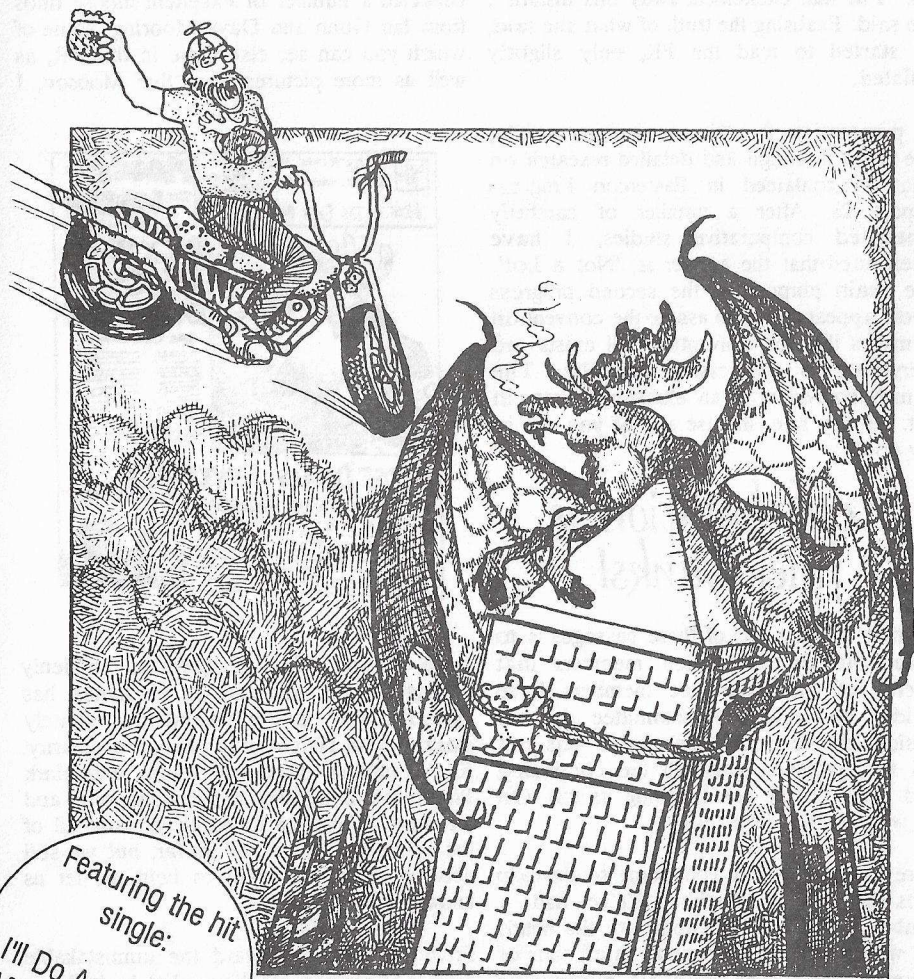

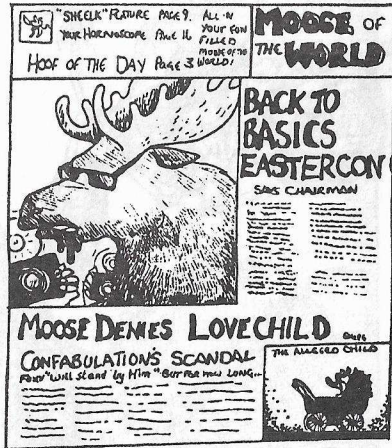

Lois McMaster Bujold

Thanks to Lois for this biography, which we've shamelessly edited in order to fit into one page.

I was born in Columbus, Ohio in 1949. I graduated from Upper Arlington High School in 1967 and attended the Ohio State University from 1968 to 1972. I have two children, Anne and Paul, and have resided in Marion, Ohio since 1980.

I've been a voracious reader all my life, beginning with a passion for horse stories in primary school. I began reading adult science fiction when I was 9, a taste picked up from my father. He used to buy science fiction magazines and paperback books to read on the plane on consulting trips; these naturally fell to me. My reading tastes later expanded to include history, mysteries, romance, travel, war, poetry, etc., etc., etc.

At the age of 15 I hitchhiked around England, Germany and Switzerland with her older brother, and travelled with my parents by car through Austria, Italy and France. Highlights of England included sleeping on everything from a park bench in Oxford to a castle in Scotland and riding in everything from the back of a truck in Wales in the rain to a lift from a local MP in his Rolls.

My first novel, *Shards of Honour*, was completed in 1983; the second, *The Warrior's Apprentice*, in 1984; and the third, *Ethan of Athos* in 1985. As each one came off the boards it began the painfully slow process of submission to the New York publishers. I also wrote a few short stories which I began circulating to the magazine markets. In late 1984 the third of these sold to *Twilight Zone Magazine*, my first professional sale and the first indication that there was light at the end of the tunnel. This thin proof of my professional status had to stretch until 1985, when all three of the completed novels were bought by Baen Books, making me an overnight success after a mere thirty or so years of build-up. The novels were published as original paperbacks in June, August and December of 1986, leading the uninitiated to

imagine that I wrote a novel every three months.

Since then I have sold three more short stories and completed my ninth book. TV rights to my first short story 'Barter' were sold to the syndicated show *Tales from the Darkside*. The fourth novel, *Falling Free*, was serialised in the winter of 1987-88 in *Analog* and was published as an original paperback by Baen in April 1988 as their lead SF title for that month. I was particularly pleased to be featured in *Analog*, as it was a favourite magazine of my father's and of my own. Two 'Miles Vorkosigan' novellas appeared in *Analog* in 1989, 'The Mountains of Mourning' in May and 'Labyrinth' in August. Another, 'Weatherman', was in *Analog* in February 1990. The fifth book, *Brothers in Arms*, is a sequel to *The Warrior's Apprentice* and was published in January 1989. *Borders of Infinity*, published by Baen in 1989, is a collection of the first three Miles novellas; a Miles Vorkosigan adventure including and continuing from 'Weatherman' and titled *The Vor Game*, was a September 1990 release from Baen. My eighth book is titled *Barrayar* and is a direct sequel to *Shards of Honour*. My most recent book in the UK is my first fantasy novel, breaking entirely away from the current series; titled *The Spirit Ring*, it is a ghost story based on an old folk tale, set in 15th century Italy.

I was runner-up for 1987's John W. Campbell Award for best new writer. *Falling Free* was a finalist for the 1988 Hugo award and won the Nebula for that year. 'The Mountains of Mourning' won both the Hugo and Nebula for best novella of 1989. *The Vor Game* won the Hugo for best novel of 1990 and *Barrayar* won the Hugo for best novel of 1991.

The next book is a sequel to *Brothers in Arms*, titled *Mirror Dance*. It was published in the US as a Baen hardcover in March of this year. In progress is another Miles Vorkosigan adventure.

Weapons Policy

Confabulation is being held in the centre of London, and as such we have to be careful about weapons and how they are used. Please do not bring any real weapons to Confabulation.

Water is a projectile. Photons aren't.

Unrealistic replica weapons **may** be allowed at the discretion of the committee. They are unlikely to be allowed if they are capable of doing damage. If there is a disagreement about whether the weapon is capable of causing damage, we reserve the right to test it on you.

The committee may confiscate anything, for any reason, at any time.

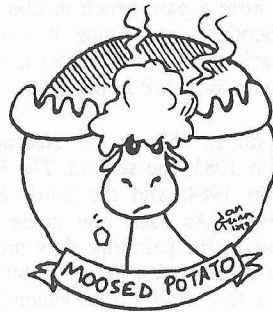
Moose Ribs (main course)

Place 3 or 4 pounds (1.4 to 1.8 kg) moose ribs, bone down, in pressure cooker. Lay strips of fat salt pork over top. Add 1/2 cup (120 ml) water and two or three sliced onions. Cook at medium pressure for 30 minutes. Remove ribs and place in an iron skillet. Mix 1 tablespoon (30 ml) brown sugar and a pinch of dry mustard with fat stock from the pressure cooker and pour over meat. Bake, uncovered, in a moderate oven until crisply browned, basting frequently.

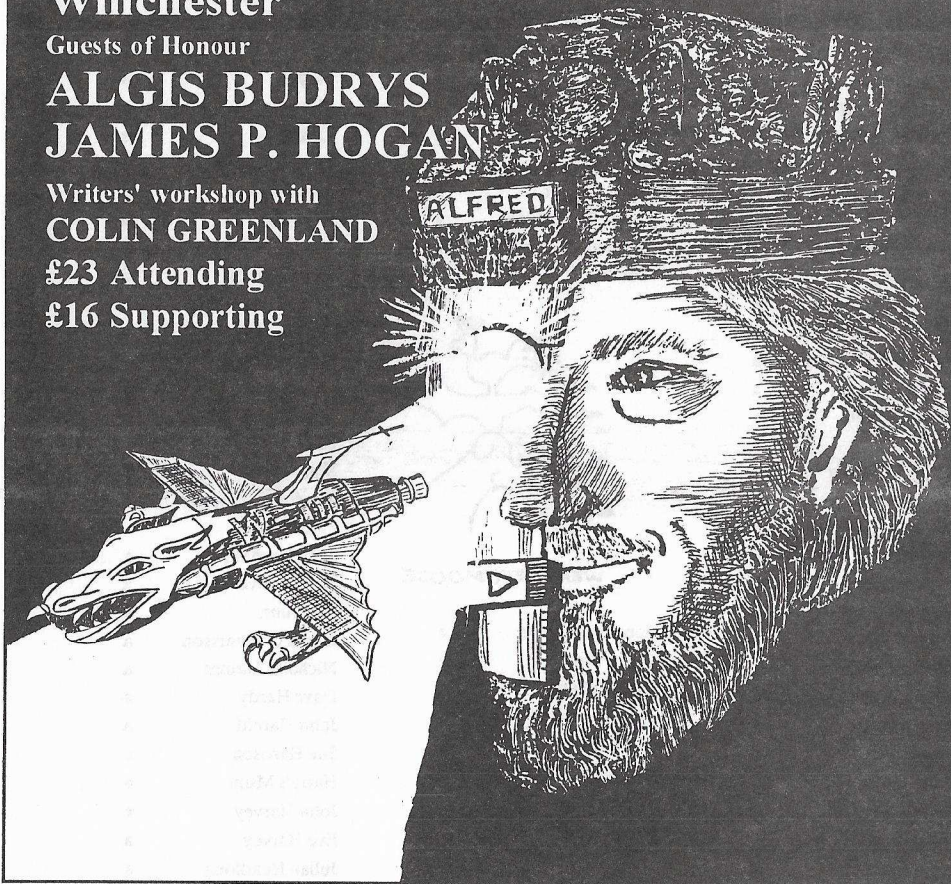

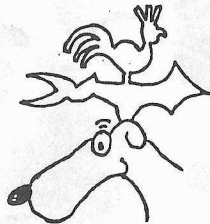

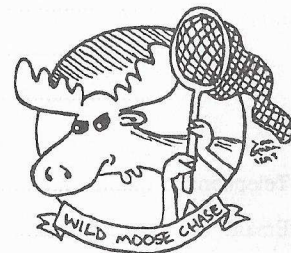

Dealers

Confabulation will have a restricted amount of space for dealers and art. This is partly because of the limited conference space in the hotel, and partly because, as a relatively small Eastercon, we don't want to overdo things.
