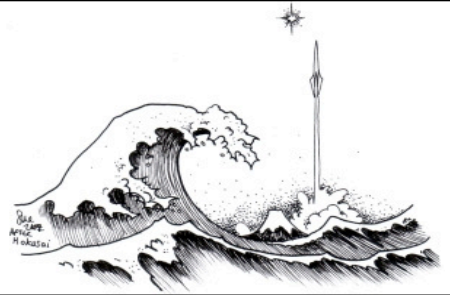

Deadline for WSFS Business

The deadline for submitting new business to this year's WSFS Business Meeting is 2100 on Thursday. To submit proposals, bring 200 copies including an original signed by at least two members of Nippon 2007 to the Convention Office, or deliver them in person to meeting Chairman Kevin Standlee or Secretary Pat McMurray.

Help Choose the Site of 2009 Worldcon

All members of Nippon 2007 are eligible to vote in the election to choose the site of the 2009 Worldcon. Two sites are contending for the right to host the convention: Montreal, Quebec, Canada and Kansas City (Overland Park), Kansas, USA. Representatives of both groups are staffing tables with information about their bids and hosting parties where

they invite you to come and talk to them about why you should vote for them.

The Site Selection voting table is located Exhibition Hall A and is open as follows:

Thursday	1300 to 1800
Friday	1000 to 1800
Saturday	1000 to 1900

(Last chance to vote!)

In order to vote, you must pay an Advance Supporting Membership fee of ¥ 5,000 (US\$45). This fee makes you a supporting member of the 2009 Worldcon no matter who wins the election. This means you will get all of the 2009 Worldcon's publications and you will be eligible to nominate on the 2009 and 2010 Hugo Awards, vote on the final ballot for the 2009 Hugo Awards, and to vote to choose the site of the 2011 Worldcon. Voters are also guaranteed the right (for a limited time) to convert their supporting membership to an attending membership for a reduced cost.

The election ends at 1900 (7 PM) Saturday. The results will be announced at the WSFS Business Meeting at 1000 Sunday morning.

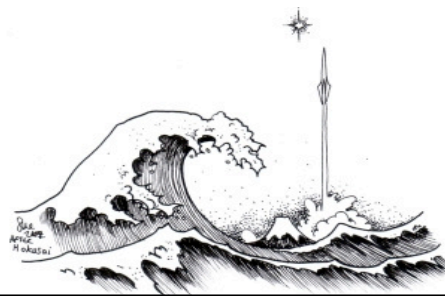

Restaurant Review: Chandler's Crabhouse Yokohama

If you're looking for a place to eat and you've had your fill of sushi and ramen, you can find some good old-fashioned surf-and-turf just a few minutes away at the Queen's Square Shopping Center, in the "at!" section on 2F. Menus are in English and the wait-staff speak basic English as well. It's a bit pricey compared to McDonalds or Subway, but then, you won't find steaks or crab legs at either of those restaurants.

Dinner prices run between 1500 and 5200 Yen. Downright affordable when compared to some other nearby restaurants. At lunchtime they have burgers and sandwiches; for dinner, they offer dishes such as grilled salmon and crab-stuffed prawns. The food was quite tasty, but the service was a bit slow considering that it was not terribly crowded while we were there on Thursday night.

If you're in the mood for steak or crab legs, then Chandler's Crabhouse is worth a visit.

WSFS Business Meeting: Friday Schedule

The following items are scheduled for the Preliminary WSFS Business Meeting, Friday 1000. Additional business may be submitted before the deadline at 2100 Thursday.

Committee Reports

- **WSFS Mark Protection Committee (MPC)**, including nominations for elections to the MPC. The MPC manages the service marks on "Hugo Award," "Worldcon," etc., and the official WSFS and Hugo Award web sites.
- **Nitpicking & Flyspecking Committee**. This committee deals with technical and wording issues surrounding Worldcon rules.
- **Worldcon Runners Guide Editorial Committee**: This committee maintains a manual of past Worldcon organization practices.
- **Hugo Eligibility Rest of the World (HEROW) Committee**, including a proposal to renew the "Blanket Eligibility" resolution giving an extended period of Hugo Award eligibility to works previously published outside the USA if they receive first publication in 2007.
- **Formulation of Long List Entries (FOLLE) Committee**. This committee maintains the official list of past Worldcons and resolves conflicts over information in that list, and related matters.
- **Taming the Digital Wilderness Committee**. This committee has been researching issues regarding electronically-published works and the Hugo Award.
- **Financial reports** from seated Worldcons and past Worldcons and NASFiCs with remaining surplus funds.

Constitutional Amendments

The Preliminary meeting will establish debate time limits and deal with technical issues surrounding the following amendments to the WSFS Constitution. The first item received first passage at last year's Worldcon, and, if ratified, will become part of the WSFS Constitution at the end of this year's Worldcon. All others are new proposals that, if passed, will be sent on to next year's Worldcon for ratification.

- **Best Artist Hugo Eligibility**: Requires prospective nominees for the Best Professional Artist Hugo Award to include citations of work published during the previous year.
- **Gaughan Gone**: Repeals the rule that forbids a person from being a nominee for Best Professional Artist and Best Fan Artist in the same year.
- **One-Vote Wonders**: Requires that the list of Hugo Award nominees and near-nominees include only works or people that received a minimum number of nominations.

Robert Anson Heinlein

On the shoulders of giants...

This year marks 100 years since the birth of Robert Anson Heinlein, and there's no doubt that he left his mark on the field of Science Fiction, but in what ways has his writing influenced the genre, and how will his works influence coming generations of writers and readers? That was the question put forth in Friday Morning's Panel: Robert Anson Heinlein: His Impact on Us. David Silver, president of the Heinlein Society, moderated the panel, and each of the panelists (Farah Mendlesohn, Kari Maund, G. David Nordley, and Dr. Keith G. Kato) discussed at length how they came to know and appreciate Heinlein's writing.

The panelists praised Heinlein's ability to push the envelope a little farther with each story, as well as his diverse cast of characters, which included protagonists of many races, genders, and orientations. Kari Maund cited what she called "Heinlein's Law", namely, "Sin is hurting other people," and that apart from that, pretty much anything goes. There was also much discussion about the quality of his female characters. Not everyone agreed that his ability to write women was strong, but all agreed that he did a great deal to advance the portrayal of female protagonists in Science Fiction. The panelists also noted that the genre today suffers from a shortage of the sort of optimistic, inclusive futures often described in Heinlein's work.

There was little disagreement that Heinlein had a profound impact on the genre of Science Fiction, in particular, the transition of writing about the effect of technology on ordinary people, as opposed to writing about the technology itself. Most of the panel was somewhat pessimistic about Heinlein's continuing level of influence, claiming that the sort of self-sufficient, engineer-adventurers seem to be out of style. But David Silver concluded the panel by saying that the current trends are a test, and the question of whether or not Heinlein's influence continues into the future is up to us, the fans who love his work.

WSFS Business Meeting Results - Friday

The Preliminary Business Meeting on Friday morning established debate time limits for the three constitutional amendments listed in Issue 2 and also one additional constitutional amendment that would create a Best Web Site Hugo Award as a permanent category. These proposals will be debated and voted at the Saturday Business Meeting (1000, room 415), except for the "One-Vote Wonders" proposal, which was postponed until Sunday's meeting.

The Business Meeting also renewed the "Blanket Eligibility Extension" resolution described in Issue 2, continued and re-

appointed various WSFS committees, adopted a number of technical proposals from those committees, and received financial reports from past Worldcons and NASFiCs.

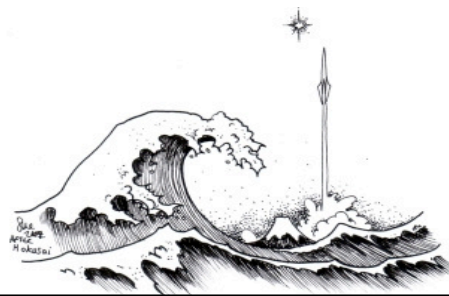

Sheldon*.

Prometheus Awards

The Libertarian Futurist Society (LFS) announced their 2007 awards during Nippon 2007. The awards ceremony was held on Friday 31 August.

The Prometheus Award for Best Novel goes to the novel *Glasshouse* by Charles Stross.

The Prometheus Hall of Fame Award was a tie this year with awards going to the novel *It Can't Happen Here* by Sinclair Lewis and the novella "True Names" by Vernor Vinge.

This year the Libertarian Futurist Society voted a Special Award for the motion picture *V for Vendetta* directed by James McTeigue, screenplay by the Wachowski brothers.

Founded in 1982, the Libertarian Futurist Society sponsors the annual Prometheus Awards and the Prometheus Hall of Fame; publishes reviews, news and columns in the quarterly "Prometheus"; arranges annual award ceremonies at the Worldcon; debates libertarian futurist issues (such as private space exploration); and provides fun and fellowship for libertarian SF fans.

Podcasting

In his kaffeeklatche on Friday, Patrick Nielsen Hayden, SF editor, writer, and teacher, spoke about the many changes taking place in the publishing industry. He answered questions about issues including the proliferation of podcasts and ebooks as alternatives to traditional print books, and the increasingly common practice of giving content away online for free. Nielsen Hayden worked directly with Cory Doctorow, making the latter's novel *Down and Out in the Magic Kingdom* available on the Internet for free, and suggested that doing so was nothing but positive, as an author's greatest enemy is not theft, but obscurity. The small group and informal setting made for a refreshing change from the more structured panels, and the whole affair was recorded for future release as a podcast from Tor Books, along with others being made through the course of the Worldcon.

Tech Savvy Criminal Panel Makes Masterminds

On Friday afternoon, authors Patricia MacEwen, Cory Doctorow, and Geoffrey A. Landis (left to right in photo below) discussed the many ways tech savvy criminals could get away with crimes from the mundane to the disastrous. The audience in the packed room eagerly became absorbed in the thought experiment and was soon adding to the master plans being discussed. Ms. MacEwen, whose background is in crime scene investigation, discussed various ways to commit murder without being caught. Mr. Doctorow, with a background in computer law and civil liberties, waxed poetic about ways to disable and

circumvent computer security. NASA Physicist Dr. Landis was all about the money. More than once he returned to his central theme that while some crimes are possible many of them did not have an easy way of making him rich.

The concept of a mastermind criminal is one that has played well in literature for hundreds of years. Today's technology and "Security Theater" act to create a panoply of options for authors and their masterminds. Even the non-authors in the crowd eagerly participated as a thought experiment to see just how well their own nefarious plans might come to fruition.

Ninety minutes flew by all too soon, and both panelists and audience were returned to their normal law abiding selves. While it is exciting to play the criminal mastermind in your head, most of us don't have the desire to risk jail time or worse for criminal gains.

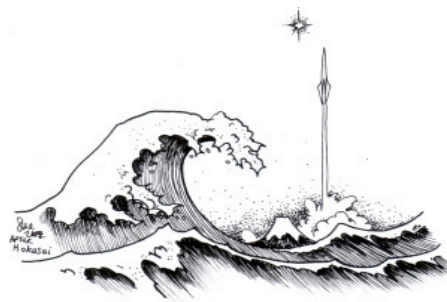

The Golden Duck is awarded for excellence in children's science fiction as judged by librarians, teachers, and those working in the sciences. This restaurant has least one English-speaking waitress, and has an English menu. There is a nice selection of Japanese and American starter bits at ¥500 including: fish & chips and edamame (boiled soy beans). The chips (fries) were nice. The third red wine down on the wine list is an OK Italian (¥2300). The mains (entrées) vary in size, and the quality is OK. We tried: Mixed Grill on Skewers (¥1380), which came with vegetables and was nice; Grilled Diced Steak (¥980) was also OK but no sides. They have no concept of where "rare" is on the doneness scale. I would hate to see the lump of charcoal that is "well done". The food was very garlic-heavy. They have a 'garlic' section on the menu, but even stuff that doesn't mention it has it.

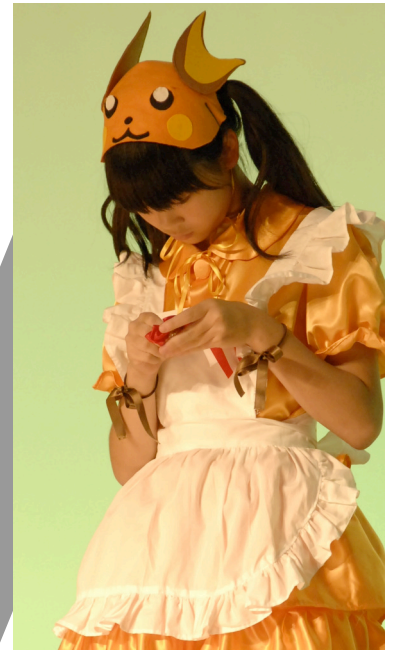
