



RULES Element 37: Rb

We at WindyCon take the rules of propriety very seriously. While it is understood that there is a certain level of nonconformity inherent in our attendees, we expect each guest to govern themselves and follow the rules.

This is our fourth year in this venue, and we hope to continue our happy relationship with the Westin. We ask that you continue to respect the facility and its employees.

If you have any questions or problems, stop by Operations. They are the communication center of the convention and can either answer your question or direct you to someone who can.

You must have your badge with you at all times in order to enter or stay in any convention function. You must present your badge to any member of the staff, including our door guards, who request it. A lost badge may be replaced at Registration for the cost of an at-the-door badge.

We understand that many of you will wish to carry your arms and armaments. Sadly, both the hotel and the local constabulary have asked that we impose what we hope are some reasonable limitations. First and foremost: use common sense. Do not raise a weapon in anger. Do not use a weapon of any type against the people or property around you. Real or realistic firearms are expressly forbidden under all circumstances. Likewise, all projectile-throwing machines are to be

kept out of the convention areas. All edged weapons, sharpened or not, must remain sheathed and secured while worn or carried. Energy weapons are restricted to only visiblelight lasers (400–700 nm) of up to 1 mW continuous wave. WindyCon reserves the right to prohibit any weapon, real or not, at its sole discretion.

Our venue has a restriction allowing only dogs on the property; no cats, rats, elephants, snakes, ferrets, unicorns, etc. are allowed. If you have a dog accompanying you, you must take it from your room for its walk and then back to your room. The only exception are dogs who are also service animals, meaning they have been trained in obedience and task skills to meet the needs of a disabled person. If you bring your canine service animal into convention space, please make certain it is properly harnessed and identified according to the relevant statutes.

Smoking is prohibited by local law and ordinance within the convention facilities. There are designated areas with the appropriate refuse bins for those who wish to include outside. Please respect those not wishing to include with you and keep the specified distance away from the doors.

WindyCon reserves the right to revoke the membership of anyone failing to conform to the letter and spirit of these policies, those of our hotel, and the laws of the State of Illinois.

We strive to create engaging programs in a casual forum for scientists to discuss work that is interesting, important and worthy of support. In this way, ISC serves as the adult counterpart to the many science-out-reach organizations focused on K-12. ISC is also the science counterpart to Chicago's many public outreach efforts for arts and humanities.

Element 53:1 WELCOME TO ISFIC

Congratulations! When you purchased your WindyCon membership, you actually joined Illinois Science Fiction in Chicago (ISFiC), the organization that runs WindyCon and is involved with other activities throughout the year.

ISFiC was founded in the early 1970s by a group of science fiction fans who wanted convention experience so they could run a Worldcon. Conceived as a general science fiction convention, the first Windycon was held October 25-27, 1973 at the Blackstone Hotel in Chicago. Joe Haldeman and Lou Tabakow were the guests of honor and Bob Tucker served as toastmaster.

The original ISFiC Board of Directors consisted of Larry Propp, Mark and Lynn Aronson, Ann Cass, Jon and Joni Stopa, and Mike and Carol Resnick. The Aronsons chaired the first three annual Windycons before passing the reins on to Larry Propp, who would go on to co-chair Chicon IV in 1982. Many more ISFiC members have helped run Worldcons over the years, although ISFiC itself has never actually run a Worldcon.

What does ISFiC do besides WindyCon?

Once WindyCon was established, ISFiC considered ways it could enhance the convention. As a 501(c)3 corporation, ISFiC's goals include use of excess funds for the benefit of fandom. ISFiC has put money back into WindyCon by providing grants to bring in additional special guests. This helped offset travel costs for SF authors and editors on the East and West Coasts. Many authors and editors who originally attended WindyCon as special guests have continued attending on their own.

ISFiC also provides grants and non-monetary resources to other Illinois fandom groups to encourage outreach, a key goal under the ISFiC charter. Organizations that have benefitted include: Chambanacon, Capricon, DucKon, and the Speculative Literature Foundation. In some cases, the Windy Con art show panels are rented for a nominal fee.


ISFiC is always interested in hearing from groups running Illinois conventions in need of assistance with specific projects.

Meanwhile, many of the people who were running WindyCon realized their duties kept them too busy to really socialize during the convention. At that time there was no summer convention in the Chicago area; so in 1986 ISFiC created Picnicon. ISFiC provides the hamburgers, hotdogs, and grills for this relaxacon picnic, and asks the attendees for donations and to bring a side dish or desert. Think of Picnicon as a massive outdoor con suite.

1986 was a busy year for ISFiC, also marked by their first amateur writers contest. The contest is held in conjunction with WindyCon, and is open to all members of ISFiC/WindyCon, and any residents of Illinois or a bordering state (plus Ohio, Minnesota, and Michigan). The first contest was won by Richard Chwedyk, who would go on to win a Nebula Award. The winner receives con membership, a cash prize, and publication of their story in the WindyCon Program Book.

In 2005, ISFiC created ISFiC Press. This arm of ISFiC publishes a hardcover book annually. Released at WindyCon, the book is often by the author guest of honor with a cover by the artist guest of honor. The first ISFiC Press book, Relativity, by Robert J. Sawyer, received an Aurora Award, the Canadian National Award presented by fans. ISFiC Press has also published science fiction novels by other authors and the Hugo Award-nominated Worldcon Guest of Honor Speeches.

The ISFiC board of directors has nine members, with three up for election to a three-year term each year. Any Illinois fan who is a member of ISFiC is eligible for election; come to the Saturday afternoon ISFiC board meeting at Windy-Con and let us know you're interested. Meetings of the ISFiC board are normally held at Windy-Con and Capricon, and are open to the public.



CATHARINE ASARO

Element 3: Li (Literary Guest)

Catherine Asaro is a scientist with a PhD in Chemical Physics from Harvard, a jazz and ballet dancer, and a writer of science fiction and fantasy. The author of twenty-five novels, she is acclaimed for her Ruby Dynasty series, which combines adventure, science, romance and fast-paced action. Her novel The Quantum Rose won the Nebula® Award, as did her novella The Spacetime Pool. Among her many distinctions, she is a multiple winner of the AnLab from Analog magazine and a three time recipient of the RT BOOKClub Award for "Best Science Fiction Novel."

Catherine also has two music CD's out. The first, Diamond Star, is the soundtrack for her novel of the same name, performed with the rock band, Point Valid, and the second is Goodbye Note. She performs as a vocalist at clubs, cons and other venues in the US and abroad, including recently as the Guest of Honor at the Denmark and New Zealand National Science Fiction Conventions. 



GREG ADAMS

Greg Adams is a jazz pianist, composer, and teacher located in Baltimore, MD. He earned his bachelors in Music Theory and Composition from McDaniel College in 2008, where he graduated summa cum laude with honors and received the award for Excellence in Music. While at McDaniel, Greg studied both jazz and classical piano under the tutelage of Eric Byrd and David Kreider respectively, giving a separate senior recital for each idiom. In 2010, Greg earned his Masters degree in Music with an emphasis in Jazz Piano from Towson University, where he studied with Tim Murphy and served as the teaching assistant for the Music Theory department.

Greg's ensemble, the Greg Adams Trio, performs regularly around the DC/Baltimore area and was recently a headliner at the Baltimore-Washington Jazzfest in Columbia, MD. The list of notable musicians Greg has played with includes Jeff Reed, John Seligman, Dave Ballou, Gary Thomas, and John Dierker. Outside of jazz, Greg is also a member of the ecclectic rock/fusion band Turtle Buddy, a pianist for Valley Brook Community Church since 2008, and a private piano instructor. At WindyCon, he is performing with author Catherine Asaro to showcase the multimedia *Diamond Star Project* that mixes literature, dance, and music.



JOE BERGERON Element 47: Ag (Artist Guest)

Joe Bergeron grew up in twin hamlets in upstate New York. As a boy he taught himself the constellations using a card-board star wheel, watching in awe as stars he had never before identified rose as predicted. Later he began a more thorough examination of the heavens using various small telescopes. A devoted hiker, Joe prowled his surroundings at all hours, discovering semi-abandoned sites of human activity which his imagination invested with the mystery of ancient ruins.

Joe was known as a "class artist" in high school, mostly by virtue of superhero drawings done in ballpoint pen. His early efforts at painting were clumsy at best and disastrous at worst. Called upon to produce planetarium shows as a summer job, Joe taught himself to paint. Soon he was selling paintings and drawings at science fiction art shows, winning a window full of awards. Later he broadened his artistic skills by earning a degree in studio art from Binghamton University. He illustrated various science fiction books and magazines, including titles by Isaac Asimov, Piers Anthony, and James Tiptree, Jr. He also served as director of a local small planetarium, and worked as staff artist at Morehead Planetarium in North Carolina, and until recently he continued to illustrate their shows.

Joe's restlessness eventually led him to make a series of trips to the West, a landscape which has fascinated him since his first visits there as a child. While living a semi-hermitlike existence in the Mojave Desert, he was tracked down by Time-Life books, spending the next few years producing illustrations for their ambitious book series Voyage Through the Universe, depicting subjects as diverse as the rings of Saturn and experimental space tethers.

After several false starts, Joe migrated to an obscure part of the southern Sierras of California, where he worked for many clients, spending his summers among those cool green hills of upstate New York. Later Joe returned to New York to try life as an Easterner who spends a good part of the year in the West. At the very least, Joe tries hard to attend the annual Grand Canyon Star Party, during which he talks to more people than he does during the rest of the year.

Though most of Joe's artwork is digital, he still treasures his ability to push paint around, and usually has a painting in progress on his easel. His other major interest is writing. He's completed his seventh novel, and is working on the eighth. Another recent creation is his Cosmic Cat children's book.

Joe's artwork is richly influenced by his decades as an amateur astronomer. He attends star parties all over the country, though most often he can be found out alone on clear nights, either somewhere in the desert or beside a frog-infested pond. He has been privileged to see the sky painted in bold colors by the aurora borealis, the glory of the solar corona during an eclipse, a golden star flickering behind the rings of Saturn, pepper-black spots deposited on the clouds of Jupiter by a rain of comets, and light streaming like water from Comets Hyakutake and Hale-Bopp. More recently, Joe stood enthralled as meteors poured from the mane of Leo.

At the end of 2001, Joe was elected a Fellow of the International Association of Astronomical Artists.

Joe finds himself in the uncomfortable position of being a cynical romantic. The beauties of the night sky and the natural world are his surest solace. In the past few years he has worked at developing a looser, more spontaneous painting style to complement the tight, precise techniques he uses for his space art and other illustrations. His work is not restricted to space themes, but includes wildlife, landscapes, fantasy, and figures. His artwork, past and future, blends his love of astronomy with interests in nature, mythology, archaeology, and wildlife.



Element 9: F (Fan Guest) HUGH DANIEL

HUGH DANIEL: HAULING ON THE FUTURE by Bill Higgins

When I met Hugh Daniel, he was a bright, articulate young man at a science fiction convention. He knew a lot about computers—and was learning more, at a frightening speed. Hugh is a hacker, in the best sense of the word. He can make machines sit up and sing. He can use them to do simple, humble tasks or great, ambitious tasks. He uses his skills to help people. As Kevin J. Maroney once said, "A better future isn't going to happen by itself."

Hugh was trying to make the Nineties happen in the Eighties. He was using mice, windows, and bitmapped screens years before they showed up in ordinary personal computers. He was part of a team trying to code a glorious hyperlinked universe of software, servers, and documents called Project Xanadu. He helped set up an online forum called *The WELL*. He agitated for restrictions on strong cryptography to be lifted, the better to protect online privacy and civil rights. He introduced me to other notable hackers. Briefly he worked for a company that built a new kind of rocket.

This is stuff a lot of people were doing in the Nineties, but only a few in the Eighties. I had a sense that Hugh had lassoed the future, and was trying to tug it closer to the present. Maybe, I like to think, it arrived a little bit ahead of schedule because Hugh was pulling so hard.

Naturally, these were exciting ideas. I used to pick his brains about computers. He used to pick mine about physics. Both of us were in love with spaceflight. We'd have a grand time talking, long into the night. When we manage to get together these days, we still do. I think he still has hold of that lasso; the other end is somewhere in the 2020s now.

A convention is always more interesting if Hugh is attending. We have taken road trips together. I have a photo of Hugh's legs sticking out of the nozzle of a nuclear rocket engine. Good times.

When help is needed, Hugh will step in. You may have seen him do this at SF cons, where he is often found behind the scenes in the Operations room. I have seen him step in and help under more unusual circumstances.

Hugh and I, in a borrowed convertible, were touring a hilly area near Palo Alto. Somebody had pulled over to the side of the road. We stopped to see if they needed help. Turned out they had spotted a fire. We were joined by a couple of local

park department guys in a pickup truck. They used a radio to call the fire department.

None of us were firefighting, just watching the fire grow. Hugh demanded to know if there were tools in the truck. Only one shovel. He grabbed it and started furiously digging a firebreak line between the fire and the road. He'd done this sort of thing before. Gradually, the volunteer fire department arrived, with serious vehicles and tools, and began to put the fire out. Only when they had it under control was Hugh willing to stop shoveling, return the shovel to the parks department, and continue on home.


Later, I told Greg Ketter, the bookseller, about this.

"You know the moral of this story, don't you?" said Greg.

"No," I said, "what is it?"

"Only Hugh Can Prevent Forest Fires."

Keep an eye out for Hugh this weekend. Big guy. Often wears a kilt. Full of opinions. Good with gadgets. You'll know him if you see him. I recommend you make his acquaintance.



FRANK HAYES Element 12: Mg (Music Guest)

How long has Frank Hayes been making funny things come out of his mouth? Let's recap: First came the Big Bang. Then the Earth cooled. A comet wiped out the dinosaurs. Then 100,000 years ago (base 2), Frank wandered into a Windy-Con VI filksing where Bob Asprin and Leslie Fish were engaged in all-out musical war, battering each other with everything from show-tune parodies to Rudyard Kipling poetry. "Say, this looks *much* more interesting than that 'Who Killed Warren Gamilel Harding?' panel", Frank thought. He stayed — and never really left.

In the decades since, Frank has written hundreds of songs and forgotten most of them, ranging from children's tunes (Never Set the Cat on Fire, Little Fuzzy Animals) and computer ditties (S-100, When I Was a Boy) to improvements on great literature (Ozymandias, Like a Lamb to the Slaughter (Talking Matty Groves)). His songs have been played on "Dr. Demento." He's won four Pegasus Awards and been inducted into the Filk Hall of Fame. There's even a disease named for his tendency to forget music and lyrics, even to songs he wrote himself.

And his song Cosmos was used to wake up space shuttle astronauts — twice. (Which, let's face it, is waaaay cooler than any of that other stuff.)

In more-or-less mundane life, Frank has been an awardwinning columnist for the trade newspaper Computerworld, a non-award-winning comic-book scripter (anyone remember Charlton Comics?), and a writer for publications ranging from the *Chicago Reader* to Japan's *Nikkei BYTE*. These days he knows more than he really wants to about the technology retailers use, as executive editor of StorefrontBacktalk, and he edits the daily online true-tales-of-IT-life feature Shark Tank.

He lives in Portland, Oregon, in direct line of sight of an active volcano.

Now, 32 years after it all started, when the moon is full and the panel on "Worldcon Isn't What It Used To Be But Then It Never Was" is just getting started, he'll be wandering into a WindyCon filksing again.

CHRISTIAN READY

Element 69: Tm (Toastmaster)

My job is to help astronomers to use the Hubble Space Telescope. When astronomers are given time to use the Hubble, we make sure that there is plenty of information for them to read. Often, however, the best thing is to have someone at the Space Telescope Science Institute they can contact to help them put together their observing program. I am one of those people, a "Program Coordinator", who helps astronomers put together their observing programs, and to answer questions about Hubble.

My specialty is in the Wide Field & Planetary Camera 2 (WFPC2), so most of the astronomers I work with are trying to take pictures of stars, galaxies, nebulae, etc. That's great for me, because I love pretty pictures!

After astronomers write their observation programs and submit them to the Space Telescope Science Institute, I check to be sure that they are written properly, and then I find out when those observations are going to be sent up to the Hubble Space Telescope, so I can get them ready in time. I often talk to many people, both here and outside the institute, about the observations I'm working on. Once all that is done, I can give the observation to the schedulers, and then I go back to work on the next observation...

Since I work "behind the scenes" at Hubble, I don't always get to see the pictures I help to take; I'm always working on the next observations. However, once in a while I'll see a beautiful picture of something taken by Hubble, realize what it is, and say, "Hey! I helped to take that!"

When I was a boy, I spent all my time watching Star Trek and reading science fiction. I used to go outside at night and look at the moon and planets with my telescope. I decided that I wanted to be an astronomer when I was about 5 years old. I got my first job in astronomy when I was 13 years old: I went to work at the nearby Sproul Observatory at Swarthmore College. I liked it a lot because I got to do real astronomy, and everyone there treated me really nice, despite my age.

When I went to Villanova University 6 years later, I majored in Liberal Arts. I spent my freshman year taking all the math courses that I was too afraid to take in High School. Even though it was hard for me. I was allowed to switch my major to astronomy, and I went on to learn a lot of physics, math, computers, and astronomy.

I earned my degree in Astronomy & Astrophysics from Villanova University in the spring of 1992, and came to work at the Space Telescope Science Institute that fall. I am so glad I did, because now I am working on the neatest venture in astronomy today. Looks like I became an astronomer, after all!


Today, I live in Hampstead, Maryland, with my wife, Jeri, and my two cats, Antigone and Misha. Jeri is writing her first book, and Antigone and Misha beat each other up. It's fun.

My biggest hobby is photography (I said I like pretty pictures, right?). I'm also in the Civil Air Patrol, where I fly with aircrews to help rescue people from airplane crashes. I also enjoy talking to people about the Hubble Space Telescope, and showing others what we are seeing with it. I've given talks and sideshows at schools, churches, community groups, and have even traveled to Star Trek and science fiction conventions. Since I've always liked science fiction, I really enjoy meeting with people and telling them about a little science fact.

If anyone is interested in becoming an astronomer or other scientist, but is afraid of the math, let me give this advice:

Once you actually start to work on it, it becomes a little easier. It's really not hard, but it is different than writing English or learning history. Never get discouraged by a bad grade, or a lousy teacher. Always ask questions, even if you are clueless. You'll be surprised at how teachers will react when you come to them for extra help, and when you tell them what you want to do in life. And, if you don't like their answer, ignore them. My 10th grade chemistry teacher told my mom that I would never, ever, go anywhere in science. Since I was not doing well in his class, he thought I would never learn chemistry, or anything else!

The bottom line: if you decide that you really want to do something, don't let anything stop you. You will do it if you decide you will!



MIKE BROTHERTON


Element 106: Sg (Science Guest)

ASTRONOMY:

When Mike Brotherton was six, he wanted to be an astronomer or a paleontologist. At twelve he wanted to be a science fiction writer.

Mike went to college at Rice University intending to get a degree in electrical engineering and work for JPL or NASA, but ended up double majoring in EE and space physics and went on to the University of Texas at Austin to study astronomy.

After getting his PhD in 1996, Mike worked at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory and Kitt Peak National Observatory. He is now an assistant professor in the department of Physics and Astronomy at the University of Wyoming specializing in observational studies of quasars and other active galactic nuclei.




WRITING:

Mike says that writing starts with reading. He doesn't remember learning to read and doesn't remember ever having difficulty with reading with one exception in the form of a nasty school librarian who told Mike in first grade that he "didn't read that book" from the "big stacks" and first graders weren't supposed to be able to read those.

Mike started writing my first novel — something really terrible inspired by Edgar Rice Burroughs's John Carter of Mars books — in sixth grade. For the most part he let the writing bug idle until college. Mike didn't sell anything he wrote in college but did start learning to be professional. He joined a local SF/F writing group ("The Slugtribe") and started getting serious about writing.

Mike attended the Clarion West Writer's Workshop in the summer of 1994. He says "Clarion West was a wonderful experience for me though not everyone fares so well. It's basically boot camp for writers for six weeks, writing 5-6 stories, reading and critiquing over 100 stories, living and learning intensely. While the craft acquired at something like Clarion is not to be underestimated, the most important legacy to me has been the friends and professional contacts I made there. Beth Meacham, my editor at Tor, was one of my Clarion instructors and gave me a thumbs-up on the novel synopsis I wrote there." It took Mike another six or seven years to finish his PhD, hone his craft, and get the actual novel, Star Dragon, on her desk. Since then Mike's Spider Star has also been published, and he the edited the anthology Diamonds in the Sky.
