Bookshops in Chester

Dr Plokta's mother, a Chester native, offers the following guide.

The Oxfam bookshop at 19 Bridge Street Row East will be closed on Good Friday, open 9:30 to 5 p.m. on Saturday, closed on Easter Sunday and open 11am to 4pm on Easter Monday. (Dr Plokta's mother will be working there for much of Saturday and Monday.) They've recently had a large donation of SF and there are about 8 shelves of interest,

fact and fiction. There's a high-class remainder shop and a good second-hand one (with a lot of SF, occult and Arthurian material) side by side on the walls just east of the Northgate. The closest second-hand shop to the hotel, on the corner by the Watergate Street traffic lights, has SF only by accident. The other Oxfam shop, in Frodsham Street, has two shelves of SF. Ring for opening hours, which may not be the same as Bridge Street Row. There are three other charity shops in Frodsham Street, with little SF. The same applies to the two in Upper Northgate Street. There's another remainder shop near the top of the escalator from Pepper Street into the Grosvenor shopping centre. The only new bookshops are Waterstone's in Eastgate row South, and Smith's on Eastgate Street near the Eastgate.

Want to buy something else?

Shopping in Chester

Chester's two-storey shopping is often described as unique, but will be familiar to anyone who's used a shopping mall. Upper level shops are described as on

rows—if someone says a shop is on Watergate Street, it's ground level; if Watergate Street Row, it's the upper level.

The larger chain stores are mostly on Foregate Street or in the Grosvenor Precinct; Eastgate Street, Watergate Street, Northgate Street and Bridge Street have a more eclectic selection of shops.

John Dallman, official con Dirty Old Man, writing under the pen name of Gail Courtney, informs us that the Obligatory Eastercon Leather Sale is happening at Lakeland [*we thought they did PVC rather than leather—Ed*], the clothes shop on Bridge Street Row East.

Eating & Drinking

The con food in the main restaurant will be served between 5 and 9, not 5 and 7 as per ReadMe. Snacks are also being served in both the main bar and the con bar. Late night food (11pm - 1am) includes bacon and sausage baps and veggie faux-pigs. Vegan food is also available at the con—but you have to ask. Everything we've eaten so far has been yummy.

Contemplation set a new record when the bar stopped selling real ale on Thursday evening. Fans are requested to form a bucket chain between the Crowne Plaza and the Marston's Pedigree in the Olde Custom House in Bridge Street.

Eating out?

Restaurant Reviews

Raffles Oriental, 1-3 Eastgate Row, The Cross. Mediocre food, very lethargic service. £17.50 for all you can eat, and this does include crispy duck. The staff make every attempt to sell additional drinks and the food is very salty, hence your bill is likely to be a bit higher than planned. Go if you're very hungry and not too fussy.

Moules a GoGo produced a reasonable bowl of moules accompanied by the traditional frites and mayonnaise for a mere £6.95 (lunchtime price), though they too were a little slow. The availability of jugs of Belgian beer did make waiting more bearable.

Ruan Orchid, 14 Lower Bridge Street (at the top, on the right as you go downhill) - reasonably good but fairly pricey (we spent £100 for three people including desserts and tip) Thai restaurant. Note that the other Thai on Lower Bridge Street is closed for refurbishment.

Martin Easterbrook and Margaret Austin recommend the **Siam Restaurant** (Thai and Tep-panyaki) at 32 City Road.

Alison and Steven's favourite Chester restaurant from many years ago is **Francs**, 14 Cuppin Street. This venerable and cosy Chester bistro has had a bit of a facelift so no longer has a bicycle on the ceiling. Shame. Set lunches (up to about 6pm) are £6.95 or £8.95 for two courses; a la carte probably about £20 a head for two courses and drinks.

Got kids?

Bottle Dungeon

The Club Lounge on the 3rd floor is available to everybody—but especially intended for families. It's a comfy no-smoking lounge with a telly. Please don't leave kids alone in the room but obviously there's no problem with parents sorting out a suitable rota with their friends. NB: there's no loo in this room so you'll want to water your kids before you go.

Late Drinker?

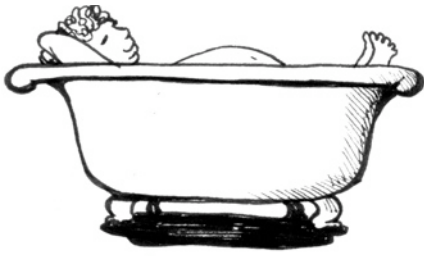
A Better Key Card

Restaurant Reviews

Fiesta Havana (on Watergate Street. Cuban tapas bar with an excellent selection of tapas. Spanish omelette particularly recommended. Serves cocktails by the jug and by the glass (half-price during happy hour. The strawberry cheesecake cocktail is to die for. Gorgeous ice-cream. Open Sunday.

Summer Palace, 126 Foregate Street, reasonably priced Chinese (under £15 a head), not at all scruffy.

Got wine -- not just a bar, there's a (pricey) restaurant upstairs (£25 for two courses). Good food, great truffles and raspberries, fancy wine list with prices to match, and friendly, knowledgeable and enthusiastic staff.

Crypt Cafe -- actually the basement of Debenhams's, but nice coffee and cakes.

Caffe Uno -- we got a review for this but we think it's probably libellous.

Aquavitus (Watergate St) Vaguely Swedish cuisine as interpreted by Italian staff working in a sort of French style. We had their evening set menu, £18 for three courses, all of them delicious including a superb lamb with garlic gazpacho. The lime and poppy seed panna cotta was pretty good too. Closed Sunday.

Fat Cat Review (85 Water Street) Friendly, good beer - usually 3 real ales on pumps. Reasonably priced pub menu. Very popular for food and drink with locals - recommended for those who care how much they are spending.
