EATING & DRINKING IN THE CHEQUERS

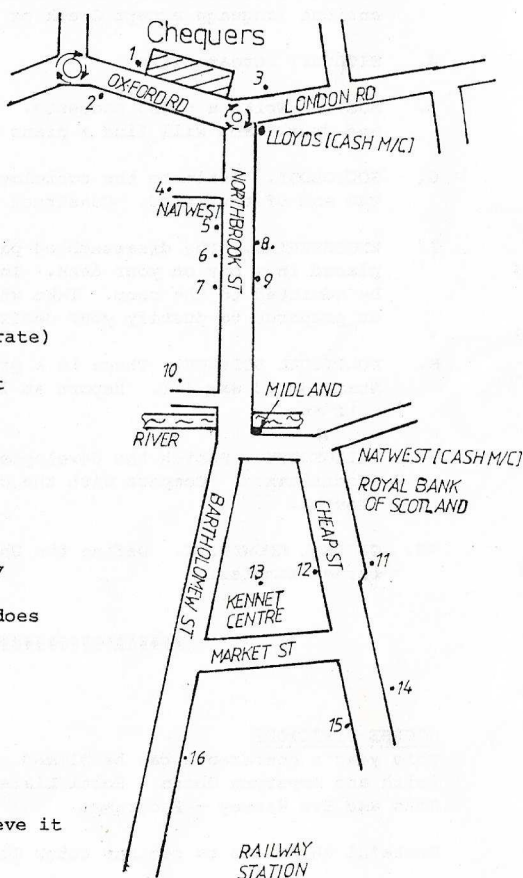
There are two bars. The small bar is between the main hall (Carnarvon Room) and the games room (Craven Room). The main bar is on your right as you come in from the street. The main bar is where you get your bar meals between 12.30 and 2.15 in the afternoon. For those of you too lazy to leave the hotel in the evenings, bar meals are also available between 6 - 9.30 p.m. If you're still hungry, sandwiches will be available after 9.30 p.m. through the night porter.

Breakfast is served until 10:30 a.m. and is well worth trying.

Of course for foodies there is always the Chequers Hotel restaurant. The A La Cart menu is not cheap but, judging by previous experience, the set menu is well worth a try.
