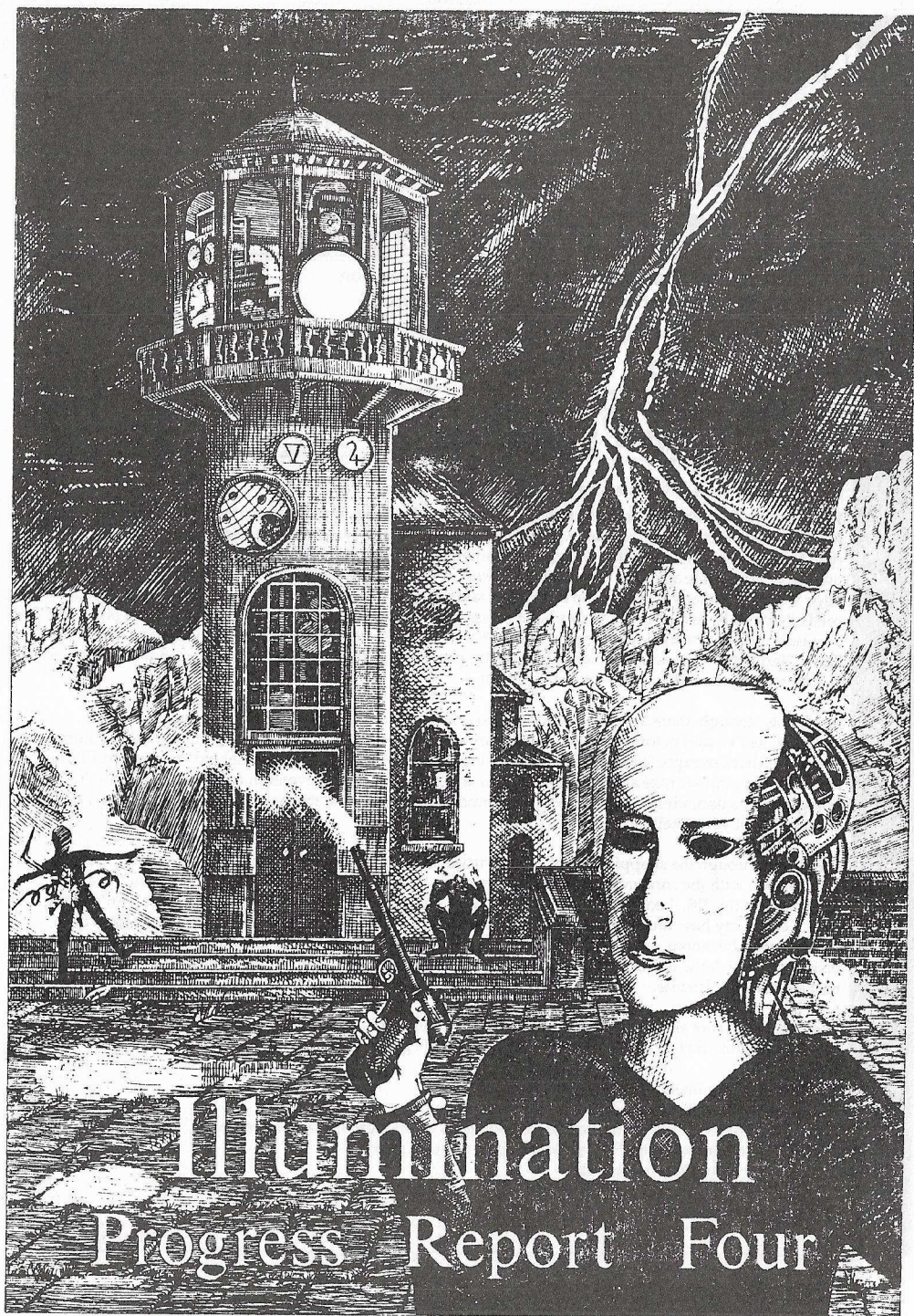

Final Approach

How to Achieve Illumination: The Penultimate Step (Or: How to get to the Norbreck Castle Hotel)

By Car:

1. Follow the M55 to Blackpool
 2. Head for the sea front
 3. At the sea front turn right
 4. Head for Fleetwood; hotel 3 miles on right (its the first castle you get to... Honest!)
- OR

1. Follow the M55 to Blackpool
2. Leave at Junction 3, A585 to Fleetwood
3. At traffic lights turn left, A585 to Fleetwood
4. Next traffic lights bear right, A585 to Fleetwood
5. Next traffic lights straight on, A585 to Fleetwood
6. At roundabout straight on, A585 to Fleetwood
7. Next roundabout straight on, A585 to Fleetwood
8. Next roundabout turn left, B5412 to Cleveleys (Victoria Road West)
9. At Cleveleys Town Centre turn left, A584 to Blackpool
10. Follow tramline; hotel one mile on left (its still the first castle you get to... Honest!)

By Rail:

1. Change at Preston for Blackpool, if you haven't got a direct train
 2. Train terminates at Blackpool North
 3. Catch Taxi (approx. £4)
- OR

3. Walk to seafront (about 10 minutes)
4. Catch a tram heading north to Fleetwood or Cleveleys (going right as you face the sea). Ask for Norbreck. Cost 65p. Trip is 2 1/2 miles, takes approx. 20 minutes

By Coach:

1. Arrive at Talbot Road bus station
2. Turn left and walk to North Pier
3. Catch tram (see above)

By Air:

1. Land at Blackpool Airport
2. Catch taxi (if you can afford the air fare, you can afford the taxi...)

By Sea:

1. Dock at Fleetwood
2. Catch tram heading south
3. Stop at Norbreck

Going Up the 'Pool (Or: What to do if you don't want to spend all your time in a Castle or a Convention)

Trams- A Beginners Guide

Does that sound negative? Read it again. My original ideas for the Illumination programme were ambitious—in retrospect perhaps unreasonably so. That the final result is not what I originally hoped for is (a) not surprising and (b) not indicative of a weak programme. On the contrary. Looking at the way things are coming together, I think that we will have an extremely strong programme, with a lot of unusual items, imaginative ideas and provocative discussions. But these will be mixed in with a lot more traditional (or, as early Ivanescque broadsides damned it, 'boring') material. Reinvent the talking-heads panel, us? Well, needs must when the devil drives. The story behind this can be obtained from me for the price of a pint and a sympathetic ear. A different story can probably be obtained from others for a similar cost. You're not interested. You want to know what is going to be happening.

Somewhere nearby, by the magic of Dave's electric wiggles, should be a copy of Friday's programme. The items should give you a fair idea of what direction the programme will be taking from there on. I could spend the rest of this article reciting the programme, but am not convinced there is really much point. Better to pick on a few representative items and selected highlights. The big items—the masquerade, the awards, the fireworks—you already know. We'll be having an audio-visual programming room, which will spend some of the time showing films and videos, but will also contain our more visually-oriented items. See, for instance, cuddly John Bray forget his computer password in glorious stereo. See, for instance, film quizzes desperately trying to identify famous stars by the backs of their necks. See, for instance, the Earth in shattered ecological ruin. See Steve Lawson's shirt...

Rule Your Own Planet!

(By Committee, Anyway)

Illumination's AV programme will feature a mass

participation version of the "Caean" computer game SimEarth, which allows players to follow the various ways that the planet could have developed, and to see the effects of changes feeding through the biosphere. The computer output will be projected onto a large video screen, and everyone in the audience will be able to join in the play decisions. The winner is the one with the most mackerel at the end.

The main programme, as previously droned on about, will tend to feature items with big floppy ears: a lot of what goes in here will be the bits of fluffy bunny rabbits that protrude above ground. For instance a couple of workshops on solving the ecological crisis either by adjusting our lifestyles to be less destructive or by finding ways to compensate for the damage we cause would lead eventually to a main programme discussion, "The Green and the Grey", on whether science is the cause of the problem or the solution. You can also find the usual run of stuff here: auctions, debates, Steve Lawson's shirt...

Yes, the guest of honour items will be here, and yes, there will be boring speechy or interviewy type things. But there will also be excitement, adventure and, at least in Pam Wells' case, really wild things. Paul McAuley appears to be planning more in the direction of really weird things. He will also be judging the sandcastle competition ("on the condition that I get to stamp on the losers," he adds).

Sunday night we plan to have—and we didn't rip this idea off Iconoclasm or anything like that—a cabaret, so polish up your acts in readiness. We will also show the Chronoclasm video to get you in the mood or spark idiotic ideas. Filkers are welcome, but please note that we don't *just* want a filk cabaret! They get their chance on Friday evening with the Golden Oldies of Filk. If there's a song you want to hear that no-one seems to bother with nowadays, or if you're just higgerant (that's ignorant to non-Welsh speakers... Ed.) and want to find out what the noise is, then this is the place to come. Secret Mastery of Filking will be rigorously suppressed and even people as tone deaf as me may join in on the choruses.

Bring Out Your Dead!

While on the subject of slightly pilfered items, here's one that's more than slight. We nicked the Unknown Programme Item from Contrivance and we're not ashamed to admit it. On Friday evening there will be a workshop meeting to decide on a

programme item to stage on Monday. Please bring ideas and stage presence, or just ideas. On Jersey a bunch of us staged the 1999 Eastercon (in an hour). Remarkable how that seemed vaguely more organised than the 1992 one... At any rate, there is a prime spot on Monday's main programme going begging. Take that diem out and carp it.

In the alternative programme you'll find more random items: the odd quiz, the occasional talk, the "You Didn't Want It And Now You're Not Going To Get It" collection of remaindered programme items, the lecture on teabag science, Steve Lawson's shirt...

Work at Lawrence-Livermore

One of the non-standard-panel formats we will be using is the 'floating panel' where anyone in the audience who makes a few good comments is invited up to join the panel, as other panellists fade away (yes, these items are scheduled late at night).

In one of these you'll be asked to come up with ultra-high-tech weaponry. Brilliant Pebbles too stupid for you? B2's spotted at 4000 yards? Come along to this one and the SDI talent scouts may pick you as the winner of a multibillion dollar defence contract!

That just leaves the workshop items, which I still insist are the good bits even if everybody else thinks I'm hallucinating. Strangest and quite possibly most intriguing item here is Graham Joyce's "Lucid Dreaming". This will actually consist of two workshops, with a couple of days in between for people to experiment before reporting back and discussing the results. Graham is the author of "Dreamside", so these items should provide some interesting sidelights on that.

If you have any interest in ecology, we will be running two related discussions, "How to be Green" and "Building Blueprints". The first asks what it means to be ecologically friendly: having a non-CFC fridge, or something deeper—from family planning to caring for the everyday environment (don't drop litter!) to the contemplation of high art, or at any rate ugly modern architecture. It should be interesting to see how people look on the environment as a whole, as a place in which to live and work, as well as just the more obvious and hackneyed issues of what to do about sunburning penguins. The latter is the prime concern of the other item (and the penguins), though, which assumes that people will always want a rising standard of living—and the Third World will always want fridges no matter how CFC-ridden they are—and investigates models for society that allow people to enjoy their luxuries

without exhausting the planet. Can these conflicting needs be balanced? Working out how will be an exercise to challenge the most creative of fannish brains...

Extra-caffeinated guest of honour Geoff Ryman will be going in search of willing types to help out in the "SF Theatre" workshop, which will be a planning session for a play or other jamboree about the life of Philip K Dick, to be performed at the convention. Geoff needs willing volunteers for this to let us know before the convention. Contact the Illumination address (or phone) if you're interested. Definitely not to be missed (but then nor are any of the other items on at the same time).

Students take note that once again the National Student SF Association will make a doomed attempt to keep the links between college sf groups open through the dark months of summer. This is a good idea whose day will come, and the sooner the better, so come to their meeting and speed it up a bit.

We also plan to produce an Instant Fanzine at the convention, so bring your journalists' notebooks. There will also be advice on how to repeat this activity in the comfort of your own home. The fanzine scene needs new blood badly, and we'd like to see people at least attempting a transfusion.

The fan programme, in the capable hands of Anne Page and Pam Wells, looks set to complement the "mainstream" programme perfectly, with a light smattering of Damn Fine Items and lots of tea, coffee and hospitality. Anne seems to be planning a fan room for fans, not just for people who already know fandom, and will be making everyone welcome. Drop in and meet the gang.

Programming in the Sun Lounge and the Norcalympia—our two lounge areas—will be light. Really light. But the really, really light stuff will be in the programme rooms. We have a great hotel, a great programme and a great shirt (well Steve does anyway). And I, personally, have my fingers crossed.

Operations

Weapons Policy

Please note that in accordance with the law the following rules must be respected by all members of the convention at all times:

1) NO weapons [e.g. swords, bows, guns or sticks (other than medically necessary)] or weapon replica [e.g. real looking pistols] are allowed. This applies especially to hall costumes and includes peace-bonded swords!

2) Weapons or weapon replica which are part of a costume for the masquerade must be wrapped up and hand-carried to the back stage area. They may only be drawn and wielded as part of the performance on stage.

Party Organisers Note

All drinks consumed in the hotel must be purchased from the hotel. Private parties on hotel premises have the option to pay the hotel corkage instead which is currently rated at almost £4 per litre bottle. A list of hotel prices is available from the Illumination address.

Writers' Workshop

Interesting Times, the Birmingham based writers group are running a writers' workshop at Illumination. They would like people to bring along a 1000 word extract from a short story, novel or play for discussion. The workshop itself will be on the Sunday morning, where they hope to discuss such things as character, pace and style. The aim is to provide constructive criticism and to help writers' improve their work.
