and you can visit at www.travelinn.co.uk/TI/index..jsp?page=inn&id=210 or ring on 08701-977-258. Travel Inn, Bentley Green, Bentley Road North, Walsall, West Midlands, WS2 OWB.

Alternatively, you can book a room at the Village Hotel, which is on the other side of the motorway, towards Walsall. Bear in mind that you will have to cross J10 to get to and from here, so think bus or taxi.

2006 Nova Awards...

In 1973, Novacon instituted the annual Nova Awards to celebrate achievement in British science fiction fanzines. Originally handed down by a panel of judges, these accolades are now decided by Novacon members who can demonstrate a basic knowledge of current fanzines.

Following Novacon 32, the three categories – best fanzine, best fanzine writer, best fanzine artist – were extended to cover fanzines produced in Eire. In addition, electronic fanzines are now eligible, provided a file copy is lodged at the address below.

Claire Brialey and Mark Plummer's Banana Wings was presented with its fourth Nova Award for best fanzine at Novacon 35 on 13 November. Claire was also named best fanwriter for the fourth year running, whilst Alison Scott received the fan artist Nova in an extremely close race with last year's winner, Sue Mason. A total of 42 ballots were submitted, 50% up on last year, and the full breakdown is as follows:

The ballot form also included a straw poll on whether the Nova Awards should be open to non-Novacon members who met the existing "informed electorate" criterion (receiving at least six different UK / Irish fanzines during the relevant year); of the 35 who expressed a preference, 32 were in favour of expanding the electorate. Any decision on this will be made by the Novacon committee.


