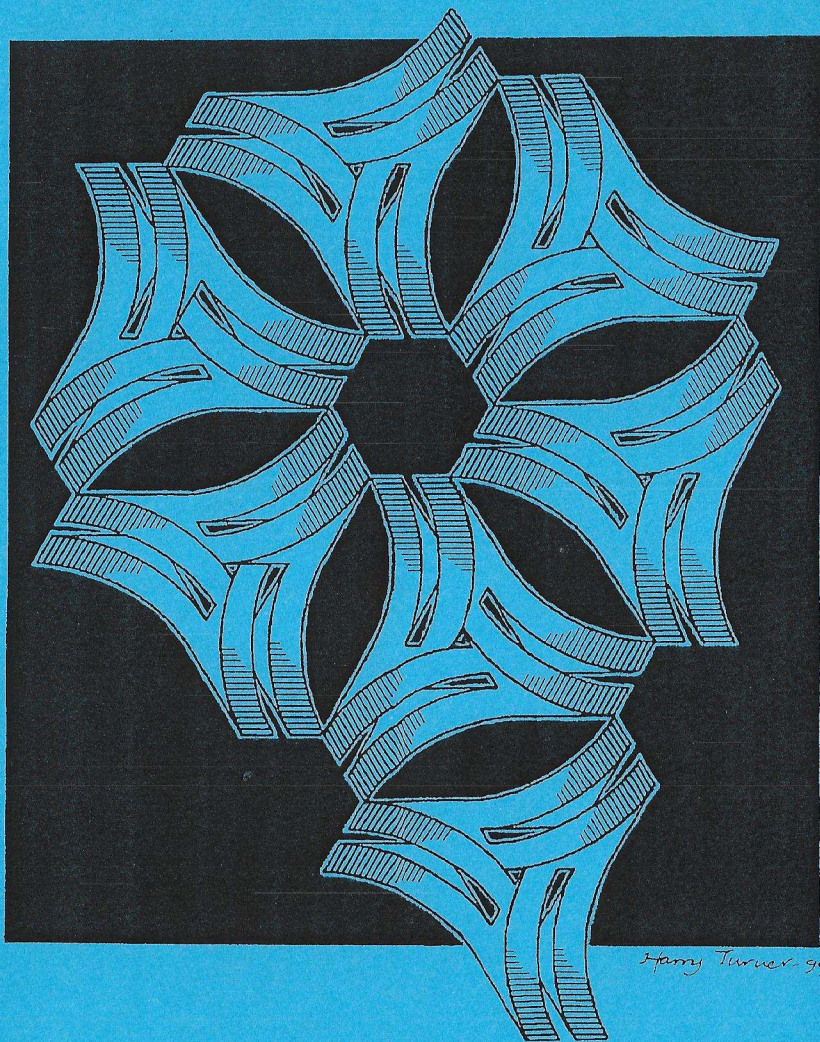

A Bad Spell by Ian Stewart

The Galactic Supercluster Patrol does not officially recognise the existence of magic, for to do so would contravene the strict scientific rationality upon which its very existence is based. From time to time, however, there occurs a case that lacks any coherent scientific explanation.

Such cases are seldom made public.

This is one of them.

In the outer reaches of the Rim Zone orbited the triple worlds of Gog, Magog, and Demagog. Gog was a dead world, scarred by some ancient final battle. Magog and Demagog had sunk into a degenerate and barbarous state.

The Band

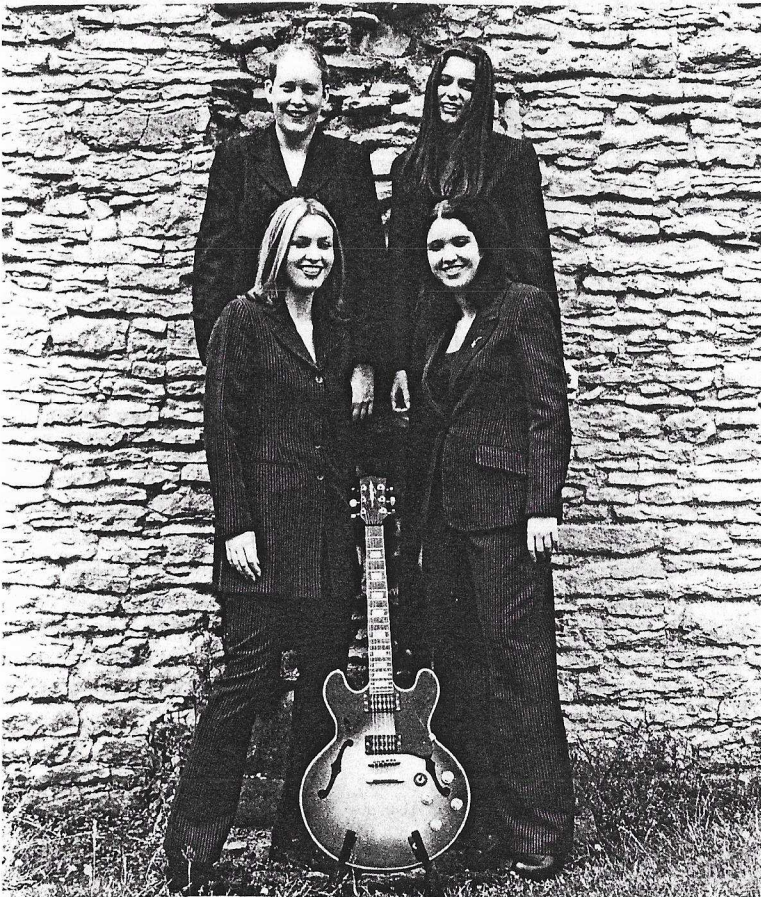
On the Saturday night of Novacon we will be introducing a new band to the sf convention circuit – ONYX.

Onyx have been together for about two years and were previously known as Four Peace Sweet (*ouch*). They are now a five piece all female band, (so the photos below are slightly out of date) with a line up of lead/rhythm/bass guitar, two keyboards and drums. The band play mainly pop/rock music with a strong vocal harmony content. They also perform several numbers in their set cappella. Their set includes covers from the 60's through to the present day popular songs and several original numbers written by them.

In June 1998 they were the winners of the Dudley Rock Festival, as a result of which they were able to record a cd at the Depp International Studios in Birmingham. Since then they have been performing regularly at local clubs in the Midlands area, including the Robin 1 at Merry Hill, the Robin 2 at Bilston and the Shed at Brierley Hill.

They have appeared on television in Midlands Today, in a feature with a group called Black Voices, a well known international cappella group of singers. More recently, in May, they appeared in a half hour programme with the BBC which featured them as an up and coming band.

In March this year they were selected to play at a commercial music convention being held at the NEC Birmingham, over a period of three days as representatives of young local bands. They have future bookings at various venues in the Midlands area including Ronnie Scotts night club in Birmingham.
