Registration is located inside the Convention Center at street level. Go through the lobby and it is on the right side and open the following hours.

Directions from Hotels to Convention Center (Registration, Info,

Exhibits, Programming, Dealers, Fan Tables, Dances and more):

From the Marriott RiverCenter (Con Suite, Hugos, Masquerade, Parties, Filk):

Street level path (dotted line, ADA access, fastest and no stairs, 10 min travel*):

Exit from lobby through side doors by Starbucks (not main entrance) turn right & cross Commerce St at the light to Marriott Riverwalk, follow sidewalk to first doors on left. Once through doors, go past elevators, turn right to proceed through lobby. (Directions continue from the Marriott Riverwalk).

From the Marriott Riverwalk (Childcare, Kaffeeklatches, Night Gaming):

From Lobby go out the main entrance (Market St), turn right, cross at the light and you will be at the Convention Center.

note: you cannot walk outside at street level along the back of the Riverwalk Hotel, you must enter the hotel to continue your journey.

Riverwalk path, at water level beneath Streets (arrow path, ADA access but see note, takes longest, is outside, 15-20 min travel*):

From Marriott Rivercenter: Take escalators or elevator from lobby down to the Riverwalk level. Exit through double doors and turn left. Follow the path along the river. You can take outside stairs up periodically (for example behind the Riverwalk Hotel) to reach street level at any time or enter through the bottom doors at both Marriott Riverwalk and Convention Center to get to the street level through the buildings. If entering the convention center from this level, you will need to go up one level to Street level for Registration.

note: Due to the high traffic volume of Labor Day crowds coupled with narrow points on the path, we encourage our less mobile members to use the Street level path above in getting to the convention center.

Welcome to Worldcon! Worldcon is the big event for science fiction fans with lots to do. But avoid falling into a rut and going to the same thing over and over. Yes, there are lots of panels featuring some of your favorite authors, artists, editors, and fellow fans. But don't neglect other aspects of this convention. We have lots of exhibits with a different theme each day. Author readings are a great way to experience writers who may be new to you. A story is always better when told by the actual author. Kaffeeklatsches and Literary Beers are a fantastic opportunity to chat with program participants in a small group. You must sign up in advance at the Information table at Registration. The art show answers the question, what if great museums had science fiction art; the best way to experience the art show are the docent tours—ask at the art show desk. Everyone knows about the Hugo Award Ceremony, but don't overlook other awards, from the Chesley Awards for art (Fri. 9 PM CC103B) to the Golden Duck awards for Children's and Young Adult (Sat. 5 PM CC008A). And don't forget about the filking (singing), films, and dances. You may even want to stop in at the WSFS Business Meeting and help govern Worldcon fandom.

TODAY'S EVENTS

MUSIC

Thursday is our special music night (not that there won't be music at other times.) It starts at 6 PM in CC Ballroom A with a special concert featuring the multi-talented Seanan McGuire & Dead Sexy (eligible for her first nomination in Best Dramatic Presentation). At 7 PM, our Guest of Honor Leslie Fish will give a concert showing why she is one of the best-known filkers. The CC Ballroom A concert continues with the Captains of the Chess Team, a Texas triumph, at 8 PM, or play Name That Tune! In CC 101B. At 9 PM, SF author, scientist, and singer Catharine Asaro performs music from her *Diamond Star* novel in CC Ballroom A, while Leslie Fish runs her own filk room in Rivercenter Conference 12. There is a Regency dance at 9 PM in CC 008A. Open filk starts at 10 PM in Rivercenter Conference 7, 8, and 16. There will be a music related panel, Texas Roadhouse Blues: Speculative Fiction and Rock and Roll at 3 PM in CC 006A. Sing out!

FILM FESTIVALS

Three Hugo Nominees will be shown Thursday. *The Avengers* (CC 006D at 8 PM); *Doctor Who: Asylum of the Daleks* (CC 202A at 8 PM); and *Doctor Who: The Angels Take Manhattan* (CC 101B at 9 PM).

LSC3 Short Fan Films Festival - Rivercenter Conference 13–14 from Noon–2 PM. Five short fan films including *Hughes the Force* and *Batman Puppet Master*.

LSC3 SF Shorts Film Festival - Rivercenter Conference 13–14 from 2–4 PM. 10 short SF films including *Giant Rubber Monster Movie* and *Starboy Eternity*.

LSC3 Horror Shorts Film Festival - Rivercenter Conference 13–14 from 8–10 PM. Nine short horror films including *Wrong Number* and *Suckablood*.

San Antonio, Texas

Restaurant Reviews

Adina Adler writes: "For lunch today I went to Rosario's Cafe y Cantina, at 910 S. Alamo Street. It's a .9 mile walk from the Marriott Rivercenter, but it's definitely worth the effort. The complimentary chips come with a salsa that was green and smoky and just a little spicy. I ordered chicken mole, which was a boneless piece of chicken that was perfectly cooked and completely enveloped in a delicious and slightly sweet sauce, accompanied by rice, refried beans, and tortillas. All that for \$6.95, which I thought was a pretty good deal. My dining companion had a small bowl of chicken posole soup, which was so good that he regretted having only gotten a small bowl."

Dave Weingart added, "Heartily seconded for Rosario's. Order the cheese enchiladas with the mole sauce. Mmmmmm." He also recommended the Green Vegetarian in the Pearl, about 2 miles north in the riverwalk. Vegetarian food, kosher. No alcohol, but very tasty food. Closed on Saturdays.

Laurie Mann recommended The Friendly Spot beer joint which is less than a block further down from Rosario's on S. Alamo. She also suggested Best Upscale: Restaurant: Gwendolyn and Best Breakfast: Taco Haven.

Richard Duffy said that coffee drinkers should skip the hotel Starbucks in favor of local outlets that use the Rewards benefits. Instead, go to the Starbucks at the lowest level of the Rivercenter Mall, tucked behind the Andean Fusion musicians' stand at the north end of the strip of water whose southern end is at the Convention Center. Easiest from the Marriott Rivercenter's western exit (Riverwalk-level), then down to the water and around the bend at right. Opens 7 PM every morning.

Hi WiFi

In the Convention Center Gallery there are three WiFi networks. Free Internet in the public areas is limited to 256K max. (Marriott lobbies also have free WiFi.) "Instant Internet" covers meeting rooms and Gallery, but not Hall A, at \$12.95 per calendar day for one device. Exhibitor Internet covers Hall A and is higher bandwidth for \$80/day (or \$240 for 5 days.)

Run (or Walk) Away

LoneStarCon begins each day with a Stroll with the Stars walk/run featuring some of your favorite science fiction people. This is a great way to get your exercise with Phil Foglio, Joe Halderman, David Brin, Shelia Williams and many others. Meet on the riverwalk downstairs from the Marriott Riverwalk at 9 AM.

Volunteer

The best way to enjoy LSC 3 is to volunteer. Even a few hours volunteering can be vital. Stop by Member Services at Registration. 15 hours gets you a free t-shirt, eligibility for prizes and access to the staff den. Volunteer 20 hours and you will be reimbursed if LSC3 makes a surplus.

Be Select

Help pick the sites for the 2015 Worldcon (Helsinki, Orlando, or Spokane) Visit Site Selection in Gallery next to the Dealer's Room. The voting fee of \$40 gives you a supporting membership in the winning convention. You can also vote for the 2014 NASFiC site (Detroit or Phoenix) for \$35.

Rayguns Over Texas

Rayguns Over Texas: Reception & Readings, Thurs. 6:30-8 PM will take place at the Central Library ("The Red Enchilada"), 600 Soledad (zip: 78205). Note that transportation is not provided for LSC3 attendees.

Most of the 21 contributors—including Chris N. Brown, Mark Finn and Joe R. Lansdale—will be present for reading, talking, noshing, selling and signing—in other words, the whole enchilada of a "launching" sort of event.

This is open to the public, so come one come all. From the convention center, it's a .9 mile walk, a short bus or trolley ride, or a \$6 cab ride. If you're driving, there is a city parking structure next to the library; the first hour is free for library users.





A long-time fan once said that conventions run on blood, sweat, and volunteers: the greatest of these is volunteers.

Friday WSFS Preliminary Business Meeting

No old business was passed on from last year's Chicon 7. A resolution was submitted party up to this point, in part because and passed to endorse the Worldcon Heritage Organization (which is preserving items of historic interest from previous Worldcons). Endorsement would make it eligible for Worldcon pass-along funds. An amendment to the Worldcon Constitution was introduced to expand Best Fan Artist to include all types of visual and performance art. There were also amendments dealing with mandating paper publications, dealing with membership fees and voting rights, and delineating financial reporting requirements for Worldcon committees. These amendments will be considered at Saturday's Main Business Meeting.

> Three amendments that will not be considered at Saturday's meeting include one to create a Best Dramatic Presentation: Very Short Form Hugo (under 15 minutes); one to delete all three fan Hugos (Fanzine, Fan Writer and Fan Artist); and one to create a Young Adult (YA) Hugo category. However, a committee will be created tomorrow to study the YA Hugo and report back at Loncon 3.


> Much of the meeting dealt with the Hugo Eligibility of the Rest of the World (HEROW) Committee, which deals with the granting of an additional year of eligibility for works not published initially in the United States. The Committee is not a standing Worldcon committee, so both the committee and the eligibility of current works were extended for another year. Amendments to change the requirement for granting eligibility from a 3/4 to a 2/3 vote were introduced for two sections. An amendment to the WSFS Constitution to make the HEROW Committee a standing committee was also introduced. These amendments will also be discussed at the Main Business Meeting.

> Efforts to apply the HEROW exception to the Retro Hugos failed. Two resolutions that would make *The Hobbit* and *Snow White and the Seven Dwarves* eligible for the ballot of the 1939 Retro Hugos, which will be awarded in London next year, were also defeated.

> Sunday's Business Meeting will deal primarily with Site Selection, as well as presentations from bids, leftover business, and any needed committee reports.

> Finally, the WSFS Business Meeting accepted reports from the Mark Protection Committee (which protects the use of the term "Worldcon," "Hugo Awards," "World Science Fiction Convention," and the Hugo Award symbol); the Nitpicking and Flyspecking

Committee (which maintains the rules), the Worldcon Runners Guide Committee (which updates said guide), and the Formalization of Long Lists Entries (FOLLE) Committee with little comment. In addition, the new members of the Mark Protection Committee will be voted on tomorrow. Financial reports from various Worldcons, past and present, were accepted. Reports were not accepted from L.A.Con and Renovation, as they did not send representatives.

Guests ImPress

On Thursday, LSC3 Guests held a press conference. They discussed NASA's presentations for this weekend, SF in Hollywood, depression in present SF and what imagination can do with recent scientific discoveries.

Paul Abell, Lead Scientist for Planetary Small Bodies for NASA, and others answered reporters' questions on what it is like to be a guest of honor at the World SF Convention.

Norman Spinrad spoke on how SF has been stuck in viewing the present as the end of everything, even when recent discoveries have made it just the beginning. "There are 17 million green planets in this galaxy alone. This is enormous. This is the golden age of astronomy. This is going to change everything and challenge religion and philosophy. I don't think SF right now is really dealing with it.

Ellen Datlow, a short story editor, spoke on SF and realism, "Good SF is as realistic as anything else. SF is about what could happen." Darrell R. Sweet, an artist in his own right, spoke briefly of the vast quantity of work produced by his father, Darrell K. Sweet, who passed away this year. "Most of it is in my house and people don't get to see it. I appreciate the opportunity to come and show it to all."

The value of SF to the young was voiced by Joe R. Landsdale. A Texas writer, he



said it was reading SF that drew him into other reading and writing. Science fiction as fertile ground for other arts was expressed by Leslie Fish, a singer of songs, who said filk was "an indigenous self-generated music of a sub culture."

Rounding out the panel was toastmaster Paul Cornell of England, who quipped about how the Convention decided to use a local boy to host the Masquerade and the Hugo Awards. – Anne Pinzow

Saturday WSFS Main Business Meeting

by Lew Wolkoff

The following were passed and will be sent on to Loncon 3 for consideration: (1) an amendment that Worldcon and NASFIC Committees could charge members for the cost of providing and mailing paper copies of their generally distributed publications; (2) an amendment adding requirements to financial reports made by Worldcon and NASFIC Committees; and (3) an amendment clarifying the Best Fan Artist Hugo to be at non-professional events including conventions.

The two amendments referring to membership costs and unbundling key WSFS rights (including Hugo voting and site selection rights) were sent to a committee, which will make a report at next year's Loncon3.

When candidate Deb Geisler withdrew her name from consideration, the remaining candidates for the three open seats on the Mark Protection Committee: Ben Yalow, Kevin Standlee, and Tim Illingworth, were elected by acclamation.

The two amendments reducing the percentages needed to grant a change in eligibility under the Hugo Eligibility Rest of the World (HEROW) rules from 3/4 to 2/3 were passed and sent on to Loncon 3. The amendment making the HEROW extension a permanent part of the WSFS Constitution was also passed and sent on to Loncon 3.

No representative was present from L.A.con IV to give its convention's financial report. A representative from Renovation reported that most of their surplus had been distributed, and that they intended to deal with the remainder by the end of the year.

A new item of business was introduced at the end of the meeting. This was an amendment to remove references to the three North America Zones from the requirements for Mark Protection Committee representation. This also passed and was sent on to Loncon 3 for consideration.



Spokane Wins 2015 Worldcon On Third Ballot Detroit Wins 2014 NASFil On First Round

For the second time in 10 years, it took the third round of balloting to declare the Spokane bid as the winner of the 2015 Worldcon Site Selection, while it only took one round for Detroit to win the 2014 NASFiC.

During the first round of the Australian-style balloting for the 2015 Worldcon, all of the votes are counted by the first choice. Although Helsinki has the most votes with 528, it did not have the required 665 needed to win (based on the total number of 1348 valid votes cast).

After the first round, there is a redistribution of all None Of The Above and, Write-In ballots to one of the three legitimate bidding cities (Helsinki, Orlando and Spokane) and No Preference, if that ballot had a second choice on it.

After the second round, Orlando was dropped from the running after totaling 307 votes, compared to Helsinki's 533 votes and Spokane's 481 (but were far below the 661 votes needed to win on that round). Then there was a redistribution of the Orlando, Write-in and, None Of The Above ballots to either Helsinki or Spokane or No Preference, if one of them was marked on the ballot.

After the third round, Spokane was declared the winner, receiving 645 votes to Helsinki's 610 (with 628 votes needed to win on that round).

In addition, in the first round of balloting, Detroit received 231 votes to Phoenix's 210, with 223 votes needing to win based on the 453 valid votes cast.

We would like to congratulate Spokane and Detroit on their victories and wish them success in their conventions.

Both conventions will have tables set up in the Fan Table area in the Convention Center Gallery next to the Dealers Room where you can buy memberships and get further information on their conventions (and even volunteer to help).
