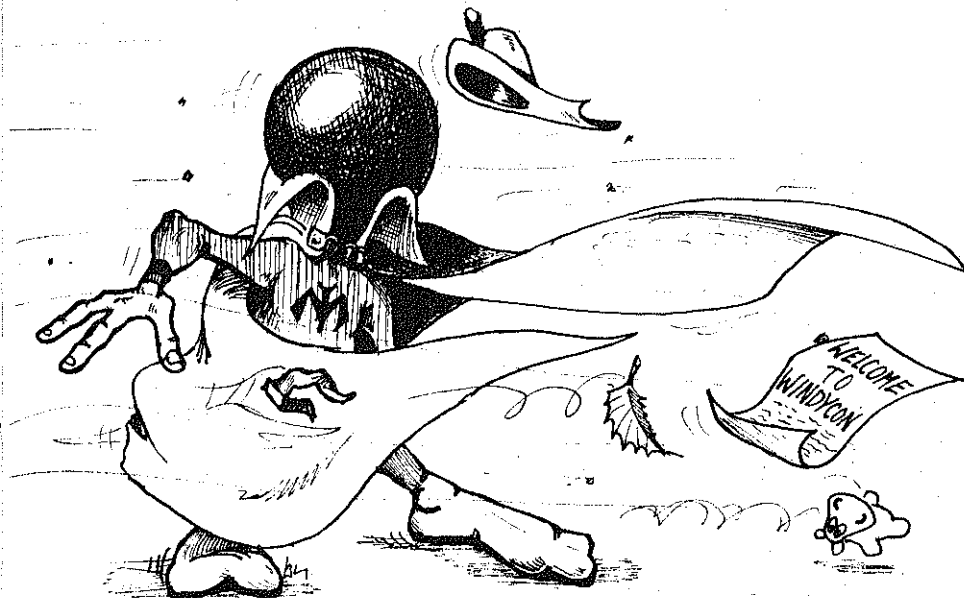

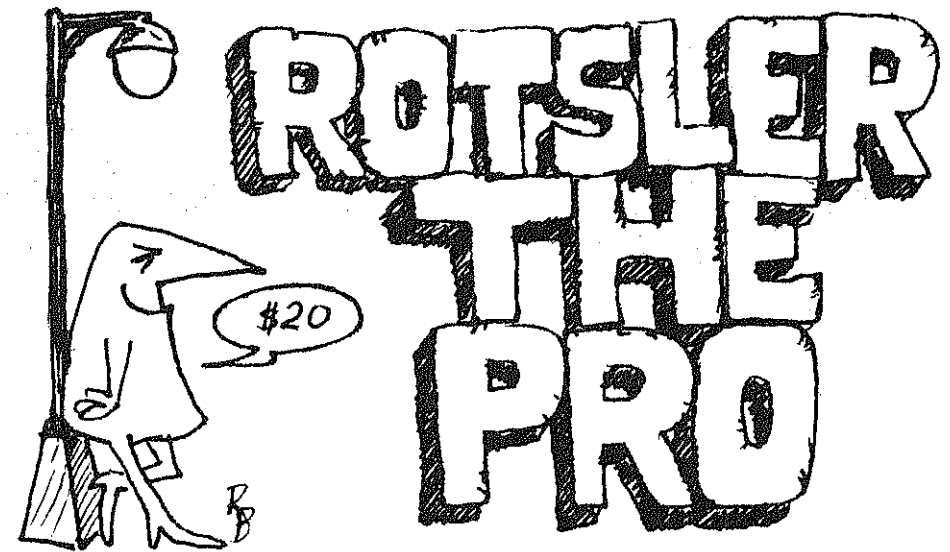
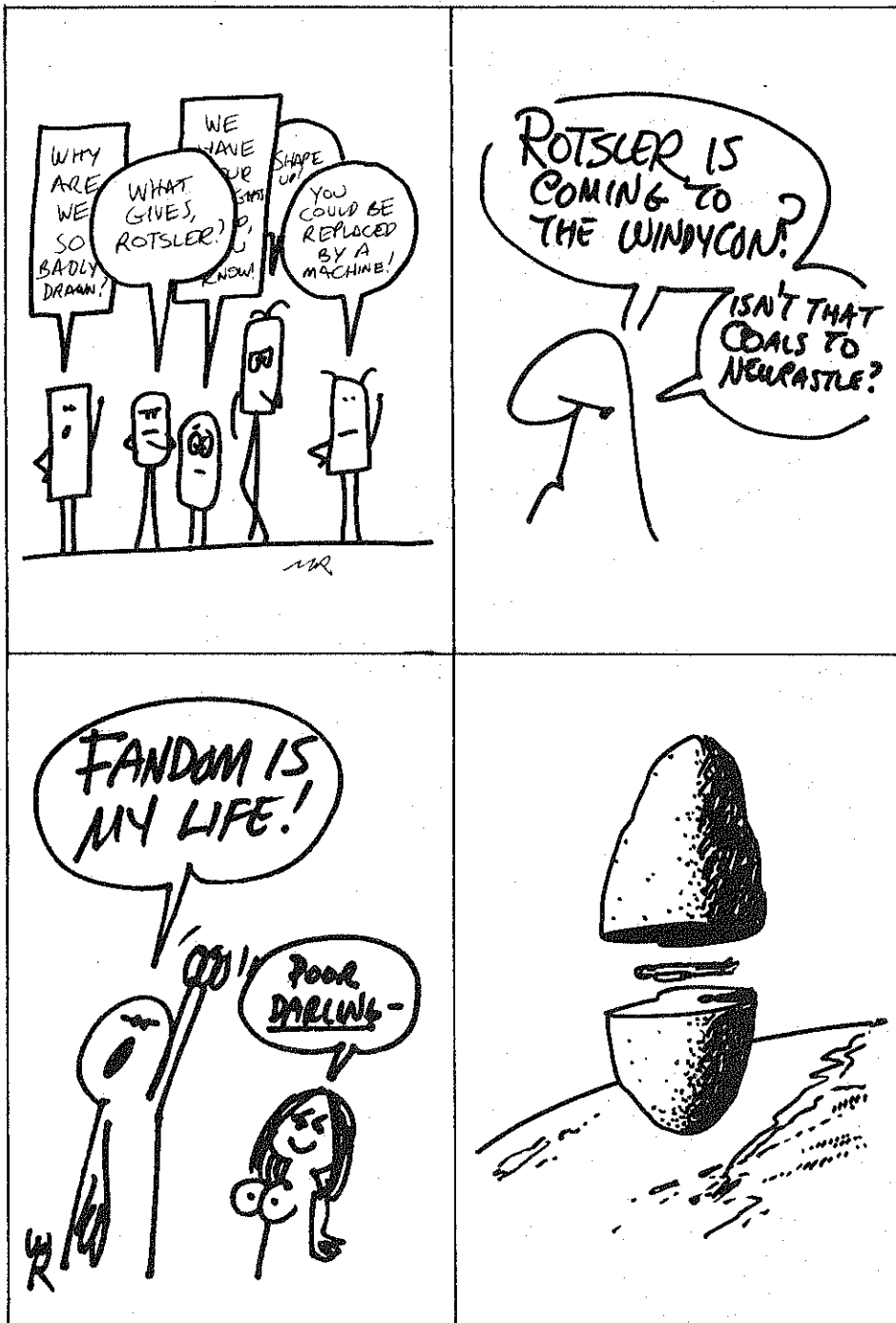

ABOUT WILLIAM ROTSLER

So now he's Pro Guest of Honor at a convention. I don't know why I should be surprised, because Bill Rotsler has been a pro in every aspect of his life as long as I've known him, and I've known him a long, long time. But I suppose we tend to put people in categories and keep them there, even close friends, and to me Bill Rotsler is the publisher of *MASQUE*, *THE GAUDY FANZINE*, and the artist who draws all those elegant little line-drawings that so neatly impale and reveal, and even though I've read his professionally published science fiction with pleasure and respect I can't help thinking of him as a fan.

Which is unjust. His story "Patron of the Arts" was a Hugo and Nebula candidate (and just missed winning), was expanded into a Ballantine novel that won much praise and has been translated into assorted alien tongues, and just the other day the original short version turned up in an Italian prozine. His novel, *TO THE LAND OF THE ELECTRIC ANGEL*, is a rich and robust peek into our crazy future. He has had an assortment of short stories in an assortment of prozines, and even a novelet, "The Raven and the Hawk," in *Analog*, which keys into another part of my youthful programming, because *Analog* used to be *Astounding*, and in my adolescent myth-system you weren't a pro until you had sold a story to *Astounding*. (I felt that way about my own career; nothing I did counted until I was on the contents page of ASF.) If William Rotsler has had a story in *Astounding*, or whatever it's called these days, then William Rotsler is a pro, even if my time-binding instincts tell me he's a fan.

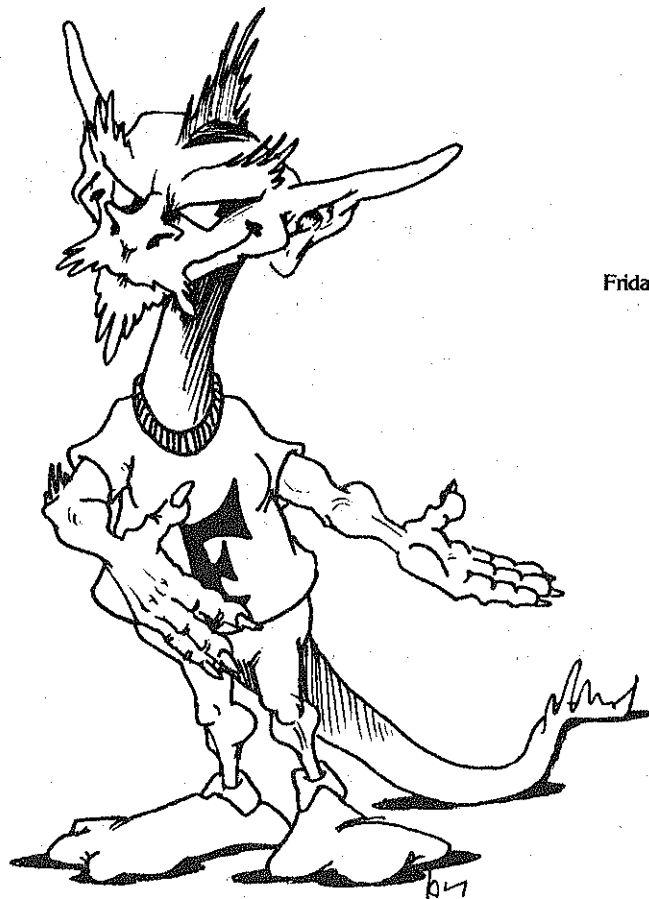
He does tell a fine swashbuckling story in clean, vigorous prose, and I guess that's no small accomplishment. But although I have no wish to put him down as a science fiction writer, it's important to realize that whereas there are plenty of other s-f writers around of equal merit, his other accomplishments are unique and far more worthy of celebration. There are the cartoons, for example—wise, witty, devastating. There are the autobiographical writings, lusty and vivid, circulated only to a privileged few. There is the sly and gentle and not always so gentle humor of the man. There is his fierce and extraordinary devotion to his friends. (There are three people on this planet, I think, who would come to my aid at any hour of day or night, regardless of their own personal circumstances at the moment, if I asked. He's one of them.) There are all sorts of reasons for honoring William Rotsler that have nothing to do with *PATRON OF THE ARTS* or *TO THE LAND OF THE ELECTRIC ANGEL* or even the work he has done under the assumed name of "Philip K. Dick."

But now he is a pro, and an accomplished one, in the field of s-f writing as well. I will suppress my surprise and call for a hearty round of applause. Ladies and gentlemen and things, let's hear it for William Rotsler, Pro Guest of Honor!

FILM PROGRAM

Friday Night:

PHANTOM OF THE PARADISE (20th Century Fox/'75). Director Brian DePalma's second film is a free-style combination of **FAUST** and **THE PHANTOM OF THE OPERA**. Dynamic camera-work, tongue-in-cheek characterizations, a brilliant score by musical munchkin Paul Williams, and narrative by the late Rod Serling make for very lively entertainment. A sinister force lurks in the bowels of the rock palace, Paradise, where a mysterious musical mogul plots the undoing of a gifted young composer and a shady career for the beautiful songstress hungry for fame. Starring Paul Williams, Jessica Harper, and William Finley as the Phantom. (92 min.)

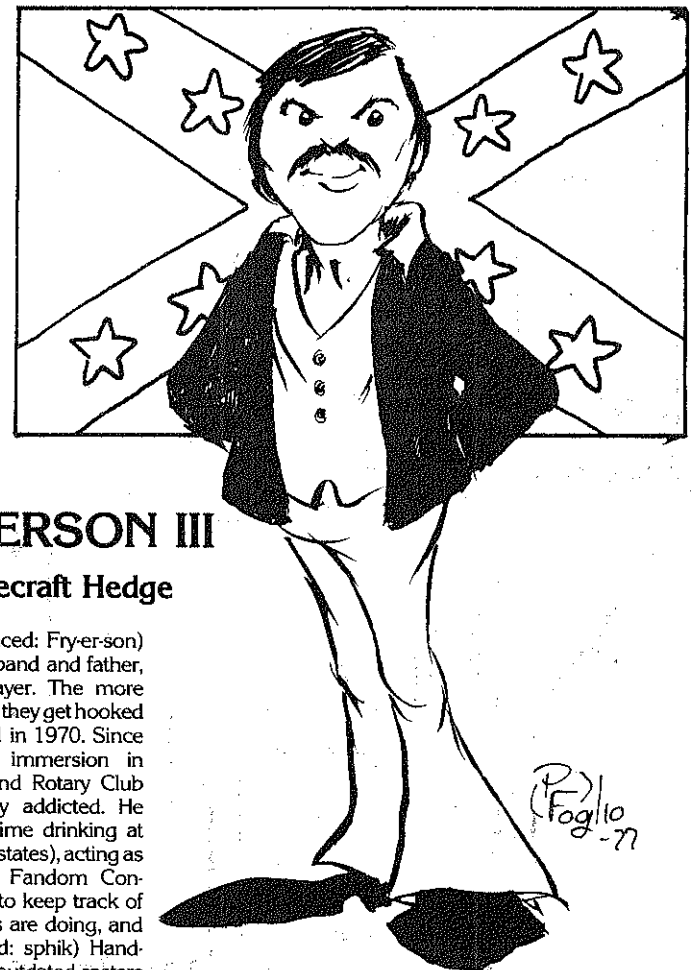


CHUCK JONES . . . Bugs Bunny and Roadrunner . . . Creme de la creme. **WHAT'S OPERA, DOC?**, **HARE WAY TO THE STARS**, **BEEP-BEEP** (original Roadrunner), etc. Rounding out the evening will be a smattering of Warner Brothers cartoons from the fifties and early sixties. They show the recurring genius of a master with his two most well known characters: the venerable Bugs Bunny and Jones' own brain-child, the Roadrunner (Birdibus Zippibus). (all color) (8 min. each)

Saturday Night:

THE SWORD AND THE DRAGON (Russian/dubbed). At the height of the Cold War in the early sixties, the epic was the trend in movies . . . ranging from biblical epics to Steve Reeves tales of ancient super-jocks. The Russians, not wishing to be outdone, promptly released a fantasy epic under the title **THE SWORD AND THE DRAGON**. It swept through the nation's drive-ins for one week and disappeared from sight evermore. The Windycon Film Committee is bringing it back to the new perspective of a Tolkien-bred generation of fantasy fans. **THE SWORD AND THE DRAGON** is repleat with heroes, trolls, wizards, distressed damsels, massive mongol hordes, daring quests, and the grand-daddy of all dragons. All this and a magic sword, too. (95 min.)

PHIL FOGLIO FILM CHOICE FESTIVAL: In the course of Phil Foglio's art education, a great many film animation shorts were presented to Phil and his fellow students that are not generally seen outside of rare film festivals. He has consented to pick out his favorites for a special program of mind-boggling animation and science-fiction concepts in a visual medium. Enjoy, enjoy. (indefinite running time)



MEADE FRIERSON III

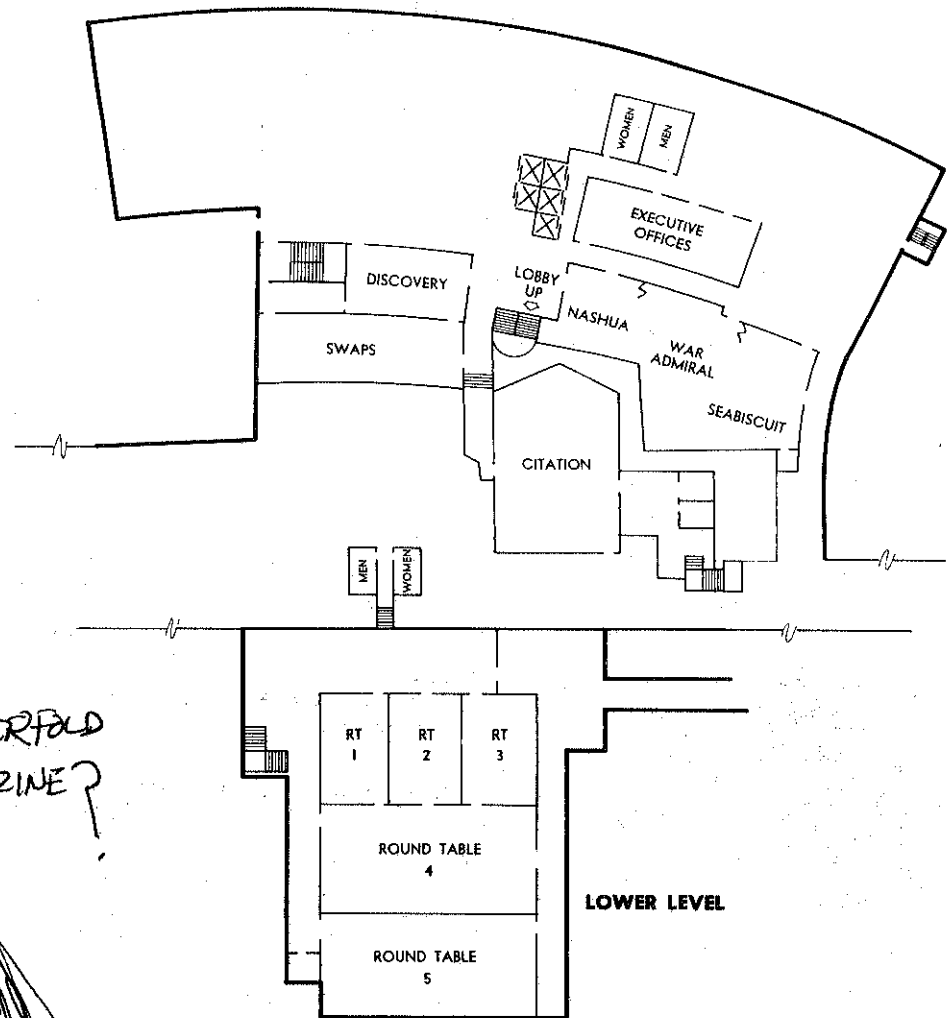
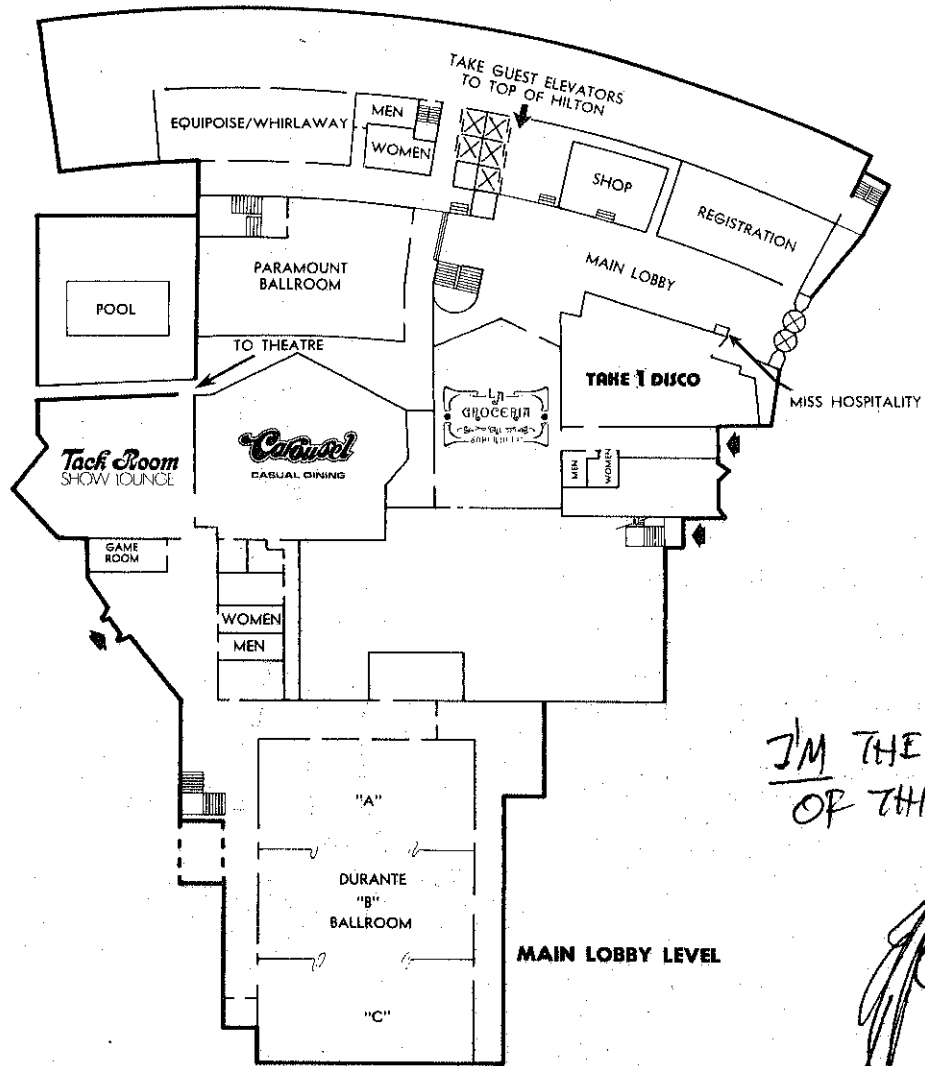

Meade Frierson (pronounced: Fryer-son) started out as a lawyer, husband and father, poet, and stock-market player. The more mundane they are, the easier they get hooked on fandom. He was hooked in 1970. Since the only known cure is immersion in alternating baths of PTA and Rotary Club meetings, I think he'll stay addicted. He spends his copious spare time drinking at cons (mainly in the southern states), acting as President of the Southern Fandom Confederation whereby he tries to keep track of what fans in southern states are doing, and publishes SFC (pronounced: sphik) Handbooks, Bulletins and always-outdated rosters of names and addresses of southern fans. He and wife, Penny, have been known to publish scads of fanzines—from a huge tribute to H.P. Lovecraft to an in-depth study of sf radio shows of the past (yawn)—recently, they formalized these publications as the Huitloxopetl Press (pronounced: puh-ress)—look for forthcoming publications, including my memoirs ala the Futurians.

He has been honored by such things as this con's title more often than he deserves. After all, he once wrote an alternate worlds fanzine that got a 7 from Buck Coulson, but his writing has all been downhill since. He blathers on in 7 to 13 apas and is OE of one (SAPS) at present. He collects artwork, Lovecraftiana, EC comics, and other extrania. He may be the only fan in captivity who neither aspires to, nor has the talent for, professional writing, but he is a self-styled omnifan (or dabbler).

Have fun at this con—I know he will. (But he can't speak worth a damn!)

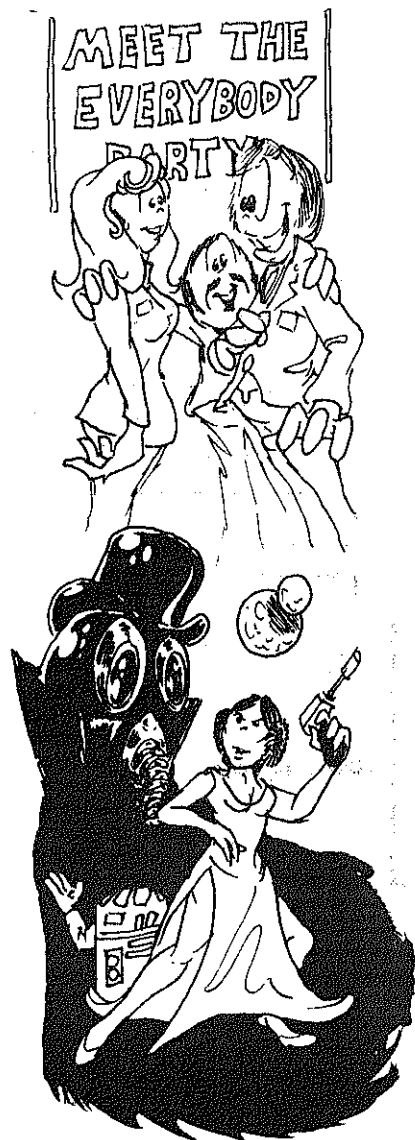

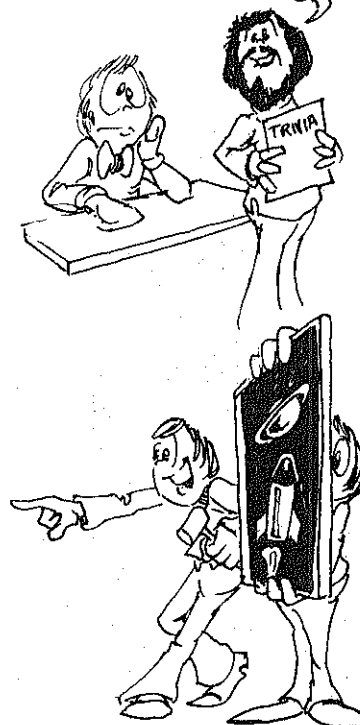

How to Successfully.... Get Conned!

If you have attended a lot of cons, you can stop reading right now. If this is your first or second, we'd like to acquaint you with Windycon. There is a program for your enjoyment. If the panelists do not cover questions you would like to ask and didn't get a chance to during the allotted time, feel free to ask them (courteously) immediately after that program item. Don't ask Sunday morning; they will probably have forgotten what they had been talking about by then. The folks selling in the hucksters' room are mostly fans who hope to help defray their expenses by selling. They will be glad to talk to you about books, and fandom, and make a sale or two. The Art Show is also for your enjoyment, and incidentally, sales. If you wish to bid on any piece of art, please put your name and a bid on the bid sheet or that item will not go up for sale. If you can't afford the things that are up for bid, check the sketch table. The person manning the desk will try to answer your questions about the Art Show.

You probably feel all alone at the con. Everybody seems to know everyone else. You aren't alone. Making friends is up to you. Start a conversation between program items, talk to a stranger at the Art Show, or join in a conversation in the con suite. Those conversations are hardly private and there will be enough variety for you to find a topic you will enjoy and feel comfortable discussing.

The con suite and parties: The con suite is a large open party where fan can meet fan. Liquor is served. Please note that the drinking age in Illinois is 21 for hard liquor and 19 for wine and beer. Please observe that rule. Don't get drunk! Fans will forgive their friends, but no one has much sympathy for a drunken neo.

There will be other parties going on. They fall into two categories: open and closed. Open means just that. The door will be open and everybody is welcome. Closed parties are for close friends only. If you have been invited to one, please don't bring five other people you just met.

There will probably be smoking and no smoking sections in the con suite. Please observe which is what. Some of the open parties may not want smoking, so please check before you light up.

Remember, police take a dim view of smoking anything other than tobacco, and we don't want the con raided.

Fandom is a big family, and like all families it has its fights and jokes. Don't try to join right in until you are sure what is going on. Lou Tabakow may insult Mike Glicksohn and get a laugh. It won't work for you, you aren't family just yet. Don't try to impress folks with caustic wit, insults, and aggressive behavior. They'll just make a note to avoid you in the future.

I hope you have fun at the convention and meet a lot of new friends. If you see my nametag somewhere, say hi.
