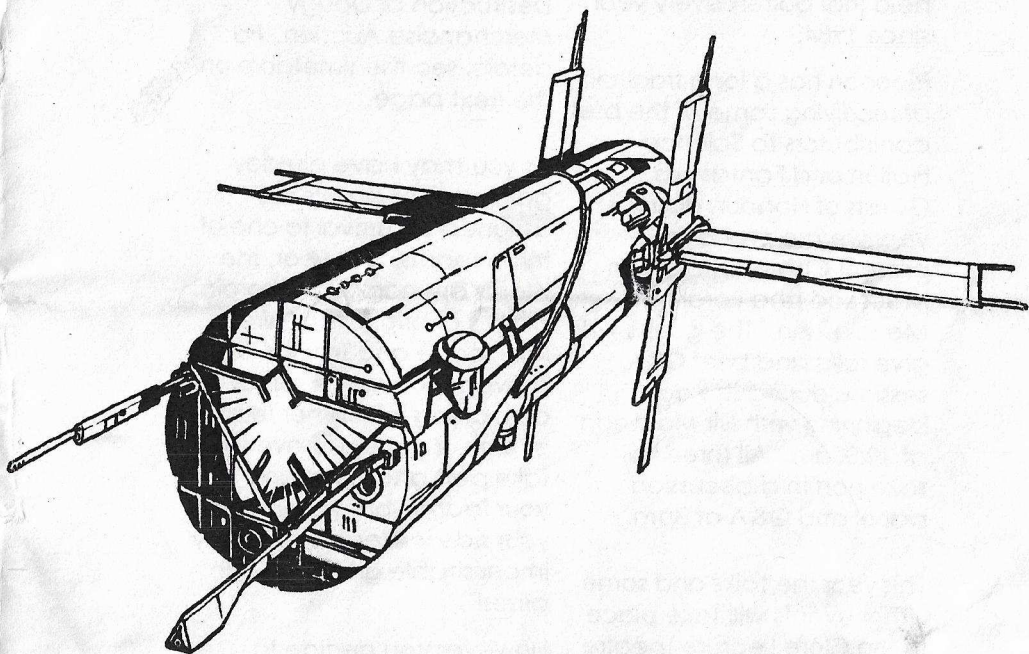

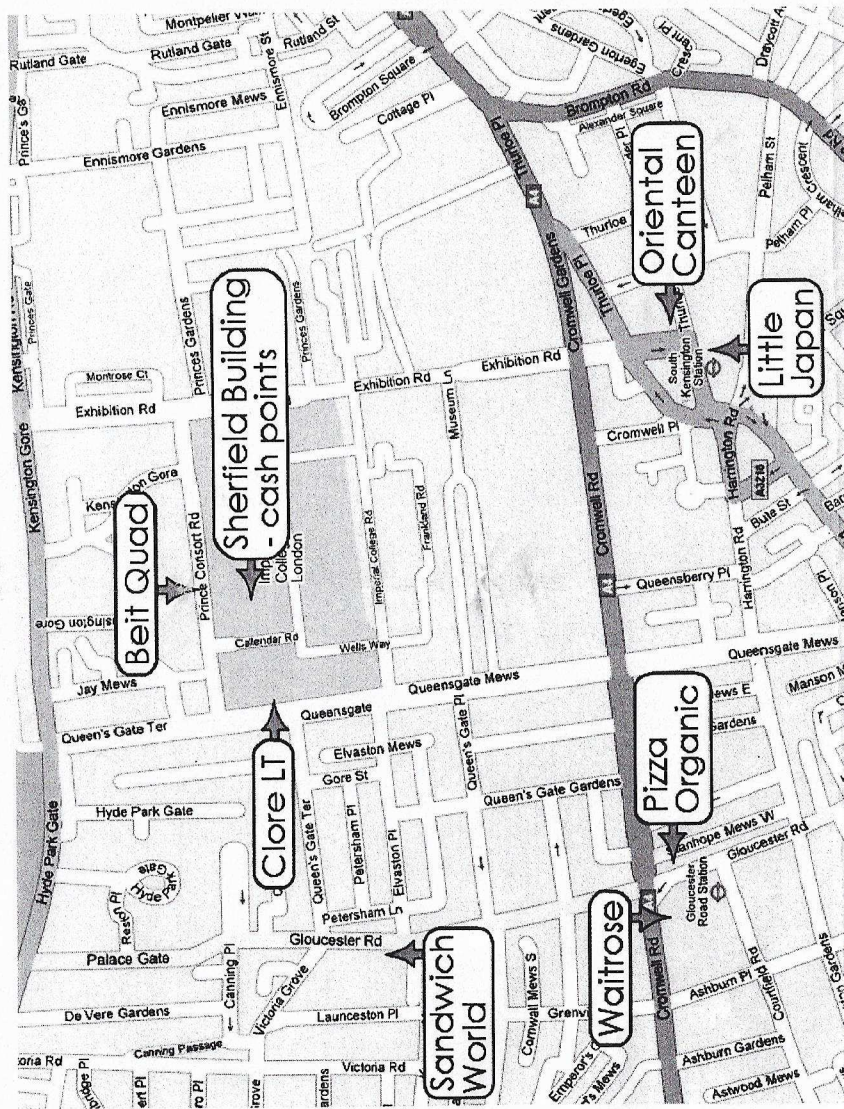

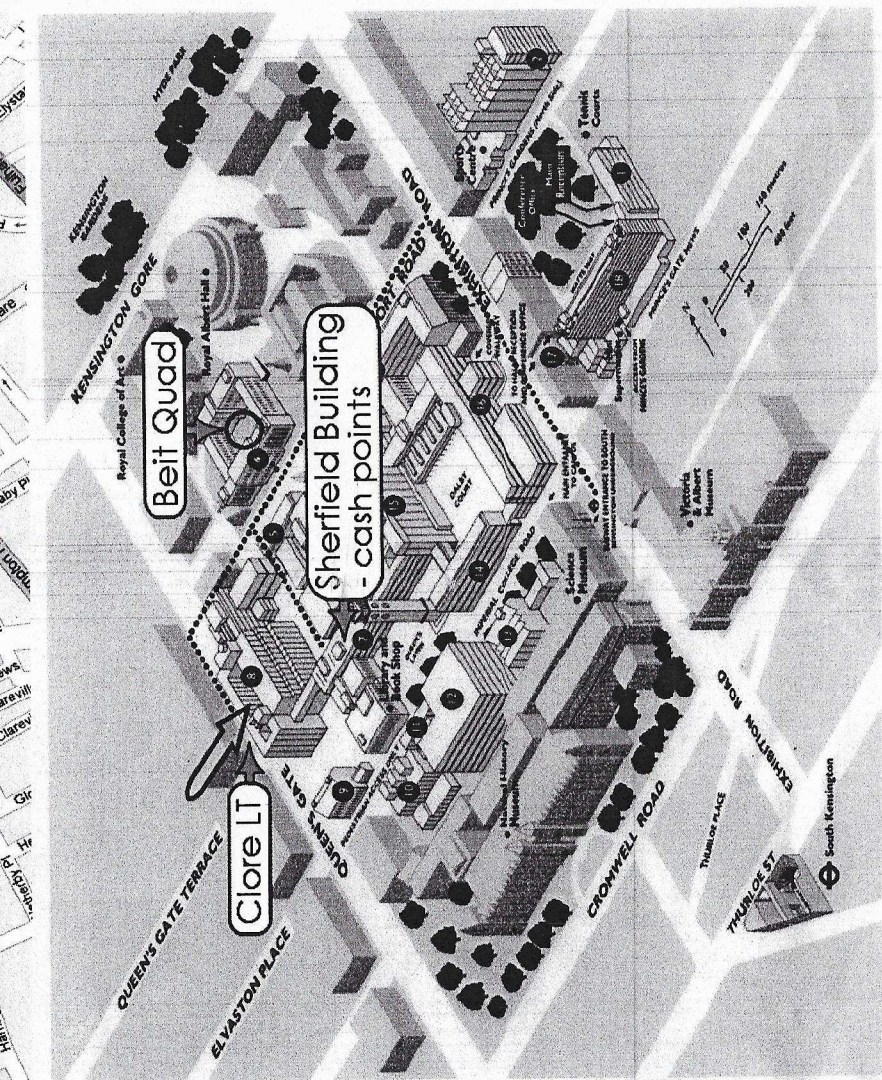


Ken has studied Zoology, researched in bio-mechanics and worked as

Handy Pull-Out Map Sheet

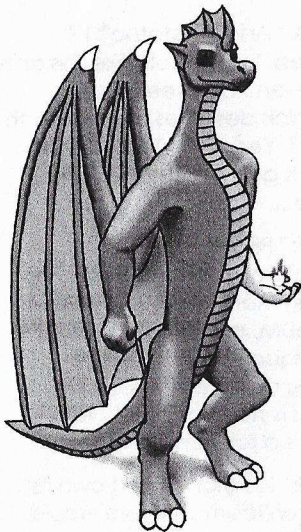




What is this Badge Thing All About?

(The records for the year 1981-1982 list a film called 'The Wild Women of Wongo'. I rest my case).

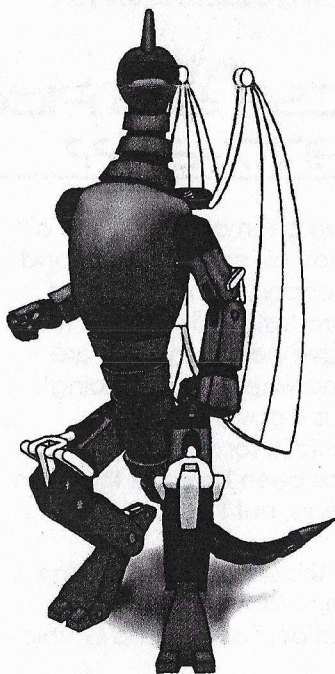
Now, the society is ensconced in its own room in the West Basement, where we are towered over by a collection of books, magazines, videos and DVDs that contains nearly 10,000 items (making it the third largest student run library in the world). The tradition of watching films on the big screen has passed with the years due to prohibitive cost, but the tradition of watching and reading total drek is, I'm glad to say, alive and well. We are also planning a second road trip to Hay-on-Wye and a team of elite technicians¹ are working day and night² on constructing our new Dalek mascot, Miranda.

As to the future, well, it's difficult to make predictions, but we are always expanding. My personal projects, as current Librarian, are to improve some of our less fleshed-out collections,

particularly the audio collection and our examples of Japanese manga and anime. But the Librarian and committee that comes after me will have their own plans and projects, so at least we'll never stagnate.

There is one thing that I'm fairly certain of: both ICSF and Picocon have a long future ahead of them.
