THE METROPOLE HOTEL, BRIGHTON

The Metropole is a great old Victorian hotel, fully modernised to include all the luxuries that no modern hotel could afford to be without, but, as their brochure says, "without impairing the important features that established the hotel's reputation as one of the finest on Britain's south coast." If there is one thing you can count on in a Victorian hotel it is space. There is plenty of it at the Metropole, so much of it in fact that we will not need the massive Exhibition Centre at the back of the hotel in which much of Seacon '79 was staged. We are going to take full advantage of every bit of space the hotel provides. The Con Hall, for instance, will be in the Winter Gardens Ballroom, which can accommodate up to 850, so we shouldn't be cramped there. Also there are lots of other rooms of varying sizes which are ideal to serve as Art Show, Fan Room, Book Room, halls for films and extra programme items, and everything else that you would expect to find at a convention. What is more, you won't have any trouble actually finding them, because they are conveniently grouped around the hotel's main entrance hall, and are on only two floors, the Ground and Basement. Also, within this area you will find lounges, restaurants and, of course, a full complement of bars without which...

If the task of exploring these bars should prove just a little too much for you, the hotel even has its own Health Club. Yes, folks, the Metropole has every facility, including the latest in sophisticated torture equipment, steam cabinets, underwater massage and the like. Masochists may be charged extra.

Having said that there is plenty of space for the convention, I should also say that spaciousness is a description that applies throughout the hotel, including the 332 bedrooms which offer a total of 580 beds. And for all this we have secured some remarkably low room rates: £16.00 per person per night, inclusive of buffet-style English breakfast and service charge, but subject to VAT.
