

International Science Fantasy Art Exhibition

General Rules:

1. These rules apply to all entries.
2. All entries must be original works of a science fiction, fantasy or fantastic theme. For abstract art, the title of the work will indicate the theme.
3. Full name and address (printed or typed) must be on the back or bottom (or attached in some way to 3-D) pieces of each piece of work, including sketch table material.
4. No piece of work may be entered for competition in more than one Worldcon or one Regional show.
5. All entries must be matter, mounted, framed, or otherwise "finished" to display the work to best advantage. Acetate is preferred to glass for protection of artwork.
6. Artwork may be in any medium (including photography) or dimensions.
7. Entries cannot be returned unless return postage has been included with mail entries. Packaging, insurance (and copyrighting, if desired) are the artist's own responsibility. ISFAE cannot accept any liability. Unsold work without return postage will be donated to the next convention for auction on a 60/40% basis.
8. ISFAE reserves the right to reject entries which do not comply with the rules, or which do not meet the standards of the show.
9. ISFAE collects a 15% commission on all sales; the remaining 85% goes to the artist/exhibitor.
10. Multiple prints of the same design, or portfolios, if entered, must be registered as one piece.
11. The DEADLINE for artshow entries is Friday, September 3, 1971. The show will start hanging entries at 10 A.M. that morning and would like people to bring their entries in as early as possible so that hanging can be completed and the show opened to the convention attendees as soon as possible. Those who plan to mail in their entries should plan to mail them to the convention address, marked clearly "For the attention of the Art Show." They should be mailed no later than August 1, 1971, to ensure that they will arrive before the convention.
12. Artists who plan on sending entries by mail should write either to the Art Show, c/o the convention or to Bjo Trimble, 869 Irolo, Los Angeles CA 90005, for entry forms and instructions on filling them out. These forms should accompany all mail entries.

Judging the Show:

Judging will be held on the Saturday morning of the convention. The art show will select a panel of five judges, who will be chosen to provide a diversity of age, sex, geographical and social stratum of fandom. Categories in which art show awards may be given are as follows: Science Fiction Illustration; Fantasy Art; Astronomical; Heroic Fantasy; Cartooning; Children's Fantasy; Design; Open Award; Judges' Choice. Categories for photography will be established as needed. The art show will be closed to the public during the judging. There will be a special category - Popular Vote - for which the public may cast ballots. These will be available at the art show desk.

The Worlds of Clifford Simak

In honor of Clifford Simak, Guest of Honor at Noreascon, there will be a special section in the art show this year for art illustrating any of his works. This section is open for entries from any artist. Mr. Simak will be the judge for this section of the show. Registration and Entry Fees:

Registration fee is \$2.00 per person (there is no fee for registration in the Junior Div. [any artist up to 14 years of age]). Entry fee is 25¢ per piece or work. This fee applies to the Junior Div. also. There is no entry or registration fee for Overseas entries if these are for sale. If they are not for sale they pay full fees. There are no fees for sketch table work.

Sketch table art:

This need not be SF or fantasy in there, but should be material to appeal to SF fans. Sketches may be any size, any medium, and in any number. Prices may range from 10¢ up. No fees for these but 15% commission will be collected from sales. Copies of photographs may also be sold on the sketch table. Unsold sketch table work may remain with the art show for two Worldcon shows, at which point these will be returned to the artist if return postage has been provided for that purpose. Otherwise the sketches will be donated to the forthcoming convention for auction (on standard 60/40% basis if the work has the full name and address of the artist on it).

Pricing Art:

You may either name a set price for your artwork or, if you prefer, give a minimum bid price which people may then bid up on the bid sheets posted next to the pieces of art. Many artists have come to prefer the bid system over the last several years as it frequently results in higher prices of the art.

Bids may be raised by a minimum of 50¢ and written bidding will close at 5 P.M. on Sunday, September 5. There will be a voice bid off on contested items from 5 to 6 P.M. and since it is unlikely that this will allow enough time for bid offs on all contested items, the voice bid off will be continued at noon on Monday, September 6. A list of artists whose work will be bid on on Sunday will be posted at the art show desk for the convenience of those interested in bidding on artwork.

All purchased artwork must be picked up and signed for by 3 P.M. of the last day of the convention. Artwork will not be released to anyone but the purchaser, except by pre-arrangement, or with a written release. Art may NOT be removed from the show until it closes. (Sketch table material excepted)

PLEASE use a check or a Postal Money Order. At present, over 80 tickets have been sold, mostly as entire tables. The earlier your order arrives, the closer to the front you will be.

Discussion Groups

Noreascon discussion groups will meet at different times at the convenience of the participants and each group will have no more than 20 people, so that everyone will get a chance to talk and to be able to listen to others. The time-limit on these groups is open-ended; they run as long as the participants wish.

No mail registration can be accepted after 10 August 1971 as we cannot depend upon the Post Office to get your convention materials to you. Registration fee at the convention will be \$10 for those who have not yet joined. So join now.

Conversion: The cost of conversion to Attending membership until 10 August 1971 is the difference between the cost of Supporting membership *at the time you bought a Supporting membership* and the cost of an Attending membership *at the time of conversion*. To convert a Supporting membership to an Attending Membership at the Convention will cost \$6 regardless of when you bought your Supporting membership. Save money - convert to Attending membership now.

Masquerade

COME IN COSTUME - JOIN THE FUN
BE A PART OF THE COSTUME BALL!
EVEN IF YOU DO NOT PLAN TO ENTER THE COMPETITION

The Masquerade will be held on the Saturday evening of the Convention; however, there will be some new features.

There will be preregistration of all costumes that are entering the judging. Registration will close at 1200 (noon) on the day of the Masquerade. Fire laws do not allow certain effects (such as the 'blasters' used in one costume at St. Louiscon) so, for the sake of safety, there will be a prejudging earlier in the day.

Contestants entering costumes requiring special effects, microphones, or lights must communicate with Stew Brownstein, in writing, the exact details at least 48 hours prior to noon Saturday so that arrangements can be made. To preserve the desired surprise of your costume: address your letters to NOREASCON attn: Masquerade, and they will be forwarded to Stew Brownstein unopened.

Due to the many complaints by contestants and audience over the years, there will be NO flash or strobe or floodlight photography, except for authorized photographers for the Convention, allowed in the Grand Ballroom during the presentations. A special room for photographers will be equipped with appropriate colored backdrops for photography.

Below is an exposure guide for most popular films; these should be regarded as exposures at the lowest light levels. The stage will be floodlit and the exposure levels will be substantially increased. Film purchased should be balanced for indoor photography so that no filters will be required. The light level is sufficient so that the metering system of automatic exposure cameras will operate without the need for manual override.

The presentation runway will be 80 feet long. The runways are standard fashion show runways - sturdy and wide - and not just tables.

We will have ultraviolet lights ("black light") available for those costumes designed to utilize it. If you are planning such a costume and have not yet contacted us please do so as soon as possible.

Please direct any questions you have about the Masquerade at all to Stew Brownstein at the address given above.

Hotel

Included with this progress report is a hotel reservation card. Listed below are a few hints to ease your interactions with the hotel.

If you plan to arrive later than 1800 (6 pm) send in a deposit equal to at least one night's rent; this will hold the reservation until the time you specify. Even if you plan on arriving before 1800 it is still a good idea to send in a deposit since transport systems have been known to develop delays.

When you have sent in your deposit and received your confirmation you have a contract with the hotel which is binding on them.

Sheraton Policy: if you have a confirmed reservation and you show up at the specified time and your room is not available you will receive \$20 of credit with the Sheraton chain. Of course, you will be asked to provide credit identification when you check in. This reservation at least two weeks before the start of the convention.

If you plan to pay by credit card it is convenient to note this on the reservation card. If you are paying by cash or check you *may* be asked to provide credit identification when you check in. This is a legal requirement of Massachusetts and of most other states.

Check out time on Monday 6 September will be extended to 1500 (3 pm) IF you notify the hotel at the time of making your reservation (note it on the card), or at check-in time at the hotel or any time up to Sunday 5 September. It is advised that you do this if you are planning to leave Monday.

If you want a double bed rather than twin beds please indicate by circling the appropriate word on the reservation card.

The studio single is truly a single. Rollaway beds (up to 3 per room depending upon room size, 2 in most) can be brought into all other rooms. Please indicate this on your reservation card. The hotel has 125 rollaways; if it finds more are needed they can be obtained - but not easily at the last moment. They can be gotten with the least trouble if you give adequate notice. Four man dormitory rooms can thus be set up in the doubles using rollaways for \$8 - \$10 per person.

Sheraton Family Plan: All children occupying the same room with the parents -- no charge. If two bedrooms are required to accommodate parents and children, the single rate applies to both rooms. The hotel will make every effort to have these rooms connecting or adjoining if at all possible.

Note that you *must* be a Noreascon member and *must* put your membership number on the reservation form to get the convention rates. The hotel will be checking this against an up-to-date computer listing supplied by the committee.

Boston Tower Suites The "Height of Elegance"

A gala reception on the topmost floor of the *Sheraton-Boston* heralded a unique concept in guest hotel living.

The Sheraton Towers, "Boston's Height of Elegance," located on the top four floors of the hotel, consists of 123 bedrooms and 122 parlors and offers special services including preregistration.

All rooms are lavishly furnished and equipped with "specials" including evening chambermaid service, personalized matches, flowers, candy, and electric shoe buffers, among other things.

A luxury lounge on the 29th floor offers Towers guests privacy for Continental breakfast from 7 to 9 a.m., and cocktails from 4:30 to 10:30 nightly. The Sheraton Towers also features concierge-type service.

General manager Richard Barger says, "We've tried to anticipate the harried traveler's every wish for a totally relaxing, comfortable and personalized stay."

The Sheraton Boston, which is located in Prudential Center, recently marked its fifth anniversary. As Boston's largest hotel it has more than 1000 guest rooms, seven restaurants and bars, and a swimming pool with cabana suites.

All-Night Food Service At Boston Sheratons

The *Sheraton-Plaza* and *Sheraton-Boston* have both instituted additional food services which are guaranteed to please early bird and night hawk alike.

At the *Sheraton-Plaza*, the *Minute Chef*, its fast food restaurant, is open around the clock from Monday through Saturday afternoon; it closes then until Monday morning. Along with this there is limited room service through the night. A guest may call an order to the *Minute Chef* and have it sent up by bellman.

The *Sheraton-Boston* keeps its *Pavilion Coffee Shop* open seven days a week, 24 hours a day, but does not offer room service. A special "Night-Hawker Menu" which is served from 10:30 p.m. to 7 a.m. includes the Sheraton Royal Hamburger, ham and eggs, steak and eggs and pizza, among other things.

In general, keep it cool.

BY AIR: from Logan International Airport (East Boston)

via Airport Limousine: direct to the Sheraton-Boston and other downtown hotels - \$1.50/person.

via Taxicab: cost is approximately \$3-4. Passengers also pay tolls in tunnel (25¢)

via MBTA: take Airport Loop bus (20¢) to Airport Station (Blue Line). Subway fare is 25¢. Take inbound train to Government Center Under station. Go to upper level of station and board trolley car (this is still underground). If you do not mind a slightly longer walk to the hotel stay on the trolley until Auditorium Station. Leave via the Berkeley Street exit. To save a little on the walk, take the trolley only one stop to Park Street Station and transfer to an "Arborway via Huntington" car. Get off at Prudential Station.

BY TRAIN: from North Station

via Taxicab: cost is approximately \$2-3.

via MBTA: take trolley (Green Line) at North Station into town. Be careful not to take the rapid transit trains (Orange Line) which also has a stop at North Station. This trolley passes through Park Street Station. See above for further information. Cost is 25¢.

from South Station

via Taxicab: cost is approximately \$1.50-2.50.

via MBTA: take subway (Red Line) at South Station Under towards Cambridge (North) for two stops to Park Station Under. Go up one level to Park Street Station. Follow instructions as above. Cost is 25¢.

BY BUS: from Trailways Terminal

via Taxicab: cost is approximately \$1-2.

via MBTA: walk to corner of Tremont and Boylston Streets. Take underground trolley OUTBOUND. All cars signed "Arborway via Huntington" stop at Prudential Station. All other cars stop at Auditorium Station. Cost is 25¢.

from Greyhound Terminal

via Taxicab: cost is approximately \$1-2.

via MBTA: walk to corner of Boylston and Arlington Streets. Take underground trolley OUTBOUND. Follow instructions for Trailways as to cars. Cost is 25¢.

BY AUTOMOBILE: if coming from South or West take the Massachusetts Turnpike Extension into Boston to Exit 22, Huntington Avenue Interchange. Proceed along Huntington Avenue Outbound. Entranceto Parking Garage is near hotel on left hand side of the street. Park in the section marked for hotel guests. There is direct entry to the hotel from the garage via elevators or staircase.

if coming from the North take routes C1/C9 into Storrow Memorial Drive. Get off at the Copley Square Exit. Turn right onto Beacon Street, Turn left on Exeter Street; go past the Boston Public Library and turn right onto Huntington Avenue. Follow directions as above.

No matter how you go you will probably get lost; don't be shy above asking directions.

Business Meeting Rules

The business meeting of the 29th World Science Fiction Convention will be held Sunday 5 September 1971 at 1000(10 am). The site of the 1973 World Science Fiction Convention will be selected at a special meeting held Saturday 4 September 1971 at 1000(10 am). The meetings will be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order, Revised*, as interpreted by the Parliamentarian except where contravened by the following Special Rules:

1. All motions, Resolutions, or other items to be presented for a vote of the convention membership at the Sunday business meeting must be submitted in written form, together with a written second, and received by the Chairman of the Noreascon Committee at least eighteen (18) hours prior to that meeting.
2. All groups planning to make Convention Bids at the con-site selection meeting Saturday must declare their intention to bid to the Chairman of the Noreascon committee, in writing, no later than 1000 (10 am) Wednesday 1 September 1971. [see BIDDING below for details]
3. If the Parliamentarian thinks the circumstances warrant it, he may accept - subject to the approval of the Chairman - motions submitted to him after the deadline, but before the opening of the business meeting, provided such motions are submitted to him in writing, with written seconds. These motions, if approved by the committee, will be presented to the convention after all other business has concluded.
4. Amendments may be submitted from the floor under the following restrictions:
 - 4.1 Amendments must be related to the general aim of the original proposal; "amendments" that are actually new proposals will be automatically ruled out of order.
 - 4.2 Amendments-to-amendments will be allowed only with the consent of the original amender under the 'originator's consent' clause in *Robert's Rules of Order, Revised* and will not otherwise be admitted to vote. In short, any amendment offered to a legitimately-submitted proposal will be voted on as offered or as amended with the consent of the amendment's originator only.
5. In all cases, the decision of the Parliamentarian will be final.

Bidding

The site for the 1973 (31st) World Science Fiction Convention will be selected in 1971 at NOREASCON; bids will be accepted from any city in the Central Division of North America as defined in section 3.02 of the Rules of the World Science Fiction Society as given above. At least one member of the bidding group must be a recognized fan. Written notification of intent to bid must be submitted to the NOREASCON Chairman at least 72 hours before the con site selection meeting (i.e. by 1000 Wednesday 1 September 1971), Saturday morning 4 September 1971 and preferably as soon as possible. In accord with section 3.06 of the Rules, voters must join the 1973 convention in order to participate in the site selection. Each group, by submitting a bid, agrees to provide manpower to aid in the registration of such voters.

To date the NOREASCON committee has received notification of intent to bid from the cities of DALLAS and TORONTO. The city of MINNEAPOLIS has withdrawn its bid in favor of TORONTO.

No person may participate in the con-site selection meeting, either as a spectator or voter or bidder, unless such persons are registered members of NOREASCON. After this requirement is met, certain other requirements as appearing hereafter will be imposed for eligibility for participation.

Voting for the convention site shall be by secret ballot, and the winning site must receive a majority of ballots cast. Only those persons who have purchased advance membership in the 1973 World Science Fiction Convention shall be entitled to attend the con-site selection meeting; only those persons in attendance of that meeting shall be entitled to vote.

Bids are limited to fifteen (15) minutes speaking time, to be divided between the original bidding speech and such seconding speeches as the bidding group shall choose.

Security

With the increase in value of the Art Show and the Hucksters' Room it has become necessary to provide professional security guards to prevent theft. Therefore, the convention is hiring guards from the Boston Police Department for this purpose.

Most of the problems and thefts are caused by non-fans. To handle this aspect plastic badges will be used in addition to the usual cardboard name tags. These badges must be worn to get into all functions with the exception of people in costume at the Masquerade and ticket holders at the banquet. This is necessary, unfortunately, to prevent those who have not paid the registration fee from imposing upon those who have had the courtesy and honesty to do so.

Auction

In addition to raising necessary funds for the convention, the auctions are the only place that most fans can get original artwork and manuscripts. Donations of auction material are very welcome. Generally, the person donating the material will get 60% of the sale price, although in special cases other arrangements can be made. Hal Clement has given to the convention the corrected galley proofs to his novel *Needle*. Artist Steve Fabian has donated the original artwork used on the cover of the third progress report. The committee has also obtained some copies of the non-defunct Anglo-Australian SF magazine *Vision of Tomorrow*. We have also made arrangements with noted award-winning artists Frank Kelly Freas and Jack Gaughan to have covers and interior artwork up for auction. Jerry Wenker has given us some old manuscripts from *Fantastika Universee*. The New England Science Fiction Association, has passed along to us artwork given them by Judy-Lynn Benjamin of *Universal PD Co.* and Larry Niven's own original drawings for *Ringworld* (the cover of the paperback is based on one of them). A few other people have also brought forward material. We'd like to thank all these people. If you have any sf material to be auctioned please get in touch with the committee.

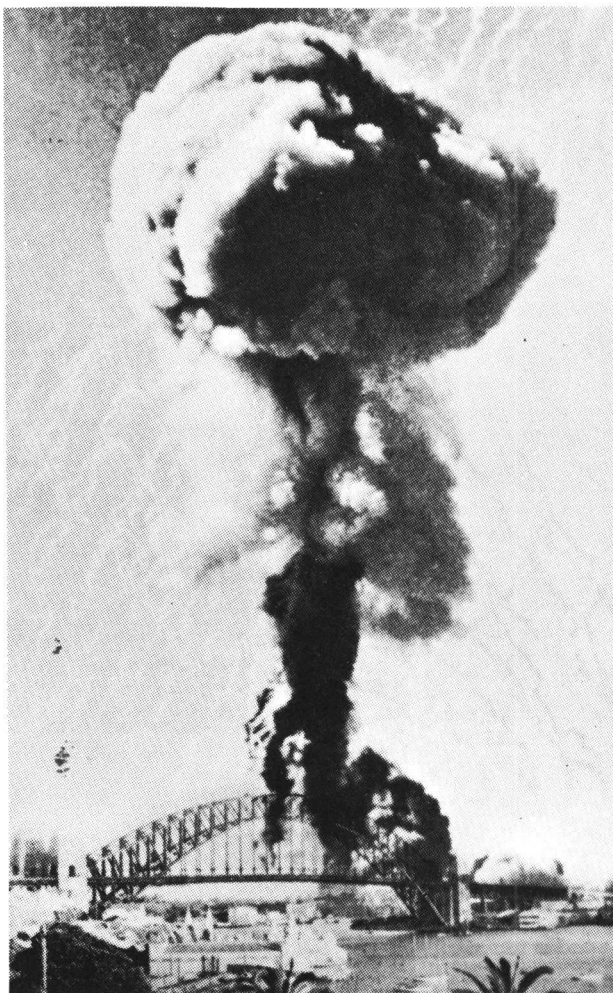

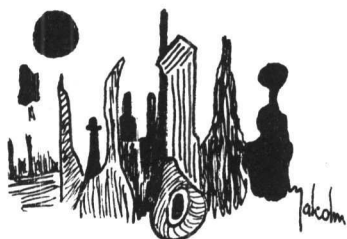

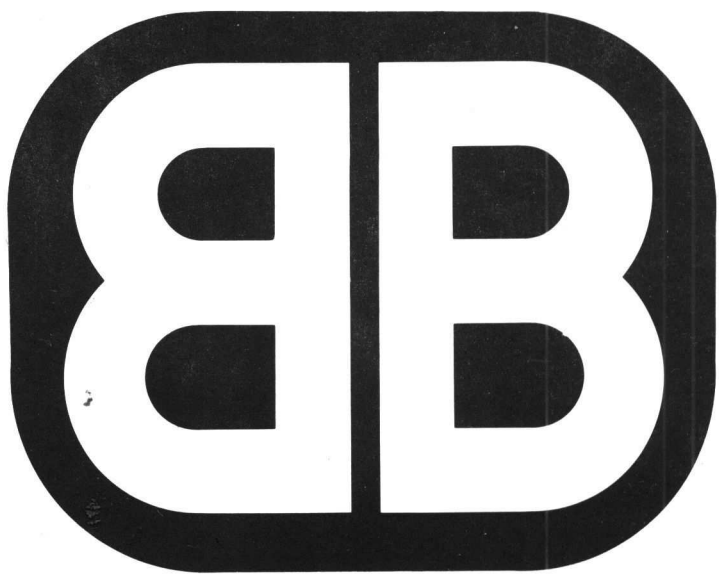
