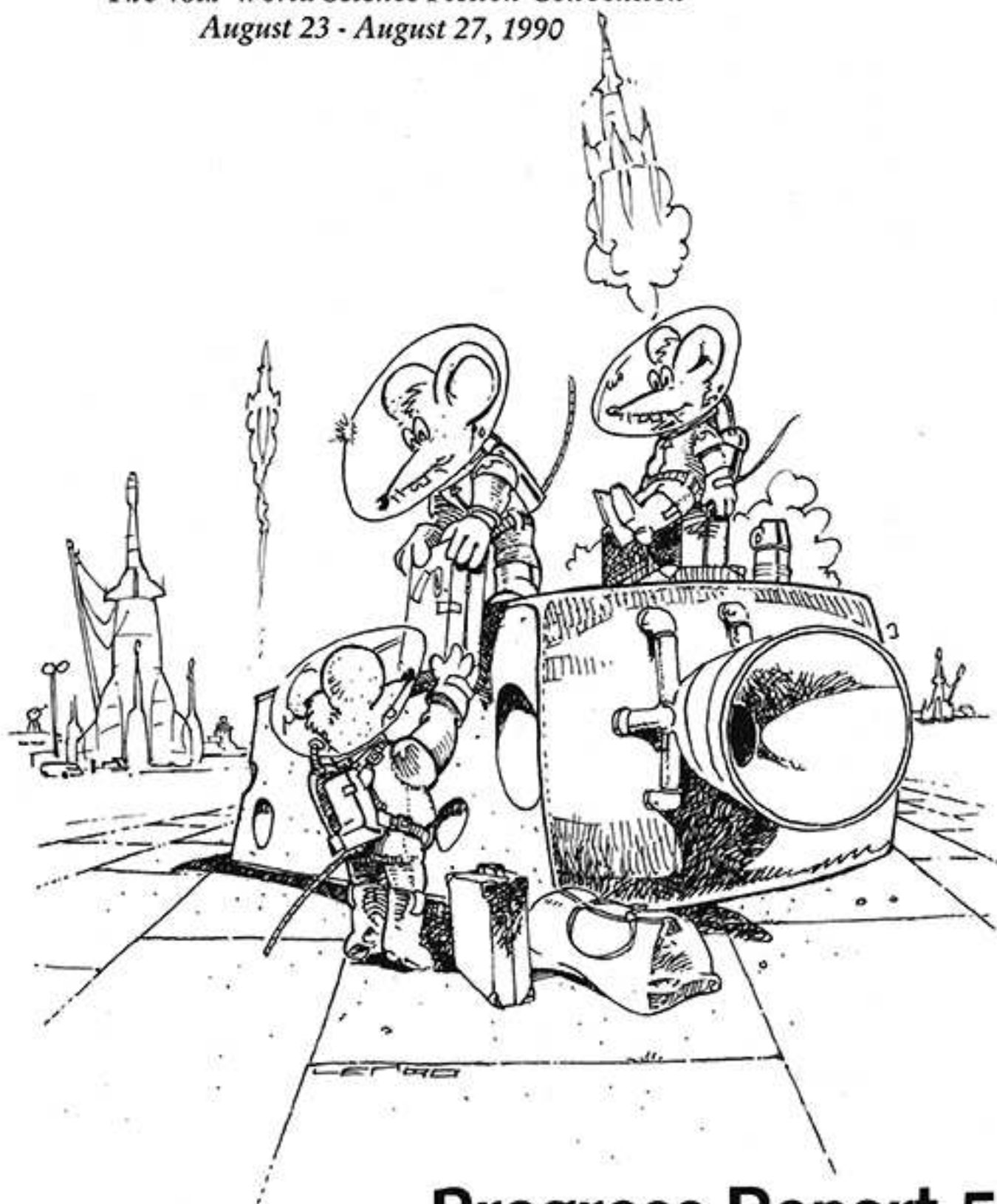

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Captain's Log

If you fail to do so, your cheque and ballot will be returned to be made out again with correct form of payment.

Both the Art Show and the Dealers Room still have (some) tables and panels as this issue goes to print. Despite the restrictions and problems with import tax and duty both Rooms will represent a global showcase and should offer enough material to cater for all visitors. Finally - we plan to have the Masquerade on Sunday night but there have been relatively few entries. If you plan to join in the Masquerade, we urge you to register before June 1st. We must know how many people plan to participate so we can plan and make things work...

And with your help we can make ConFiction an unforgettable event. We need your help on all levels and hope you will give us a hand and earn a Gopher T-Shirt. Interested? See the special HELP WANTED article for more information.

There were 13 valid nominations and only Jeschke's Midas and Schaap's De Wolver received more than one nomination.

Hotel & Travel

As mentioned in PR#4, we have two hotel room deals: one for the US fans, and one for fans from the rest of the world. This has to do with the special arrangements we've made for you as fans with the US-based travel agency Holland Approach, Inc. and our main hotel agency, Convention Travel International (CTI)

There are, of course, also cheaper bed & breakfast-type hotels, but Convention Travel International (CTI) or Holland Approach Inc. cannot book those rooms in advance, for neither them nor ConFiction can guarantee that these rooms will live up to the expectations of the foreign fans, though most of the rooms will be decent

enough. Should you wish to know more about this possibility, write directly to: The Hague Tourist Board (also known as the V.V.V. Den Haag), Reservation Department, P.O. Box 17224, 2502 CE, The Hague, The Netherlands.

Please, do not phone or write directly to the convention hotels, listed on these pages. They will tell you that all rooms are booked already! Write instead to Holland Approach or Convention Travel International, or use the hotel reservation forms in this Progress Report. Hotel rooms are subject to availability, though we will do our best to get you all a decent bed!

Update on Holland Approach information (US fans only).

We are happy to pass on the latest news of Holland Approach Inc. in answer to comments and questions among bookers. First, however, a slight correction of the text in Progress Report # 4. There was some mention of administrative fees, levied by the organizers in case of changes or cancellations. We hope it was clear, from the context, that the text was not referring to ConFiction, but to Holland Approach. Just to set the record straight.

- Holland Approach regrets not to have included a booking form in PR#4, but you'll find one in this issue on the next page.
- You don't need to travel in a group with Holland Approach. You just travel on the dates you wish, subject to availability, and you can stay longer, either in The Hague, or elsewhere (though at additional cost).
- You may also go elsewhere on the KLM package and still get the benefits. For example: you fly KLM to Amsterdam/Schiphol, attend ConFiction, and take a train to Rome for an add-on extended holiday. You can return with KLM to the USA from Rome via Amsterdam (transfer only).
- Holland Approach is also quite willing to help in arranging additional touring arrangements in Holland or Europe, though only if you purchase your air/land package from us. And we ask you to submit your itinerary or ideas as soon as possible for it's quite some work to put it all together. Give us a few days to work it out for you, and please, do not change afterwards.
- You do not need to fly with KLM, but since KLM is the official appointed carrier for ConFiction, we owe it to KLM to promote them. If KLM, however, doesn't fit into your plans, we can offer you various alternatives. Please check with us, Holland Approach, before deciding on other plans. We could come up with quite some nifty 'approaches'!
- If you have made reservations, please give Holland Approach a courtesy call if you decide not to make use of them, so we can accomodate other people with your space.
- Holland Approach must, regrettably, charge you if you cancel or change, even if it's only one night. We urge you, therefore, to read the terms and conditions of the reservation form carefully.

Hotel arrangements for fans from the rest of the world

Convention Travel International deals with all bookings of hotel accommodation of the convention hotels (see the booking form for a complete list). All rooms, except Category D, have private bath and/or shower. Rates (1989 price level) are per room, per night, including breakfast, service and taxes. You'll find the booking form at the back of this page.

Important! All requests for reservations will be dealt with strictly on a first come, first served base. No reservation can be accepted over the telephone, and no reservation can be made without a deposit or credit card guarantee.

A reservation must be accompanied by a deposit of Dfl 250,- per room. Payment of the deposit can be made out by bank draft or Eurocheque payable to Convention Travel International, or by direct bank transfer to account no. 47.34.19.815 (Convention Travel International) with the AMRO Bank, The Hague, stating ConFiction 1990 and the name(s) of the participant(s) for whom payment

is made. Personal cheques are accepted, but must be issued in the equivalent amount in Dutch guilders. For credit card guarantee the appropriate section of the reservation form must be filled out.

Upon receipt of the deposit, or form with credit card guarantee, participants will receive a hotel confirmation voucher, showing all reservation details as well as the deposit paid, less bank costs and Dfl. 7.50 reservation fee per room. This voucher must be handed over to the hotel reception when checking in. The deposit will be then deducted from the final hotel bill.

Please, make your cancellations in writing, by telefax or by cable to Convention Travel International. When cancelling a reservation the hotel voucher must be returned. For cancellations received before August 9, 1990, the voucher value will be refunded less bank cost and a Dfl 50,- cancellation fee per room. No refunds can be made for cancellations after that date. Prices are subject to change.

We will offer a varied programme and want to offer all attendees the opportunity to join in at all times and have fun, but morning and late evening programme will not be as intensely scheduled as day prime time tracks.

We are scheduling programme items opposite all main events to provide alternatives for those who would rather go to workshops, panels or other items. With an international convention as this we try to plan ahead as well as we can but should there be changes in the programme we will inform you during the convention of any changes. Thanks to the kind help of Noreascon Three we are able to work with their programme database - this enables us to produce on the spot updates of the programme with changes clearly marked as such. We will produce these *Pink Sheets* and make them available early in the morning as special newsletter editions, called *The Programme Busters*. To make sure you get to your desired programme items, be sure to read these Busters before you embark on a day of pleasure. Remember also to check the signs in front of each Programme Room for changes too!

ConFiction in a Nutshell

Like the previous Worldcon we are offering you a quick schedule of ConFiction. Remember, it's rather open at the moment, but these items have been put down on those days.

Monday, August 20th through Wednesday August 22nd

Convention setup. There will be no programme and no exhibitions open. However, on Wednesday 22nd, Registration will be open from 1 PM till 6 PM for staff, gophers and pre-registered members only. This is a good day to pick up your programme book(s), offer help or take the day off and visit the Beach.

Thursday, August 23rd

The convention officially starts at 2 PM with an official opening and presentation, which you don't want to miss.

Dealers Room and Art Show will be set up and will be open from 5 PM till 8 PM for the first time. Kidcon and crèche will be open also (for details, see below). First day of the convention will have light programming.

Friday, August 24th

ConFiction is now in full swing. A full day of programme and videos and films all over the building. Exhibits will be open, same for Art Show and Dealers Room. WSFS preliminary Business Meeting scheduled for 10 AM. First of the series Dutch Treat (details below) takes place. Workshops in function space of Bel Air. The Friday evening extravaganzas are Meet the Pros (possibly with a Rijsttafel - details below), starting at 6 PM and the theatreplay *The Oracle* by Edith Fern Katz based on an Edgar Allen Poe story. This starts at 8 PM in the Mondriaanhall. Later that evening it is bid party time in a number of halls at the convention centre.

Saturday, August 25th

Another day of full operation. The schedule is like Friday's except that Site Selection balloting closes at 6 PM. The first Art Auction should prove interesting for art shoppers. The evening's main event is the Hugo Ceremony that starts at 8 PM. Later that evening there is a second performance of *The Oracle* and the rest of the evening there will be more parties to go to and enjoy.

Sunday, August 26th

The last full day of the convention, but a day of giants. A special one day programme stream has been developed to honour J.R.R. Tolkien by Unquendor, the Tolkien Society. There is also a full one day stream to celebrate the publication of # 1000 of the Perry Rhodan series. Also the announcement of the 1993 Worldconvention at the WSFS Business Meeting. The second Art Auction is planned on Sunday afternoon. The main event is the Masquerade that will start at 8 PM - although we still need to get more participants! Care to join? After the Masquerade it's party time again for those who wish to join the fun or light counterprogramming for the more serious minded fans.

Monday, August 27th

The last day of ConFiction with the Closing Ceremony at 2 PM. Both Art Show and Dealers Room will be closed in the afternoon and by Monday Evening the dead dog parties (with a special one for gophers) will be all that is left (although we will have a partial Teardown Monday evening).

A science fiction convention is run for and by the fans. Although we have had quite a few offers for help, we need more. Please, write to us in advance so we can plan ahead - or come to the **Gopher Hole** to volunteer...Anybody who works at the convention for a minimum of eight (8) hours will be entitled to special limited edition of a **Gopher T-shirt**; if you put in more than sixteen (16) hours you will - in addition to the special T-Shirt, which will not be on sale - be eligible for a refund of your membership fee, if the funds permit us to make reimbursements. So, come and help us out - with this experience you may one day run your own convention or profit from what you have learned at ConFiction. Your help is really needed!

Dutch Treat(s)

We plan a number of social gatherings between fans and professionals in the field during all days of the convention. This will be in small groups - usually between 10 and 15 persons and one Big Name Author. The guests will pay the Authors drink(s) or lunch (should the gathering take place during lunch time). This way you have a chance to sit down with your favourite author or artist and talk at ease about (almost) everything you always wanted to know about this person but never were able to ask before. You can register for the Dutch Treats at the convention - special information will then be made available.

Weapons Policy

We follow the general no-weapons policy of major conventions all over the world. Anything that constitutes or may be taken for a weapon will be banned at ConFiction, even for hall costumes. Special rules apply for Masqueraders and Dealers, if you haven't received this set of rules, please ask for them.

Fan Comforts

We realise visiting a worldcon in a foreign country is not just like going to any other convention. You might need, say, spectacle repairs, a spangle for your costume, a new string for your guitar - where do you find it, and what's more: how do you ask for it? Our **Comforts** desk in the Congress Centre can supply the information. We'll have maps, telephone books, dictionaries, and info on public transport etc. We won't run a Tourist Bureau or Travel Agency, mind you, but we can certainly tell you where to find one.



Meet the Pros and... a Rijsttafel?

We plan a large social gathering on Friday evening around dinnertime. To make this more interesting we think it is a good idea to make a Rijsttafel available during this meeting, which will take place in a number of rooms on the first floor of the building. Basically, everybody is welcome and invited to join in the fun. Drinks can be bought at several bars - but the rijsttafel should make the atmosphere even better. A rijsttafel is a traditional Indonesian dish. It comes with rice, several sorts of meat and sauces and is considered a real treat. As we anticipate a large number of people for the rijsttafel we need to be able to make an estimate on the amount of food we have to cater for. The rijsttafel will be made available at cost and you must purchase your ticket prior to the Meet the Pros. Tickets can be paid for at the convention itself (this to avoid problems with currency conversions and banking fees) but you must register prior to the convention if you want to enjoy the delight of a Rijsttafel. The rijsttafel will cost fl 25,- and can only be had if you have registered prior to the convention and if you have picked up and paid your ticket at the desk. It also comes with one free drink...Tickets for the Rijsttafel must be ordered before July 15th which is the absolute deadline. Just drop us a card or make a photocopy of the Rijsttafel Ticket form and send it to us. Should there be lack of interest to join in for the Rijsttafel, ConFiction will cancel this part of the evening's event - but what's a good conversation without some typical Dutch Indonesian food?

Pocket Guide to ConFiction

The centerfold of this Progress Report is a mini-guide (apart from the Hugo Ballot, but then, you're supposed to send it in anyhow!) that you can use separately. It contains all necessary information about how to reach The Hague, your hotel, the Congress Centre, and lots of other useful tidbits about public transport, money matters, emergencies, etc. In the centre you'll find a streetmap, and a complete route description.

How to get here...

Coming in by plane

Most of you will arrive at Schiphol Airport. From there you simply follow the signs **To the trains** (it's an underground station), and take a train to **Den Haag CS** (The Hague Centraal) or **Den Haag HS** (Holland Spoor). The ticket office is in the circular underground hall; you simply can't miss it. See further at: **Coming in by train**.

Coming in by boat

There are regular trains from Vlissingen and Hoek van Holland to **Den Haag HS** (The Hague Holland Spoor) or **Den Haag CS** (The Hague Centraal). From Hoek van Holland is a connecting boat train to HS station, otherwise change at Rotterdam. See further at: **Coming in by train**.

Coming in by train

The Hague has two main railway stations: **Den Haag CS** (Centraal Station) and **Den Haag HS** (Holland Spoor). In both stations you'll find a Tourist Office and an Exchange Bank (open 9.00 a.m. - 9.00 p.m.). On the inside of this Pocket Guide you'll find a streetmap of the city, plus a route description to most hotels and, of course, to the convention site.

Local Public Transport

Trams and buses are swift and frequent. It's only a step or at most a 5 minutes' walk from the stop to your hotel or the Congress Centre. Buy a **strippenkaart**, our local transport ticket, at the station ticket windows.

At HS trams and buses come in front. At CS tram and bus platforms are up on the roof. Take the escalator up from the train platform for bus roof, or the stairs/escalator on the left or right of the station hall to the tram platforms. See the inside of this Guide for directions to hotels and Congress Centre.

Stripping in public

We have a nifty ticket for use on local transport, that's valid everywhere in the country. Ride a bus in Amsterdam or a tram in Den Haag on the same ticket! This **strippenkaart** ('strip' card) is sold at a discount at railway stations and post offices. Get one as soon as you arrive. Or buy one from the driver, (a bit more expensive). For every trip, check the number of zones you wish to travel through (see maps at nearly every stop or ask driver), then add one for the road. Stamp the appropriate strip in the yellow machine in bus or tram or have the driver stamp it. If you travel together on one ticket, stamp separately for every member of your group. Up to 4 zones you get one hour of travel after the stamped time, including as many changes as you can manage. It may seem confusing but it is a good idea to get behind a local and watch him or her doing it first. Or ask him or her to help you; English is the second language of the Dutch.

The color of money...

Banks

Banks open weekdays 9.00-16.00 hrs. The bank in Centraal Station is open 09.00-21.00 hrs. daily (also on Sunday). Larger hotels have also change facilities.

Travellers cheques and credit cards

Travellers cheques are usually not accepted in direct payment, but you may cash them at a bank or in your hotel. Blue Giro cheques and Eurocheques are widely accepted. Credit cards are accepted as advertised on shop door or at cash registers. Not accepted at most supermarkets, at railway stations, post offices etc. But most major cards are accepted in lots of restaurants.

Shops and services

Most shops and supermarkets are open 9.00-17.30 from Monday to Saturday, though some close up a bit earlier on Saturday. Banks are open from 09.00-16.00, and post offices from 08.30-17.00. In the beach area a shopping mall is also open on Sunday. The big stores in the centre will open Monday at 13.00, as are most book shops. Keep that in mind if you have to leave early in the morning.

Cash

Dutch bills have strong colours and big numerals, and a raised device in one corner for tactile recognition. Most widely used are bills of Dfl. 5.00, 10.00, 25.00, 50.00 and 100.00. Bills of 250 are still rare, not easy to get change for; bills of 1.000 often faked. Don't accept!

Coins range from 5ct (copper), through 10 and 25 cent, 1 and 2.50 guilders (all silver) to 5 guilders (brass). Useful for parking meters and pay phones: 25 ct and 1 guilder.

Attention: prices are often marked in cents, but the 1 cent coin is out of circulation; prices get rounded off.



How to travel to the Congress Centre and convention area hotels

Take tram no 8 from HS station, or no 7 from CS station to Scheveningen. Get off at **Johan de Wittlaan**. The Promenade Hotel (3) is at your back. Cross tram tracks and road, and walk on to find the Congress Centre (1) and Bel Air Hotel (2) straight ahead.

To the Scheveningen hotels

Take tram no 7 from Central or no 8 from HS station to Scheveningen. Get off at **Badhuiskade** for Badhotel (4), next stop for Flora Beach (5). **Kurhaus stop** for KurhausHotel (6), & Europa (7) and **end of line** for Aquarius (8) & Carlton Beach (9).

To the Kijkduin hotels

From HS station take a train to Centraal Station. For hotels Atlantic and Zeehaghe (10 and 11) take no 4 bus (on the roof) direction Kijkduin to end of line.

Youth Hostel/Camping

From HS station take a train to Centraal Station. For Youth Hostel, take buses 122/123/124 (on roof of Centraal Station). Get off at **entrance Youth Hostel**. For the camping it's the same. Walk from the Youth Hotel stop to the camping (there are signposts) in appr. 10 minutes.

To the city centre hotels

For Pullman Hotel (13), take tram nr. 8 from HS station or nr. 7 from Central station to Scheveningen, get off at **Spul**. The hotel is on your left (tram 7) or right side (tram 8). For Park Hotel (12), take tram no 8 from HS station to Scheveningen, get off at **Kneuterdijk**. Cross tram tracks and road and take the first street on your left. At the end turn again left and take the first street to the right: the **Molenstraat**. At the end is the hotel. At Central Station take no 3 tram to Loosduinen, get off at **Veenkade/Noordwal**, turn right, take the first right, then the first left. The hotel is on your left side.

Coming in by car

Inquire at your travel agent, automobile club or the Dutch Tourist Office about traffic rules, signs etc. Dutch Automobile Club ANWB runs emergency road services: **Wegenwacht**. Yellow emergency phones on most motorways. For all those innocent... in Holland we drive on the right side!

Filling stations close at app. 22.00 hrs. Many are self service. All stations offer unleaded (Euro Loodvrij), high grade (Super), and Diesel. LPG not everywhere on sale. Most stations won't accept credit cards.

Direction signs are dark blue with white lettering. Road numbers: "A" for motorways (red panel), "N" for local through roads. Ignore green E-route numbers. On all signs The Hague reads as **Den Haag**.

Approaching Den Haag

You'll approach Den Haag from either Schiphol, Rotterdam, or Utrecht. An exception is Hoek van Holland: see below for details. All approaches will take you into town to the same **Spot** (see map).

From Utrecht

Keep on the A12 and direction signs. After the last exit Nootdorp (ignore it), keep to left hand lanes for **Den Haag, Voorburg**. The A12 takes you straight into town. Follow the white sign for **Scheveningen & Kijkduin**. At speed limit 50,

watch for sign pointing left for Scheveningen/Kijkduin at traffic lights. Turn **left**. Next set of lights is the **Spot**. Turn **right**, for ConFiction and hotels. (for Pullman Hotel however: turn **left**).

From Rotterdam

Keep on the A13. Last exit Delft/Pijnacker /Nootdorp. Bear right to join A4 for **Den Haag, Amsterdam**. Keep right, follow signs to join A12 to **Den Haag, Voorburg, Utrecht**. Ignore exits and take A12 into town as above.

From Schiphol

Take the A4, direction **Den Haag**. Some kilometers past Schiphol Airport A44 (also to Den Haag) splits off. Keep left to stay on A4. Last exit Leidschendam, bear right to join A12 to **Den Haag, Voorburg, Utrecht**. Take A12 into town as above. You may also follow the split to the right by the A44. It's an attractive but slower route. Motorway ends in **Wassenaar**. Road continues into **Den Haag**. Follow the white signs for **Centrum**. Watch for traffic lights where A12 joins from left. Next set of lights is the **Spot**.

So far, so good. All cars must have reached The Spot now. From there we have various routes to various destinations. See also on the map for the relative locations of the hotels and the convention site.

To Congress Centre and convention area hotels

From the **SPOT** where you made a right turn, continue along a canal till 3rd set of traffic lights, where a viaduct crosses the road. A white sign for Kijkduin points right. Pass underneath the viaduct, at once turn **right** and go up. Continue across the canal, down, and through a park. At first traffic light turn **right** for **Promenade Hotel**. Cross tram tracks at second traffic light, continue and find the blue & yellow Congress Centre ahead. Drive past it for the Bel Air Hotel, right behind the Centre..

To hotels at Kijkduin/ Youth Hostel/ Camping

Follow route to ConFiction, pass the Bel Air hotel, (bend to right). Cross a bridge, continue on this through road, till sign for Kijkduin points to the right. Turn **right**, uphill, for Hotels **Atlantic and Zeehaghe**.

Turn left at foot of hill for Camping and Youth Hostel. Find the Camping entrance on your right a little further on. At first traffic lights after this, turn right (for **Monster**). The Youth Hostel entrance is immediately on your right.

To City Centre Hotels: Park Hotel

From the **Spot** after your right turn, turn immediately left again at traffic lights. After third set of traffic lights the road broadens. Turn left at next traffic light, drive on along canal till street narrows, take first left.

Pullman Hotel

At the **Spot** turn left, turn right at first traffic light, continue alongside pond, at end turn left at traffic lights, follow road; after 3rd sets of lights find Pullman Hotel on your left.

To the Scheveningen hotels

From the **Spot** continue along the canal and stay with the road which ends at a wide square across. Go around the square to the right: the **Europa Hotel** at corner. Turn right and make left turn at the end for **Carlton Beach** and **Aquarius Beach**. Go round the square itself for the Kurhaus Hotel, or round and left for **Flora Beach** and **Badhotel**.

Science Fiction Achievement Awards (Hugos) FINAL BALLOT

PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS BEFORE VOTING:

Only members of ConFiction are eligible to vote. You must include your name, address, and signature in the appropriate spaces overleaf. (Your membership number isn't required, but including it will save us a little work.) Votes must be cast on this ballot or a good reproduction thereof. All ballots should be sent to Richard Katze, P.O. Box 760, Framingham, MA 01701, USA, and must be postmarked no later than Friday, July 13, 1990 to be counted.

This is a preferential or "Australian" ballot, which means that you should mark your choices in order of preference: "1" for first place, "2" for second place, and so on. You don't have to fill in all the places, but every vote you cast contributes to the ultimate ranking of the nominees; if your first choice is eliminated, your vote is reassigned to your next choice, and so on until someone has a majority. However, we recommend that you not vote in any category in which you are not familiar with a majority of the nominees. If you decide not to vote in a given category, leave it blank (note that "No Award" is not an abstention, but a vote that nobody should be given the award in question).

The nominees that follow were chosen by popular vote: valid nominating ballots were received from 281 members of ConFiction or Noreascon Three. In some categories more than 5 nominations appear due to tie votes (a 3-way tie in two instances).

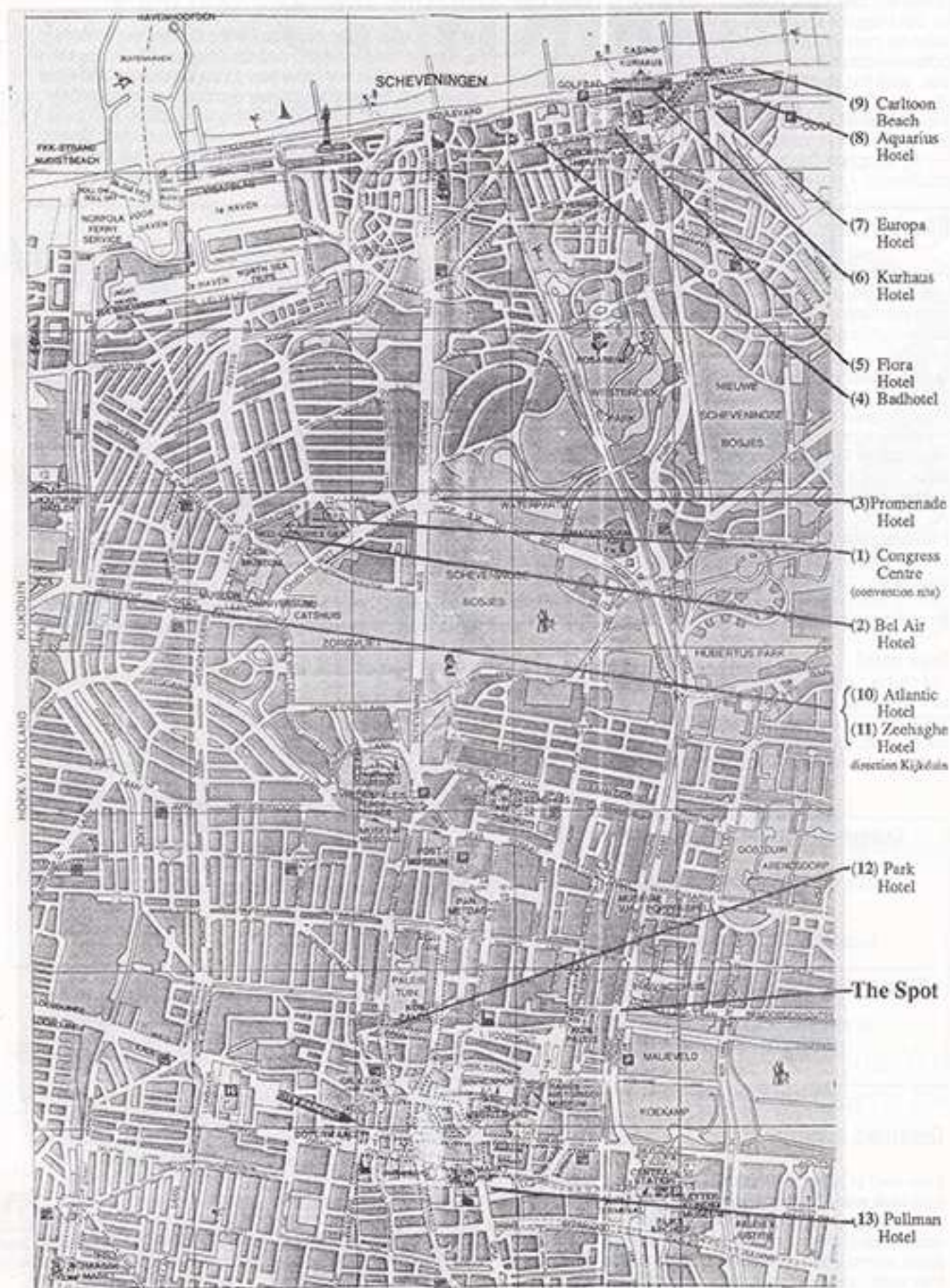

From Hoek van Holland

Unless you detour past Rotterdam (see above) just follow signs for Den Haag. It's a winding road. After the village of Monster, watch for intersection with white sign pointing left for Scheveningen/Kijkduin/ Den Haag Centrum. (Just before that, you'll find Youth Hostel entrance to your left.) Turn left for Den Haag Centrum, find entrance Camping a little further on, on your left. Continue until intersection where sign for Kijkduin points ahead. Drive straight on for Kijkduin hotels. For the Congress Centre, turn right for Scheveningen, follow road through 4 sets of traffic lights. At the 5th, sign for

Scheveningen points left, but cross the bridge and go straight on. After third set of traffic lights and bend to left, you'll have the Bel Air hotel at your left and the blue and yellow tiled Congress Centre ahead. For the Promenade Hotel, continue and turn left at 3rd traffic lights. For the Scheveningen Hotels, turn left at 2nd set of lights past the Congress Centre and follow tree-lined road. At end follow tram tracks to Badhotel and Flora Beach and the wide square (see description above). For City Centre hotels: Continue past Promenade Hotel through park. Go up the viaduct, on top take right exit for Rotterdam, Utrecht, Centrum. Across and down, take third right for Park Hotel, fourth right for Pullman Hotel (see description above).

Phone home...

Phone signals may confuse all you E.T.'s, so here is what you hear when you use the phone in Holland. Pick up the receiver to get a low, continuous dialing tone. Dial area code to get higher pitched continuous dial-on signal.

Dialing an extension number, you may get:

- High-pitched staccato signal - number engaged.
- Lower pitched 2 second signal, 4 second wait - phone rings.
- High-low signal - number disconnected.

Attention: all The Hague numbers should be 7-digit, starting off with a 3. You may find old listings, then just add 3 in front of the number.

Phoning abroad

Dial 09, to get higher pitched continuous dial-on signal. Then dial country code, area code, and extension number without pausing. Find country codes on initial pages of Phone Book. In phoning out-of-country, leave off the initial 0 for the area code.

Take note!

Use 25ct or 1 guilder coins. Some booths only have card-slots for magnetic telephone credit cards. You may obtain those at any station ticket window or post office.

Not all phone booths are equipped for international calls! But those that are, have also handy instructions in 4 languages.

Disabled visitors

If you want us to plan properly for what you might need, we must have your Questionnaire, so please look up PR 3, fill out the form and send it to us. Also, if you want to register at the easily accessible H-Access Registration desk, we must know you're coming. We have hotel and taxi information for wheel chair users, and travel information for blind visitors with a companion, but again, if you don't send in your Questionnaire we won't know you need it..

Kid Con

For children from 4 to 12 years of age ConFiction offers a convention of their own called Kid Con. Any kid may join Kid Con, regardless of the membership it has. Kid Con has two sessions a day, 9 AM to 12.30 PM and 1.30 PM to 6 PM. Children may come and join a session at any time of the day - unless an excursion is planned in which case parents will be asked to bring their children on time. During the one hour lunch break a cold meal will be available at cost. All children must leave or be picked up at 6 PM. Most of the time we will plan things to do in the Congress Centre but there may also be excursions - if so, we will need assistance. Please, offer us your help to make Kid Con work! We plan to have at least a magician, lots of toys, videos, games, a childrens masquerade, make up sessions - and maybe a trip to Madurodam, a famous miniature city. Monday will offer a few activities. Although Kid Con is free for all children with a registered Children's membership we may have to ask for a small additional contribution to cover cost for "expeditions" to the outside world. Such contributions will be announced at the convention and members can then decide whether or not they want their children to partake in such a tour.

The Crèche

ConFiction will have a crèche available but you must register your child with us prior to the convention. This will allow us to plan ahead and make arrangements for beds, toys and other materials. We will charge a small amount for food and diapers. Although the crèche is free we want to avoid crowding and using the crèche as a "baby dump". Therefore we would very much like to know how many babies we can expect. So, please, register your babies for the crèche and offer assistance - we do need it.

Babysitting

After 6 PM a babysitting service will be made available at cost and you can make your own choice whether or not you wish to make use of this service. This service will be taken care of by our own (crèche and Kid Con staff) as well as a professional babysitting office in the Hague.

If you have a baby and you intend to use the Convention-crèche, please register your baby. We also would like to know who wants to volunteer for crèche and Kid Con. As soon as we know how many babies and volunteers we can expect we will inform you about possible costs. Please let us know if you will need a baby-sit at your hotelroom or in the Congress Centre during evening hours. (until 12 pm.) This applies for children up to twelve years. 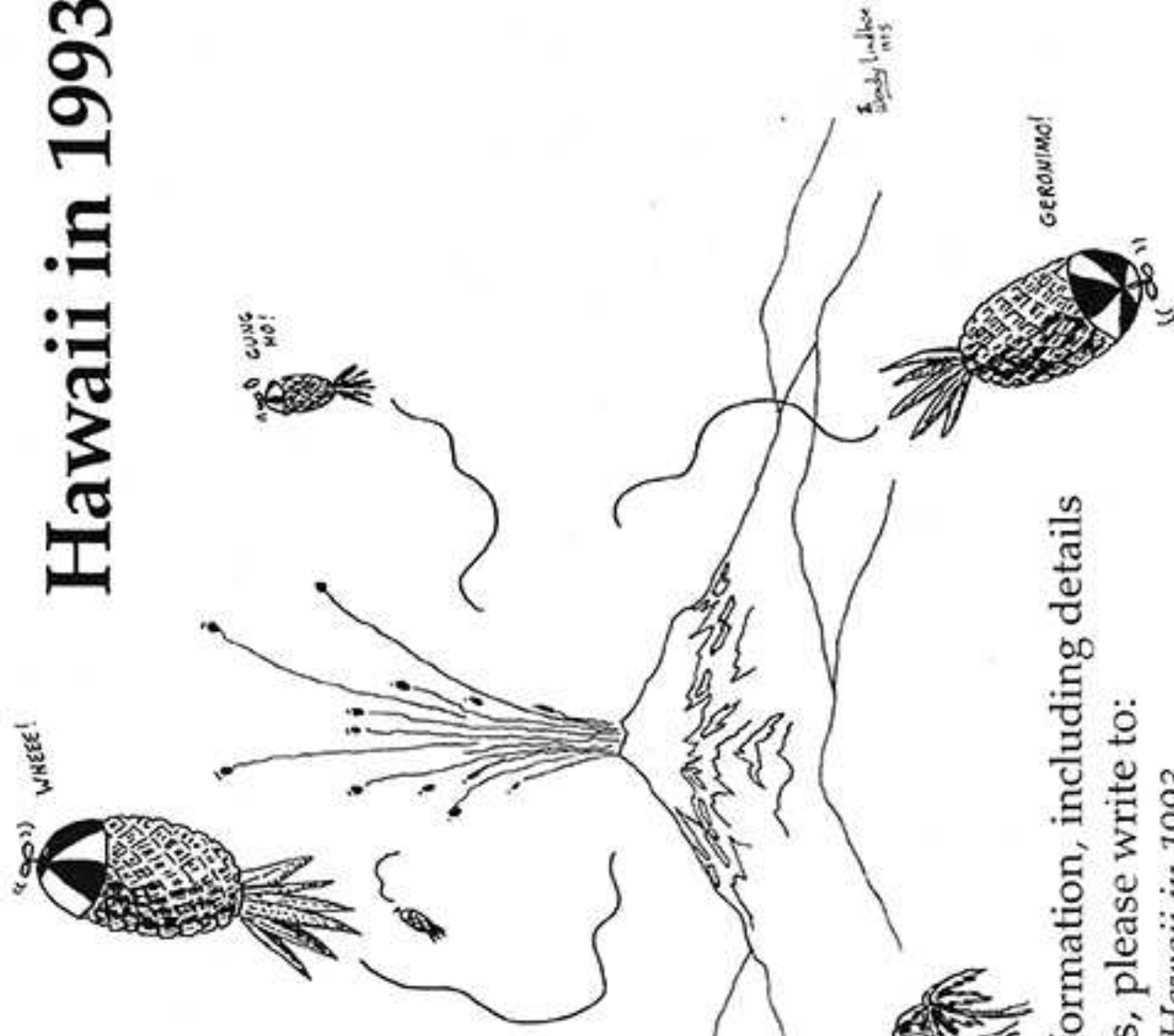
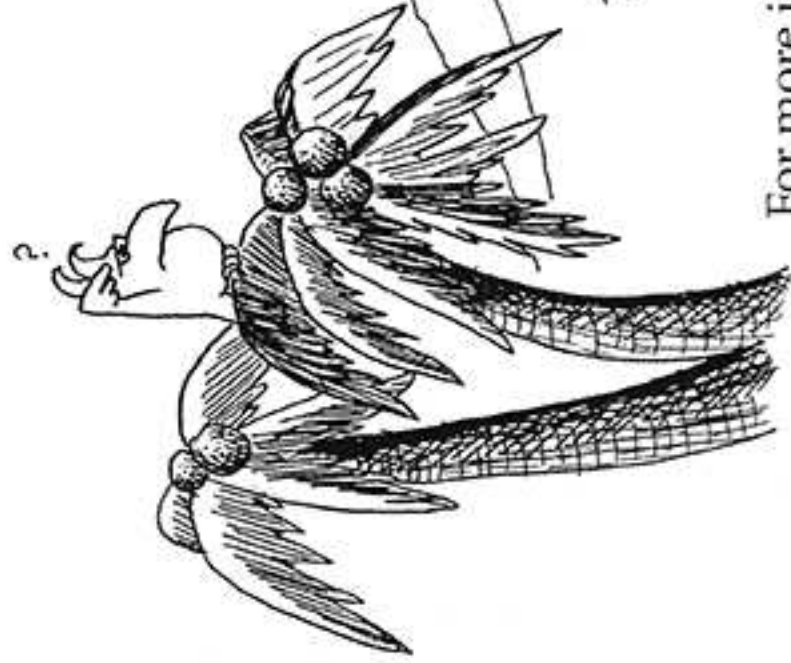

Methods of payment

Membership Registration Desks

If you attend ConFiction you must get your badge. You can collect your badge at one of the member registration desks. The problem is: there are several desks. So where do you go, what do you need to have with you, what do you do in case of a problem, a transfer, or a conversion.

First of all: All attendees of ConFiction must have a **Quickie Form**. They are either mailed to you or you can fill in one at the convention itself. Your Quickie is in fact the cover of this Progress Report! The Quickie form will serve as a checklist and will be collected at the last desk you pass. All attendees will be asked to show an identification, carrying a photograph of yourself.

We do have several desks, for pre-registered Full Attending Members, Program Participants (please, have your letter of confirmation by ConFiction's Programme Board at hand), a special desk for physically impaired attendees (to help you overcome possible inconveniences like long waiting times), a desk for press representatives, a conversion desk, a walk-in desk and a problem desk.

Your conversion will be checked and the amount you have to pay will be put on your Quickie. You then proceed to the finance desk to pay, to the badge desk to get your badge and the goodies desk to get your goodies.

Walk-in

You are a walk-in, coming on the spur or dragged in by your friends. You can buy a full attending membership or a day-admission. Please note, however, that a day admission doesn't give you the right to vote for the site selection 1993. The Walk-in desk is open at the same hours as the Conversion desk and can also be found in the Bourgogne hall (left in the main lobby).

Fill in a Quickie form at the convention. Then your badge is made by a computer, while you pay at the finance desk (your Quickie form will be marked). Next you pick up your badge and your goodies (a copy of your Quickie form will be collected).

Problems

Heaven forbid but you have a slight problem, like you paid but we don't know about you and other small things. Well, let's try to tackle the problems one by one.

- You have bought/have been given someone else's membership, a Transfer. If it is a full attending membership you should: complete the Quickie form with your own information. You must have a signed letter of the original owner of the membership, stating that the membership is transferred to you. Show an identification with a photograph of yourself. The Problem desk will whisk you through the motions. If it is a supporting membership, go to the Conversion desk.
- You like to change the name on your badge. Simply go to the badge making facility in the Bourgogne hall.
- Your address is no longer correct. Put the correct address on your Quickie form and hand it over at the appropriate desk (Attending or Conversion)
- Any other Problem? Go to the Problem desk.

Voting for the Site Selection 1993

At ConFiction a vote will decide where the 1993 World Science Fiction Convention will be held. At this point there are 3 bids who have filed and one write-in bid. Because of ConFiction being held on the Old Continent the voting fee could be payed in many different currencies. Different currencies means changing the money into the Dutch florin (= guilder). But changing means banking fee's and that could go up to Dfl 9.00 (appr 4.5 US\$) per cheque. Not so pleasant for the winning bid. So we decided after talking to the bids on the following procedure:

Mailed in votes:

- cheques: must be post dated to 1 aug 1990. This means that we just hand over all the cheques to the winning bid and it is their concern. Your cheque must be made out to the 51st World Science Fiction Convention. This includes also Giro and Eurocheques. Of course we expect the voter to have money in the bank just after ConFiction.

- other payments: ballot and money will be returned to the voter.
- The mailed in votes must be received before July 15th, 1990.

At ConFiction:

- cash: you can pay with Dfl 47.00, US\$ 22.00 or UK£ 14.50.
- personal cheques are also accepted

You will find the Site Selection ballot as a part of the centerfold of this Progress Report.

On Saturday August 26, 1990 the voting desk will be closed at 18.00 (6.00 PM) sharp. The winner will be officially announced at the 10.00 AM Business Meeting of the WSFS on Sunday August 27, 1990.

Just a reminder: day's admissions don't have the right to vote for the 1993 Site Selection.

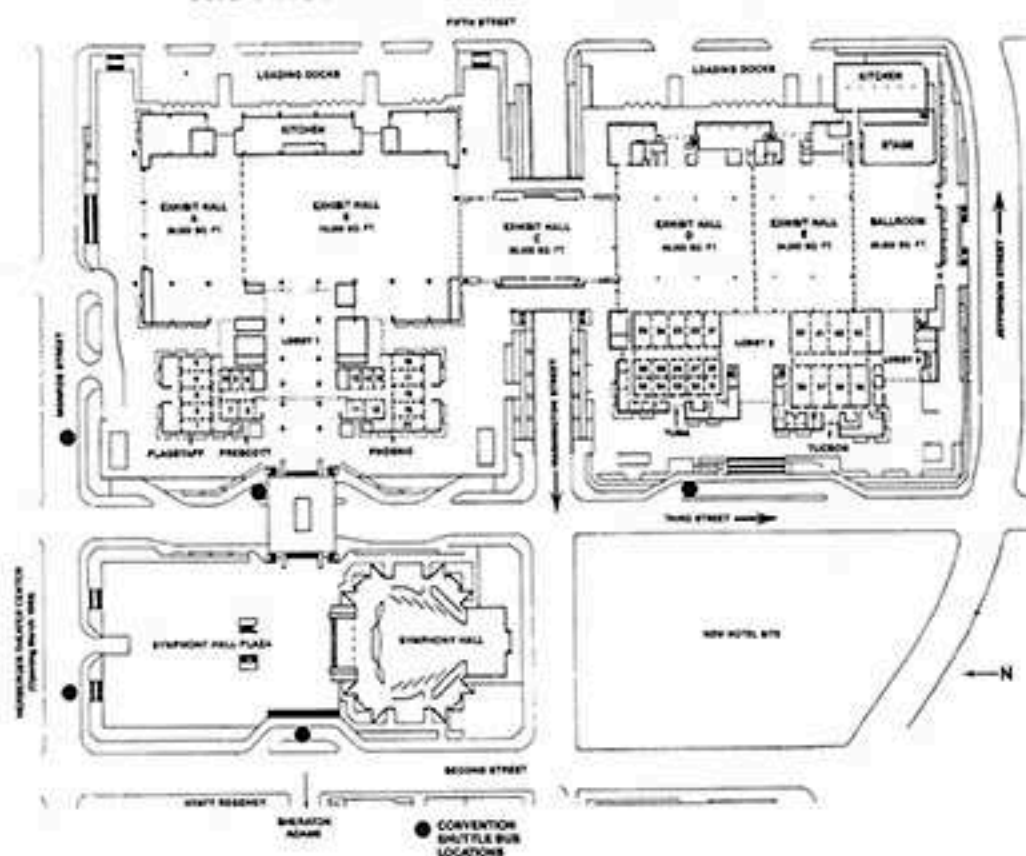

Experience

Phoenix is one of the most experienced convention running fandoms in the West. We have run 2 WesterCons, a NASFiC, and a World Fantasy Convention during the 1980's. In addition to the two annual local conventions, and three annual relaxacons. With all this activity, our volunteer staff of over 200 local fan with a wide range of interests. We are also experienced at drawing on the fan community from other localities for expertise.

Our Bid Chairs, Terry Gish, Doreen Webbert and Eric Hanson all have Worldcon level experience. Terry has worked at either committee or senior staff level for several Worldcons and WesterCons including chairing WesterCon 41. You are not allowed to bring in supplies into the building unless you wish to pay a high corkage. If you wish to throw parties, get in touch with ConFiction, att. Getting there through the air...Some tips for cheap travel

Air fares to Europe are not cheap in late August. However, you must realize places in Europe are close together, similar to the Bos/Wash corridor. To give you some idea, if you took a map of the province of Saskatchewan, and placed it over the map of Europe, in such a way that the US/Alberta/Sask border point was at the same point where the French/Spanish border meets the Bay of Biscay, then one side of the province would be at Brest, France and the other side would be at Warsaw, Poland! Hence you do *not* need to fly directly to Amsterdam, Holland, if there is a better deal to somewhere else. If your travel agent can get you a very good price to London, Paris or even Frankfurt, you may want to go that way.

Note: Most airlines schedule so that you fly overnight, arriving in the morning hours at your European destination. If you like, you could continue to travel overnight while touring Europe. The money that you would have spent on hotels, will pay the transportation costs to Den Haag. Also, once you arrive in Europe, you can add a day of sight seeing in the city of destination to your touring.

I cannot stress enough the savings that derive from spending an afternoon in your Public Library. Once you know how, when and where you are going to, grab the books on travel in that area. The "Europe on X \$S a DAY" - both Europe in General and on the specific countries that you may be visiting are a must. If you cannot buy up-to-date copies, then photocopy the best pages, especially the *maps*. This info will save you lots of time and money as you will learn how to get around easily, and the times of museums etc. are open. Most have a weekday closed plus often what seem like strange hours for being open. Once in Europe you may choose to travel to Den Haag by either bus or train. Both are excellent, both have day & night service, taking about the same amount of time and both drop you off at exactly the same spot, the train station in Den Haag. Mind you, the bus is usually cheaper. At this point, the train station has an information booth or kiosk. If you walk in there, they will explain how to get to the convention site. (See also the pocket guide in this Progress Report).

The History of Fanzines exhibit, developed by Nancy Atherton, encourages the current-day fan to travel back to the days of Spaceways, Le Zombie, Quandry and Xero. The exhibit features a feast of fanzine writing from the 1930s through the 1950s by such legendary fans as Walt Willis, Lee Hoffman, Donald Wollheim, Ray Bradbury, Robert Silverberg, Robert Bloch, Bob Tucker, Marion Zimmer Bradley and a host of others.

The fanzines on display are likely to include the 1930s *Cosmology*, *The Planet*, *The Time Traveller*, *The Phantagraph* and *fantasy Magazine*; the 1940s *Peon*, *The Acolyte*, *The Fanscient*, *Futura Fantasia*, and *Spacewarp*; the 1950s *Fanac*, *Hyphen*, *Grue*, the *Vega Annish* and the *BNF of IZ*. There will also be copies of special items such as *Up to Now*, the first fan history; Walter A. Willis's immortal fan fable, the *Enchanted Duplicator*; Jack Speer's original *Fancyclopedia* and Bob Tucker's original *Neo-Fan's Guide*.

The History of Worldcons Exhibit, developed by Bruce Pelz, includes the World Science Fiction Banner, the Program Book from each previous World Science Fiction Convention, (we hope) several carousels of slides chronicling our history and pictures of many of the Hugo which were presented by other Worldcons. (The rocket ship design is standardized in the World Science Fiction Society (WSFS) Constitution, the base is designed by each administering committee. We'd like your help in identifying people in these photographs. If you know who one or more currently unidentified people in these photographs are, please give us the information by

following the posted instructions. If you have any of these banquet photographs, and are willing to have them displayed, please contact me at the above address.

The Portrait Gallery, a collection of over two hundred photographs of professionals in the SF community, was created by Christine Valada. If Christine can arrange to attend ConFiction, she will be photographing additional SF professionals during the convention. Beth Zipser is co-ordinating the biographies for this exhibit.

The History of Bidding, developed by Joe Siclari based on a prototype by me, features the potpourri of gimmicks which silly groups of fans have used to win (or lose) the right to work themselves to a frazzle over the Bank Holiday or Labor Day Weekend. There are ceramic whales and beer buckets and coupons good for a backrub and rats and wooden shoes and a host of other ideas too fascinating to be forgotten.

If you have material (especially for the German, Australian, and British Worldcon bids) which you are willing to have on display, please contact me. Scenes from World-Wide Fandom will include material from Japanese Fandom (thanks to MR. Takumi Shibano), Russian Fandom (courtesy of the Russian SF artist Anatoly Paseka), Canadian Fandom (many thanks to both Charles Mohapel and John Robert Columbo) and several European groups such as the NCSF (Holland), SFCD (Germany) and others including the famous M.R.U. photocovers, spanning 35 years of fandom.

A walk around the block

We have told you before: Holland is a small country and everything is to scale. It may take some getting used to these short Dutch distances, that one can actually... walk. So let me take you on a stroll around the Congress Centre, to show you, in minutes and seconds, how easy it is to get about on foot.

Let's start from the large glassed-in porch (the murals are done by Karel Appel), turning our backs on ConFiction and the Centre alike. We'll reach the second set of traffic lights, marking the intersection with the 17th century toll road in 4.5 minutes flat. We could take a tram number 7 or 8 from here, to either the seaside or the town centre. Across is the Promenade Hotel, at 7 minutes stroll from ConFiction. The park behind the hotel offers fine morning runs and pleasant strolls. If we stick to the straight path, another 6-7 minutes takes us to the worldfamous miniature model village of Madurodam.

If we wanted a walk, we could turn right at this point, along the old toll road through the woods, and be at the International Court of Justice or Peace Palace in 12 minutes. Or we could turn left and walk up the avenue to the village of Scheveningen. In 15 minutes we'd reach the sea bulwark (or boulevard) and the small white-washed fishermen's church, where the women come to Sunday service in local costume.

But I was going to take you around the block, not all over town. We'll start again from the porch, and now turn to the right. When nearly at the Centre's corner, look across the road. You can see a patch of wooded park and a driveway, and sometimes a guard. We could cross for a

moment. From the drive, we can just see the modest 17th century country place that used to belong to a statesman, poet and author of the Dutch Renaissance, Jacob Cats, who called it Sorghvliet, the place where he could flee his cares. Nowadays cares and worries of state are brought here, for this is our Prime Minister's official residence.

But let's continue our walk around the block. Only 4 minutes and 24 seconds after leaving the Centre we are at the entrance of the Bel Air Hotel. Another 2 minutes and we're at the door of the Omniversum, part of a large museum complex. The Omniversum has a 180 degrees domeshaped screen, where specially made films are projected - (English commentary on ear phones). Shows include programmes on space and cosmology. Continuing round the corner, we pass the adjacent Museon (Museum of Education) built of the same warm yellow brick. Here you'll find stops for the number 4 bus (to Kijkduin and the city center) and the number 10 tram (into town). Continuing clockwise we find that the bricks have an older patina. This is the Gemeentemuseum (City Museum), designed by Berlage. If you're not an architecture buff: Berlage was for architecture what Mondriaan was for painting. And of course Mondriaan's paintings are also on show in this museum that boasts a good collection of 20th century art, but also a very fine collection of ancient and exotic musical instruments. When we reach the main entrance, it's 8 minutes 25 seconds from Go.

Strolling on, we reach the new wing that marks the end of the museum complex at 10 minutes 17 seconds from Go, without once stepping off the sidewalk. The

triangular lemon yellow tower of the Congress Centre is again in sight. If we turn into the second side road and walk on, we'll reach the corner of the Congress Centre in another 2 minutes. Here we find the number 14 bus stop to Scheveningen. Turning one more corner, we are back at the main entrance, having rounded the block in exactly 15 minutes 19 seconds.

But now I am going to take us out of our way to explore the neighbourhood. Turning our backs on the modern wing of the Museum, we cross the double road (and tram tracks) and walk into the Statenkwartier, a quarter graced with the names of the first statesmen of the Dutch Republic. Statenkwartier is a typical The Hague neighbourhood.

We'll walk up tree-lined Willem de Zwijgerlaan, (after William Prince of Orange, called the Silent, founder of the Dutch Republic). We pass the post office on our left. Soon we reach a main intersection. This is Frederik Hendriklaan, a pleasant, meandering street, one of the more intimate shopping districts of The Hague. At this

intersection you'll find one of the town's great bookshops stocking lots of American, British, French and German books, and newspapers and magazines from all over the world. Mind you, even quite humble bookshops offer foreign newspapers and stock English-language books.

Turn left or right at your pleasure for clothing and shoe shops from modest to expensive, fishmongers, banks, fruit stalls, supermarkets and speciality grocers stocking exotic brands or health foods, second hand book shops and jewellers... So why don't you browse a little, have a coffee and a sandwich, or a meal, or stock up on goodies. In the meantime I'll turn right to continue my walk up Frederik Hendriklaan, crossing Statenlaan, and on, to Prins Mauritslaan. I am now 9 minutes 31 seconds away from the museum corner. Turning right into Prins Mauritslaan I find the Congress Centre at the end of the street. Only 12 minutes 47 seconds after departing from the museum corner I am back at the Centre's main entrance. So: around the block in 15 minutes, halfway round the block and taking in the shopping mall: some 23 minutes. Round the world takes just a little longer.

ConFiction can only accept Dutch guilders, but we have excellent money-changing facilities in and outside the building. There will be an American Express exchange bus in front of the building. Besides, in the centre itself there are also money-changing facilities.

We advise you to take Traveller Cheques and/or your credit cards, for it will be difficult to get money on a personal cheque. We do accept credit cards (Euro, Master, Visa and Access). In restaurants and shops (especially the luxury shops and department stores) American Express and Diners Club are also accepted.

Voting-fee of the Site Selection at the convention

You may pay your voting-fee in either Dutch guilders, American dollars or British pounds, but in cash only.

Art Show and Auction

The currency at the Art Show and Auction will be again the Dutch guilder. Please bear in mind that the auction price will be increased with 10% Value Added Tax and local taxes.
