I was standing in front of the mirror. It was 5 am, the Monday after a con weekend.

I was shaving with a new blade in my razor and no matter how hard I scraped with the new blade, I still could not make any headway with the weekend stubble. It took several minutes for my caffeine-deprived mind to realize that I had put the blade in backwards. Sometimes running a con has the same feeling at times.

Torcon has received all its pass-along funds from the previous 3 Worldcons, in reverse order. Many thanks to Con Jose, MilPhil, and Chicon. In total we received \$40,000USD which will equate to about \$60,000CDN. The money will be put to good use. I believe I have found ways to spend it 10 times over.

My border of choice from crossing to/from the States is the Queenston/Lewiston bridge (You do have to travel across Beaver Island, NY).

For the first time there was a check point by Canadian Customs where I was asked some strange questions (how much Canadian Cash are you carrying, how much US Cash, are these your kids, etc.). As the official banged away at the computer entered unknown information, he queried me about Science Fiction in general. I tried to explain Lunacon, why I was going, etc.. We eventually ended the conversation with him deciding he liked SF Movies and my entering the US. Total crossing time 15 minutes.

Returning, no waiting line and 3 questions asked: Where do you live, When did you leave, and approximately how much did you spend? Now move along...

Our website (www.torcon3.on.ca) is growing at an ever increasing pace. One area is a weekly paragraph from yours truly, highlighting important announcements within the site, among other items of note. The information is updated every Tuesday/Wednesday and each week is archived and available on line. I strongly suggest you visit the website frequently, or at least once a week.

I am pleased to mention that our Facilities Division has been able to secure more party suites for the convention at the Royal York. Woo-hoo!

Torcon is close to securing child care with an outside provider. However, in order to better meet child care needs, we need to know how many people plan to use Child Care. We know how important it is not only to the parents but also to the kids. Our two (ages 4 and 2) were never keen on conventions until we exposed them to the Kids room at cons. Now they can't wait to go back to conventions.

Revision to Torcon 3 Children Membership Policies

Child members:

For purposes of Torcon 3 a child membership is required for a child aged 6 to 12 at the time the convention begins (born after August 28, 1990 but before August 29, 1997) and may be purchased for a child who is younger, if desired.

A child member has the right to attend Torcon 3 for all five days of the convention but must at all times be in the company of an attending member who has full authority and responsibility for the actions and safety of the child member. A child member has no nominating or voting rights. A child member of Torcon 3 does not receive the general publications but will receive a special child's souvenir book.

Torcon 3 plans to provide Child Care. A child member may be placed in child care (subject to space availability) for an additional fee and subject to the rules of the Torcon 3 Child Care department.

Kid-in-tow:

Children under the age of 6 (born after August 28, 1997) do not require membership status and will be admitted free of charge. A Kid-in-Tow badge will be issued for identification purposes and must be worn at all times.

A Kid-in-Tow who is old enough to be out of diapers may be placed in child care (subject to space availablity) for an additional fee and subject to the rules of the Torcon 3 Child Care department. Note that the Child Care fee for a child with Kid-in-Tow status may be greater than the fee for a child who is a Child member.

Please note the following:

- 1) The additional fee and rules of the Torcon 3 Child Care department have not yet been determined.
- 2) Anyone who has purchased a Child membership for their Child who now falls under the Kid-in-Tow status is entitled to a refund. We urge you to apply for that refund prior to the convention in order to make your registration at the convention as smooth as possible.

SARS in Toronto?

[This article was written in April, at the height of media interest in SARS. -ed.]

I live just ten minutes away from one of the hospitals in the Toronto area that has been closed due to a feared SARS (severe acute respiratory syndrome) contamination. The public library nearby where I do a great deal of my research work has posted notices requesting that patrons exhibiting SARS symptoms not enter the building. Just last week, over a hundred workers at the nearby offices of Hewlett-Packard of Canada were quarantined with the fear that they might have been exposed to SARS after a guarantined worker returned to work a day too early. With all this happening literally on my doorstep, you might think I'm scared witless about contracting SARS. I'm not. I do not walk around wearing a mask and latex gloves, I have not been ordered to quarantine, and I am not running to the nearby SARS clinic with every single sniffle or cough. I am still shopping in the local malls, and yes, I still eat at Chinese food restaurants, how could I not with an abundance of excellent restaurants nearby?

As someone who lives full time in the Toronto area, let me say this as clearly as I can: Toronto is safe now and Toronto will still be safe in August when Worldcon arrives.

You wouldn't know it from watching the national and international media coverage of the city. Coverage of the Toronto outbreak has been lumped in with other hot zones such as Hong Kong, and China, where, depending on whose numbers you trust, hundreds have died and thousands are ill with SARS. The uncritical eye watching the media would think that the Black Death has returned, and body-collectors are running around Toronto with wheelbarrows like something out of a Monty Python sketch, minus the humour.

The truth is this: As of the day I finished this article, the entire province of Ontario, home to well over eleven million people, had logged slightly over 300 suspected or probable cases of SARS. According to the definition being

used by Health Canada, a Suspected SARS case is one where the patient has developed a fever and other symptoms of SARS after returning from a SARS hot zone or being in close contact with a Probable SARS patient. Suspected SARS patients might have SARS, or they might have one of the other related illnesses that has similar symptoms. Suspected SARS cases comprise nearly half of the cases being treated in Ontario today. A Probable SARS case is one where the patient has developed SARS symptoms, and has become severely ill with symptoms that do not fit the criteria of any of the other related illnesses. Already, fully a third of the suspected and/or probable SARS patients in Ontario have been treated, given a clean bill of health (for SARS anyway), and released from hospital. Most of the remaining patients are responding well to medical care. The travel advisories, health emergencies, hospital closures, and quarantines that have occurred are the result of a plan by the Toronto and Ontario departments of health to prevent SARS from spreading any farther. They are as much preventative measures as they are reactions to the outbreak. As with the outbreak in many other parts of the world, the fear of SARS has proven much, much more contagious than the illness itself. It is true that thirteen people - all of them traced back one way or another to Toronto's original SARS case - have succumbed to SARS, but all but one of these patients was already in poor health, with chronic or terminal illnesses that resulted in their

bodies having a weakened immune system, when they contracted SARS.

So what does SARS mean to World-con? Nothing, really. The convention is still a go, and everything is business as usual. The number of new SARS cases is not increasing as quickly as it was earlier in March and April. Only a handful of the people quarantined will actually develop SARS. In fact, the only reason there has been a quarantine scare in Toronto at all is because irresponsible people who are at a genuine risk of SARS exposure have been sneaking out of isolation too early, thus forcing health officials to quarantine others just to be on the safe side.

People living in or travelling through Toronto are being reminded to maintain good health and good hygiene practices. Maintaining good health allows your body's immune system to fight off SARS and other viruses naturally. If SARS cases in Toronto continue to decline the way they have until now since the original outbreak, then SARS will effectively be a non-issue by the time the summer rolls around. As it stands right now, you have a better chance of catching the common cold, or being hit by a car during your five days in Toronto than you do getting SARS.

Travel advisories and passenger screening for SARS symptoms at the Customs stations in Toronto's Pearson International Airport will likely add an extra hour or so to the amount of time it takes you to arrive in Toronto, but you can leave the containment suit at home.

Weapons Policy

It is the policy of Torcon that no real or realistic edged or projectile weapons may be carried anywhere within the convention. Exceptions will be made at the Masquerade when approved by the Masquerade Director or for special events when approved by Programming or Events. In any case where an exception is made, the head of Rangers must be notified. No weapon of any kind may be drawn or wielded in any area of the hotels or convention space.

Torcon defines a weapon as any object designed to cause damage, or any replica of such an object, or any object that the Committee determines to pose a risk or perceived risk to the safety of others or to personal or hotel or Convention Centre property. The Committee reserves the right to alter or amend this definition without notice and the right to impound weapons or objects designated as weapons for the duration of Torcon. Failure to put an object that violates this policy away in your hotel room or vehicle, or to leave it with Rangers for the duration of your stay at Torcon, is grounds for immediate revocation of membership without refund and expulsion from the convention.

Dealers who sell weapons or weapon replicas must securely wrap each item at the point of sale and provide each customer with a printed copy of these rules (available from the convention office).

Torcon is well aware that most people who would like to carry weapons are generally sensible and careful individuals. However, we must bear in mind legal liability, our relationship with the hotels and Convention Centre, and the general peace of mind of the ordinary public whom the convention members will be passing amongst as they go back and forth between events.

Summer in the City A Quick Look at Events in Toronto

Toronto is a wonderful city, especially in the summer. In the months between June and September hundreds of events take place in and around the city. If you find while planning your trip that you are going to have a few extra days to spend in Toronto, I recommend arriving in the city a few days early to capitalize on the peak of the summer event season. September 1, the end of Worldcon, is also Labour Day, the traditional end of the summer event season, so most events that do not run year-round will be closed after that date. Below you will find a listing some of the summer events in the city that take place during the months of August and September. It's by no means an extensive list. Prices quoted here are in Canadian dollars and might change as the summer progresses. The first group of events is those that take place within the city of Toronto itself, and can be reached easily and quickly by public transit or car.

The Canadian National Exhibition ("The Ex")

Runs daily from August 15 to September 1

The Ex is a 125-year-old tradition located on the Toronto waterfront. With hundreds of rides, games and exhibits on its midway, the Ex is among the largest annual fairs in North America. It's the kind of fair where planners can put "babes-in-arms" on their ticket pricing signs. (Babes-in-Arms are admitted free with purchase of an adult pass, by the way.) The Ex is one of the largest events in Toronto, and attracts well over a million visitors each year. Easily accessible via public transit from the downtown core, the Ex will provide visitors with days worth of fun and excitement. In addition to its midway, the Exhibition grounds house an agricultural fair, an international bazaar and hundreds of shows by local performers ranging from demonstrations of Tai Chi to Skateboarding. Budget at least one or two days to see The Ex. Most of the events take place outdoors, although the international bazaar, food pavilion and some other events do take place in the permanent buildings on site.

Selected Dates in August

If you have never seen the Cirque du Soleil perform, then I doubt I could accurately describe to you the sheer pleasure that is having the opportunity to take in one of their shows. Cirque du Soleil is a troupe of artists from Montreal who have single-handedly redefined the definition of a circus. Their shows feature everything from interpretive dance and song, to gravity defying acrobatics, and stunts. The troupe has established permanent shows in Las Vegas and Orlando. Its travelling shows are active on three continents. As part of an annual tradition, the Cirque du Soleil's distinctive yellow tent will be set up on the Exhibition grounds during the Canadian National Exhibition. This is a must-see show for anyone who manages to secure tickets. Information on dates, times and ticket prices will be posted on the troupe's official website in the next few months.

The Skydome

Something interesting going on daily, year-round

The Skydome is Toronto's event stadium. Throughout the year it is home to various concerts and events. Playing in the Skydome, which is located just a walk down the street from the site of Torcon 3, the Toronto Blue Jays have been a fixture of summers in Toronto since 1976. The Jays will have 10 home games during the month of August. Ticket prices range from \$7-60, excluding taxes. Tickets are available online through the Toronto Blue Jays' official website, or at the stadium's box office. Tickets are also available for the August and September home games of the Toronto Argonauts, our Canadian Football League team. Ticket prices for the Argonauts' 2003 season were not finalized before this issue went to print. Tours of the Skydome itself are available daily. The tours cost \$12.50 per person and require approximately one hour. The tour itinerary varies based on what Skydome events are scheduled for the day, but can include tours of the stadium's media room, skyboxes, dressing rooms, and the playing field itself.

The 10th Annual Taste of the Danforth Festival August 8-10



Summer in the City...

Events Just Outside Toronto

The small towns and cities around the city are also very active during the summer. If you have the time, check out these wonderful events just minutes from Toronto:

The Ontario Renaissance Festival (Milton, Ontario)
Operates on weekends from July 19 - September 1

The Ontario Renaissance Festival is located about a 45 minute drive away from Toronto in the city of Milton. Ontario. or rather the city known as Milton on Monday through Friday. On summer weekends, the normal hustle and bustle of the city gives way to the excitement of Trillingham, a sixteenth century Tudor village. The village is located on 250 acres of wooded grove, with buildings and attractions in the renaissance style (and carefully concealed 21st century portable toilets). Trillingham is home to dozens of craft merchants, selling everything from tea to chainmail. You'll also find strange and wonderful performances by such celebrities as Zoltan the Adequate and the Theatre in the Ground acting troupe. You will need a car to get to the festival, and you'll need at least one day to take everything in. Special themed weekends occur during the summer months, including the Regional Jousting Championships. Check the faire's website frequently for listings of all special events as they become available.

Paramount Canada's Wonderland (Maple, Ontario) Operating Daily from May 23 - September 1

Canada's Wonderland features over 200 attractions sure to keep you and the little ones busy all day. The park boasts more than 60 roller coasters and all sorts of other devices designed to separate you from your lunch. You can also enjoy countless midway-style games, and entertaining shows ranging from stunts and Chinese acrobatics to dancing cartoon characters (I kid you not). The park also has a 16-slide waterpark that operates daily in the summer, weather permitting.

Ticket prices for a full day of entertainment are \$47.99 for adults and \$23.99 for children and seniors. Taxes and parking fees are not included. Special pricing for guests with disabilities, guests who will not be riding the roller coasters, or guests in large groups, are also available. If you plan on visiting the park more than two or three times during you stay, a Season's Pass, priced at \$92.99 may be a worthwhile investment. The park is conveniently located not far from the highway. Many hotels in the greater Toronto area also have shuttle services to the park. You can travel to the park by public transit, but it's quite time consuming.

The Stratford Festival (Stratford, Ontario)

Runs from April to November

Each year, the Stratford features new productions of some of the most famous plays in the history of theatre. The festival has been host to some of the greatest actors of the theatre, including the late Sir Alec Guinness. This year's list of plays include a wide range of plays, from the Shakespearean classic, the Taming of the Shrew to Roger and Hammerstein's The King and I. The festival recommends that tickets are purchased as far in advance as possible, since they tend to sell out quickly. Ticket prices vary depending on the show, venue and seating, but start at about \$40. For those who do not wish to drive up to Stratford, the festival operates a coach servicing selected matinee performances between June and September that can transport patrons directly from Toronto's Yorkdale Mall to Stratford and back again. Round trip tickets on the coach cost \$35 per person in addition to your performance tickets. A trip to Stratford will require an entire day.

Murray Moore, Facilities Division Head writes...

If you have not reserved your room, the sooner you reserve, the more choice you will have. The rooms reserved exclusively for Torcon 3 members are assigned only until July 26. You will not be able to reserve a room through the Torcon 3 Housing Bureau after July 26.

TORCON 3'S HOTELS

Of Torcon 3's four hotels, the Fairmont Royal York is Torcon 3's largest hotel. The Royal York is the party hotel. Twenty-four hour programming will happen in the Royal York. Daytime programming will occur in the one-block-distant Metro Toronto Convention Centre.

The Royal York is:

- A classic Canadian Pacific Railway hotel
- · Equipped with 13 elevators
- Haunted by two ghosts (not including Torcon 3 GoHst of Honour Robert Bloch)
- · Famous for its martini bar
- A stop on the route of the Pearson Airport express bus
- Opposite Union Station (for Amtrak passengers)
- Fondly remembered by attendees of Torcon 2

The Renaissance Toronto Hotel at Skydome is:

A Toronto landmark

You can sleep in a Toronto landmark: no, not the CN Tower, the other Toronto landmark: the Skydome. Renaissance Toronto Hotel at Skydome is built into the curve of the Skydome, the home of the Toronto Blue Jays.

The Jays are on the road during all of Torcon 3 except Labour Day. On Labour Day the Jays begin a home stand against the New York Yankees. So you won't be disturbed by the roar of the baseball crowd. None of the Torcon 3 rooms have a view of the interior of the Skydome.

Presentation of a Torcon 3 membership gets you a 10 per cent discount in the Skydome hotel's restaurant. You don't need to be staying in the hotel.

The Skydome is around the corner from the Metro Toronto Convention Centre, 300 steps apart, and closer than both the Fairmont Royal York and the Holiday Inn on King. Mere steps if you have a load of loot from the Dealer's Room and Art Show. The Dealer's Room and the Art Show are in the part of the convention centre closest to the Skydome.

While the Skydome is at a higher elevation, pedestrians have a choice of wide steps and ramps. And be sure to look up to see the baseball figure sculptures in the side of the 'Dome.

- A three-star hotel
- The lowest-priced of our hotels

The Crowne Plaza Toronto Centre is:

Popular. All of the rooms are reserved.

SUITE BLOCKER ROOMS

Are you going to the parties every night? Are you helping to host a party? Are you a heavy sleeper? Torcon 3 needs people to volunteer to stay in rooms adjacent to the rooms in which parties are happening. Having people in rooms near parties who will not complain about noise is very desirable for everyone.

If you are staying in the Fairmont Royal York, to volunteer to stay in a room near a party suite, if you are mailing or faxing the Housing Reservation for Torcon 3 form, draw an X in the box named Room closer to party suites; if you are reserving your room online, type Party in the Comment field. Programming Report

Alex von Thorn, Deputy Programming Division Head

writes... The first phase of developing a Worldcon program, arguably the most important aspect, is building a team to get the job done. The second phase is collecting the ideas for items on the program. The third phase is putting the schedule together, and the final phase is preparing for the at-con delivery of the program.

As you can see from the programming division staff list, the first phase is almost complete. There are a few key positions (green room manager, among others) that still need to be fill as this goes to press, and many staff positions where we need people to do the important work at the convention, but many of the key roles have been filled. The second phase is well underway. We have hundreds of ideas from many sources, and the programming team has begun to refine, combine, and select ideas to put in the actual schedule. The third phase of the programming plan is scheduled for April and May, so that a preliminary program schedule can go on the Torcon web site sometime in June.

We are very pleased to announce additions to our team who have come forward in the past few weeks. Tammy Coxen, recent chair of Confusion in Detroit, has agreed to take on the task of Program Operations, running the actual program at-con; Tammy has worked Program Ops at the past two Worldcons. David Gardner, a veteran Worldcon panelist and new president of the Science Fiction Oral History Association, will help us organize Academic Programming. Richard Chwedyk has stepped forward to take on the task of running Writer's Workshops at Torcon, a role he played at Chicon 2000. Piet Van Hiel, recent head of programming at Primedia in Toronto, will be running the gaming rooms at Torcon, with the assistance of Justin Mohareb, another Primedia hand who is also a gaming commenta-

tor for Parsec and other publications. Charles Mohapel, known for years of costume photography, will be helping to organize Costume Programming, with the enthusiastic assistance of the local and international costuming community. This are just the newest members of the programming team.

New people are stepping forward every week, so we have a very good mix of local conrunners, experienced Worldcon volunteers, and others from around the world who are bringing their established expertise into the Worldcon community.

There are some items where we need help from the fan community.

First, we need ideas, both for program items and for program participants. Make sure we know who your favorite authors are. Some authors don't step forward to be on panels unless they are invited, and yet we expect to have more people wanting to be on programming than the schedule can accomodate, so we aren't going to look hard for people who haven't come to us to volunteer unless membes remind us

about who they want to see. In some cases where authors haven't made plans to attend, if we get a dozen requests for them, we can do more than just send an invitation; we can work through publishers' publicity staff or persona contacts to make an extra effort to invite the most popular possible panelists. Now is the time to get in touch with us with what you'd like to see; this is how you can help us make this your Worldcon

The other thing we need are volunteers. We need a good crew of people for green room, program operations, program tech, and gaming; we will get people volunteering at the door, but the more people let us know ahead of time, the more we get people up to speed ahead of time so that we can be more organized at-con. Many tasks in the listhave only a single name, where we will need a team of people, most departments need more people to contribute ideas pre-con and/or time atcon to get the jobs done. We look forward to hearing your ideas, and seeing you all at Torcon!

"Critique circle" workshops

One thing we need to tell you about right away are the "critique circle" workshops we're offering. Here's your chance to get first-hand feedback from your peers and from a number of professionals in the field.

This workshop style requires that manuscripts be submitted in advance by mail or e-mail. The manuscripts will be assigned to a critique circle session where three manuscripts will be considered. Each member of the circle will receive copies of all three manuscripts.

You'll have ample time to read the other entries in your circle, as the other members of your circle will have ample time to read your entry. The members of each circle will include the manuscript entrants, two professionals in the field and a moderator.

In the session, each member offers his or her comments on what they liked, what they didn't like and – most important – what they think will improve the manuscript in question and make it more saleable to editors. The critiques are offered verbally, but also may include written notes and/or notations on their copies of the manuscript (all your manuscript copies will be returned to you at the end of the session). The moderators will offer their critiques as well and they'll make sure no one's critique is interrupted or goes into overtime. Each critique is given without interruption, then the author of the manuscript gets a chance at the end to ask questions and receive clarifications.

The spirit of the critique circles is to provide positive, constructive criticism – but that doesn't exclude being tough at times. This workshop style is probably not recommended for anyone who's only interested in hearing praise or is sensitive to criticism, but remember that we're here to help.

Because of the amount of time, care and forethought taken in putting these circles together, you may as well make the best us of this opportunity and submit your best work – something you really desire to get published.

The critique circles will be held in quiet, private rooms on the con site, but away from the hustle and bustle, and will last about three hours, so that everyone has a chance to get their comments in. Visitors will not be allowed to sit in (excepting assistants to entrants with physical disabilities). Please make sure to show up on time for your section. Late arrivals cause headaches for everyone.

Fees

There's a \$48.15 (\$32.10 USD) fee, including taxes – to cover the cost of photocopying, mailing and routing of manuscripts to other members of your circle. Make checks payable to TorCon3. If mailing your fee (which should be included in your manuscript submission if you're mailing your submission) you can also use your credit card by including your credit card information (Visa, Mastercard, American Express). All credit card payments will be processed in Canadian Funds.

Registering for the workshop

The critique circles are open to all attending members of TorCon 3. Please pre-register so we can confirm your membership. Please make sure your manuscript is as close to a professional format as possible. Double-spacing, one inch margins, a readable font (preferably Courier) on white paper, printed on one side only. Please paper clip it and ensure that your name, manuscript name, and page number is in the header of each page. You need only submit one copy of each entry.

The length of the manuscript is limited to 7,500 words, or roughly thirty printed or typewritten pages. They should be works of prose fiction – science fiction, fantasy or dark fantasy/horror or at least contain some fantastic element – either short stories or sections of longer works, though the longer works should include a brief synopsis that will be considered part of the 7,500 word limit.

All submissions should include a cover letter with your name, address, phone number, an e-mail address if you have one and your TorCon registration/badge number. Entrants who wish to have more than one work critiqued should submit separate checks for each entry. If a work is a collaboration, it will be counted as one entry.
