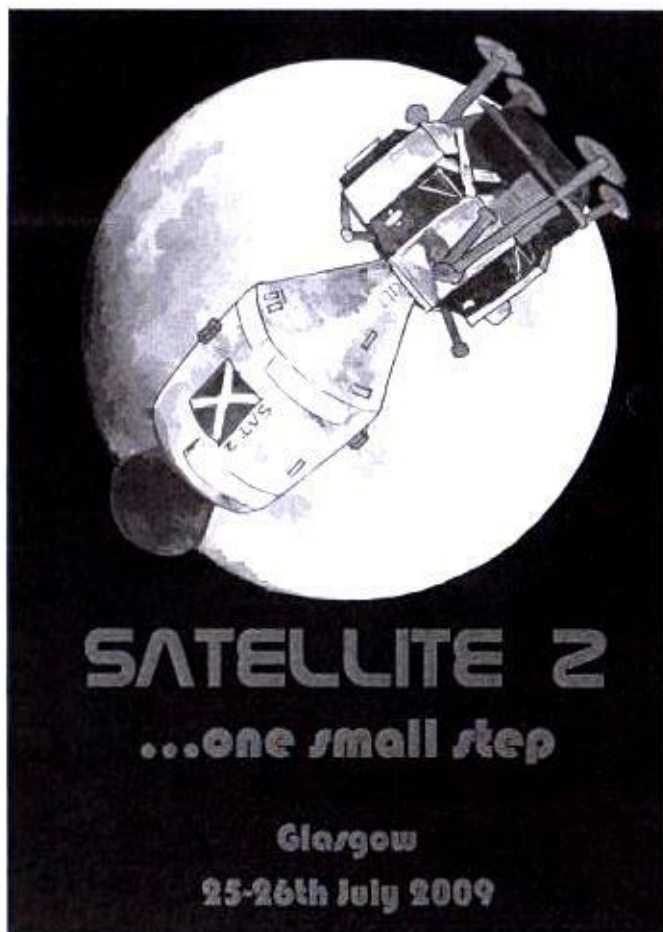

PROGRAMME

The programme is the heart of any convention, and ours aims to feature a wide variety of items to appeal to all fannish tastes, from SF to space science and from the fairly serious to the very silly! Highlights include:

Guest of Honour

Iain M Banks will be giving us a sneak preview of his new novel *Transition*, due for publication in September 2009, and tells us about things that really get his goat in *GoH Room 101*.

Talks

A diverse range of speakers have been recruited, including artists, authors, scientists and engineers. Dave Woods recounts the history of the Apollo Space Programme whilst astronomer Robert Law will look at the prospects for a *Return to the Moon*. There will also be talks on *Inadvisable Rocket Science*, *How Science Produces Art*, and a personal reflection, *We and the Moon*, by well-known Glasgow fan Ed Buckley.

Panels

We plan panels on how the moon has been portrayed in both literary and media SF and discussions on the *Future of Space Exploration*. We turn the spotlight on Iain M Banks' Culture asking *It may be a Techno-utopia but would you want to live there?* Some Grumpy Old Fan tell us why fandom just ain't what it used to be, and we consider *SF Things I Wish I'd Never Thrown Away*. Everyone has the chance to design their ultimate 'dream' convention in *Fantasy Football Con*. Our money's on Arthur C Clarke to beat Jules Verne for the coveted GoH spot in injury time!

Workshops

Alex Holden oversees *Chaos Modelling*, a chance to build your own Lunar Lander from household junk. Munchkin challenges teams to *Fake Your Own Moon Landing* and David McIntee presents *Martial Arts on the Moon*.

Games and Quizzes

Our sister Glasgow convention, *Albacon*, will run an SF music quiz, whilst our very own Mad Elf will oversee one more round of the popular *Finding Uranus*, plus a new game, *One Small Step*, in honour of 2009 also being the 40th anniversary of Monty Python. Come prepared for much hilarity, running around and stomping!

Evening Events

Saturday evening features a disco with the theme *Beach Party on the Shore of the Sea of Tranquility*. Come in swimwear, a spacesuit, a Hawaiian shirt...or all three! On Sunday there will be the traditional *Dead Laika* (i.e. Dog) Party with a pub quiz hosted by Daig...for anyone still standing.

TRAVEL AND LOGISTICS

Opening Ceremony:	approximately 10:30 am Saturday 25 th July
Closing Ceremony:	approximately 6:00 pm on Sunday 25 th July

How to get there:

Trains: Glasgow has two major railway stations in the city centre. Glasgow Central Station is the destination for west-coast main-line trains from the south. Trains from the north and most services via Edinburgh (including some of those originating on the east-coast main-line) arrive at Glasgow Queen Street Station. The Crowne Plaza is less than 2 miles from the city centre and a taxi should cost no more than £4.

The nearest public transport to the hotel is a train on the Argyle Line from Glasgow Central Low-Level Station to Exhibition Centre railway station. On exiting the station, turn sharp right and take the covered walkway to the SECC. The hotel is straight ahead.

Planes: The hotel is 8 miles from Glasgow International Airport, which is served by direct connections from most major UK airports and by a variety of airlines, including budget operators such as *Easyjet*. A taxi from the airport will cost about £15.

... and Automobiles: The hotel is adjacent to the Scottish Exhibition and Conference Centre (SECC), the Clyde Auditorium (known locally as the 'Armadillo') and the (in)famous 'Squinty Bridge'. The M8 motorway runs close to the venue and the SECC exit is junction 19.

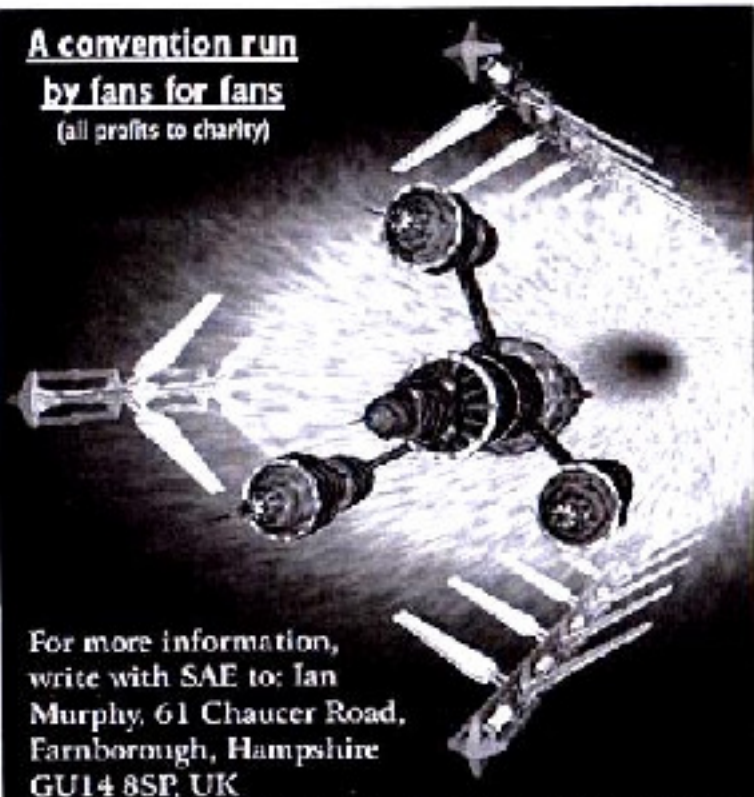
