SFWA Emergency Medical Fund Auction

Once again, the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America (SFWA) are pleased to present the Emergency Medical Fund Auction at ConJosé. The auction will be held on Saturday, August 31st from 4:00 to 5:30 PM in room B1/B2 of the Convention Center.

SFWA's Emergency Medical Fund came about as a response to the dramatic increase in the costs of medical care—and medical insurance—in today's society. Many full-time writers carry insufficient medical insurance—or none at all. Others are only able to write part time, while

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they hold down day jobs that provide insurance benefits. To help alleviate this situation, the EMF provides interest-free loans to help SFWA members meet unexpected medical costs, so they can get back on their feet and start writing again. Every penny we collect goes to needy members; there are no administrative costs or other overhead.

Other than donations from our members, the fund's major source of funds has been charity auctions given at conventions around the country, and in particular at Worldcons. We offer such items as rare books, bound galleys, tuck-erizations, manuscript critiques, and other unique or collectible items associated with the SF and Fantasy genres. For the auction at ConJosé, we have the services of two first-class auctioneers: Ellen Klages and Wombat (jan howard finder), which promises to make this a highly entertaining hour and a half. Come, bid, buy—and enjoy!

Locks of Love

Locks of Love is a non-profit group of wig-makers and hair-dressers who make wigs for children who have lost their own hair through chemotherapy, severe burns, and other medical problems. Cut-down adult-sized wigs look stupid on children, and are also too clumsy for play, so a method was devised to make special child-sized wig bases.

On Friday and Sunday of ConJosé, licensed cosmetologist Lora Boehm will cut and shape your hair free of charge. All she needs from you is at least 10" of newly-washed, but dry, hair. Remember, hair grows;

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change is GOOD! Lora doesn't plan to stalk the hallways with her scissors; she accepts only volunteers willing to help a child. If you simply cannot donate your tresses, then please donate money to the Guilty Locks jar (\$1.00 per inch is about right) to help cover wig-making expenses. In fact, cash donations are very welcome from anyone, with or without donations of hair.

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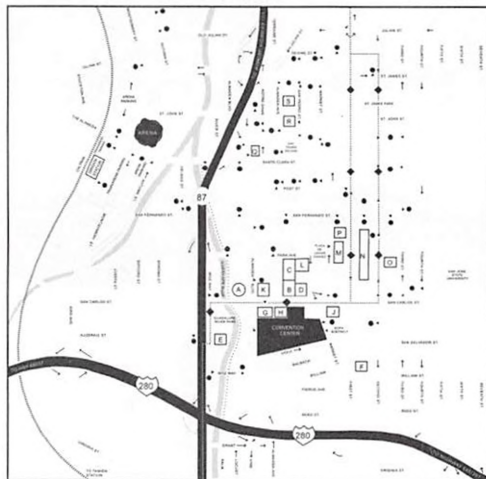

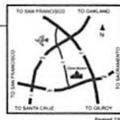

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Downtown Map

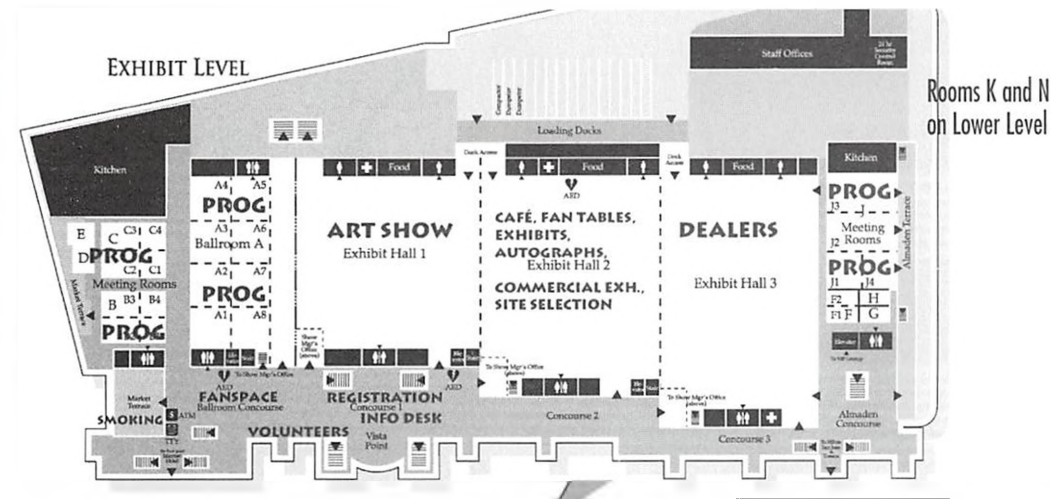

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Policies

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Alcohol Use and Parties

It is ConJosé policy not to budget for or serve alcoholic beverages in convention space. We will allow others to provide and serve alcohol in convention space in accordance with California laws and the corkage rules and other requirements of the facility (the specific hotel or the convention center).

Currently, there are no plans for any special events in the Convention Hospitality Suite ("Con-Suite") to include alcohol served by others. We expect other groups will serve alcohol elsewhere in the convention, including nighttime parties in the Fan Lounge.

In California, the legal drinking age is 21. It is illegal to provide any alcoholic beverage to a person under 21 or to an obviously intoxicated person. While the law regarding civil liability is complex, party hosts need to know that under some circumstances they, their sponsors, bartenders, and others can be held legally liable for

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the consequences of serving alcohol to underage drinkers or to obviously intoxicated persons.

As a social host or party planner, you could be sued and potentially found personally liable for damages to the injured party(ies).

Hospitality functions (parties) are a traditional aspect of Worldcons. ConJosé will attempt to reasonably accommodate persons and groups who wish to hold parties in conjunction with the convention; however, ConJosé is not responsible for the conduct of party hosts. Party hosts are responsible for the conduct of their parties, for abiding by hotel rules and convention policies and the directions of convention operations staff, hotel staff, and other lawful authorities.

ConJosé recommends, but cannot require, that party hosts limit admission to their parties only to members of the convention. If a party serves alcohol, the host is responsible for serving it in a safe, sensible, and legal manner.
