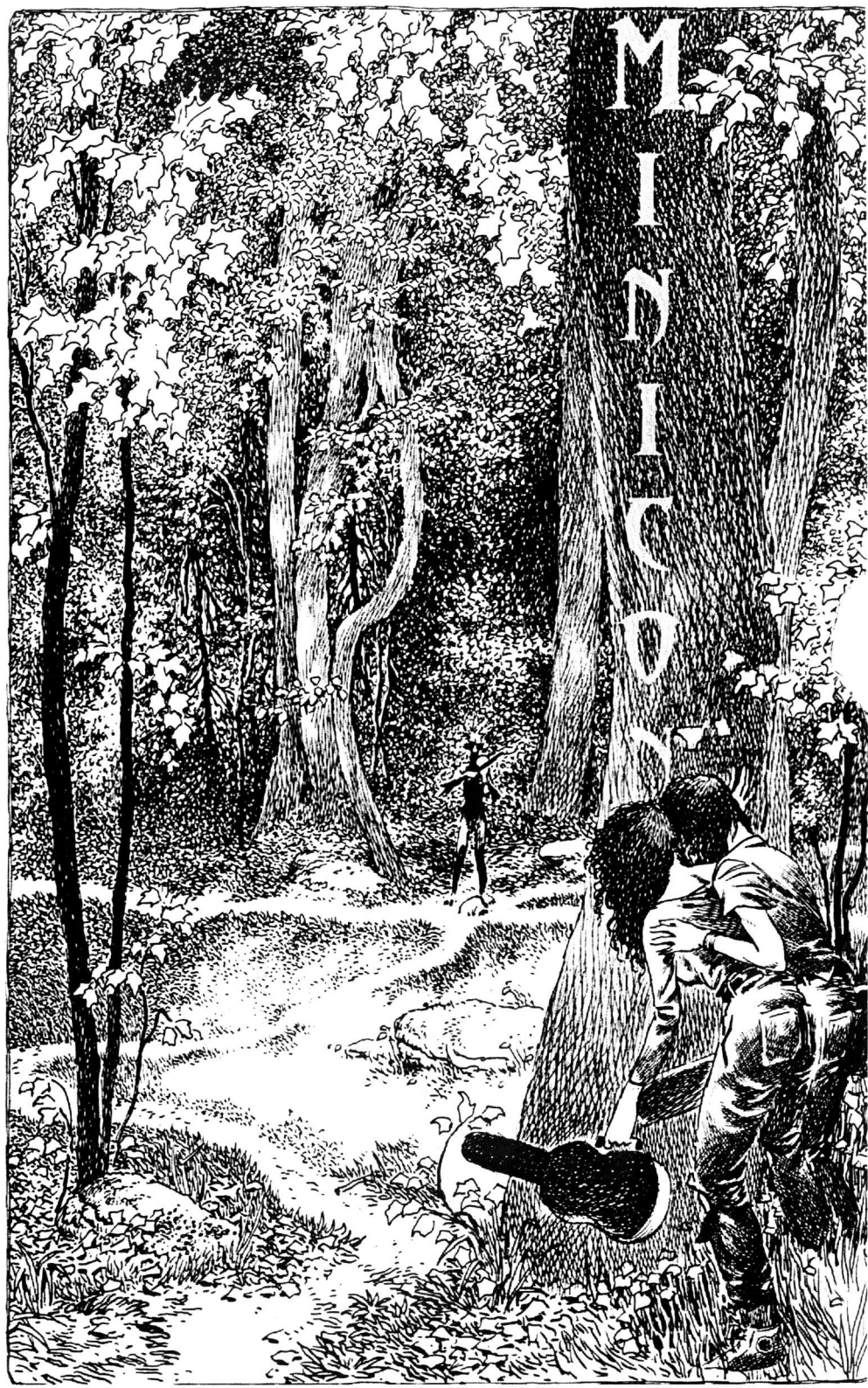

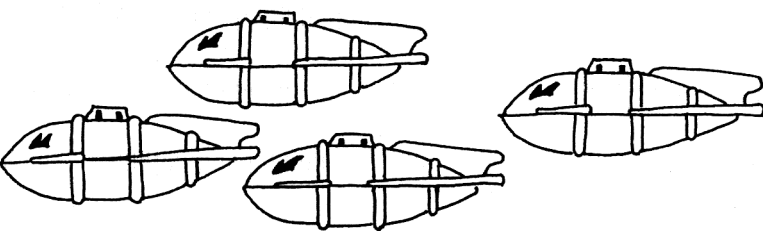
Registration

Charles de Livr

was born in the town of Bussum in the Netherlands on December 22nd, 1951. In his early years, he grew up in a variety of places, including Britannia (Ontario), Western Canada, Quebec, Turkey, and Lebanon, before his family finally settled in Lucerne.

During that time, Charles began to read voraciously and widely. Initially interested in mythic matter and folklore, his reading soon branched out into Tolkien, Lord Dunsany, William Morris, James Branch Cabell, E.R. Eddison, Mervyn Peake, Lin Carter, and Thomas Burnett Swann. After later becoming interested in Robert E. Howard, Lovecraft, and Clark Ashton Smith, Charles finally discovered Science Fiction by way of Andre Norton, Clifford Simak, and Roger Zelazny, among others. With such a start, it will surprise no one that Charles' reading remains eclectic; anyone who has read his monthly book review column in *The Magazine of Fantasy & Science Fiction* will have seen first-hand how widely this man's tastes range.

It may then come as a surprise (at least to those who haven't heard him play) that Charles didn't originally consider making a living as a writer, but instead aspired to become a musician. His love of Celtic music came before its popularity was spread by Worldbeat, the Pogues, Spirit of the West, and other pioneers of the art, and for fourteen years Charles worked in a variety of record stores during the day and played gigs on weekend.

Although he wrote for personal pleasure during these years, it wasn't until the mid-seventies that Charles began to write seriously. Even that came about by chance: an anti-friend, John Charette, would draw, and Charles began to write stories for him to illustrate. John showed some of these to another writer, Charles K. Saunders, who, in turn, convinced Charles to send some of his work out to various small press magazines, where his first stories sold for all of \$10.

During the next six or seven years, Charles continued to work in record stores, played music, and wrote stories and novels, most of which came back unpublished. Finally, Andy Offutt picked up novella "The Fane of the Grey Rose" for his *Swords Against Darkness* series (which piece later grew into the novel *The Harp of the Grey Rose*).

In 1980, Charles married his lovely wife, MaryAnn, who convinced him to push his stories out of lairic forests and into city streets, and also to have a go at writing full-time. He sold three novels that year, and the rest of history past, and history yet to come.

Today, Charles and MaryAnn work and play together in word, song, and art; warp and weft in a tapestry of their own weaving.

Charles Vess

was born in 1951 in Lynchburg, Virginia and has been drawing since he could hold a crayon. He drew his first full-length comic when he was 10 and called it "Noemic Man". Minimalist in nature, it required no drawing of hands, feet or heads ("they just glowed"). Since then, he has painstakingly drawn thousands of hands, feet, and heads in great detail. Charles graduated with a BFA from Virginia Commonwealth University, and worked in commercial animation for Candy Apple Productions in Richmond, Va., before moving to New York City in 1976. It was there that he became a freelance illustrator, working for many publications including Heavy Metal, Klutz Press, and National Lampoon. His award-winning work has graced the pages of numerous comic book publishers such as Marvel, DC, Darkstone and Epic. He has been featured in several gallery and museum exhibitions across the nation, including the first major exhibition of Science Fiction and Fantasy Art (New Britain Museum of American Art, 1980) and "Dreamweavers" (William King Regional Arts Center, 1994-95). In 1991, Charles shared the prestigious World Fantasy Award for Best Short Story with Neil Gaiman for their collaboration on Sandman #19 (DC Comics) – the first and only time a comic book has held this honor. In the summer of 1997, Charles won the Will Eisner Comic Industry Award for Best Penciler/Inker for his work on *The Book of Ballads* and *Sagas* (which he self-publishes through his own Green Man Press) as well as *Sandman* #75. Soon after Charles finished the last of 175 paintings for *Standstill*, a novel written by Neil Gaiman, for which he was given the 1999 World Fantasy Award as Best Artist.

In 2002 Charles won a second Will Eisner award, this time as Best Painter for his work on *Rose*, a 130-page epic fantasy saga written by Cartoon Books' Jeff Smith. The year continued to be busy for Charles with the publication of *Seven Wild Sisters* (Subterranean Press) and *The Green Man, Tales from the Mythic Forest* (Viking), both utilizing cover art and interior b/w illustrations by the artist, and both making the 2003 American Library Association's list for Best Books for Young Adults! By the end of the year he had completed 28 paintings for his first children's picture book, *A Circle of Cats*, done in collaboration with writer Charles de Lint (Viking). This cover art won the Gold Award for Best Book Art in the 10th annual "Spectrum: The Best in Contemporary Fantastic Art" even before it was officially published. A new edition of *Peter Pan* (Tor/Sanscape) featuring a cover as well as over 30 b/w interior illustrations by Vess was released this past Fall. Another collaboration with de Lint, *Medicine Road* (Subterranean Press) and the YA anthology *The Fanny Reed* (Viking) will be arriving this spring and he is currently hard at work producing drawings for several new books, including *A Storm of Swords* (Mishra/Merlin), the 25th anniversary edition of *Moontide* (Subterranean Press) and a graphic novel collection of his ballad material for Tor.

Charles and Karen live happily in the Appalachian foothills in a small farmhouse, in a small town, with 4 small cats and a dog with a very small (but loving) brain. Charles' favorite whiskies are the Scottish Highland single malts (such as Glenmorangie or Cragganmore) if you want to get him talking.
