The convention will make available a PC/word-processing facility so that participants can type up and print short, complete pieces of writing.

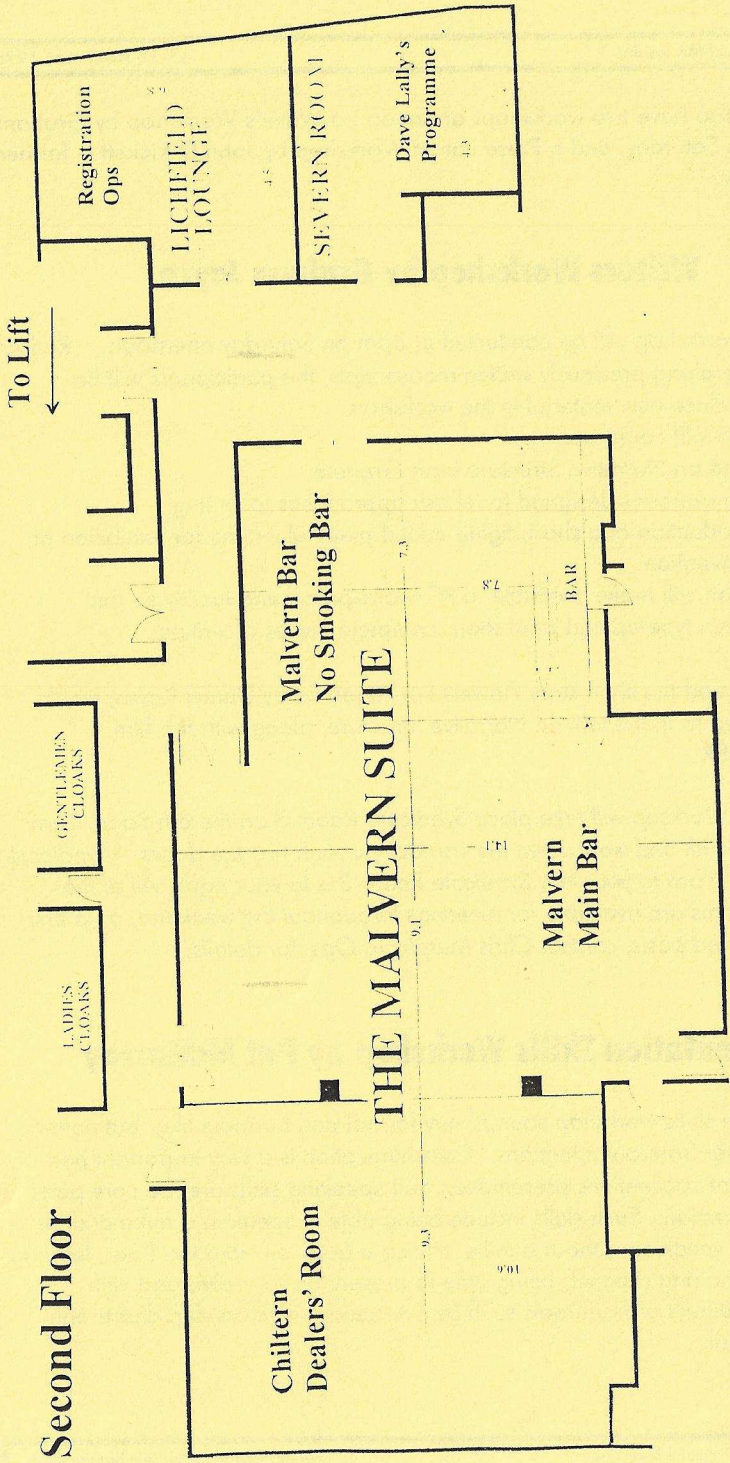

Presentation Skills Workshop by Pat McMurray

A presentation skills workshop sounds very formal and business like, but nothing could be further from our intentions. Communication is a very important part of fandom, and at conventions presentation and speaking skills are the core parts of public interaction. Such skills include being able to speak in a mike and be heard clearly, speaking without a mike, asking a question from the floor, leading a debate or chairing a panel, being able to present on your own and with support from others or from tools such as overhead projectors, flip charts and other visual aids.

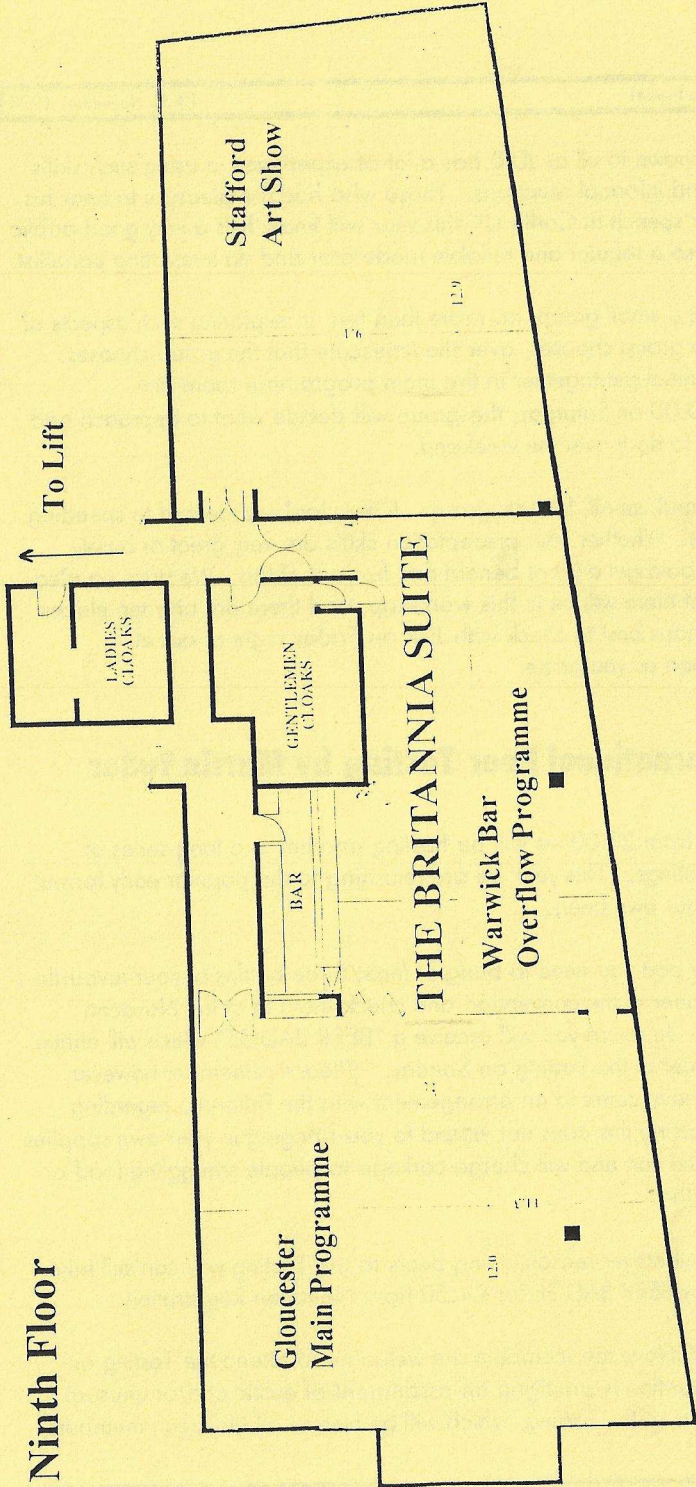

Ninth Floor



*The meeting/workshop rooms are on the 8th floor (Syndicate Rooms 1, 2 and 3).
Turn right out of the lift and walk down the corridor through two fire doors --
Syndicate Rooms 1 and 2 are to your left, Syndicate Room 3 is to your right.*

John D Rickett (known to all as JDR) has a lot of experience in using such skills in both formal and informal situations. Those who had the pleasure to hear his Guest of Honour speech at Corflu UK this year will know he's a very good public speaker. He's also a regular and reliable moderator and an interesting panellist.

He hopes to lead a small group, no more than ten, in exploring such aspects of these skills as the group chooses, over the timescale that the group chooses. Starting with an initial get together in the main programme room (the Gloucester) at 10.00 on Saturday, the group will decide what to approach and when and where to do it over the weekend.

It will be an informal, small, friendly group. JDR is looking forward to spending some time on this. Whether your presentation skills are very great or barely beginning you should get a lot of benefit and fun out of this. We have no idea how much interest there will be in this workshop, and there are only ten places available, so perhaps best to check with JDR on Friday night or ask at Registration as soon as you arrive.

The International Beer Tasting by Martin Tudor

On Sunday night from 20.00 we will be hosting another in a long series of Novacon Beer Tastings. This year we are returning to the popular early format of BYOB (bring your own beer).

If you wish to take part you need to bring *at least* three bottles of your favourite British or foreign beer to the convention and check them in at the Novacon Registration desk! In return you will receive a "BEER BADGE" which will entitle you to drink the beer at the Tasting on Sunday. (Please remember however, that although we have come to an arrangement with the Britannia regarding corkage for the Tasting this does not extend to you bringing in your own supplies of drink. The Hotel can and will charge corkage to people smuggling food or drink into the hotel!)

If you cannot, for whatever reason, bring beers to the Tasting you can still take part by buying your BEER BADGE for £4.50 from Novacon Registration.

Please note that *all* Novacon members are welcome to attend the Tasting on Sunday. The convention is supplying an assortment of exotic and/or unusual non-alcoholic drinks at the Tasting, which will be free to all Novacon members,

but please note that only those with BEER BADGES will be entitled to drink the beer.

To get the ball rolling the convention hopes to lay on two local beers on draught, Enville White (OG 1042, ABV 4%) and Sarah Hughes Dark Ruby Mild (OG 1058, ABV 6%), as well as a few interesting bottles - the rest is up to you! (For further information contact the Beer Tasting Organiser, Tony Berry, in the bar.)

Table d'hôte

In addition to the "Convention Menu" the hotel has an excellent table d'hôte menu of which Birmingham-resident gourmet Rog Peyton said "I don't think I will be going out of the hotel to eat if that is an example of the menu", and it is reasonably priced at £14.50 for three courses.

The table d'hôte menu will be available 19.00-21.30 on Friday and Saturday. You should find booking forms detailing the menu in your convention pack on arrival. If not ask at either the Hotel Reception or at the Novacon Registration Table.

Drink

We will not be using Harvey's as a bar apart from the Brian Aldiss Signing Session and Andromeda Party on Friday night. The main convention bar is the Malvern and Malvern Bar on the 2nd floor (please note that the smaller section, the Malvern "Bar" is a no smoking area). In addition we will be using the Warwick bar on the 9th floor to serve drinks to those taking part in or watching the programme. Opening times are as follows:

Malvern/Malvern Bar: Friday and Saturday 11am to 2am and Sunday 11am to 9pm.

Warwick Bar: Friday 6pm-2am, Saturday and Sunday 11am to 2am.

The Real Ale we have arranged for the Britannia to supply for the weekend has been changed to Everards' Tiger Best Bitter (OG 1041, ABV 4.2%) and that will

sell at £1.85 per pint. John Smith's Smooth Pour and Foster's lager will be sold at £1.50 per pint. Beamish Black is also available at £2.10 per pint. Unfortunately the hotel cannot do draught cider, but will sell bottled cider, both sweet and dry, at £1.00 per bottle. As an added bonus the bars will be selling chocolate, Cadbury's as it is local but this will include Bournville for real chocolate lovers.

General Information

Novacon Table

The Novacon Registration table will be open:

Friday: 4pm-9pm for N28 Registrations ONLY.

Saturday: 10am-2pm and 3pm-7pm for all Novacon/BSFG business

Sunday: 10am-2pm for all Novacon/BSFG business

From Saturday morning onwards the table will be: selling a variety of Novacon merchandise and publications from previous Novacons; selling badges for the Beer Tasting (£4.50 per person or your 3 bottles of beer); selling memberships to Novacon 29 (just £23.00 at Novacon 28, rising to £28.00 after the con); raffle tickets in aid of the RNIB's Books for the Blind Project; taking money for the Birmingham SF Group's Beer & Skittles evening.

Dealers' Room

This is in the Chiltern on the 2nd floor and will be open from 10am until 6pm Saturday and 10am until 4pm on Sunday. It may be open at sometime on Friday. Times are subject to change.

The Art Show

This is in the Stafford on the 9th floor and will be open from 10am until 6pm on Saturday and on Sunday from 10am until the Art Auction starts at noon.

Gophers

If you *have* volunteered to be a gopher or if you *wish* to volunteer please report to CHRIS MURPHY in the Ops Room (the Lichfield, behind the Novacon Registration Desk). If you *have* volunteered or *wish* to volunteer to help in the Book Room please report to NIGEL FURLONG in the Chiltern.

Raffle

If you wish to purchase tickets for the annual raffle in aid of RNIB's Books for the Blind Project, they will be on sale around the con and from the Novacon Registration table - Saturday onwards. In a change from established tradition,

prizes will not be given out as the draw is made at the Award Ceremony. Instead prizes will be available for collection from a table set up in the Warwick bar *after* the ceremony.

Badges

As non-convention hotel guests will be using the restaurant - for the table d'hôte menu you **MUST** wear your convention badges at all times in the public and convention areas of the Britannia. If you do not you may be refused service in the bars and refused food from the Convention Menu. You **WILL** be challenged by our own security staff and prevented from entering the function spaces. The hotel will challenge anyone in the hotel who is not wearing a badge.

As usual the badges are colour coded. Full members are white, Friday members pale yellow, Saturday members pink, Sunday members white, Tech Ops and Gophers green, committee orange Guest of Honour mid blue, BSFG Friday members pale blue, beer badges bright yellow.

Operations

As we are sure most of you are aware Novacon, like most conventions in Britain, is run by volunteers and we can't have too many of them! So if you are willing to help out at the convention - anything from moving chairs to helping with tech ops or working on the programme, please contact our Ops Manager, Chris Murphy, in the Ops Room or volunteer at the Novacon Registration Table (both Ops and Registration are in the Lichfield on the 2nd floor).

A Baby Sitting & Child Minding Service

Is being provided, on a privately arranged basis, by Richard Standage, a registered nurse working at the highly prestigious Birmingham Children's Hospital, and Helena Bowles, registered nurse at the totally non-prestigious Birmingham Heartlands hospital, who are attending Novacon with their four-year-old son and one-year-old daughter. They can be contacted via the Novacon Registration Desk.

No Smoking

We would appreciate it if you refrained from smoking in designated "No Smoking" areas such as: the Chiltern/Dealers' Room (apart from dealers), the Stafford/Art Show, the Malvern Bar, and the Gloucester/Main Programme.

Dire Warnings

Please remember that the Britannia Hotel is in the business of selling accommodation, drink and food for profit. Neither the management of the Britannia nor the Novacon committee will approve of people "crashing" in rooms they haven't paid for, and/or smuggling food/drink into the hotel. The Novacon committee will obviously support the hotel in any dispute with members of Novacon caught "crashing" and/or "smuggling".

Wheelchair Access by Pat McMurray

As you will have noticed the main entrance to the Britannia comprises a revolving door, leading to a small landing at the top of three stairs down to the ground floor reception. There is also a fire exit which can be opened from the inside, which leads to the same small landing. It appears possible to get an ordinary manual or powered wheelchair through the fire exit onto the landing. The hotel have a ramp for the three steps which they will lay down for the weekend. The fire exits are alarmed, but we'll ask them to switch the alarm off for the weekend. In the nature of things they will almost certainly forget to do these things, and switch the alarms on and take the ramp up at every shift changeover, but we shall do our best.

If you have a scooter or large trolley which cannot get through the fire exit, the revolving door can be completely folded back to allow very good access. I have been shown how to do this, and intend to train every gopher and anyone else who's interested in it, how to do it. The hotel have shown every sign of being helpful and friendly, but best to be prepared. I would expect that the ramp will be down and the doors open most of Friday afternoon as the dealers come in and out as well.

The hotel has 11 floors - ground floor reception, Mezzanine bar area, which we probably won't use, 1st floor restaurant which we will use, 2nd floor main con bar, dealer's room, Ops and registration, 8th floor workshops, 9th floor artshow, smaller bar and programme room. All other floors are bedrooms and there are bedrooms on the 2nd and 8th floors as well.

There are three lifts to each floor - two public lifts and one staff lift. There are also fire escape stairs between all floors and public stairs between the ground, mezzanine and first floors. Both public lifts and all public rooms appear both wheelchair and scooter accessible. We've calculated that it will take ten minutes for the entire membership to travel by lift from the second to the ninth floor - we have fifteen minute intervals between most programme items. The staff lift can

be used by the membership, but appears very difficult for wheelchair access - I'd stick to the public lifts.

All the public areas on each floor are flat, with no stairs. Many of the doors are on springs and may prove difficult to open without assistance. Most entrances to public rooms are double doored and will be left open where possible. The artshow and dealers room appear large enough that they should not be crowded and manoeuvring should be reasonable.

The hotel has certain bedrooms they provide to people with access difficulties. None of them are fully accessible. All the bedroom doors are standard width, but they can remove the bathroom doors, if requested. I would suggest contacting the hotel in advance to make doubly sure they are aware of any potential difficulties. I believe wheelchairs will be able to get into the rooms, but I don't think scooters will be able to. It should be possible to get the hotel to take care of a scooter and recharge it overnight.
