For the fourth time we greet you via mail. In 2 more months we will be able to exchange greetings in person. In the last report I mentioned about Ted Carnell coming over from London, England. His last letter advises us that everything is all set; he has booked passage on the Queen Elizabeth to New York. You can count on seeing him at the Convention, now. Since then, we have been contacted by Forest J. Ackerman who informs us that there is now a fan from Australia who is going to try to come to the Convention! He is Stirling Macoboy 39 Aubin St. Neutral Bay Sydney, NSW, Australia. The only hitch with his coming, is building up enough bank credit in the U.S. to qualify him for a Visa. To do this, he has sent Forrie a shipment of books to sell for him. If you are interested in buying a few books for your collection, and at the same time help out a fellow fan get to the convention, you can do double service with your dollar if you will write to Forrie at Box 6151 Metro Station, Los Angeles 55, California.

We receive letters and hints from enthusiastic fans over the country; and it is beginning to look like we will have the best attendance yet for any convention. Our membership continues to mount gradually and has now neared 200 as of the last of June. This is very good when you consider the fact that only 235 joined the TORCON last year. Of this the attendance was 137. However, speaking from the Treasurer's view point, we can still use more advance memberships. To those of you who do not know, it is \$1.00. Mail your dollar to Don Ford 129 Maple Ave. Sharonville, Ohio. There is quite a bit of expense in getting everything ready for the big event. One item alone surprised me when I looked at the list of all expenses; just on 3¢ stamps (not counting the 1¢ and 2¢) we have used a fraction under 900. That rather startled me when I checked the list; but will give you an idea of what we mean when we say we can always use more memberships. The Post Office won't accept an I.O.U. We're not complaining; and we'll get by O.K. but you will help us out, if you can talk your friends into sending that buck, now.

On the latter pages we are reprinting maps of the city, the hotel rates, and their locations. Again, you are warned to get your reservation in soon, if you aspire to a room in the Hotel Metropole, our convention headquarters. Please remember we make no reservations ourselves; you write the hotel of your choice, direct. The various hotels have asked us to remind you to include payment for 1 day in advance in order to insure your reservations. This is on account of the Holiday week-end. So many people in the past have made reservations that they did not pick up, that all of the hotels now ask for the 1 day advance payment as a protective measure.

If you need any of these maps included, or this Report as a reference, you'd

better hang on to this copy as it is the last. There won't be much more news that won't keep; and we can also cut down on the expenses and cut laborers. Instead, we are running off 500 copies of this report and calling it quits until September 3rd.

Our Program Booklet will be Planographed in order to give more freedom in the use of photos; and at the same time it will cut the cost and deadlines down. The number of pages will be determined by the amount of advertising sold. We will have 500 copies run off; but if the advertising runs to only 20 pages, that will be it. The advertising copy is beginning to come in now; and we're handling it on a first come, first served basis with special arrangements to be made only for the cover ads. The rates again: Full page--\$6.00. 1/2 page--\$3.00. 1/4 page--\$2.00. 1/8 page--\$1.00. And Booster ads. at 50¢ each. The deadline is August 1, 1949. Send all money and copy to Stanley C. Skirvin Licking Pike Newport, Kentucky. He is our advertising manager and will take care of that from now until convention time.

Our publicity is coming along pretty good. Due to time limitations, we can't contact every fan editor like should be done. You all have permission to reprint or excerpt anything you care to from this Report. College has let out for the summer, and some of our "spark plugs" have returned home; so we are going to try to have a few stencils made up ahead of time in order that any fan editor writing in, can get a stencil of an ad. merely for the asking. Tucker wrote in saying he wanted a photo, material, etc. for that article in his latest Bloomington News Letter. Those of you with Planographed fan mags, can do something similar if you desire. As for the Professional mags, we've been able to get a few letters printed (we've written all) or a notice inserted. However, to date, there are still one or two we have been unable to crack. This may be somewhat balanced out by a 1500 word article that has been promised us for Amazing's Club House section in either the issue hitting the stands July 10, or Aug. 10. It has been slanted more to the fans who have heard about conventions; but up to now, have never done anything about it. You old timers won't find anything new in the article if you have been reading these Reports; but never the less, it is still a good break for the convention. The more publicity this and future Science Fiction conventions get, the better we will like it.

Have been giving some thought to this Fan Auction. There should be some order of selection set up; so we are going to let all of you guys write to: W. B. Houston 1985 Sutter Ave. Apt. H, Cincinnati 25, Ohio. He will give you a number in the order of mail received. That way, you will know your turn ahead of time and will be a lot better than everyone trying to jump in line ahead of the next person. Might even save a few black eyes. When you write in, give the approximate number of articles you think you will have to offer. For instance: 10 books, 25 mags, 1 original, 25 fan mags etc. We want to get an idea of how much quantity will be offered in total. If there is a tremendous number of fans who are going to enter something in this auction, we may have to ask you to enter your material in small lots. We'll only do this, though if it looks like it might turn out to be an all day affair. Instead of auctioning off one magazine at a time, you might be asked if you'd be willing to auction off say 5 at a time. Does this idea sound fair to you? We'd like to hear some alternate suggestions if you think of anything any better.

For our Main Auction, we have on hand the covers to: THE EYE OF BALMOK & THE ISLAND OF DR. MOREAU. The first is from a '49 issue of Fantastic Novels and is Tempra on cardboard. The second is from the Oct. '46 FFL, and is oil on canvas. Both look good. Wonder how high Harry Moore will go this year? Since he bid \$70.00 last year, I gave him #70 membership in the Convention. Will he get #100

next year ? Tune in on Labor Day, folks, and see what happens next. We also have 16 black and white originals from Mary Gnaedinger of FFM; with more promised for later. Jack Williamson is going to send us the typescript of "...And Searching Mind"; Ralph Milne Farley is also going to send us a typescript of one of his Myles Cabot series----"The Radio Planet". He is also sending quite a quantity of scrapbooks containing Tarzan comic strips. A.E. van Vogt has sent us a copy of "The Weapon Makers" that he used in revising the story for a possible printing by Simon & Shuster. Almost every page has his writing and revisions on it some where. Bob Tucker has sent us a large packet of 8" X 10" photo stills from various Science Fiction movies. Shasta publishers has sent us a very large package of Shasta books and their Galley Proofs, along with sets of color proofs. Erle Korshak has sent us the original manuscripts to 2 chapters out of COSMOS. They're by Eando Binder and Ray Palmer. That's not all; but will give you an idea of what sort of material we will have available for our auction. We want to have a list made out of all the material up for auction, so that we can give everyone a copy at the door. This was done last year at the TORCON and worked out very well. For that reason, we're asking those of you who intend to donate, to please send it in to Don Ford by Aug 1. This will give us some time to work on preparing this list. Of course we won't refuse anything after this date, but it will help us out.

Lee D. Quinn of Box 1199 Grand Central Station, New York 17, N.Y. has an ALL EXPENSE TOUR TO THE CONVENTION for \$55.00. This includes transportation, meals, tips, & hotel. You leave New York at 5:00 P.M. the night before, and arrive at 8:35 the morning of the convention. The tour originates in New York. For you fans in New York, this sounds like a pretty good deal. We figure at this end it will cost \$25.00 for meals and hotel. For more information, write Lee at the above address.

Our mail box has been receiving some pretty strange items in the past few years. More so, after the TORCON, but the one reproduced here in this issue, beats them all.

The tentative line up of the program is included here. Please remember that it is not set; and will remain elastic for a couple of months yet. If you have some constructive criticism that can be exercised in time for the convention, we will be glad to hear it. The more things we can get ironed out before the convention starts, the better it will please the majority. The time on the various authors' speeches is not set too rigid. Some may talk only 5 minutes; others 1/2 hour. It's up to them. We do feel that the average length will run about 15-30 minutes with the exceptions of the Guests Of Honor; which may be more. We are going to try to let the thing run along as spontaneous as is practical; and still manage to get everything included.

That's about all I can think of for now. The preparations are made; and I'll be seeing all of you when the curtain goes up at 1:00 P.M. Sept 3rd at the Hotel Metropole, Cincinnati, Ohio. To those of you coming in the day before, I'll be on hand at the hotel to greet you. I'm afraid I might miss something, so I'm going to take a room there, myself.

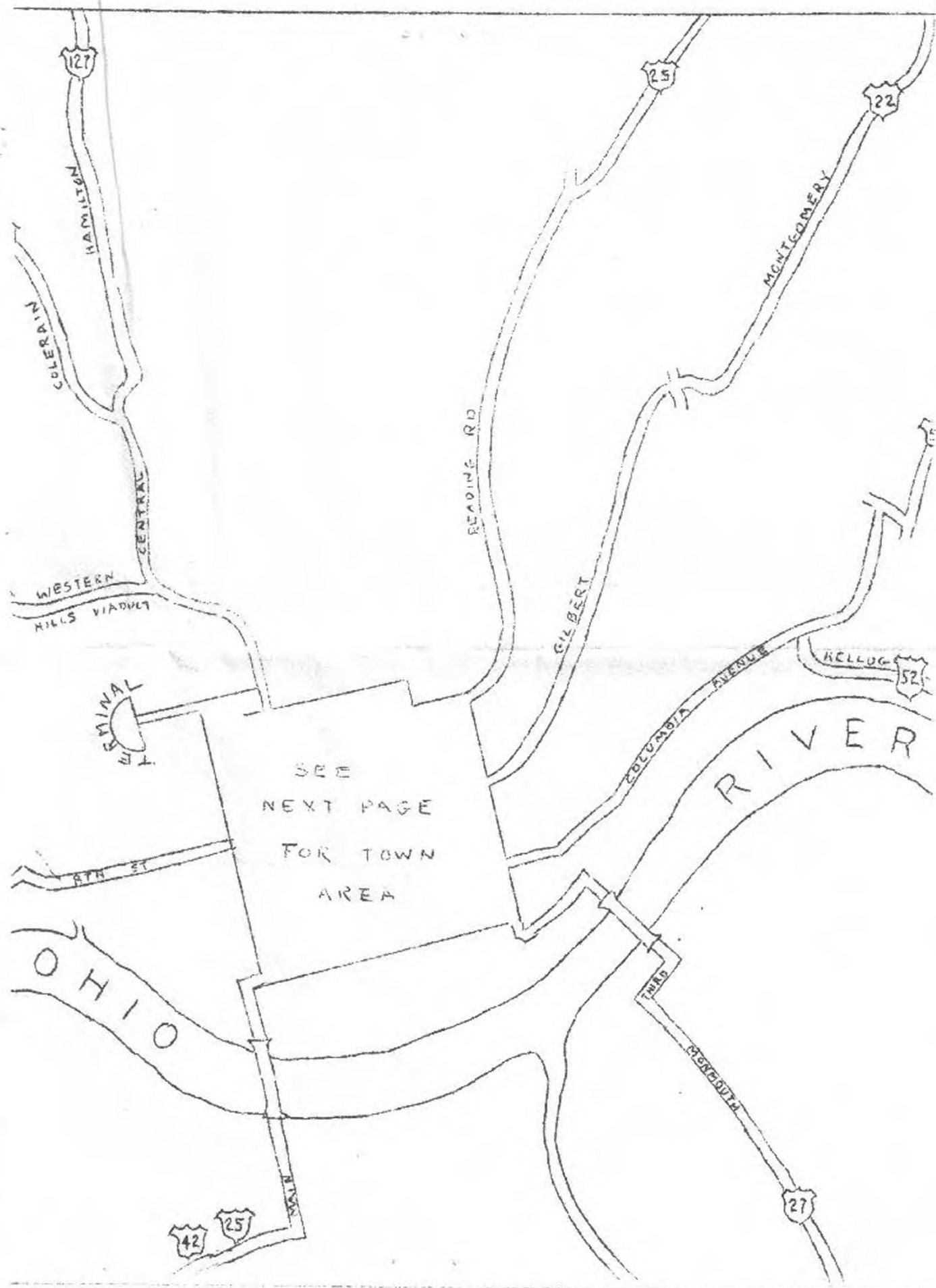

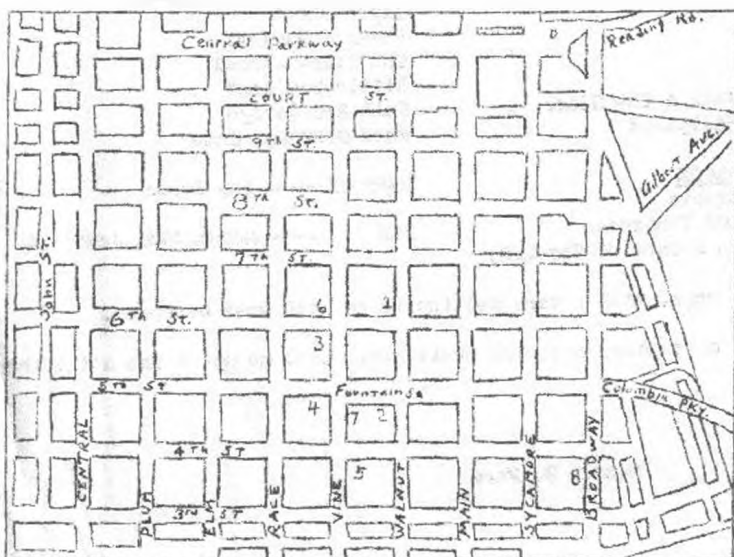

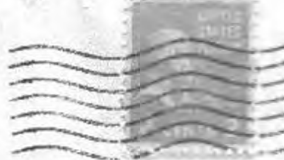
