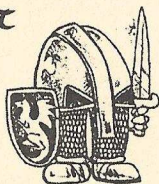

On top of all this there will be the old favourites of course. The Masquerade is in the capable hands of Alice Lawson, while Mike Whitaker is in charge of the Saturday Night Concert. There will be games and quizzes. There will be songs and stories. There will be talks and discussions. There will be words and pictures (and even a debate as to which of these two the future belongs). In this, the year of the 60th anniversary of SF conventions there will be an old fashioned fan lounge. Gosh, it all sounds exciting doesn't it.

Art Show Q & A

What is Intervention?

Intervention is the 1997 British National Science Fiction Convention, to be held at the Adelphi Hotel, Liverpool on 28-31 March 1997.

How much will it cost to display work in the Art Show?

There is no charge for displaying artwork, but the convention charges a 10% commission on all artwork sold at Intervention. Work which is not for sale may also be displayed, of course.

Do I have to book in advance?

If you don't, we can't guarantee that there will be space for your work. Everyone who books in advance is guaranteed at least some space. Any unallocated space will be distributed on a first come, first served basis. Also, artists who do not book in advance will not get bid slips and artist control forms in advance and so will have to spend time at the convention preparing these. Unless all space is allocated earlier, cut-off date for advance booking is 14 March 1997. After this date, but before the convention, we will let you know how much display space has been allocated to you.

Do I have to be an attending member of the convention to display artwork?

If you are not attending the convention, we can arrange for you to get in to set-up your work for display, and again when it needs to be taken down. If you cannot get to the convention, then you will have to make arrangements for someone to act as your agent to set up/take down, and we can arrange for them to get in if they are not an attending member. However, we do need to know all this in advance.

When can I set up?

Artwork should be set up between Thursday evening (when the display boards will probably be set up) and Friday (28 March). Whenever, it should be as soon as possible after you arrive at the convention. Any

space booked which is not occupied by noon on Saturday will be reallocated on a first come first served basis. Please note that artwork must be set up by the artist or their agent.

What about bid sheets and control sheets?

Bid sheets should be attached to artwork when it set up for display. Two copies of control sheets should be given to art administration.

When's the Art Auction?

Sunday afternoon. Check the Programme Book/Readme for details.

When do I get paid?

Monday. After all sales have been completed, selling prices are recorded on the control sheet. Total sales are determined, commission is assessed, and then the artist can be paid as they check out of the art show.

What forms do I need to complete?

The booking form, and when received, the bid slips and artist control forms.

Is my work insured while at the convention?

Intervention's insurance doesn't cover artwork, but the convention will cover any damage caused by gophers.

What presentation media are available?

There are 'peg-boards' and supports which have been used by Eastercons for years now. These are about 4 feet by 4 feet each. There will also be some tables which are about 2½ feet by 6 feet. We will also try to have the hotel remove the stuff that's usually hanging on the walls of the room for the hanging of heavier pieces.

Are there any limitations on the amount of work that may be displayed?

This will have to be determined as we go along and when setting up at the convention. It is very important that we know in advance both how much space you would like and what is the minimum you can live with. We will make every effort to display everything we can. Other than that, if you want to bring 144 one-inch square paintings, by all means do so.

During set-up, can the artist specify where their work is to be displayed?

With consultation with the artist, art

show administration will determine where the work will be displayed when the artist checks in. But we reserve the right to make the final decision.

Will the convention supply hanging materials?

We will provide 'normal' hanging materials—'blu-tac', hooks, Velcro, bulldog clips etc.—but if any special equipment is required for hanging or display, the artist should provide this.

What is the lighting like in the art-show room?

The room where the art show is to be held does have some natural lighting, but not much. The room will have its usual artificial lighting, in addition to which will be some small spotlights for mounting on the display panels.

Are there any limitations on what may be displayed?

Historically, the art show has never gone in for censorship, but just in case, we do reserve the right to ask an artist not to display a piece which we consider questionable.

What about security?

The art show room is secured (i.e. locked) when not open and security is handled by convention security. While open, there will be someone at the door to ensure that people going in and out of the art show do not take drinks in or take artwork out. There is also usually a gopher or two wandering around to keep an eye on things.

With Easter fast approaching, we're pulling out the stops to ensure Intervention's Fan Lounge is a worthy addition to the tradition of fan rooms and programme streams dating back to the 1970s.

We've already scheduled a varied and exciting line-up of panels, presentations, parties and performances, launching on the Friday afternoon and running right up until the early hours of Tuesday. And just to ensure the appropriate atmosphere is maintained all weekend long, the Real Ale bar will be located just outside our entrance, opposite the main programme hall.

But we've never intended that the Fan Lounge merely house a non-stop programme stream. Rather, items will be dotted about the schedule, allowing the area to concentrate on its primary mission: providing an informal and friendly gathering place for all members, be they veteran fans or newcomers attending their first convention, established professionals in the SF field or those yet to break into print. The central theme of this event is 'communication', and we aim there should be no area where this is truer than in the Fan Lounge.

However, we still need your assistance if our plans are to become a reality. The list below indicates specific items currently receiving our attention, but we'd be just as glad to hear from you should you have any last-minute ideas of your own, or simply want to volunteer to help out on the day. After all, the Fan Lounge is intended to be a showcase for all that is weird and wonderful in this fannish community of ours.

Display Items: To reinforce the Fan Lounge atmosphere, display boards located around the room will chart the history and diversity of SF fandom. We need photographs, newspaper clippings and similar relics from fandom's past, which would obviously be returned after the convention. Dig out your albums and scrapbooks—embarrass a fan today!

Fannish Readings: A number of gallant souls have already come forward and volunteered to bring to life the work of classic fanwriters, British and American, but we'd still like more, especially if you have a favourite short piece in mind.

Parties: Rather than have convention parties and similar fannish events stretch their finances to hold separate events in diverse locations across the weekend, we're offering the chance for them to pool resources and hold one memorable keynote event on Friday evening, whilst retaining a platform for their individual agendas. As a way of commemorating some of the weird and wonderful t-shirts and badge designs SF fandom's conjured up over the past six decades, partygoers are invited to rummage through their wardrobes and mark the occasion with a dash of fannish retrofashion.

Promotion: Conventions and local groups are invited to advertise themselves with inserts in ring-binders; all we ask is that you limit yourselves to a single A4 sheet.

Fanzines: As well as Memory Hole, which will have a set of tables in the Fan Lounge (see Greg Pickersgill's article over the page), we'll be offering space for fanzines to be sold in aid of various fannish good causes. If you're a fanzine editor, please consider running off a few extra copies or digging into your backnumbers; if you simply have fanzines in your collection which you'd like to see going to an appreciative new home, please donate them to Memory Hole.

We look forward to seeing you all at Intervention—and to hearing from everyone who can help make this an Eastercon to remember.

Memory Hole: Fanzines for the Future

The Memory Hole project began in 1994, to recover unwanted or dormant fanzine collections and redistribute them both to new fanzine readers and to established fans and collectors looking for additions to their active collections.

Far too many fanzines have been irretrievably lost or thrown away, and that's not counting those locked into actual living collections. Probably 75% of the average fanzine's print run vanishes—a lot when one considers print runs of only 150-odd copies. And it's a damned peculiar thing that fans, in general collectors and usually aghast at the idea of throwing away any book, especially a rare first edition, often treat fanzines in such a cavalier fashion. Some suggest that this is because fanzines are produced for Love rather than Money, given away rather than sold (or, if sold, usually at token—less than cost—price), and thus don't have the 'value' of, say, a first-edition P.K. Dick novel. This might be right, but is no excuse. Each fanzine, whatever its individual merits (some are genuinely brilliant, some simply devalue the paper they're printed on) is a potentially rare first edition, and perhaps might be valued more in time to come than it is today. And that value, I submit, is not and should not be financial: fanzines are produced for Love, represent the living culture and history of SF fandom, and should always be passed on freely to anyone who wants genuinely wants them.

It was with those ideas in mind that Memory Hole was begun. Since then, the project has had a great deal of success. Substantial collections have been passed on by, for example, Walt Willis and Beryl Bentcliffe (widow of Eric), and smaller amounts come in from fans who aren't collectors, or collectors weeding their files of duplicates. A considerable amount of material comes from, and goes to, the US, Canada and Australia.

Memory Hole is keen to gather in any unwanted science fiction fanzines (not gaming fanzines, please note, nor single-topic media-based fanzines) from your shed, your attic, from under your bed, the top of your wardrobe. We'll arrange to come and pick up large collections, and will certainly repay any shipping charges as required if you are able to package and mail smaller quantities.

We make no charge whatever for our services (trading in fanzines is Low, and for Worms!), but we do shamelessly accept donations to help cover the various costs involved, and we certainly do require that those asking for either random bundle or specific issues send money to cover postage. MH may be a public service, but it isn't rich!

Memory Hole also maintains a permanent fanzine collection. This began, based around my own personal collection, when I realised that in the event of a disaster (fire, flood, meteorite) occurring to Vince Clarke's home (site of the only other established fanzine library), there would be no substantial collection of fanzines left anywhere in Western Europe. So the idea of a 'Second Foundation' seemed sensible verging on vital. The 'permacollection' presently contains around 11000 fanzines: about 2000 different titles, covering the period from 1934 right up to last week. The collection has been logged on a database and the current version of the bibliographic catalogue is now available on request (free on disk, on paper by arrangement). The MH permacollection has strong links with both Vince Clarke's Fanlibrary and the SF Foundation at the University of Liverpool; MH provides material to fill their deficiencies, and absorbs their unwanted material for the recycling side of the Memory Hole project.

Memory Hole at Intervention

Memory Hole will have a definite presence at Intervention. We have several tables reserved in the Fan Lounge and a substantial amount of MH recycling stock will be available.

Fanzine Sales: Although Memory Hole is in principle opposed to trading in fanzines, there's nothing at all wrong with current faneditors selling their fanzines at conven-

tions; indeed, this was done right at the first real British Fan Room way back at the 1977 Eastercon, and has been continued at a variety of conventions, even including the one in the Glasgow shed, right up to date.

As part of the Memory Hole array in the Fan Lounge, I'll be running fanzine sales tables: so please, all fanzine editors who may be attending Intervention, if you're publishing anything between now and then, or have stocks of recent back issues available, by all means bring them along and we'll hawk them in the Fan Lounge on your behalf.

The usual principles apply: we'll sell them for your chosen price, and you get the cash less 10%, which will go the United Fan Funds for distribution to whichever fan fund (Friends of Foundation, TAFF, DUFF, etc) seems to be most in need at the time.

Any quantity of material can be handled; all you'll need to do is get it there. No need to inform us beforehand, just show up with your material.

Indeed it is possible to enter a Masquerade with a track suit, a plastic bow and arrow from Woolworths and a sense of humour and still walk off the stage with a round of applause and an inflatable space shuttle as a prize.

Entries can be individuals or groups. Costumes can be wholly original or copies of existing designs. They must be amateur productions. By all means come along as your favourite character from *Star Trek* or *Babylon 5* but don't just walk into Forbidden Planet and buy a uniform.

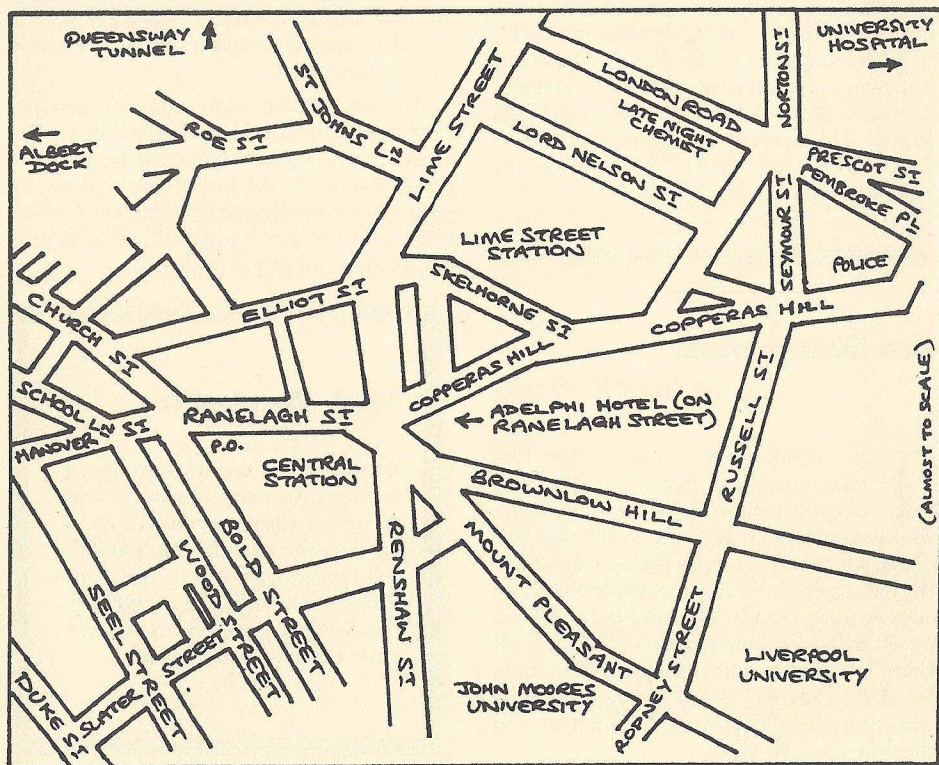
