Where to Find Us

Registrations is located in the hotel foyer, immediately between the entrance and the bar. It will be manned from 16:00 until 18:30 and from 19:30 until 22:00 on Friday; from 10:00 until 15:00 and from 16:00 until 18:00 on Saturday; from 11:00 until 14:00 on Sunday.

Main Programme is in the Oliver Cromwell Room (turn right as you leave the bar; it's at the end of the corridor).

The Dealers' Room is located in the King Charles Room (halfway down the corridor between the bar and main programme). Opening hours will be posted on the door.

The Artshow is split across the Sedgley and Brierley Rooms (turn left as you leave the bar; they're just past the staircase).

In addition, Dave Lally will be rummaging through his video archive in the Dudley Room; full details will be posted outside.

The Netherton Room (next to the artshow) is available for independent meetings and presentations; please contact Registrations or the Duty Committee Member if you wish to arrange a slot.

Food & Drink

We've arranged for both a real ale and a real cider to be on tap in the bar: Black Sheep and Addlestones, at just £2.30 per pint. Alternatives are Worthington (£2.30), Murphy's (£2.50), Carling (£2.30) and Grolsh (£2.50), house wine (£2.60 per glass or £12.00 per bottle), tea or coffee (£1.50), cola or plain lemonade (£0.85 for a 10oz glass), OJ & lemonade (£1.60). Don't forget the free drinks at Friday's party!

Breakfast will be served from 08:00 until 10:00 on Saturday, until 10:30 on Sunday and from 07:30 until 09:30 on Monday. Those who miss breakfast (this is Novacon, after all) will be issued with a voucher exchangeable for a baguette in the bar.

Lunch will be served from 12:00 until 14:30 on Saturday, and until 13:00 on Sunday. A selection of baguettes will be available at £2.25 (a half-baguette will cost £1.15) on Saturday, as well as the option of a trip to the salad bar (£2.25), soup and roll (£1.85), jacket potato with filling (£2.10) or the Chef's choice of hot dish (£7.50). Baguettes will also be available on Sunday, as well as a one-course carvery (£7.95).

Dinner will be served from 18:00 until 21:00 on Friday, and until 21:30 on Saturday. A main course will be available at £7.50, with a desert at £1.75 (additional £9.50 options will be on Saturday's menu).

Our popular "midnight baps" return on Friday and Saturday: you can choose from bacon, sausage, chips or vegetarian, all at £1.75.

General Certificate of Science Fiction Education

On the next few pages you will find a GCSE Question Paper. You should also find a loose A4-sized answer sheet in your membership pack; if not please contact Registrations.

This is a multiple-choice quiz, with a built-in draw. Each question has been given several answers, only one of which is correct. They are often abbreviated, because giving them in full would make the correct answer too obvious. You must match your answer to one of the given ones. It's a bit like being given specifications for making a key, together with five different locks. If the key is made correctly it will fit one of the locks; if it's not, it won't.

Instructions:

1. There are three Sections to the Paper - Section B is easy, Section A is medium and Section C has harder questions. You have to submit two Sections, one of which must be Section A. If you submit Sections A&B, you may obtain an Ordinary Level GCSE Certificate; if you submit Sections A&C, you may gain an Advanced Level GCSE Certificate. Pass mark is 40% and every Certificate is graded.

2. Read each question, decide on your answer and match it to a given answer. When you've answered as many questions as possible, decide whether you will submit Sections A&B or Sections A&C. If all three are submitted, it will be treated as an Ordinary Level entry. Please submit under your own name (precociousness is one thing, giving a certificate or draw prize to an infant is another).

3. The answer paper has numbered and lettered squares which correspond to the questions below. Carefully BLOCK OUT (with black or blue ink, ballpoint or felt tip) the squares corresponding to your chosen answers. Please DO NOT circle, cross or otherwise mark the squares, or use pencil, because the marking mechanism will not be able to cope with it and your paper will be rejected. If you make a mistake, put a large X through the incorrect square.

4. Similarly, block out the square corresponding to the Level you are submitting (A&B or A&C) and PRINT your name and address, which will be used as an address label if you do not collect your certificate during Novacon.

5. Post your entry in the GCSE box at Registrations no later than 19:00 on Saturday, but watch the GCSE posters for any alteration to this deadline. All papers submitted will be entered into a free draw.

6. Collect your results from me on Saturday evening or Sunday, and find out whether you have been awarded a certificate and possibly also won a prize.

7. Finally, results will be advised directly to you; no one else will know how you have done unless you tell them. So please have a go, you may be better than you think.
