1939 And All That

This evening, Loncon 3 will be awarding the Retro Hugo Awards for 1939. Retro Hugos are awarded on the 50th, 75th or (one day!) 100th anniversary of a Worldcon where the Hugos weren't awarded. This will be the first of the 75th anniversary Retro Hugos, because 1939 was the first Worldcon.

In 1938, conventions were just starting to happen in the UK and US (naturally, there is debate about which side of the Atlantic got there first). A plan was hatched to hold a *World* convention, to coincide with the World's Fair in New York City.

As with any convention [Except for $Loncon\ 3-Ed$], there were fallings out among the staff and disagreements about the best way to do things.

In New York, there was once one big, happy SF society, The Greater New York Science Fiction Club. Then things started to go downhill, and it split into what eventually became known as New Fandom, lead by Sam Moskowitz (who chaired the convention with help from James Taurasi and Will Sykora), and the Futurians, whose members included Donald Wollheim and Frederik Pohl. Many short and pointed fanzines were published on each side of this quarrel, which involved a huge number of changes of club names and a lot of political name-calling.

New Fandom ended up in running the Worldcon, and a number of their Futurian rivals were banned during "The Great Exclusion Act." All in all, it's probably a good job that Twitter hadn't been invented in 1939.

Jo Walton, Hugo Award Winning Novelist, speaks:

Your first Worldcon?

Worldcons are big, that's the terror and the glory of them. They are a gathering of the tribes. And they're about conversation. The program isn't like a theatre programme, it's like a computer program. It's what the convention is running. A good program comes out of the conversation in fandom before the con and spills out of program rooms during the con, and feeds back into the wider conversation afterwards.

If you don't know anyone yet it's possible to be lonely in the middle of everything because it seems as if everyone else knows each other. And to a large extent that's true. At Worldcons these days I don't have time to hang out with all the cool people I already know and only see once a year. That doesn't mean I don't want to meet new people, but it does make it harder.

The advice people normally give new fans is to volunteer. This will introduce you to people, it will give you something to do, and it helps the con. This is all a good idea, especially for able-bodied people.

I also recomend kaffeeklatches, or literary beers. These are small group meetings with a writer, artist, or editor. You have to sign up in advance -- see pocket program. Look for people whose work you like. You'll get to spend an hour with a writer, and you'll get to meet and talk to another nine people who share your tastes. Then afterwards you will know them, and they'll know you, and can introduce you to more people.

WSFS Business Meeting Report

All constitutional amendments submitted to the Business Meeting survived the Preliminary Business Meeting and will be considered at the Main Business Meeting on Saturday (10am, CS 8+11). This includes the seven constitutional amendments passed on from last year and six new proposals. All thirteen were summarized in the WSFS Special Edition and are on the Loncon 3 web site. Two of

the new proposals were referred to special committees that may report revised versions to Saturday's meeting.

The most contentious item of new business was a proposal that would replace the current ratification process (a vote at the following year's Business Meeting) with a ballot submitted to all of the members of the following year's Worldcon. A proposal to prohibit Worldcons from selling memberships with any WSFS voting rights for less than the cost of a Supporting membership also had some controversy, and both were referred to committees with instructions to report back to Saturday's meeting.

The Business Meeting also adopted the usual Hugo eligibility-extension resolution for non-US-published works (this may be rendered moot if the constitutional amendment making such extensions permanent is ratified) and a resolution recommending that the Mark Protection Committee establish a legal entity ("Worldcon Intellectual Property Trust") for holding WSFS's intellectual property, especially outside the USA.

The meeting received reports from many WSFS and Worldcon committees, including financial reports from past Worldcons. Details are in the agenda papers (copies should still be available at tomorrow's meeting) and will be included in the minutes published after the convention.

None of my multivariate and confused selves are ever very far away from speculative fiction. This makes me very happy.

Access has become aware of several incidents involving mobility scooters that resulted in injuries to people and damage to property. We'd like to request the following:

- + Please use the Scooter-Friendly Access Lifts, which are located on Level 0 just inside the Fan Village, on Level 1 at the door near the Exhibit Hall, and on Level 3 at the west end of the corridor behind the grating screen. We're asking this because we've discovered that the main passenger lifts (the ones that come out near the Access desk on Level 0) are unsafe for scooters; the doors are narrow and close very quickly, and several people have been caught in them.
- Please drive at a safe (that is, slow) speed. Several crashes have happened because people were driving too fast.

WSFS Main Business Meeting Report

The Business Meeting on Saturday dealt with all substantive business: Sunday's meeting will just be for Site Selection business, with no meeting on Monday.

The Site Selection Meeting on Sunday (10am, CS8+11) will consist of the announcement of and a presentation by the winning 2016 Worldcon, Question Time for next year's Worldcon (Sasquan), and short presentations from bids for the 2017 Worldcon.

All seven constitutional amendments passed on from last year were ratified. Four new proposals received first passage and will be passed on to next year's Worldcon for ratification:

 Business Meeting and ratified by the next will be submitted to a referendum of the following (third) year's Worldcon's members.
- A Story by Any Other Name: Clarification of the status of audiobook versions of "story" works.
- Hugo Finalists: Formally renames those works/people who appear on the Hugo Award short list "finalists" instead of "nominees."
- Membership Types and Rates: Worldcons (and NASFiCs) cannot sell memberships with voting rights for less than the cost of their supporting memberships.

Proposals to extend Hugo Award nominating rights to members of NASFiC (WSFS's other convention, held when the Worldcon is outside North America) and to create a Best Fan Performer (later modified to Best Fan Performance) Hugo Award category failed to pass.

The WSFS Mark Protection Committee will meet in CS8+11 at noon tomorrow, after the **Former Worldcon Chairs' Photo Shoot** in the same room. This meeting is open to all Worldcon members.



As human habitations go, London is not merely old, but ancient: a phoenix-city rising, over and over, from its own stubborn ashes. Small wonder, then, that Hidden London has practically become an SFFnal subgenre in its own right. In our minds, the tricksy Londons of Neil Gaiman's Neverwhere, China Mieville's Un Lun Dun, Ben Aaronovitch's Peter Grant series, Tom Pollock's Skyscraper Throne, Maureen Johnson's The Name of the Star and countless other stories, both past and present, all inform its reality as a place both impossibly real and, really, impossible. London is clotted with ghosts and magic, her Spring-Heeled Jacks and killer queens all dancing to the bonesaw song of the TARDIS. It is a place to love, to be drunk, to get lost in; it is a home and pilgrimage both, older than the Roman Empire, and if you treat either it or its inhabitants without due consideration, it will open its glass and concrete jaws and snap. And then, quite possibly, offer to buy you a drink.

The last time I visited London, I spent the bus-ride down in the company of a former Uzbek spy whose public defection made the papers, then went to stay in a street where the houses looked so dystopian that they've appeared in multiple SF films. So wherever you've come from, wherever you're going, welcome to London. You're part of her story, now, and all she asks in return is that you tell it.
