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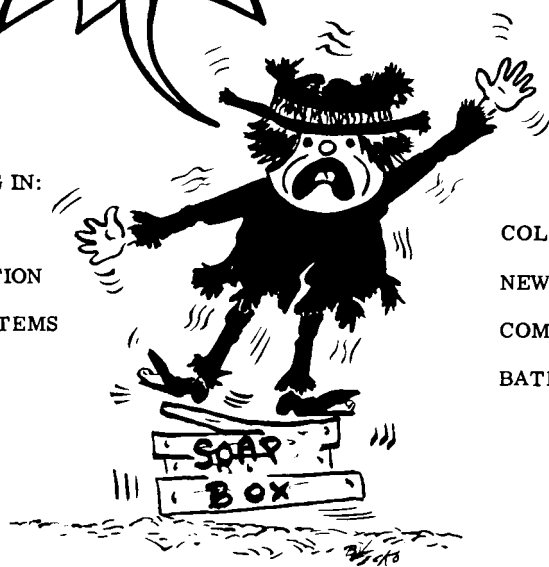
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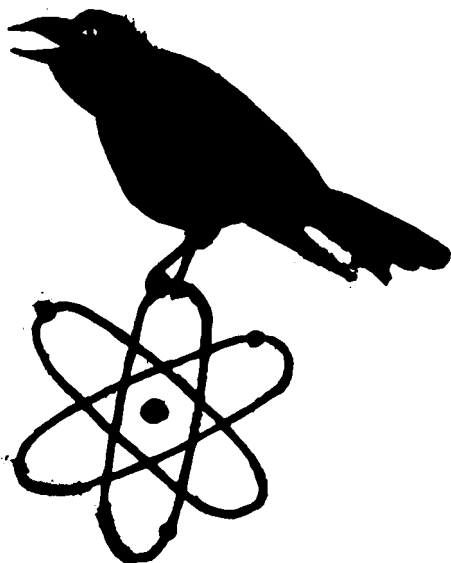

Wells' birthday, it is entirely fitting and the Tricon Committee wishes to further announce that it will match John Brunner's offer with another \$10 to make it a total of \$20.

SPECIAL ROOM RATES FOR HIGHER PRICED SUITES: In Progress Report No. 2 we asked if members were interested in some of the higher priced suites - interested, providing that we could arrange a 20% discount off the usual rate. The response was high enough to make us look into the matter further and we have been successful in obtaining the discount. Here, then, are the rates:

\$45 per date suite (Discount Price \$36.00)	- - sleeps four (1 twin bedroom & 2 cots)

Your cost with 4 sleeping in the \$36 per day suite	breaks down to \$9 per person

It is obvious from the above breakdown that the \$40 and \$52 per day suites are the better buys. Please bear in mind that these suites have only one bathroom and would result in a certain amount of discomfort with 6 or 8 individuals occupying them. We should point out that SOME of the above suites can be obtained with TWO TWIN BEDROOMS with the same discount applying. The Tricon Committee brings these special priced suites to the attention of the members so that those who have special parties or entertaining of their own in mind can take advantage of the special discount price.

BUDGET MINDED FANS will probably find even the economical room rates of the Hotel Cleveland-Sheraton beyond reach. Please remember that the \$7.85 single room rate is the lowest rate given to convention members in many years. To the budget minded fans we offer the following room rates sent us by the local Y. M. 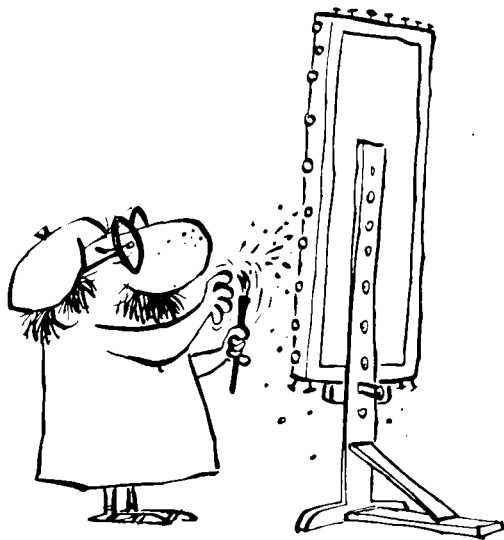
