### GUEST OF HONOUR - JEN WILLIAMS by Juliet Mushens

Jen Williams is a hugely talented author and illustrator. I started working with Jen more than a decade ago and since then she has had 8 novels published all over the world with another 3 under contract. Known for her diverse influences (from Studio Ghibli to *Thundercats* to Robin Hobb), wicked sense of humour and love for a slow-burn romance she has been reviewed everywhere from *The Guardian* to *SFX* and there is a reason she has twice won the British Fantasy Award.

I always tease Jen over how long her novels are but the truth is they are never long enough for me - I (like many readers) absolutely lose myself in her eldritch world building and incredible character development. Her debut THE COPPER CAT trilogy was renowned for its streak of mischief as well as the sense of camaraderie between characters, a strength she built on in THE WINNOWING FLAME. She stretched her horror muscles with DOG ROSE DIRT and GAMES FOR DEAD GIRLS. the first of which is being adapted for



television by Gaumont, before making a much-lauded return to fantasy with TALONSISTER - full of the magical creatures and conflicted characters that she loves to expertly bring to life.



### DOCTOR WHO - FANDOM, ART & EBOOKS by Alex Storer

As a *Doctor Who* obsessive, I have always enjoyed channelling my creative energies into *Who*-related projects. In the past, this has usually been artwork, but in recent years, I've found myself in the unexpected position of author and co-producer of several *Doctor Who* eBooks.

In 2020, during those worrying times when we were all stuck at home, I struck up a friendship with fellow fan John Collier, who was researching a project about the original *Doctor Who* exhibition in Blackpool – a subject close to both our hearts. John wanted to

write a detailed and extensive history of the exhibition, which ran from 1974 to 1985. He'd seen my accounts of my own 1985 visit online and my attempted floor plan designs. In no time at all, we were working up more accurate floor plans and piecing together the chronology of what many fans still regard as a sacred place in the show's history. We soon had dozens of fans submitting photographs and vivid recollections from over the years, and we found ourselves



in contact with Lorne Martin and Julie Jones – the original curators of the Blackpool and Longleat exhibitions when they worked in the BBC's exhibition department. We charted the history of the building and the exhibition, which changed each year to tie-in with the current season of the show on TV. If there was such thing as a *Doctor Who* treasure trove, this was it!

Blackpool Remembered was the name of the project and John was keen to produce something by fans, for the fans, for free. The only way we could make a free book was by


creating a digital publication. Producing an eBook meant we had no constraints – the book could be as big as it needed to be – however, we weren't prepared for the sheer number of contributions that came flooding in. The result was over 400 pages of photographs, recollections, history and nostalgia following the timeline of the exhibition along with year-by-year plans of what was on display.

This project also got me back into illustrating *Doctor Who*, after not having done so for many years. Drawing the Daleks and my own comic strips was always one of my favourite pastimes as a kid, and suddenly, I'm in my forties doing it all again with all the same

enjoyment! I produced the cover illustration and a series of pieces for the inside. We published *Blackpool Remembered* online in August 2020. To date, *Blackpool Remembered* has been downloaded over 15,000 times. Many fans have told us this was the book they had always wanted.

We enjoyed the project so much and received so many submissions, we soon embarked on a follow-up, *Blackpool Revisited*.

The main emphasis on the second book would be the latter-day Doctor Who Museum, which ran from 2004 to 2009, just a stone's throw away from the original exhibition site on Blackpool's Golden Mile. It is because of these two exhibitions that many fans regard Blackpool as the spiritual home for Doctor Who, with many fans still making the pilgrimage the to original exhibition location on Chapel Street, which sadly is now a sorry-looking bargain shoe shop. Blackpool Revisited was another




jam-packed publication, this time over 600 pages long!

By sheer coincidence, around the same time, Reeltime Pictures finally started to realise their long-standing aim of producing a series of documentaries about the classic series exhibitions – *Doctor On Display*. Both myself and John were filmed for the Blackpool episodes, and I also became the cover designer for the series. The *Doctor On Display* series has since proven to be a hit with the international sci-fi film festival circuit, picking up several awards (the documentaries are available to stream or buy on DVD

from Reeltime Pictures' website). I'm enormously proud of being a small part of this long overdue, exciting series.

In 2021, I was feeling the need to write about my beloved show some more, so I set about compiling a book of my own experiences at *Doctor Who* conventions and other exhibitions and events from recent years. I had a wealth of great photographs that I'd taken over the years which were just gathering virtual dust on my



hard drive, so it was time to put them to good use - the result was Up Close, a book looking back over the past two decades and exploring just why we have that relentless need to get up close and personal with our favourite show. Another free download, Up Close includes photos and memories from several Who conventions, a look around Neil Cole's amazing Museum of Classic Sci-Fi in Allendale, the recent Worlds of Wonder touring exhibition and interviews with ex-K9 assistant operator (and author of two

excellent books on visual effects), Steve Cambden and composer Dominic Glynn, who reworked the show's theme tune and incidental music in the late 1980s.


2023 is obviously a significant year for the show, as it celebrates its sixtieth anniversary. However, this year also marks forty years since the infamous "Celebration" event for the show's twentieth anniversary, at Longleat House in 1983. Although neither myself nor John had been to Longleat, with the help of fans who were there, we set about compiling a new book celebrating what remains

the most iconic event in the show's history. We released *Longing for Longleat* in April 2023.

Meanwhile, I had been asking myself what I might do to celebrate the show's sixtieth – one thing was clear: it would be about the Daleks. I have been a fan of *Doctor Who* and the Daleks in particular, for as long as I can remember. In fact, it's fair to say I'm


probably even more obsessed by the Daleks than I am the show itself. The good Doctor may be enjoying a big birthday this year, but it is also sixty years since the Daleks first trundled on to our screens in December 1963.

Earlier in the year, I was out of action with a bad back and unable to work — much to the frustration of my creative brain, which always needs some kind of project to chew on. So, I started to write about Daleks and asked myself just what it is about them that still holds my fascination all these years later and why, like



many fans, we have that *need* to collect. It soon became clear this project would be a chronological history of Dalek toys and models from the 1960s to present day. *Evolution of the Toy Dalek* was born! Collecting Daleks has always been my thing, so I initially started thinking about doing something around my own collection. While looking through my various books, I realised that despite the dozens of titles or merchandise specials, nobody has ever produced anything purely on Dalek toys. Well, now they have.

l set about photographing my own collection and enlisted the help of a few friends who photographed their own collections and wrote up their own recollections of buying and enjoying Dalek merchandise for that all-important nostalgic element that would be core to the project and which had made the Blackpool books so



The end result was 100 pages of Dalek toy nostalgia, illustrated with over 300 photos - most of which were purpose-taken for the project. It certainly wouldn't have been the the same without contributions from Richard Hayes, Christopher Hill, Philip Brennan, Mark Dunne, Simon Horton and John Collier. The book isn't an exhaustive list of every bit of Dalek merch ever produced, and it only focuses on the scale models and toys rather than wider ranging merchandise. But for me, this was perhaps my ultimate fan project,

and a perfect way to celebrate sixty years of the Daleks as well as my own lifelong obsession for collecting them.


Evolution of the Toy Dalek was released in July – again as a free digital publication – and so far, it has been downloaded over 3,000 times. Fans, as collectors, often prefer a physical item (despite usually no longer having any room for anything!), and as with the Blackpool books, countless people have asked me if it will be released as a physical book or why a digital-only release? Again, this comes back to wanting to produce something for free, for others to enjoy – and the only way of doing a project like this, exactly how we want it with no time, budget or format constrains, is to make it in electronic format. Although maybe one day it would be nice to see Evolution of the Toy Dalek in print, as it is a project that can easily

grow as more merchandise comes out – even at this very moment, we don't know when the Daleks will be returning to our screens, but one thing's for sure: when they do, they will have undoubtedly had another overhaul, thus paving the way for a whole new wave of toys and models. I can already hear my wallet screaming.

### TALONSISTER - Reviewed by Carol Goodwin

As a reader I find that when you have particularly enjoyed one series by an author, there is always some trepidation when starting a new unconnected series. It's facing that leap into the unknown; having to leave behind favourite characters and worlds and wondering how you will adapt to new ones. Thankfully, while definitely different to her previous two fantasy series (The Copper Cat and The Winnowing Flame) TALONSISTER still shows the author's customary skill in creating complex, credible societies with multifaceted characters with emotional depth.



In TALONSISTER much of a Europe-analogue is under the control of the Imperium, with the island of Brittletain remaining unconquered. The Imperium's victories so far have been led by its Heralds; people alchemically transformed into superfast and vicious warriors. The key to this transformation lies in the use of the bones

of Titans, mythological creatures most of who are now extinct. Brittletain is the last home for one of these species, the griffins and the Imperium has its eye on them.

The story is told from three main points of view; Ynis, a foundling rescued and raised by griffins; Kaeto, an Imperial Envoy, spy and assassin for the Imperium; and Leven, a retired Herald whose different journeys (physical and emotional) will be crucial to the future of Brittletain and the Imperium.

One of the strengths of this book is the contrast between the worlds and attitudes of the Imperium and Brittletain. In Brittletain, much of the land is still covered in forest, the Wild Wood, which is interconnected and sentient on some level. The Druins are humans who have committed to walk the forests, linked to its magic and acting as guides and interpreters for non-transformed humans. I found myself reminded of Juliet McKenna's *Green Man* series or Rob Holdstock's *Mythago Wood* books, both of which reference the rich folklore of Britain and the connection between magic and the environment. For the most part in Brittletain, there is a respect for magic.

This is in contrast to the Imperium which regards those of Brittletain as superstitious primitives, and the Titans purely as a resource to be exploited. Lands under Imperium control are "Blessed" and "privileged" to be living with the "benefits" of civilisation. These hubristic prejudices view people mainly as resources to be used and then discarded, especially the Heralds.

Each of the three main characters are initially shaped by their respective backgrounds but this starts to change as they encounter others and uncover more of their own back history. While the main characters weren't as immediately charismatic as say Lady Vintage (Winnowing Flame) or Wydrin (Copper Promise) they did grab me as the narrative progressed. Analysing this I think it is because they are less extroverted and more subtle. I really enjoyed their

development throughout the book. There are also other important characters which I haven't had space to mention here, and again these are meticulously differentiated and delineated.

So far, I have mentioned Brittletain and the Imperium but there is also the "Unblessed" country of Houraki. Kaeto, the spy escorts the inventor of the Heralds there, in search of a rumoured humaniform species of Titan, now believed extinct. This is a land of a "thousand gods" and a mysterious and shunned Black City. The atmosphere of this portion of the book has very definite *Indiana Jones* and *The Mummy* vibes – ancient ruins and long-lost secrets – it even has scenes with a moving carpet of multi-coloured and predatory beetles. Great fun as a reader though not so much for the characters!

This book maintains the high standards of Jen's writing. The plot is multi-stranded but the author maintains a good balance between the main plot lines, keeping this reader engaged throughout. The pacing is also excellent, with action scenes and quieter character reveals well distributed. The story reaches a satisfactory conclusion, but it is clearly part of a series and we have only just started to uncover the connections between the main characters and a lot to resolve between the various societies.

If you like exciting and unusual fantasy, I would definitely recommend this book. Now I'm eagerly awaiting the sequel.



### 100 YEAR FILM ANNIVERSARIES by Carol Goodwin

With a lot of attention on Doctor Who 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations this month, I was wondering about other significant SFF movie

anniversaries there might be this year. Due to space constraints I can't cover most of them, but there are a couple of 100-year anniversaries that I thought the reader might be interested in.



Disney has been celebrating its 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary this year, based on the date that Walt Disney founded The Walt Disney Company (October 16<sup>th</sup>, 1923), although his iconic character, Mickey Mouse didn't make his first appearance until 1928 in STEAMBOAT WILLIE. As part of their celebrations they have had a limited screening programme showing classic groundbreaking films from almost every decade. I have seen a number of these and it's been very interesting to see how they have stood the test of time.

For example, there is still some absolutely stunning artwork and animation in SNOW WHITE (1937, the first full-length animated feature) and the Wicked Queen is still quite scary for little ones. By contrast, the awakening of Snow White by an unknown prince with

a (non-consensual) kiss, and her immediate whisking off to a castle doesn't sit well with modern feminist sensibilities!

For Halloween this year, I went to the annual Silent Movie classic at Birmingham Town Hall (which is accompanied by live organ music which




works well with the often spooky films). This year was a classic which is also 100 years old this year — THE HUNCHBACK OF NOTRE DAME starring "The Man of a Thousand Faces" — Lon Chaney. The actor was renowned for doing his own makeup in films. For this film, he had one eye covered, and other facial makeup to exaggerate his nose, teeth, lips and cheekbones. In addition he wore

a 50-pound hump on his back which must have been incredibly tiring. Despite that he managed to swing from the bells and pillars of the Notre Dame movie set. Well worth checking out if you get the



chance. Another famous role as the Phantom in THE PHANTOM OF THE OPERA (1925) also showcases his talent for makeup. If he hadn't died suddenly in 1930 from a throat haemorrhage, it is likely he would have taken the iconic role in DRACULA taken by Bela Lugosi!

Interestingly, his son Lon Chaney Jr became a well-known actor in many Universal horror movies. These included playing a werewolf (THE WOLF (1941) and various crossover films), monster (THE Frankenstein's GHOST OF FRANKENSTEIN 1942), the Mummy in three pictures (starting with THE MUMMY'S in TOMB 1942). and as Dracula/Count Alucard (Dracula



spelt backwards) in SON OF DRACULA (1943).

Probably similarly to many of you, I first encountered these movies many years ago, either in the cinema or on late-night television re-runs. Although they are undoubtedly dated in some respects, the craftmanship and skill still shows even without modern technology. I find it amazing how much they can still entertain and urge you to go and check them out.

### **NOVACON CODE OF CONDUCT**

A Convention is a private event and, as such, the Committee has always had the right and the ability to remove any attendee for antisocial behaviour. Over recent years, it has become standard practice for such events to publish a Code of Conduct providing guidelines as to what that antisocial behaviour may include.

The Code of Conduct governs not only behaviour at Novacon, but also in certain spaces elsewhere, including but not limited to activity online, such as in messages or replies to Novacon accounts on social media, and posts in Novacon pages and groups.

The Novacon Code of Conduct team receives complete information from preceding Novacon Code of Conduct teams and passes complete information to future Novacon Code of Conduct teams. It also maintains an awareness of activity which has been of concern to other conventions.

For most people, the simple principle of "Behave like a decent human being" is enough of a guideline. However, just in case, these are the behaviours we feel lead to that result:

- 1. **Be welcoming**. We expect all our attendees to respect each other's right to be at Novacon. In particular, discriminatory behaviour or harassment will not be tolerated.
- 2. **Be courteous** and aware we all have different sensitivities. If your language or behaviour is unwelcome to another attendee then stop. Anything else may be considered harassment.

- 3. **Be respectful** of other people's boundaries. Physical contact should only occur with all parties' enthusiastic consent. Remember, not everyone likes being hugged.
- 4. Be aware that communication may be verbal or non-verbal.

**Discrimination** includes, but is not limited to, discrimination on the grounds of: sex, gender, gender identity or expression, sexuality, ethnicity, age, religion and mental or physical disability.

Harassment includes, but is not limited to, any behaviour that can be reasonably expected to disturb or intimidate another convention attendee. It includes the wearing of symbols associated with fascism and racism, independent of the intent of the wearer. Harassment may be verbal or non-verbal.

### Dealing with discrimination or harassment

If you feel comfortable, address the person and the problem behaviour directly. In most cases this will be all that is required.

If you are not comfortable with a direct approach, or it proves insufficient, then either:

- report the matter to the Duty Committee Member (look for the gold waistcoat). He/she will contact the Designated People who will come to talk to you as soon as possible, or
- contact one of the Designated People directly on the number below.

### **Convention Response and Responsibilities**

The Novacon Convention Committee is responsible for enforcing the Code of Conduct and for maintaining confidentiality. This responsibility is delegated in the first instance to a team of three people (the Designated People); at least one will always be a member of the Novacon committee, and at least one will not.

The complaint will be heard, in confidence, in a private place, and an appropriate response agreed upon with the complainant. This may be any of the following:

- Arbitration between the parties involved
- One, and only one, verbal warning.
- Rescinding of convention membership without refund and/or refusal of membership at future Novacons.
- Reporting the incident to the police.

The committee's decision in this matter is final.

If a complaint is made about you, either to your face via the Duty Committee Member or via the Designated People, your interaction with the complainant is over.

In cases of a dispute with the hotel, the committee will support the hotel and the hotel's own Code of Conduct.

The standard of judgement in these matters is the "reasonable person" standard as applied by the designated committee members. Attempts to "rules lawyer" the Code of Conduct will be seen as a sign of bad faith.

This Code of Conduct is considered to be a living document and is expected to evolve year on year. In advance of each convention, we fix the Code of Conduct for that convention. This is the iteration that will be in use Novacon 52. Constructive comments are welcome and will be considered when drawing up the Code of Conduct for next year's Novacon.
