


CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE: Why FANtasm?

This year's name, FANtasm is an indication that the traditional fans are our focus. This convention is an attempt at an event that tries to appeal to those fans, and includes elements of newer popular culture to keep things fresh

We are at a crossroads in the world of traditional Science Fiction / Fantasy conventions. Both the internet and specifically social media has changed the landscape of conventions in an extreme way.

Clearly, there are two animals, the Comicon model, which has the advantage of scale such that it can provide dribbles of what traditional Sci-Fi/Fantasy fans want in its mighty wake; and the old-style convention with the much more intimate and targeted experience.

There was a show on PBS recently called "Generation Like". It was a very revealing documentary about how marketing and targeting occurs in the age of social media. It went through the marketing process of the latest "Hunger Games" movie and associated social media ramifications. It was very eye-opening about how marketing works with young adults these days. Things like movie posters are not what youngsters look for. By doing things like posting reconstructed videos, the new-style fan can accumulate points. If they gain a zillion points, they can expect a congratulatory message from one of their favorite actors. This is what they are looking for. Personal interaction with actual human beings can be expensive and scary.

Do we really want to mimic this stuff that seems necessary to recruit youngsters? Could we do it, even if we decided to? It seems that everybody wants the traditional conventions to keep happening, but few want to help when it comes down to actually expending time and energy on making them work. This kind of thing has happened with Anizona, CopperCon, LepreCon, etc. Even WesterCon, and NASFiC are showing signs. The situation is similar to the story of the Little Red Hen, in which everyone wanted to eat the bread, but no one wanted to do the work of making it. This must stop for our culture to continue. People that want to see traditional conventions thrive are going to have to support them, or forget it, and be satisfied with Comicon.

Last year's CopperCon: Revolution was an attempt at a mini-Comicon. It was less than well-received by both traditional fans, and the hoped-for new order. We are back now at our roots, where we came from, for another grand experiment. This is a smaller, more tightly run ship. Let's see it into port.



FILM FESTIVAL

Returning after a successful screening at last year's CopperCon, Hal C F Astell of Apocalypse Later will present another feature length set of international award-winning short sci-fi films on the opening night of the con, many of which can't be seen anywhere else.

This year, each has a slight tinge of horror to tie into the convention theme. Watch what happens when you trust in a post-apocalyptic world in Bonnie Sowle's Arizona short, 'Closed Quarters'. Discover what's going on behind the deceptive 'Bar Talk' in Lowell Northrop's adaptation of a Joe R Lansdale story. Find out what happens when you assume in Justin O'Neal Miller's cloning story, 'Redemption'.

This set will run around ninety minutes and feature films from multiple countries. The event is free and open to the public.

Also, on the Saturday night, those with con memberships can experience Hal's personal favourite feature film of all time, Peter Jackson's debut, 'Bad Taste'.

It's a gory but comedic tale of what happens when aliens decide that human flesh is the new taste sensation and they package up a New Zealand township into cardboard boxes to take back to space and make into burgers. Tasked with fighting for the human race are a misfit band of Kiwis with personality disorders.

Made over three years on weekends with a bunch of mates, 'Bad Taste' is where Peter Jackson learned much of the art of filmmaking that he put to use in later work, but without a fraction of the budget. You won't see the magic effects of the 'Lord of the Rings' movies here, but you'll see just as much glorious imagination.

100 percent of the students and their families are at or below the poverty line and a vast majority of the students are homeless. There are approximately 350 students, grades K-9, being educated on its grounds. The school provides stability and hope for kids amid a chaotic world of homelessness and hopelessness; many of the children live in motels, shelters and many live doubled-up. Children First Academy works to provide the necessities, care and attention that so many homeless and low socioeconomic children lack. Their five buses travel over 450 miles a day; changing routes to accommodate the transitional lives of students' families. This provides a consistent and stable environment for their kids. Once a month, food boxes are given to families. As a result of community donations, families receive hygiene kits, clothing, furniture and household items.

At each Phoenix-area convention at which WesternSFA is present there will be a special donation box near the Fan Table area. We will be collecting books to distribute to homeless children. This donation will stock the school library. The age ranges vary, but we would particularly like to see juvenile fiction. Please take some time to clear your shelves and closets of unwanted books and help a child.

We will take anything you bring - if you donate adult fiction, we have an agreement with a local bookseller to exchange adult fiction for juvenile fiction. So keep an eye out for the big Harry Potter donation box.

Hygiene items are also greatly needed. You could throw in any soap and shampoo you might have picked up at any hotels.



Some of his Battletech books were used as the source for a television animated series. He was then selected to write several novels in the Star Wars universe for Bantam Books. He also wrote several comics based in the Star Wars universe for Dark Horse Comics. These covered the period just before his X-Wing novels. Later he covered the marriage of Luke Skywalker and Mara Jade in Union and collaborated with Timothy Zahn on Mara Jade's early career. The Age of Discovery trilogy is his latest complete series, with A New World released mid-2007. The trilogy is set in a fantasy world, with an attempt at an unconventional approach to magic and mastery. The Crown Colonies is a new original trilogy that re-imagines the events of the American Revolutionary War. The first book, At The Queen's Command, was released in November 2010. At New York Comic Con 2012, it was revealed that Blizzard Entertainment had approached Stackpole to write the next novel in their series based on the popular MMORPG, World of Warcraft.



Ken St. Andre has been coming to local SF cons since they started in Phoenix - in fact, he helped organize the first LepreCon here and still remembers the first Westercon in Phoenix when Harlan was GoH. The highpoint of that Con for Ken and friends was taking Fritz Leiber to supper. 2013 has been a big year for Ken with the Deluxe Tunnels and Trolls Kickstarter project--not quite finished yet, but a ton of updates and new stuff already made, the republication of a revised and reillustrated 2nd edition of Griffin Feathers under the Trollhalla Press imprint an article in Gygax Magazine and several other publications in the last 2 years. 
